WATER EFFICIENCY REBATE PROGRAM UPDATE

SUMMARY:

IRWD implements numerous water efficiency programs to assist customers with reducing water use. Rebate and other programs are funded from over-allocation revenues and vary depending upon the needs of the various customer types served by the District. This report provides an update on water savings to be realized from IRWD's rebate programs as well as expenditures on each program during Fiscal Year (FY) 2019-20.

BACKGROUND:

IRWD provides supplemental funding for specific devices offered in the regional rebate program which is administered by Metropolitan Water District (MWD). IRWD's customers are eligible for rebates on the water efficient devices offered through MWD's program and receive the added benefit of an increased rebate amount on the devices selected for IRWD supplemental funding. The supplemental funding is made available primarily for outdoor devices and other water efficient equipment taking into consideration device saturation, cost effectiveness, product cost and the availability of other regional funding. IRWD's cost of water to be saved from all the rebate programs combined during FY 2019-20 was approximately \$24 per acre-foot (AF). The table below shows the expected lifetime of water savings and expenditures for each rebate program for FY 2019-20. More than half of IRWD's expenditures were for turf removal.

2020 LEGISLATIVE AND REGULATORY UPDATE

SUMMARY:

This report provides an update on the 2019-2020 legislative session, regulatory issues, and IRWD priorities. As legislation and regulations develop, staff will provide updates and recommendations to the Water Resources Policy and Communications Committee and the Board, as appropriate. Staff recommends the Board receive and file the report.

BACKGROUND:

On July 27, both the Assembly and the State Senate returned from their summer recesses, two weeks later than they had been scheduled to return. With the delayed return, the policy and fiscal committee deadlines were moved. Policy committees now have until August 14 to hear bills in the Assembly and August 15 to hear bills in the Senate. Fiscal committees in both houses will have until August 21 to meet and report bills to the floor. The last day for each house to pass bills without an urgency clause this legislative year is August 31, which is the day the Final Recess begins.

A copy of the 2020 Legislative Matrix is provided as Exhibit "A". Links to the bills discussed below are included within each discussion, unless a separate exhibit is noted.

Economic Recovery Plan:

On July 27, the day that the Legislature returned from its summer recess, legislative leadership unveiled an outline for a \$100 billion economic stimulus plan developed by two Assembly and Senate work groups. A copy of the released outline is provided as Exhibit "B".

The economic stimulus plan proposes to raise \$100 billion for the State by issuing future tax vouchers, securitizing current revenue streams, accelerating general obligation bonds, and borrowing from the federal government. The plan focuses on three policy objects, which the outlines states as:

- <u>Support for Small Business</u> Protect small businesses from the impacts of the economic downturn through policy changes and funding;
- <u>Protections for Working Families</u> Support struggling workers through stronger benefit programs and policy changes, while ensuring families have access to affordable housing and students have a safe way to learn; and
- <u>Investments in Our Green Economy</u> Improve the environment, combat climate change, and create green infrastructure and jobs with investments.

The outline of the plan is limited on details, but specific proposals included in it would bolster unemployment benefits, should the federal surplus benefit not be renewed; expand housing and mitigating hardships for homeowners and renters, including protections from evictions; and invest in climate resilience and green infrastructure, including improving clean water delivery and recycling infrastructure and creating a fund to incentivize clean vehicles and expand electric vehicle charging infrastructure.

According to working group leaders, the working groups will seek input on the plan from Governor Gavin Newsom's Administration, including the Governor's Task Force on Business and Jobs Recovery, as well as from the public. The work group intends to work to enact the plan before the August 31 end of the 2020 legislative session and to identify priorities for the following legislative session.

