PUBLIC HEARING

SEWER CHARGES IN IRWD'S NEWPORT NORTH AREA

SUMMARY:

On June 26, 2023, the Board adopted Rates and Charges effective July 1, 2023, which included monthly sewer charges of \$33.24 for a residential single-family home and \$23.10 per unit for multiple-family dwelling units. IRWD customers in Newport North will be charged the same rate, but the method of collection differs in that they pay their sewer fees on an annual basis by means of the County of Orange tax rolls.

BACKGROUND:

By adoption of Resolution No. 1987-45, the Board of Directors elected to have sewer charges for certain parcels of land located in the Newport North area collected on the tax roll together with IRWD's general taxes. This resolution directs the filing of a report, attached as Exhibit "A", containing a description of such parcels and the corresponding charges for each fiscal year. The recommended resolution for adopting the sewer charge report and authorizing the collection of sewer charges on the tax roll for IRWD's Newport North Area is attached as Exhibit "B".

On June 26, 2023, the Board adopted Rates and Charges effective July 1, 2023, which included monthly sewer charges of \$33.24 for a residential single-family home and \$23.10 per unit for multiple-family dwelling units.

Sewer Charges for IRWD's Newport North Customers

IRWD's Newport North customers are charged the IRWD Board-adopted sewer rate, but they pay their sewer fees on an annual basis by means of the County of Orange tax rolls. In 2022, the previous monthly sewer charges of \$29.75 for a residential single-family home and \$20.45 per unit for multiple-family dwelling units were included in County tax rolls for IRWD's Newport North customers for the 12-month period of July 2022 to June 2023. The monthly sewer charges increased to \$33.24 for a residential single-family home and to \$23.10 per unit for multiple-family dwelling units for Fiscal Year (FY) 2023-24. The total assessment will be \$398.88 and \$277.20 for single-family home customers and multiple-family dwelling unit customers respectively.

To implement these sewer charges for IRWD's Newport North customers, staff recommends that the Board conduct the Public Hearing, per Resolution No. 1987-45, and adopt the recommended resolution regarding the new sewer charges for these customer.

PUBLIC HEARING:

Resolution No. 1987-45 directs the filing of a report containing a description of such parcels and the corresponding charges for each fiscal year. Pursuant to the requirements of the Health and Safety Code of the State of California, a public hearing on the report is required. The District Secretary has noticed a hearing for this meeting for objections or protests to the report, if any.

FISCAL IMPACTS:

The sewer rates charged in IRWD's Newport North are the same as any other area within the District, and therefore will be set at total assessment of \$398.88 for a residential single-family home, which is the equivalent of twelve months assessment of \$33.24 per month for FY 2023-24, and \$277.20 for multiple-family dwelling units, which is the equivalent of twelve months assessment of \$23.10 per month for FY 2023-24, respectively. The total sewer charges are the same rate as other IRWD customers, but the means of collection is different for the customers in Newport North.

RESOLUTION NO. 2023-

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF IRVINE RANCH WATER DISTRICT ADOPTING THE SEWER CHARGE REPORT AND AUTHORIZING COLLECTION OF SEWER CHARGES ON THE TAX ROLL FOR THE NEWPORT NORTH SERVICE AREA

Resolution No. 1987-45 was adopted on August 10, 1987. The Board of Directors of Irvine Ranch Water District ("IRWD") elected to have sewer charges for certain parcels collected on the tax roll each year in the same manner, by the same persons, and at the same time as, together with and not separately from, its general taxes, pursuant to Section 5473 et seq. of the California Health and Safety Code.

Pursuant to said Resolution, a report has been filed with the Secretary containing a description of such parcels and the corresponding charges for Fiscal Year 2023-24 and notice was given as required by law of a hearing on the report to be held on Monday, the 10th day of July 2023, at 5:00 p.m. (or as soon thereafter as is reasonably practicable) in the Board of Directors meeting room of IRWD, 15600 Sand Canyon Avenue, Irvine, California.

The duly noticed public hearing was held and all persons interested were given an opportunity to be heard concerning the report and to submit any objections or protests to the report.

The Board of Directors of IRWD does hereby RESOLVE, DETERMINE and ORDER as follows:

<u>Section 1.</u> The Board of Directors hereby determines that protests to the report were not made by the owners of a majority of separate parcels of property described in the report.

Section 2. The Board of Directors hereby adopts the report containing a description of the parcels for which charges for sewer service shall be collected on the tax roll and containing the amount of the charges for each parcel for the Fiscal Year 2023-24, computed in conformity with the schedule of rates and charges adopted by Resolution No. 2023-___. The report is provided as Exhibit "A" and is incorporated herein by this reference. Each charge set forth in Exhibit "A" is hereby determined to be adopted.

<u>Section 3.</u> The Secretary is hereby authorized and directed to endorse on the report a statement that the report was adopted by this Board on July 10, 2023, and to take whatever other action is required by the Auditor of the County of Orange in regard thereto in order to place the charges on the tax roll for the parcels described in the report.

<u>Section 4</u>. The Secretary is hereby authorized and directed to file a copy of such report with the Auditor of the County of Orange.

MINUTES OF REGULAR MEETING - JUNE 26, 2023

The regular meeting of the Board of Directors of the Irvine Ranch Water District (IRWD) was called to order at 5:00 p.m. by President McLaughlin on June 26, 2023 at the District offices, 15600 Sand Canyon Avenue, Irvine.

Directors Present: Withers, Reinhart, Swan, LaMar and McLaughlin

Directors Absent: None

Written Communications and Oral Communications: None

Also Present: General Manager Cook, Executive Director of Operations Chambers, Executive Director of Water Policy Weghorst, Director of Water Resources Sanchez, Director of Human Resources Mitcham, Director of Water Quality and Regulatory Compliance Colston, Director of Safety and Security Choi, Director of Maintenance Manning, Director of Treasury Morris, Director of Information Services Kaneshiro, Director of Recycling Operations Zepeda, Secretary Bonkowski, Assistant Secretary Swan, General Counsel Collins, Consultant Newell, and members of the staff and public.

PUBLIC HEARING: PROPOSED CHANGES TO THE SCHEDULE OF RATES AND CHARGES EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2023

General Manager Cook reported that on April 24, 2023, IRWD adopted its Fiscal Year (FY) 2023-24 and 2024-25 Operating Budgets. Mr. Cook said that the proposed changes to IRWD's rates and charges were publicly noticed by mail as required under Proposition 218, and protests to the implementation of those rates and charges have been tallied by the District's independent auditors. He said that as of June 22, 2023, six written protest letters were received by the District, which represents less than 0.005% of the total customers and substantially less than the 50% which would have been required to prevent the Board from adopting the current proposed rates and charges.

President McLaughlin declared this to be the time and place for a hearing on the proposed changes to the rates and charges and asked the Secretary how the hearing was noticed.

Secretary Bonkowski said that the hearing was noticed by mail and presented an affidavit of mailing. On <u>MOTION</u> by Swan, seconded by LaMar and unanimously carried, THE AFFIDAVIT OF MAILING BY AN INDEPENDENT PROCESSING FIRM AS PRESENTED BY THE SECRETARY WAS RECEIVED AND FILED.

President McLaughlin asked Legal Counsel to describe the nature of the proceedings. Legal Counsel Collins said that the public hearing is held, pursuant to Proposition 218, Article XIIID of the Constitution of the State of California, for all persons interested to be heard, to present objections or protests, including any written comments submitted, concerning the increase in property-related rates and charges and any proposed new property-related rates and charges.

PUBLIC HEARING (Continued)

President McLaughlin asked for a staff report on the proposed rates and charges, and she inquired whether there have been any written communications.

Using a PowerPoint presentation, Manager of Strategic Planning and Analysis Smithson provided a staff report and noted the number of protests received to the implementation of the rates and charges.

President McLaughlin asked whether there was anyone present who wished to address the Board regarding the proposed changes to the rates and charges. There were none.

President McLaughlin asked whether there were any comments or questions from members of the Board of Directors. In response to Director Swan's request for staff to confirm the pumping charges in the Newport Coast area, the motion for this item was amended to include a further review of these charges. In response to Director Reinhart's inquiry relative to water contingency rates, Legal Counsel Collins clarified the noticing process where the Water Shortage Contingency Plan rates allow the District to set a maximum rate, if needed. There being no further comments, on <u>MOTION</u> by Swan, seconded by LaMar and unanimously carried, THE HEARING WAS CLOSED AND THE FOLLOWING RESOLUTION WAS ADOPTED BY TITLE SUBJECT TO A REVIEW OF THE PUMPING SURCHARGES IN THE NEWPORT COAST AREA:

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF IRVINE RANCH WATER DISTRICT ADOPTING CHANGES TO THE SCHEDULE OF RATES AND CHARGES FOR WATER, SEWER, AND RECYCLED WATER SERVICE

CONSENT CALENDAR

Prior to voting, Director Swan asked staff to confirm the \$100,000 annual cost for the retiree health plan as noted in the Board writeup No. 9. This amount was confirmed by Director of Human Resources Mitcham. Director Swan also requested, relative to Item No. 10, to make the annual payment to CalPERS before the end of the fiscal year if possible. Staff said that they would confirm with CalPERS and review current accounting rules to determine if this is possible, and, if possible, to make this payment before July 1, 2023.

Before the vote, Mr. Cook further said that each June, the Board is typically asked to consider changes to the salary schedules for District employees. He said that pursuant to Government Code 9495.3(c)(3), prior to taking final action on changes to salary schedules that include salary ranges for local agency executives, a summary of the recommended action for Item No. 8 is required. He said that the recommendation for the Board's consideration is adoption of a resolution revising the District's Schedule of Positions and Salary Rate Ranges for the General Unit, the non-exempt Supervisor Unit, and for Managers, Exempt Supervisors, Confidential and Exempt Employees effective July 1, 2023. He stated that although the General Manager's salary is included in the schedule, no increase in the General Manager's salary was being made. This action will supersede Resolution No. 2022-14. He further said that the revision to the salary grade schedule is based on a cost-of-living adjustment of 3.8% for Fiscal Year 2023-24.

CONSENT CALENDAR

2023 LEGISLATIVE AND REGULATORY UPDATE

SUMMARY:

This report provides an update on the 2023 legislative session, regulatory issues, and IRWD priorities. As legislation and regulations develop, staff will provide updates and recommendations to the Board, as appropriate. Staff recommends the Board consider the following actions / positions:

- H.R. 2964 (McClain / Peltola)/S. 1350 (Merkley / Collins) Wastewater Infrastructure Pollution Prevention and Environmental Safety (WIPPES) Act: "SUPPORT";
- *H.R. 3027 (Porter) Reclamation Climate Change and Water Program Reauthorization Act of 2023: "SUPPORT";*
- S. 1429 (Lummis) Resource Management (PFAS) Liability Protection Act of 2023: "SUPPORT";
- S. 1430 (Lummis) Water Systems PFAS Liability Protection Act: "SUPPORT"; and
- Senate Environment and Public Works (EPW) Committee Draft PFAS Legislation: "SEEK AMENDMENTS".

BACKGROUND:

June 2, 2023 was the House of Origin deadline, the deadline by which each house of the Legislature is required to pass bills introduced in that house if they are to move forward, while June 15, 2023 was the constitutional deadline for passage of the State Budget. July 14, 2023 is the last day for policy committees to meet and consider bills, and also the day on which the Legislature will begin its month-long Summer Recess.

A copy of the 2023 Legislative Matrix is provided as Exhibit "A". Links to the bills discussed below are included within each discussion unless a separate exhibit is noted.

Fiscal Year (FY) 2023-24 State Budget:

On June 15, 2023, the Legislature passed *SB 101 (Skinner, D-Berkeley)*, the Budget Act of 2023. While the passed budget did meet the June 15 constitutional deadline for passage of a budget, the budget is a placeholder budget while the Governor, Senate President pro Tempore, and Assembly Speaker negotiate the final budget package. This adopted placeholder budget has begun to be referred to as the "Paycheck Budget" because it was passed by the deadline for the Legislature to act and still continue to be paid. As of the writing of this report, a final budget deal has yet to be reached.

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The Paycheck Budget will be amended when a final budget is negotiated and acted upon. The actions related to a final budget deal will also include action on the budget trailer bills agreed to in the budget negotiations and any budget bill "juniors" associated with the negotiated budget deal. This year there are a significant number of budget trailers bills under discussion. As the <u>Assembly Floor Report of the 2023-24 Budget</u> states there are "around 20 or more trailer bills and one or more "budget bills junior" that will be associated with the 2023-2024 budget. Given the number of bills related to the budget, it is expected that action on budget-related bills will likely continue into late August or early September, and that a few 2023-24 budget-related bills will likely be considered in early 2024.

Paycheck Budget Details:

The Paycheck Budget provides for \$311.7 billion in total spending, including \$227 billion from the General Fund, and a total General Fund Reserves of \$37.2 billion. It also restores spending that the Governor had proposed cutting in his May Revise. The Paycheck Budget restored this spending by offsetting \$1.3 billion in cuts to spending approved in previous budgets, including \$937 for the strategic energy reserve and \$416 million for Voluntary Agreements.

Among the funding restored in the Paycheck Budget are:

- \$310 million for recycled water programs;
- \$204 million for the statewide parks program;
- \$124.5 million for urban greening;
- \$102 million for coastal resilience programs at the Coastal Conservancy and \$65 million to implement SB 1 at the Ocean Protection Council;
- \$75 million for the extreme heat and community resilience program;
- \$70 million for *per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances* (PFAS) cleanup;
- \$50 million for dam safety, and moves the full \$100 million to 2023;
- \$6 million for Natural Community Conservation Program Planning and Land Acquisition;
- \$62.5 million for Regional Climate Resilience;
- \$94 million for various watershed resilience programs; and
- \$50 million for Salton Sea restoration.

The Paycheck Budget also includes:

- \$290 million for flood protection;
- Adds \$60 million to reduce lead in schools through testing, filters, and faucet replacements; and
- Includes statute language to allow water agencies to access \$406 million in unspent funds for water arrearages.

Staff will provide the Board with an update on the budget, any agreed to or enacted final budget deal and discussion surrounding budget trailer bills associated with the 2023-2024 budget.

2023 State Legislative Update:

AB 516 (*Ramos*, *D-San Bernardino*) – *Mitigation Fee Act: Fees for Improvements: Expenditure Reports and Audits:*

Under existing law, the Mitigation Fee Act governs development impact fees (DIFs) that a local agency may charge a development project. AB 516 would add requirements to the Mitigation Fee Act requiring local agencies to make certain additional information available to the public related the public improvements for which DIFs are being charged. The bill would also revise the audit requirements for DIFs.

Additionally, AB 516, as amended on June 15, modifies the audit requirements for both DIFs and water and sewer connection fees. The audit provisions would add in a requirement that any audit of DIF's, and possibly connection fees, include when the revenue generated by a fee or charge is scheduled to be expended and when the development project is scheduled to be completed. While that information may be appropriate for DIFs, connection fees have separate audit requirements under another provision of the Government Code.

The local government and wastewater industry are currently working to seek a clarifying amendment to AB 516, which clarifies that the proposed audit requirements in AB 516 apply to DIF's while the requirements outlined in other sections of the Government Code govern audits of connections fees. Staff will update the Board on the status of this effort.

AB 516 is currently in the Senate Appropriations Committee.

AB 764 (Bryan, D-Culver City/Cervantes, D-Corona) – Local Redistricting:

AB 764 would require special districts, school districts, community college districts, and county boards of education, if the governing body of these local governments is elected by districts, to comply with the Fair and Inclusive Redistricting for Municipalities and Political Subdivisions (FAIR MAPS) Act. The FAIR MAPS Act currently governs the redistricting process for cities and counties.

Specifically, the FAIR MAPS Act prescribes the specific process by which a city or county must redistrict its division boundaries. It prescribes certain outreach, hearing and process requirements. Additionally, it mandates the criteria, in ranked order, which must be used for redistricting. AB 764 proposes to apply these same requirements and criteria to special districts elected by division-based elections.

AB 764 would require a special district to draw divisions that are:

• Substantially equal in population as required by the United States Constitution using the total population of residents of the local jurisdiction as determined by the most recent federal decennial census, but including any incarcerated person whose last known place

of residence was within that district and excluding those whose last known place of residence was outside of the District;

- In compliance with the United States Constitution, the California Constitution, and the federal Voting Rights Act of 1965; and
- If possible, based on a required analysis, create minority-majority divisions if there are minority groups sufficiently large and geographically compact enough to constitute a majority in a single-member division.

Additionally, AB 764 would require that the following criteria, in the following order of priority, be used to draw the new division boundaries:

- To the maximum extent practicable, divisions shall be geographically contiguous. Areas that meet only at the points of adjoining corners are not contiguous and areas that are separated by water and not connected by a bridge, tunnel, or regular ferry service are not contiguous;
- To the maximum extent practicable, the geographic integrity of any local neighborhood or local community of interest shall be respected in a manner that minimizes its division. A "community of interest" is defined as a:

"population that shares common social or economic interests that should be included within a single election district for purposes of its effective and fair representation. Characteristics of communities of interest may include, but are not limited to, shared public policy concerns such as education, public safety, public health, environment, housing, transportation, and access to social services. Characteristics of communities of interest may also include, but are not limited to, cultural districts, shared socioeconomic characteristics, similar voter registration rates and participation rates, and shared histories. Communities of interest do not include relationships with political parties, incumbents, or political candidates";

- 3) To the maximum extent practicable, the geographic integrity of a city or census designated place shall be respected in a manner that minimizes its division;
- 4) To the maximum extent practicable, divisions shall be bounded by natural and artificial barriers, by streets, or by the boundaries of the local jurisdiction. Division boundaries should be easily identifiable and understandable by residents; and
- 5) To the maximum extent practicable, division shall be drawn to encourage geographical compactness in a manner that nearby areas of population are not bypassed in favor of more distant populations.