The Senate and Assembly work groups were led by Senate Bob Hertzberg (D-Van Nuys), Senate Steven Bradford (D-Gardena), Assemblymember Phil Ting (D-San Francisco) and Assemblymember Jacqui Irwin (D-Thousand Oaks). The other work group members included Senators Jim Beall (D-San Jose), Anna Caballero (D-Salinas), Maria Elena Durazo (D-Los Angeles), Cathleen Galgiani (D-Modesto), Holly Mitchell (D-Los Angles), Anthony Portantino (D-Glendale), Nancy Skinner (D-Oakland), and Bob Wieckowski (D-Fremont); and Assemblymembers Tasha Boerner Horvath (D-Carlsbad), David Chiu (D-San Francisco), Eduardo Garcia (D-Coachella), Adam Gray (D-Merced), Tim Grayson (D-Vallejo), Sydney Kamlager (D-Culver City), Monique Limón (D- Santa Barbara), Kevin McCarty (D-Sacramento), Kevin Mullin (D- San Mateo), Al Muratsuchi (D-Torrance), Cottie Petrie-Norris (D- Newport Beach), Rudy Salas(D- Bakersfield) and Buffy Wicks (D-Oakland).

2020 State Legislative Update:

In addition to any updates on new developments, staff will discuss the following bills/topics with the Committee:

- SB 414 (Caballero, D-Salinas) Small System Water Authority Act of 2019;
- SB 1099 (Dodd, D-Napa/Glazer, D-Orinda) Emergency Backup Generators;
- SB 1386 (Moorlach) Local Government- Water Assessments, Fees and Charges; and
- State-proposed COVID-19 related legislation.

2020 State Regulatory Update:

Governor's Executive Order on a Water Resiliency Portfolio:

On April 29, 2019, Governor Newsom issued an executive order (EO) for the California Natural Resources Agency, the California Environmental Protection Agency, and the California Department of Food and Agriculture. The EO directed the agencies to prepare a water resiliency portfolio that "meets the needs of California's communities, economy, and environment through the 21st century." The EO also directed the agencies to base the portfolio on seven principles:

- Prioritize multi-benefit approaches that meet several needs at once;
- Utilize natural infrastructure such as forests and floodplains;
- Embrace innovation and new technologies;
- Encourage regional approaches among water users sharing watersheds;
- Incorporate successful approaches from other parts of the world;
- Integrate investments, policies, and programs across state government; and
- Strengthen partnerships with local, federal and tribal governments, water agencies and irrigation districts, and other stakeholders.

In directing the State agencies to develop a Water Resiliency Portfolio, the Governor was seeking to develop his plan for California water. After a multi-month public outreach process and comment period over the summer of 2019, the "Draft 2020 Water Resilience Portfolio" was released on January 3, 2020. Following the release of the draft, the Administration and State agencies held another public comment period and then continue their work to finalize the Water Resilience Portfolio.

On July 28, Governor Newsom released the final version of his *Water Resilience Portfolio*. In releasing the final portfolio, the Administration said that the Portfolio is:

"[T]he Administration's blueprint for equipping California to cope with more extreme droughts and floods, rising temperatures, declining fish populations, over-reliance on groundwater and other challenges."

"The portfolio outlines 142 state actions to help build a climate-resilient water system in the face of climate change. The actions tie directly to Administration efforts to carry out recent laws regarding safe and affordable drinking water, groundwater sustainability and water-use efficiency. They also elevate priorities to secure voluntary agreements in key watersheds to improve flows and conditions for fish, address air quality and habitat challenges around the Salton Sea and protect the long-term functionality of the State Water Project and other conveyance infrastructure."

Given the recent impacts of COVID-19 to the State's finances, the Administration acknowledges that the implementation of the actions contained within final portfolio will depend on the State's budget situation; however, it will prioritize the following:

- Implementing the Safe and Affordable Drinking Water Act of 2019;
- Supporting local communities to successfully implement the Sustainable Groundwater Management Act of 2014;
- Achieving voluntary agreements to increase flows and improve conditions for native fish in the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta and its watersheds;
- Modernizing the Delta water conveyance system to protect long-term functionality of the State Water Project;

- Updating regulations to expand water recycling;
- Accelerating permitting of new smart water storage;
- Expanding seasonal floodplains for fish and flood benefits;
- Improving conditions at the Salton Sea;
- Removing dams from the Klamath River; and
- Better leveraging of information and data to improve water management.

Staff will discuss the final *Water Resilience Portfolio* with the Committee and the District's next steps in advocating for the actions it proposed for inclusion in the portfolio.

Other State Regulatory Updates:

The following is a list of some of the State regulations and agency reports staff is monitoring, tracking or planning to engage in over the next three to 12 months. As the next drafts of the regulations or report are released for public review and comment, staff will engage, as appropriate. Staff will also provide an oral update to the Committee on any new developments related to these regulations.