AB 764 also states that the "districting body shall not adopt election district boundaries for the purpose of favoring or discriminating against an incumbent, political candidate, or political party."

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This bill would additionally establish a procedure for legal challenges over local jurisdictions' compliance with the redistricting requirements.

AB 764 has been assigned to the Senate Committee on Elections and Constitutional Amendments, and the Senate Government and Finance Committee.

SB 3 (Dodd, D-Napa) – Discontinuation of Residential Water Service:

SB 3 would expand the applicability of the Water Shutoff Protection Act ("Act") (a.k.a. SB 998) to public water systems that serve at least 15 service connections used by yearlong residents or regularly serves at least 25 yearlong residents and require community water systems to comply with SB 998 provisions on or after August 1, 2024.

Previous versions of this bill would not have impacted IRWD, but the bill was amended on June 15 and now modifies provisions of SB 998 which apply to IRWD.

SB 3 now would require all public water systems to have a written policy on discontinuation of residential service for nonpayment that includes a plan for deferred or reduced payments and alternative payments schedules for all customers, not just low-income customers, who are delinquent on their water bills.

Additionally, as amended, SB 3 expands the Attorney Generals' ability to bring an action again a water supplier for violating this area of the law. SB 3 would permit the Attorney General to bring an action in state court to do either of the following:

- 1) "Restrain by temporary or permanent injunction the use of any method, act, or practice declared in this chapter to be unlawful;" or
- 2) "Restore to any person in interest any money or property, real or personal, that may have been acquired by any method, act, or practice declared by this chapter to be unlawful."

IRWD currently has a "watch" position on SB 3. Staff will discuss SB 3 with the Board. As of the writing of this report, SB 3 is in the Assembly Appropriations Committee.

Update on Bills of Interest to IRWD:

As has been traditionally done after the House of Origin deadline, staff is providing an update on bills the District has taken a position on or has actively monitored during this legislative session. The location of each bill, as of the writing of this report, is noted below. Staff will provide an oral update to the Board on bill status changes.

AB 30 (Ward, D-San Diego) – Atmospheric Rivers Research, Mitigation, and Climate Forecasting Program:

AB 30 would require the Department of Water Resources (DWR) to take certain actions to improve atmospheric river predictions and their impacts on water supply, flooding, post-wildfire debris flows, and environmental conditions. It would also require DWR to take all actions

within its existing authority to operate reservoirs in a manner that improves flood protection and to reoperate flood control and water storage facilities to capture water generated by atmospheric rivers. IRWD currently has a "support" position on AB 30. As of the writing of this report, the bill on the Senate Floor.

AB 246 (Papan, D-San Mateo) – Product Safety: PFAS in Menstrual Products:

AB 246, beginning January 1, 2025, would ban menstrual products that contain intentionally added PFAS or beginning January 1, 2027, having a presence of PFAS at or above 10 ppm. IRWD currently has a "support" position on AB 246. As of the writing of this report, the bill is in the Senate Judiciary Committee.

AB 249 (Holden, D-Pasadena) – Water: Lead Testing at Schoolsites:

AB 249 would require a community water system that serves a K-12 public school receiving federal Title I funds to test each of the schoolsite's potable water system outlets for lead on or before January 1, 2027. IRWD currently has an "oppose unless amended" position on AB 249. As of the writing of this report, the bill is scheduled for a hearing in the Senate Environmental Quality Committee on July 5.

AB 305 (Villapudua, D-Stockton) – California Flood Protection Bond Act of 2024:

AB 305 would authorize the issuance of general obligation bonds in the amount of \$4.5 billion to finance flood protection, subject to approval by the voters in the November 5, 2024, statewide general election. This measure includes \$1 billion for dam safety and resilience. IRWD currently has a "support" position on AB 305. As of the writing of this report, the bill is in the Senate Natural Resources and Water Committee.

AB 334 (Blanca Rubio, D-Baldwin Park) – Public Contracts: Conflicts of Interest:

AB 334 would provide that an independent contractor that enters into a contract with a public entity to perform one phase of a project and seeks to enter into a subsequent contract for a later phase of the same project is not an "officer" subject to conflict-of-interest prohibitions if the independent contractor's duties and services related to the initial contract did not include engaging in or advising on public contracting on behalf of the public entity. IRWD currently has a "support" position on AB 334. As of the writing of this report, the bill is scheduled for a hearing in the Senate Judiciary Committee on July 6.

AB 460 (Bauer-Kahan, D-San Ramon) – State Water Resources Control Board: Interim Relief:

AB 460 would grant the State Water Resources Control Board authority, on its own motion or upon the petition of an interested party, to issue interim relief orders against water diverters and users in order to apply or enforce specified provisions of law related to water rights, water quality, and water law. IRWD currently does not have a position on AB 460. As of the writing of this report, this bill was pulled from the agenda of the Senate Natural Resources and Water Committee and is now a two-year bill.

AB 480 (Ting) – Surplus Land:

AB 480 would make many changes to the Surplus Land Act (SLA), including revisions to the definitions of "surplus land" and "agency's use." It would also change the treatment of exempt surplus land. IRWD currently has an "oppose unless amended" position on AB 480. As of the writing of this report, the bill is in the Senate Housing Committee.

AB 557 (Hart, D-Santa Barbara) – Local Agencies Open Meetings & Teleconferences:

AB 557 would eliminate the January 1, 2024 sunset date on the authorization in state law for local agencies to use teleconferencing without complying with specified teleconferencing requirements in the Ralph M. Brown Act when a declared state of emergency is in effect. IRWD currently has a "support" position on AB 557. As of the writing of this report, the bill is on the Senate Floor.

AB 676 (Bennett, D-Oxnard) – Water: General State Policy:

AB 676 would define domestic water use to include water use for purposes such as human consumption, cooking or sanitary purposes; care of household livestock and animals; care of household gardens; and deliveries of water by community water systems, other public, municipal, and industrial water agencies, and water corporations regulated by the Public Utilities Commission. IRWD currently does not have a position on AB 676. As of the writing of this report, the bill is in the Senate Natural Resources and Water Committee.

AB 727 (Weber, D-La Mesa) – Product Safety: PFAS in Cleaning Products:

AB 727, beginning January 1, 2026, would ban cleaning products that contain intentionally added PFAS or PFAS in the product or a product component above specified levels. IRWD currently has a "support" position on AB 727. As of the writing of this report, the bill is in the Senate Judiciary Committee.

AB 735 (Berman, D-Palo Alto) – Workforce Development: Utility Careers:

AB 735 would have established the High Road Utility Careers (HRUC) program to connect existing resources with individuals interested in careers in the utility sector and ensure a continued reliable workforce for California utilities. IRWD took a "support" position on AB 735, but the bill was held on the Assembly Appropriations Suspense File and will not move this session.

AB 754 (Papan, D-San Mateo) – Water Management Planning: Water Shortages:

AB 754 would require an urban water management plan to include in the narrative relating to water demand management measures implemented over the prior five years any demand management measures that have a significant impact on water used by downstream water rights holders. It would also require an urban water supplier to include in its water shortage contingency plan (WSCP), for a single reservoir that constitutes at least 50 percent of its total water supply, a target water supply storage curve for that reservoir based on target carryover levels sufficient to satisfy water users and ecological streamflow needs, and reservoir shortage levels relative to the target water supply storage curve that trigger specified shortage response actions. IRWD currently has a "watch" position on AB 754, as it was amended and will no longer impact the District. As of the writing of this report, the bill in the Assembly Appropriations Committee.

AB 755 (Papan) – Public Entity Urban Water Supplier Cost-of-Service Analysis:

AB 755 would require water suppliers to include a determination of the incremental costs incurred due to the top 10 percent of single-family customers in all of its cost-of-service studies. It would also require that those studies include an analysis of which costs would be avoided if those customers met the long-term water efficiency standards developed under the "Making Conservation a California Way of Life" legislation. IRWD currently has an "oppose" position on AB 755. As of the writing of this report, the bill is scheduled for a hearing in the Senate Natural Resources and Water Committee on July 10.

AB 838 (Connolly, D-San Rafael) – Water Bill and Infrastructure Information and Data:

AB 838 would have required public water systems to provide information and data to the State Board related to the average water bill paid by customers and the system's completed and planned infrastructure replacements. IRWD took an "oppose" position on AB 838. The bill was held on the Assembly Appropriations Committee Suspense File and will not move forward this session.

AB 1072 (Wicks, D-Oakland) – Water Conservation and Efficiency: Low-Income Residential Customers:

AB 1072 would require urban water suppliers to offer technical assistance and financial incentives to low-income residential customers, and to allocate a minimum of 40 percent of its conservation and efficiency funding to low-income households and disadvantaged communities within its service area unless it can demonstrate to the State Board that no more than 10 percent of its households fall within those categories, in which case the State Board could allow the water supplier to allocate a minimum of 10 percent. IRWD currently has an "oppose unless amended" position on AB 1072. AB 1072 was made a two-year bill by the Assembly Appropriations Committee.

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AB 1216 (Muratsuchi, D-Torrance) – Wastewater Treatment Plants: Monitoring of Air Pollutants:

AB 1216 would overturn a South Coast AQMD abatement order for the Hyperion Water Reclamation Plant and impose stricter monitoring and data reporting requirements on the City of Los Angeles. IRWD currently has no position on AB 1216. As of the writing of this report, the bill is in the Senate Appropriations Committee.

AB 1272 (Wood, D-Santa Rosa) – State Water Resources Control Board: Drought Planning:

AB 1272 would require the State Board, in consultation with the Department of Fish and Wildlife, to adopt principles and guidelines for diversion and use of water during times of drought or water shortages in coastal watersheds which drain to the Pacific Ocean, are located in Regional Water Quality Control Boards 1, 2 or 3, and are identified and are a priority for the recovery of native anadromous fish species. The bill would authorize the State Board to issue a cease-and-desist order when a diversion or use violated the principles and guidelines. IRWD currently has no position on AB 1216. As of the writing of this report, the bill in the Senate Appropriations Committee.

AB 1290 (Luz Rivas, D-Arleta) – Product Safety: Substances in Plastic Packaging:

AB 1290, beginning January 1, 2026, would ban plastic packaging, except packaging for specified medical products and drugs, that contains certain specified chemicals, pigments, or additives, including PFAS. IRWD currently has a "support" position on AB 1290. This bill is a two-year bill currently on the Assembly Inactive File.

AB 1337 (Wicks, D-Oakland) – State Board Water Shortage Enforcement:

AB 1337, which is intended to address the gap in the State Board's authority over pre-1914 appropriative rights revealed by the court in the *California Water Curtailments Cases* decision, would authorize the State Board to issue a curtailment order for any diversion, regardless of basis of right, when water is not available under the diverter's priority of right. IRWD currently has a "watch" position on AB 1337. As of the writing of this report, the bill is scheduled for a hearing in the Senate Natural Resources and Water Committee on July 10.

AB 1423 (Schiavo, D-Santa Clarita) – Product Safety: PFAS in Artificial Turf or Synthetic Substances:

AB 1423, beginning July 1, 2024, would require a manufacturer or installer of artificial turf or a synthetic surface that resembles grass that contains PFAS to provide a notification to any party receiving a proposal to design or install an artificial turf field, and prohibit cities, counties, and schools from purchasing or installing artificial turf or a synthetic surface resembling grass if it contains PFAS. Beginning January 1, 2025, this bill bans the sale of artificial turf or a synthetic surface that resembles grass that contains PFAS. As of the writing of this report, the bill is scheduled for a hearing in the Senate Governance and Finance Committee on July 12.

AB 1567 (Garcia, D-Coachella) – Safe Drinking Water, Wildfire Prevention, Drought Preparation, Flood Protection, Extreme Heat Mitigation, Clean Energy, and Workforce Development Bond Act of 2024:

AB 1567 would authorize the issuance of general obligation bonds in the amount of \$15.995 billion to finance projects for safe drinking water, wildfire prevention, drought preparation, flood protection, extreme heat mitigation, clean energy, and workforce development programs, subject to approval by the voters in the March 5, 2024, statewide primary election. This measure includes \$300 million for water recycling projects and \$900 million for dam safety and resilience. IRWD currently has a "support and amend" position on AB 1567. As of the writing of this report, the bill is in the Senate Natural Resources and Water Committee.

AB 1572 (Friedman, D-Burbank) – Nonfunctional Turf:

AB 1572 would prohibit the irrigation of nonfunctional turf with potable water by commercial, industrial, institutional (other than cemeteries), and large landscape water users, phasing in this ban for specified property types beginning January 1, 2027. June 19, 2023, amendments removed multifamily residential properties and cemeteries from the bill. IRWD currently has a "watch" position on AB 1572. As of the writing of this report, the bill in the Senate Appropriations Committee.

AB 1573 (Friedman, D-Burbank) – Water Conservation: Landscape Design and Nonfunctional Turf:

AB 1573 would change MWELO from a landscape design standard that must be met to a landscape design, planting, and irrigation standard. Among other things, it would require that MWELO be updated to include provisions that require that at least 25 percent of the plants installed in new or renovated nonresidential landscapes be California native plants. Recent amendments require DWR, no later than July 1, 2024, to convene a working group composed of a broad range of stakeholders with expertise in native plants to develop a strategic plan with measurable milestones to reach a requirement by January 1, 2035, that all new and renovated nonresidential areas install in the project footprint not less than 75 percent native plants. IRWD currently has a "seek amendments" position on AB 1573. As of the writing of this report, the bill in the Senate Appropriations Committee.

AB 1594 (E. Garcia, D-Coachella) – Medium- and Heavy-Duty Zero-Emission Vehicles: Public Agency Utilities:

AB 1594 would require any state regulation that requires or otherwise compels a public water, wastewater or electric utility to procure medium- and heavy-duty zero-emission vehicles to ensure that those vehicles will allow the utility to maintain reliable water and electric services, respond to disasters in an emergency capacity, and provide mutual aid assistance statewide and nationwide. IRWD currently has a "support" position on AB 1594. As of the writing of this report, the bill is in the Senate Environmental Quality Committee.

AB 1637 (Irwin, D-Thousand Oaks) – Local Government Websites and Email Addresses:

AB 1637 would have required all local agencies to ensure that their website utilizes a ".gov" or a ".ca.gov" domain extension, and also ensure that each email address provided to their employees utilizes one of those two domain types. The bill was amended and now only applies to cities and counties. As of the writing of this report, the bill is in the Senate Governance and Finance Committee.

SB 23 (Caballero, D-Salinas) – Water Supply and Flood Risk Reduction Project Expedited Permitting:

SB 23 would have improved and streamlined the regulatory permitting process for water supply and flood risk reduction projects. IRWD took a "support" position on SB 23. This bill was held on the Senate Appropriations Committee Suspense File and will not move forward this session.

SB 34 (Umberg) – Surplus Land Disposal Violations: Orange County:

SB 34 would provide that if the Housing and Community Development Department (HCD) notifies the County of Orange, or any city located within Orange County, that its planned sale or lease of surplus land is in violation of the SLA, certain procedures for addressing the notice of violation must be followed. SB 34 includes a reference to notices of violation from HCD in connection with a "sale or lease" by a local agency. IRWD currently has an "oppose unless amended" position on SB 34 and is seeking the removal of "lease" from the bill. As of the writing of this report, the bill is scheduled for a hearing in the Assembly Local Government Committee.

SB 48 (Becker, D-San Mateo) – Building Energy Savings Act:

SB 48 would have required water and electric utilities to maintain water and electric usage data for specified buildings and required the Energy Commission, in consultation with the State Board, to develop regulations requiring the reporting of this information. This bill was amended on April 18 and all the provisions in the bill that had related to water were removed. IRWD currently has an "watch" position on SB 48. As of the writing of this report, the bill is scheduled for a hearing in the Assembly Natural Resources Committee.

SB 57 (Gonzalez, D-Long Beach) – Utilities: Disconnection of Residential Service:

SB 57 would require specified electric and gas utilities, as well as public water systems, to postpone the disconnection of a customer's residential service for nonpayment when the National Weather Service's local forecast predicts that the temperature within the utility's service area, over the next 24 hours, will be 32 degrees Fahrenheit or cooler or 95 degrees Fahrenheit or warmer. IRWD currently has an "oppose unless amended" position on SB 57. This bill is a two-year bill in the Senate Energy, Utilities and Communications Committee.

SB 229 (Umberg) – Surplus Land: Disposal of Property: Violations: Public Meeting:

SB 229 would provide that if a local agency is disposing of a parcel by sale or lease, and it receives a notice of violation from HCD that it is in violation of the SLA with regards to the parcel, the local agency shall hold an open and public session to review and consider the substance of the notice of violation. IRWD currently has an "oppose unless amended" position on SB 229 and is seeking the removal of leases from the bill. As of the writing of this report, the bill is scheduled for a hearing in the Assembly Local Government Committee.

SB 366 (Caballero, D-Salinas) – The California Water Plan Long-Term Supply Targets:

SB 366 would set long-term water supply development targets and require the DWR to develop of a comprehensive plan within the California Water Plan on how the state can meet the long-term water needs for urban, agricultural, and environmental uses. IRWD currently has a "support" position on SB 366. As of the writing of this report, the bill is scheduled for a hearing in the Assembly Water, Parks and Wildlife Committee on July 11.