The pending regulations and reports actively being tracked include the:

- California Air Resources Board's Advanced Clean Trucks Regulations;
- Department of Water Resources (DWR) and the State Board's implementation of the "Making Water Conservation a California Way of Life" legislation;
- State Board's development of a "Cross Connection Policy Handbook;"
- State Board's Safe and Affordable Funding for Equity and Resilience (SFER) Drinking Water Program;
- State Board's water loss performance standards regulations; and
- State Board's "Water Quality Control Plan for Inland Surface Waters, Enclosed Bays, and Estuaries of California" and draft "Toxicity Provisions."

2020 Federal Legislative Update:

IRWD's federal advocacy efforts in 2020 continue to largely focus on seeking federal funding for the Kern Fan Groundwater Storage Project and advocating for an increased funding authorization for the federal Water Storage Program. As the nation's attention has shifted to COVID-19, staff and the District's advocates have been tracking the federal legislation dealing with the coronavirus. Staff also continues to track federal legislation related to infrastructure funding. Staff will update the Committee on these efforts and on the ongoing efforts related to positioning the Kern Fan Groundwater Storage Project for federal funding this year. Additionally, staff will update the Committee on efforts related to federal dam safety funding.

 - Accelerate existing CPUC revenue streams that will expand broadband services throughout the state to benefit distance learning and other activities.
 - Accelerate future Cap and Trade funds to backfill lost revenues due to the downturn and ensure critical programs remain funded.
 - Accelerate authorized, but unused, general obligation bonds to generate bond funds to infrastructure projects.
 - Borrow from the federal government to bolster state unemployment insurance programs.

- Support for Small Business. Protect small businesses from the impacts of the economic downturn through policy changes and funding, including, but not limited to, the following efforts:
 - Expand small business tax breaks, such as extending the sales tax loan program.
 - Exclude small businesses from increased Unemployment Insurance costs to repay federal unemployment insurance funds.
 - Reduce the risk of small business owners, and other Californians, losing their homes due to bankruptcy.
 - Combat history of systemic racism and sexism with efforts to support minority and women owned businesses.
 - Streamline the Work Sharing program administered by EDD so more employers have temporary alternatives to layoffs when its business operations are reduced.
 - Incentivize on-shore manufacturing of PPE, ventilators, swabs and other products critical to our COVID-19 response, including expansion of workforce retraining programs.
- ✓ Protections for Working Families. Support struggling workers through stronger benefit programs and policy changes, while ensuring families have access to affordable housing and students have a safe way to learn, including, but not limited to, the following efforts:
 - Fill gaps in Unemployment Insurance, including extending to undocumented workers, shortfalls resulting from if the federal government does not extend the \$600 per week payment, and other holes that remain.
 - Expand the EITC to provide more relief to low-income Californians, including those that file taxes with Individual Tax Identification Numbers.
 - Improve access to safe childcare programs, including capital assistance for homeowners updating homes for in-home childcare services.
 - Help students return safely to in-person education while balancing costs to schools, and provide expanded broadband access, particularly in rural and

unserved communities, so students who cannot return to the classroom aren't left behind during distance learning.

- Increase affordable housing supply by helping homeowners access financing to build ADUs, and loaning public higher education institutions funds to build more student housing.
- Protect renters from eviction and support struggling homeowners and landlords.
- Augment Budget Act appropriations for local governments to combat homelessness, and provide incentives for local governments to build housing on non-traditional sites.
- ✓ Investments in our Green Economy. Improve the environment, combat climate change, and create green infrastructure and jobs with investments including, but are not limited to, the following efforts:
 - o Invest in wildfire prevention and vegetation management activities.
 - Fight sea level rise, and protect wetlands and communities from climate change impacts.
 - o Improve clean water delivery and recycling infrastructure.
 - Create a dedicated fund to incentivize light and heavy-duty, including passenger clean vehicles, as well as expedite and expand electric vehicle charging infrastructure projects.
 - Make buildings more energy efficient with greener HVAC and water systems, as well as clean energy generation and battery energy storage systems.
 - Streamline the CEQA through targeted, and limited, use of the AB 900 process – including for housing – to ensure environmental leadership projects actually get built.