SB 389 (Allen, D-Santa Monica) – State Water Resources Control Board: Determination of Water Right:

SB 389 would authorize the State Board, upon a finding that there is reason to believe that the information would protect the public interest or further the State Board's responsibilities under Section 2 of Article X of the California Constitution or the public trust doctrine, to investigate the diversion and use of water to determine whether the diversion and use are based upon appropriation, riparian right, or another basis of right. As of the writing of this report, the bill is in the Assembly Water, Parks and Wildlife Committee.

SB 414 (Allen, D-Santa Monica) – Drought Tolerant Landscaping: Local Incentive Programs for Synthetic Grass and Artificial Turf:

As introduced, SB 414 would have prohibited cities, counties, and special districts from issuing a rebate, voucher, or other financial incentive for the use of synthetic grass or artificial turf that contains contaminants, including zinc, plastic, or PFAS. This bill was gutted and amended, and as amended, the bill relates to the use of hydrogen. IRWD currently has a "watch" position on SB 414. As of the writing of this report, the bill is in the Assembly Appropriations Committee.

SB 638 (Eggman, D-Stockton) – Climate Resiliency and Flood Protection Bond Act of 2024:

SB 638 would authorize the issuance of general obligation bonds in the amount of \$6 billion to finance projects for flood protection and climate resiliency projects, subject to approval by the voters in the November 5, 2024, statewide general election. This measure includes \$1 billion for dam safety and resilience. IRWD currently has a "support" position on SB 638. As of the writing of this report, the bill is scheduled for a hearing in the Assembly Water, Parks and Wildlife Committee on July 11.

SB 659 (Ashby, D-Sacramento) – California Water Supply Solutions Act of 2023:

SB 659 would require DWR to develop a groundwater recharge action plan by January 1, 2026, that provides actionable recommendations that result in the ability to create additional groundwater recharge capacity. IRWD has a "support" position on SB 659. As of the writing of this report, the bill is scheduled for a hearing in the Assembly Water, Parks and Wildlife Committee on July 11.

SB 745 (Cortese, D-Campbell): The Drought-Resistant Buildings Act:

SB 745 would require HCD and the California Building Standards Commission to research, develop, and propose building standards for new buildings- residential and non-residential-including consideration of requiring installation of water reuse systems and pre-plumbing of buildings to allow future use of recycled water, onsite treated graywater, or other "alternative water sources." IRWD currently has an "oppose unless amended" position on SB 745. As of the writing of this report, the bill is in the Assembly Housing and Community Development Committee.

SB 747 (Caballero, D-Salinas) – Surplus Land Act: Economic Development:

SB 747 would make several changes to the SLA, among which is to add a definition of "dispose" to the SLA. IRWD currently has a "support if amended" position on SB 747. As of the writing of this report, the bill is scheduled for a hearing in the Assembly Houisng and Community Development Committee on June 28.

SB 778 (Ochoa Bogh, R-Redlands) – Excavations: Subsurface Installations:

SB 778 would revise the Dig Safe Act of 2016 and amend both operator and excavator responsibilities related to underground utilities and excavations. The introduced version of this bill would have added non-pressurized sewer lines and storm drains to the definition of "subsurface installation." IRWD currently has a "watch" position on SB 778. As of the writing of this report, the bill is scheduled for a hearing in the Assembly Utilities and Energy Committee on July 12.

SB 867 (Allen, D-Santa Monica) -- Drought, Flood, and Water Resilience, Wildfire and Forest Resilience, Coastal Resilience, Extreme Heat Mitigation, Biodiversity and Nature-Based Climate Solutions, Climate Smart Agriculture, Park Creation and Outdoor Access, and Clean Energy Bond Act of 2024:

SB 867 would authorize the issuance of general obligation bonds in the amount of \$15.5 billion to finance projects for drought, flood, and water resilience, wildfire and forest resilience, coastal resilience, extreme heat mitigation, biodiversity and nature-based climate solutions, climate-smart agriculture, park creation and outdoor access, and clean energy programs, subject to approval by the voters in an unspecified statewide election. This measure includes \$300 million for water reuse and recycling projects and \$400 million for dam safety and resilience. IRWD currently has a "support if amended" position on SB 867. As of the writing of this report, the bill is in the Assembly Natural Resources Committee.

SCR 52 (Alvarado-Gil, D-El Dorado Hills) – Special Districts Week:

SCR 52 proclaims May 14-20, 2023, to be Special Districts Week. IRWD has a "support" position on SCR 52. This resolution was chaptered on June 6.

2023 State and Regional Regulatory Update:

The following is a list of state and regional regulations and agency reports staff is monitoring, tracking, or planning to engage in over the next three to 12 months. As the next drafts of the regulations or report are released for public review and comment, staff will engage, as appropriate. Staff provided an oral update to the Committee on new developments related to these regulations and other regulations of interest to the District.

The pending regulations and reports actively being tracked include:

- <u>California Endangered Species Act Listing</u> for the Southern California Steelhead;
- California Natural Resources Agency (CNRA) <u>30 x 30 California Implementation;</u>
- CNRA's <u>Water Resilience Portfolio Implementation and Resiliency 2.0</u> Implementation;
- DWR's 2023 California Water Plan Update;
- DWR and the State Board's implementation of the "<u>Making Water Conservation a</u> <u>California Way of Life</u>" legislation:
- State Board's development of a "Cross Connection Policy Handbook;"
- State Board's <u>Direct Potable Reuse Regulations;</u>
- State Board's implementation of the Lead and Copper Rule;
- State Board reporting requirements;
- State Board's <u>Safe and Affordable Funding for Equity and Resilience (SAFER) Drinking</u> <u>Water Program</u>;
- State Board's **Development of Maximum Contaminant Levels for PFAS**;
- South Coast AQMD's Cumulative Impacts from Air Toxics for CEQA Projects;
- South Coast AQMD's Tier 4 Emergency Generator Testing Policy; and
- South Coast AQMD's <u>PAR 1146.2 Control of NOx from Large Water Heaters</u>, <u>Small</u> <u>Boilers and Process Heaters</u>;

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2023 Federal Legislative Update:

Reclamation Climate Change and Water Program Reauthorization Act of 2023 Introduced by Congresswoman Katie Porter:

On April 28, 2023, Congresswoman Katie Porter (D-Irvine) introduced the Reclamation Climate Change and Water Program Reauthorization Act of 2023, <u>H.R. 3027</u>, which would reauthorize, through 2033, a program that supports the Bureau of Reclamation's and its partners' assessment of risks to water supplies and identification of strategies to address water shortages. Without reauthorization, this program will expire at the end of 2023.

Because of this program, the Bureau of Reclamation has conducted studies on water basins that are critical to supplying water to Orange County and elsewhere, including a <u>Water Supply and</u> <u>Demand Study of the Colorado River Basin</u> and a <u>Santa Ana Watershed Basin Study</u>. These studies are used in the development of water management plans and are critical tools for sustainably managing water supplies.

Staff recommends the Board adopt a "support" position on H.R. 3027.

PFAS CERCLA Liability Protection Legislation Introduced in the Senate:

On May 3, 2023, Senator Cynthia Lummis (R-WY) introduced five bills that would exempt certain sectors and industries from PFAS liability under the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation and Liability Act (CERCLA): <u>S. 1427, the Agriculture PFAS Liability Protection Act</u>, <u>S. 1429, the Resource Management PFAS Liability Protection Act</u>, <u>S. 1430, the Water Systems PFAS Liability Protection Act</u>, <u>S. 1432, the Fire Suppression PFAS Liability Protection Act</u>, and <u>S. 1433, the Airports PFAS Liability Protection Act</u>.

The Water Systems PFAS Liability Protection Act would exempt public water systems, POTWs, municipalities with a stormwater discharge permit, wholesale water agencies, and contractors performing the management or disposal activities for these entities from liability under CERCLA for costs arising from a release of PFAS to the environment. More specifically, the exemption would apply to these entities transporting, treating or disposing of, or arranging for the transport, treatment or disposal of, PFAS in a manner consistent with all applicable laws at the time the activity is carried out, and during and following the conveyance or treatment of water, including through:

- The management or disposal of biosolids;
- The discharge of effluent;
- The release or disposal of water treatment residuals or any other byproduct of drinking water or wastewater treatment activities, such as granulated activated carbon, filter media, and processed waste streams; or
- The conveyance or storage of water for the purpose of conserving or reclaiming the water for water supply.

The Resource Management PFAS Liability Protection Act would exempt solid waste management facilities and facilities that processes compost for sale or distribution to the public from liability under CERCLA for costs arising from a release of PFAS to the environment resulting from:

- The disposal or management of any residual or byproduct of municipal solid waste in accordance with a permit;
- The disposal or management of biosolids; or
- The application or processing of compost.

As discussed previously with the Water Resources and Policy Committee, the United State Environmental Protection Agency (U.S. EPA) has proposed designating PFOA and PFOS as CERCLA hazardous substances, and U.S. EPA has also issued an Advance Notice of Proposed Rulemaking on potential future designations of PFAS as CERCLA hazardous substances. It is expected that these several PFAS liability protection bills will ultimately be incorporated into a larger PFAS bill. Staff recommends the Board adopt a "support" position on S. 1429, the Resource Management PFAS Liability Protection Act, and S. 1430, the Water Systems PFAS Liability Protection Act.

Draft PFAS Legislation Introduced by Senate Environment and Public Works Committee:

On June 22, 2023, the Chair of the Senate Environment and Public Works (EPW) Committee, Senator Tom Carper (D-Del.) and the Ranking Member of the EPW Committee, Senator Shelley Moore Capito (R-W.Va.), jointly released draft PFAS legislation for public comment. This draft legislation has three stated goals: (1) Support EPA's ability to address PFAS for communities through infrastructure and new technologies, (2) expand EPA science related to PFAS, and (3) assist communities dealing with PFAS contamination. Specifically, this bill would:

- Set a deadline of September 30, 2024 for the EPA to complete its ongoing rulemaking process to set drinking water standards for specific PFAS substances;
- Require the EPA to contract with the National Academy of Science, Engineering, and Medicine to carry out a study within a year from enactment on both beneficial as well as nonessential uses of PFAS in commerce;
- Allow for states to use up to 1% of their State Revolving Fund (SRF) administrative fees to maintain a list of industrial users of PFAS within the state's boundaries;
- Clarify that grant funding provided by the EPA to the states may be used to assist small and disadvantaged communities in remediating or mitigating individual well contamination;
- Require the EPA to create and maintain a clearinghouse containing risk management strategies used by states, territories, and Tribes, and to develop a risk management guide for educating the public regarding the hazards or potential risks resulting from exposure to PFAS, along with mitigation measures that reduce exposure to PFAS;

- Direct the EPA to carry out a research and technology development program on nonregulatory strategies for the prevention, detection, destruction, and verification of emerging contaminants, with a focus on PFAS;
- Create a prize competition to encourage innovation in the development of technologies that help identify PFAS in low concentrations in the environment; prevent the intrusion of PFAS in the environment; and destroy PFAS;
- Require the EPA to work with a standards-setting organization to supplement EPA's work on PFAS standards; and
- Create a new emergency assistance authority for the EPA to help small, rural, Tribal, underserved, or disadvantaged communities address PFAS contamination.

The EPW is seeking stakeholder comments on the draft legislation by Monday, July 3, 2023. As of the writing of this report, staff are continuing to analyze this draft legislation and will work with the District's associations and other stakeholders to develop comments, as appropriate.

Staff recommends the Board adopt a "seek amendments" position on this draft legislation and direct staff to seek amendments that add CERCLA liability exemption language consistent with S. 1429 and S. 1430.

Disposable Wet Wipes "Do Not Flush" Legislation Introduced in Both House of Congress:

On April 27, 2023, the "Wastewater Infrastructure Pollution Prevention and Environmental Safety (WIPPES)" Act, which would require "Do Not Flush" labeling on disposable wet wipes packing, was reintroduced in both the House of Representatives and the Senate. In the House, Congresswoman Lisa McClain (R-MI) and Congresswoman Mary Sattler Peltola (D-AK) introduced <u>H.R. 2964</u>, and in the Senate, Senator Jeff Merkley (D-OR) and Senator Susan Collins (R-ME) introduced <u>S. 1350</u>. Both of California's Senators, Senator Diane Feinstein and Senator Alex Padilla, are cosponsors of S. 1350.

These identical bills would require, no later than two years after the bill's enactment, the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) to issue regulations requiring manufacturers, wholesalers, suppliers, or retailers that are responsible for the labeling or retail packaging to label premoistened, nonwoven disposable wipes clearly and conspicuously with "Do Not Flush" label notices and symbols.

The California Association of Sanitation (CASA) is among the supporters of these bills and has worked with the sponsors on their introduction. Staff recommends the Board adopt a "support" position on H.R. 2964/S. 1350, as the Board adopted a "support" position on the WIPPES Act bills that were introduced in Congress last year.

Kern Fan Groundwater Storage Project Outreach:

IRWD's federal advocacy priority in 2023 focuses on seeking federal funding for the Kern Fan Groundwater Storage Project and advocating for an increased funding authorization for the federal Water Storage Program. Staff will provide an update on those efforts.

- Bureau of Reclamation's <u>Post-2026 Colorado River Reservoir Operational Guidelines</u> and Strategies for Lake Powell and Lake Mead.

EDUCATIONAL SERVICES AGREEMENT WITH DISCOVERY CUBE ORANGE COUNTY

SUMMARY:

Irvine Ranch Water District has collaborated with Discovery Cube Orange County since 2007 to create and implement meaningful water education programming for schoolchildren throughout the District's service area. Over the course of this 16-year partnership, these District-sponsored elementary school assemblies, presentations, and field trips to the San Joaquin Marsh Wildlife Sanctuary have educated more than 125,000 local students about the importance of water in our lives and the need to use it wisely.

The proposed two-year agreement for Fiscal Year (FY) 2023-24 and FY 2024-25 blends the same successful in-person and virtual programming of the past with new opportunities for hands-on learning. In addition to the traditional fifth-grade field trips to IRWD's San Joaquin Marsh, local students in grades K-4 will be offered field trips to Discovery Cube's new Ocean Lab and Touch Tank exhibits, where lessons about the water cycle, the interconnectedness of water systems, the impacts of urban runoff, and the need to use water wisely gain palpable meaning. This creates a tangible tie-in to content learned from the San Joaquin Marsh field trips, enhances awareness of IRWD's Natural Treatment System sites, and bridges the link between water waste, pollution, and degraded wetland habitat downstream.

Staff recommends the Board authorize the General Manager to execute a Professional Services Agreement, with a total cost of \$355,983 over a two-year period, with Discovery Cube Orange County to implement educational programs for FY 2023-24 and FY 2024-25.

BACKGROUND:

IRWD first formed a partnership for water education with Discovery Cube Orange County (formerly Discovery Science Center) in 2007. The partnership was renewed in three-year increments until 2019-20, when the Board of Directors approved a two-year term covering 2019-20 and 2020-21 to better align the program with the District's two-year budgeting process. In 2020-21, IRWD worked with Discovery Cube to establish online and virtual resources such as the interactive 360-degree video tours of the San Joaquin Marsh and Michelson Water Recycling Plant. These interactive digital experiences continue to be used to enhance learning for students preparing for field trips to the San Joaquin Marsh or studying the importance of recycled water in their community.

Plans for the next two years consist of a hybrid in-person and virtual learning model that includes in-person and virtual features (based on grade) listed below and as described further in Discovery Cube's proposal, provided as Exhibit "A". These features will be made available to all schools within IRWD's service area.

In-Person Programming:

- *School Assemblies:* Students in kindergarten through fourth grade participate in assembly-style programming that teaches grade-specific, Next Generation Science Standard-aligned content that builds yearly. Hand-held keypads and interactive skits provide hands-on learning opportunities that are fun and engaging;
- *Field Trips to Discovery Cube:* Students in kindergarten through fourth grade will participate in field trips to the new Ocean Lab and Touch Tank exhibits to explore a diverse selection of ocean topics to put into context how water consumption and waste affect the environment. Displays on alternative water sources showcase IRWD's pioneering role in recycled water, among other water sources. The exhibit also incorporates information on how students can take action to protect the Earth's precious water resources and ecosystems;
- *Water Quality Lab and Field Trips:* In this two-part program for fifth graders, students attend a workshop at school to learn about water quality testing. On the second day of the program, the students attend a field trip at IRWD's San Joaquin Marsh where they tour the ponds, learn about the Michelson Water Recycling Plant, and perform tests for dissolved oxygen levels with samples collected from the San Diego Creek. Water conservation kits are distributed to these students for use in their homes; and
- *Sixth, Seventh, and Eighth Grade Workshops:* Middle school students will be introduced to aquifers and their importance in our ecosystem using real-world challenges. They will explore groundwater and its contribution to the world's freshwater supply through Cube-created videos and hands-on exploration. Students will participate in a 360-degree recycled water experience to better understand the role recycled water plays in our communities today and in the future.

Virtual Programming:

- *Virtual Workshops and Presentations:* Students in kindergarten through fourth grade participate in online workshops and/or presentations that teach grade-specific, Next Generation Science Standard-aligned content that builds yearly. Pre-recorded content is used and accessible via the Discovery Cube website, including a variety of learning tools such as workbooks and activities;
- San Joaquin Marsh Wildlife Sanctuary Experience: This digital adventure takes students on a virtual tour and exploration of the San Joaquin Marsh where they click on searchable data points to learn more about the Natural Treatment System, and the plants and animals that make their home at the Marsh. This project replaced in-person marsh field trips during the pandemic and will continue to be used as a virtual tool to enhance in-person field trips; and
- *Recycled Water / Michelson Water Recycling Plant Experience:* A 360-interactive experience will provide an in-depth discovery of the benefits, uses, and treatment processes of recycled water to sixth, seventh, and eighth-grade students enabling students to learn about the benefits of recycled water and virtually explore the Michelson Plant.

FISCAL IMPACTS:

The FY 2023-24 and 2024-25 operating budgets include the two-year program costs of \$355,983 for the elementary and middle schools. All Discovery Cube education programs will be funded from IRWD's over-allocation funding.

The mission of Discovery Cube is: *To inspire and educate young minds through engaging and impactful science-based programs and exhibits*. With more than 120 hands-on exhibits at Discovery Cube locations, and 300 remote-based activities hosted online at Discovery Cube Connect, Discovery Cube offers families, teachers, and student's fun and innovative ways to learn about Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, and Math (STEM/STEAM).

At Discovery Cube, we imagine a world of positive change through science education. As a national award-winning science center and a champion of STEM education, we strive to enrich young minds in a safe and constructive environment. Our commitment begins with setting educational goals that focus on important scientific principles that are a part of our everyday lives, influencing the lives of children and their families across the Irvine Ranch Water District service area.

Background

Irvine Ranch Water District (IRWD) and Discovery Cube Orange County (DCOC) have been partners on a comprehensive water education program since the 2008 school year. Since that time, this partnership has reached over 125,520 students. This partnership was the first in Orange County to utilize student response keypads to gauge student learning during the program.

DCOC proposes to continue this partnership with the IRWD in an innovative effort to drive measurable action and awareness of the future of the region's water resources. DCOC has established itself as a regional leader in environmental education with water resource education as a particular strength. DCOC believes strongly that environmental education:

- Connects us to the world around us
- Teaches us about both natural and created environments
- Raises awareness of issues impacting the environment
- Encourages specific actions we can take to improve our environment

In previous years, DCOC has utilized classroom space at the San Joaquin Marsh to host a science focused summer camp program. We would like to reaffirm our desire for DCOC to host our summer camps at the Marsh in the future, at no cost to the District.

Kindergarten through Fourth Grade – Assembly Programs

DCOC proposes to continue the assembly style programming at the kindergarten through fourth grade levels. Using Discovery Cube's science sustainability curriculum, we will engage students in science exploration by focusing on California's unique environment as context for learning. Through a series of Cube original musical science videos, kid-friendly documentaries, and scientist spotlights, together with interactive presentations and hands-on activities, students will be immersed in a fun science program that is correlated with Next Generation Science Standards based on the Environmental Principals & Concepts. Sustainability topics include water conservation, how our water is transported to Southern California through natural and man-made devices, the water cycle, healthy ecosystems, water filtration, watersheds, recycled water, and groundwater.

Kindergarten through Second Grade: Through the power of science connections, music, and literature, students will experience fun-filled assemblies that will transform mindsets and teach new habits pertaining to environmental literacy. Learning will be assessed through questioning and observation. A brief description of each grade level is below:

- **Kindergarten:** Saving Water Students will learn about one of the most precious parts of our Southern California ecosystem water! Through a science, music, and literature connection, students will investigate what it means to be water wise in order to conserve our limited water resources. During the assembly, students will work together with a Discovery Cube educator and use problem-solving skills to find ways to save water.
- **First Grade** Topography and Our Water: California's landscape is beautiful and diverse. Through a connection between science, music, and literature, students are taken on a journey to imagine what their life would be like without water. Understanding the unique topography of California will further student learning of how its landscape assists in bringing water to us in the southern part of the state to supplement the water we have stored in underground wells and aquifers.
- Second Grade The Water Cycle: The Water Cycle is explored through literature and video with beautiful imagery to make the concept come alive for young learners. Numerous forms of water will be discovered from clouds to fog to frost, and in lazy marshes, churning rivers, and breaking waves; yet one thing remains similar – the cycle of water. Using descriptive terms and images throughout the assembly, students will be encouraged to participate in a skit focused on the unique characteristics of water.

Third and Fourth Grade: Students will explore water sustainability topics as they understand their relationship with water and their ecosystem, identify local challenges, and appreciate their individual and community responsibility for the health of our planet. The program will also introduce students to careers with meaningful impact on the environmental industry. Learning will be assessed using interactive keypad technology. A brief description of each grade level is below:

- Third Grade Water Filtration: Students will learn about water filtration through the process of evaporation and underground filtration by watching a video and participating in an interactive assembly. They will be introduced to a variety of contaminates that can exist in our water, like bacteria and undesirable chemicals, and will be encouraged to help find solutions for cleaning our water supply for human consumption.
- Fourth Grade Moving Our Water: Students will be taken on a journey of how water is transported to our dry and arid environment in Southern California for all to use. While only 14% of the water in the IRWD service area is imported from outside the area, it helps supplement the

well water, surface water, and recycled water we have. Students will be introduced to the innovative solutions that have been created to adapt to living in a coastal desert ecosystem, such as the use of aqueducts, while understanding and celebrating the success of water efficiencies. Exploring water's voyage from the mountaintops to the coast will engage students in the engineering design process as they create a Rube Goldberg-type machine for the conveyance of water.

Additionally, a take home booklet will accompany each kindergarten through fourth grade level assembly. These booklets serve to reinforce key concepts taught in the assembly and include activities that encourage family learning.

Kindergarten through Fourth Grade – Field Trip to Discovery Cube

Life on Earth would not be possible without the ocean. When viewed from space, our planet is a world covered in water. All living things are intimately tied to the ocean in many ways, and the variety of marine life inspires and amazes us! The new Ocean Lab and Touch Tank Exhibits will explore a diverse selection of ocean topics while giving guest the opportunity to discover how each of us can help diminish threats to our oceans and their inhabitants.

Discovery Cube is proposing adding a field trip experience for students in grades K-4 that would focus on our new Ocean Lab and how our water habits affect the ocean. Taking children on a field trip to a science center can have numerous benefits, including:

- 1. Understanding the Water Cycle: Ocean exhibits can teach children about the water cycle and the interconnectedness of water systems. This can help them understand how their own water consumption affects the environment and the water cycle.
- 2. Learning about Water Conservation: An ocean-based field trip can teach children about the importance of water efficiencies and ways that they can reduce their water consumption at home.
- 3. Seeing the Impact of Pollution: Ocean exhibits and touch tanks can show children the impact of pollution on marine ecosystems and how it can affect water quality. This can help children understand the importance of reducing pollution and protecting water sources through understanding innovative solutions such as IRWD© Natural Treatment Systems and the San Joaquin Marsh Wildlife Sanctuary that help clean runoff in the watershed before it reaches the ocean.
- 4. Discovering Alternative Water Sources: Field trip content can also showcase alternative water sources, such as rainwater harvesting and water recycling where the pioneering role of IRWD[®] will be examined. Children can learn about how these systems work and how they can be used to use water more efficiently.
- 5. Making Connections: A field trip to Discovery Cube can help children make connections between what they learn at the science center and their daily lives. By seeing how their water consumption affects the environment and marine ecosystems, children can better understand the importance of conserving water and protecting the planet.

A field trip to Discovery Cube focusing on the Ocean Lab and touch tanks can be a valuable educational experience that can help children learn about the water cycle, water efficiency, the impact of pollution, alternative water sources, and making connections to their daily lives. This knowledge can help children develop a deeper understanding of their own water consumption and how they can take action to protect our planet's precious water resources.

Fifth Grade – Water Quality Lab and Field Trip

In this two-part program, students will discover the importance of chemistry in aquatic ecosystems and in the water recycling process.

Day one of the program consist of a workshop session at the school and introduces the concept of water quality testing, specifically to monitor the levels of dissolved oxygen in our water supply. Chemically treated samples, as well as tap water, are tested to discover the acceptable levels of dissolved oxygen in our water supply. Students will also investigate pollutants, how they travel through the water, and how they affect our food chain.

The second day of the program takes the students on a field trip to the San Joaquin Marsh. Activities presented at the Marsh will guide students to understand the concepts of biomagnification and water quality. In addition to the in-person field trip, students will be introduced to the San Joaquin Marsh through a 360-degree interactive marsh experience.

When in-person field trips are not possible, Discovery Cube will continue to offer the San Joaquin Marsh tour as a virtual experience, utilizing the 360-degree experience and an online workshop format.

Also included with this program is a water conservation kit that is focused on indoor water use. The water conservation kit consists of a 1.5 gallon per minute (gpm) showerhead, 1.5 gpm swivel spray kitchen aerator, two 1.0 gpm bathroom aerators, toilet water saver fill cycle diverter, two toilet leak detection tablets, flow meter bag, water conservation wheel, and accompanying home survey. Discovery Cube will order and distribute the kits, along with directions for how to use the kits and for the completion/assessment of the home survey.

Sixth, Seventh, and Eight Grade Workshop

Middle school students will be introduced to aquifers and their importance in our ecosystem using real world challenges. They will explore groundwater and its contribution to the world's fresh water supply through Cube-created videos and hands-on exploration. Students will also be introduced to the innovative 360 Degree Interactive Experience at the Michelson Water Recycling Plant. They will journey through the plant as they learn how the water is cleaned and recycled. There are several non-linear stops in the tour, where students can choose their own path and explore the scientific specifics of the purification process through gamified interactions. As they progress, they will collect points, see their water become purified, and accrue a score. Ultimately, the interactive culminates in a spotlight of IRWD's invention of the purple pipes.

Virtual Programs

Discovery Cube will continue with virtual programs where students will have the opportunity to participate in and watch live webinars led by a Discovery Cube Educator. They will also have access to two to three STEM water-focused activities for each grade level.

Program Budget

DCOC will provide an environmental enrichment program to the students in the IRWD service area that is rooted in experience, research, interactive learning, and fun. Each workshop, assembly, and field trip will have students immersed in a STEM topic using hands-on activities, literature, math, art, and visual aids.

The program includes all hands-on materials, worksheets, interactives, journals, literature books, visual aids, videos, access to Discovery Cube Connect online resources, and instructor demonstrations. All instructors have degrees in science or education, are highly skilled educators/performers who are trained in an assortment of programs, and will provide students with a rich variety of teaching methodologies as well as perform science demonstrations found in some of our other programming.

With many years of experience teaching in the enrichment learning space, Discovery Cube has adequate resources to serve all of the students in our program. We have two science centers in Santa Ana and Sylmar, equipment and material shops at each location, and a supply resource center to package and store all necessary materials to successfully perform to the program parameters.

MICHELSON WATER RECYCLING PLANT TRANSFORMER REPLACEMENT CONSTRUCTION AWARD

SUMMARY:

The Michelson Water Recycling Plant (MWRP) Service A Transformer Replacement project will replace the existing Service A electrical transformer that failed in March 2023. Staff recommends the Board authorize the General Manager to execute a construction contract with Arizona Pipeline Company in the amount of \$419,405 for the MWRP Service A Transformer Replacement project.

BACKGROUND:

The electrical service to MWRP is provided by Southern California Edison (SCE) through two separate electrical services: Service A and Service B. Under normal operating conditions, the MWRP electrical loads are balanced between both services. During an emergency, either Service A or Service B is capable of providing power to all of the plant loads. The existing natural gas generators and battery energy storage system are interconnected only with Service A since SCE will not issue multiple interconnection agreements for the same equipment on multiple services.

In March 2023, one of the SCE-owned transformers on Service A failed, rendering Service A completely inoperable. Immediately after this failure, staff transferred all MWRP electrical demands to Service B to maintain continuity of operations. Since the failure of Service A, both the natural gas generators and the battery energy storage system have been unavailable since these facilities are only interconnected with Service A.

The transformer that failed is obsolete and the existing Service A is no longer meets SCE's design standards. Therefore, the entire existing Service A must be replaced with a new Service A that complies with current SCE standards for equipment, technology, and minimum working clearances. Since the failure, staff has been working with SCE to fast-track the development of the design for the replacement service. The design is now complete, and staff is proceeding with its implementation, which will result in the restoration of parallel electrical services at MWRP and the ability to interconnect and operate the existing natural gas generators and the battery energy storage system. A location map is provided as Exhibit "A".

Construction Award:

Staff and SCE collaborated to develop the design of the replacement service and associated equipment. Due to the specialized nature of the work and the urgency associated with restoring electrical service through Service A, staff also coordinated closely with a contractor, Arizona Pipeline Company, during the design phase. Arizona Pipeline specializes in underground

construction and high-voltage facilities and is well-versed in SCE design, construction standards, and other requirements. Arizona Pipeline is an approved SCE contractor and currently serves as one of SCE's on-call contractors in Orange County. Arizona Pipeline has also successfully completed previous work for IRWD at the MWRP during consutruction of both the MWRP Phase 2 Expansion and the Biosolids Dewatering and Energy Recovery Facilities.

Once the design for the new Service A was complete, staff requested a bid from Arizona Pipeline Company. For the reasons described above, Arizona Pipeline is uniquely qualified to perform this work. Arizona Pipeline submitted a bid in the amount of \$419,405; the bid is attached as Exhibit "B". Staff reviewed the bid and confirmed that the proposed cost is comparable to similar work on other District projects with similar SCE infrastructure. Staff has determined that the bid is responsive. Staff recommends the Board authorize the General Manager to execute a construction contract, as a sole source, with Arizona Pipeline Company in the amount of \$419,405.

FISCAL IMPACTS:

Project 12615 is included in the FY 2023-24 Capital Budget and will be funded through sewer replacement funds. The existing budget is adequate to fund this project.

ENVIRONMENTAL COMPLIANCE:

This project is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) as authorized under the California Code of Regulations, Title 14, Chapter 3, Section 15302, which provides categorical exemption for the replacement of existing facilities where the new facility will be located on the same site as the facility replaced and will have substantially the same purpose as the facility replaced. Staff will file a Notice of Exemption with the Orange County Clerk Recorder's office.

COMMITTEE STATUS:

Construction awards are not routinely taken to a Committee prior to submittal to the Board.

RECOMMENDATION:

THAT THE BOARD AUTHORIZE THE GENERAL MANAGER TO EXECUTE A CONSTRUCTION CONTRACT WITH ARIZONA PIPELINE COMPANY IN THE AMOUNT OF \$419,405 FOR THE MICHELSON WATER RECYCLING PLANT SERVICE A TRANSFORMER REPLACEMENT, PROJECT 12615.

2023 ANNUAL WATER SUPPLY AND DEMAND ASSESSMENT

SUMMARY:

Staff has prepared and submitted IRWD's 2023 Annual Water Supply and Demand Assessment (AWSDA) consistent with the requirements of Section 10632 of the California Water Code requiring all water suppliers with over 3,000 urban connections to perform and submit annually an AWSDA to the California Department of Water Resources (DWR). IRWD's 2023 AWSDA shows that the District has a water supply surplus, and that its supplies are reliable. Staff recommends that the Board ratify the 2023 Annual Water Supply and Demand Assessment.

BACKGROUND:

In 2018, the State legislature adopted "Making Conservation a California Way of Life" legislation. In addition to establishing new water efficiency standards, the legislation included substantial provisions to strengthen local water shortage planning. The provisions include new requirements for Water Shortage Contingency Plans (WSCP) and for the preparation and submittal of an AWSDA to DWR beginning July 1, 2022.

In 2021, the Board adopted IRWD's 2020 WSCP that incorporated written procedures for preparation of IRWD's AWSDA. These procedures are based on IRWD's existing methods for its annual water budget development process and are consistent with DWR guidelines.

Overview of IRWD's 2023 AWSDA:

IRWD's 2023 AWSDA, provided as Exhibit "A", is an assessment of the near-term outlook for supplies, demands, and the identification of any expected water shortage that may prompt response actions in the current year. Available supplies are assessed through staff coordination with Orange County Water District and regional wholesalers, including the Municipal Water District of Orange County (MWDOC) and the Metropolitan Water District. MWDOC's 2023 AWSDA shows no imported water shortage affecting IRWD.

Key Criteria and Assumptions:

The 2023 IRWD AWSDA is comprised of five DWR-required tables. Key criteria and assumptions of this AWSDA include:

- The AWSDA is based on IRWD's annual water budget and considers the previous year's demands and projected future demands;
- The AWSDA is based on a projected single dry year of unconstrained demands, which is defined as demands absent any water supply or demand restrictions;

- Projected potable water supplies considered in the AWSDA include IRWD's supplemental water banking supplies that would be available for use on an emergency basis if needed; and
- IRWD can access additional imported supplies in Southern California and has the potential to pump additional groundwater if needed.

Conclusions from 2023 AWSDA:

As shown in the 2023 AWSDA, IRWD has no projected water shortage. IRWD has an overall surplus of 40% for potable supplies and a 12% surplus for non-potable supplies with no supply gap. The AWSDA demonstrates that the District's supplies are reliable and in surplus. Staff will provide a presentation on the 2023 annual AWSDA (provided as Exhibit "B") at the meeting.



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



- Identification of any expected water shortage(s) and the associated response actions for the year.
- Procedures documented in Water Shortage Contingency Plan and based on IRWD Water Budget.

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS


- IRWD's assessment shows no projected water shortage.
- IRWD's 2023 AWSDA indicates water supply surplus and reliable supplies:
 - 40% for potable (includes available water banking supplies); and
 - 12% for non-potable water
- Additional Supplies are Available for Emergency Use:
 - Water Banking Supplies (if needed);
 - Additional imported supplies in Southern California (if needed); and
 - Potential to pump additional groundwater (if needed).
