## CONSENT CALENDAR

### WATER SUPPLY ASSESSMENT FOR MACARTHUR COURT MIXED-USE PROJECT

#### SUMMARY:

In August 2025, IRWD received a request from the City of Newport Beach to prepare a Water Supply Assessment (WSA) for the MacArthur Court Mixed-Use Project. Staff prepared the WSA for the proposed project and recommends Board approval.

#### BACKGROUND:

The proposed MacArthur Court Mixed-Use Project in the City of Newport Beach is designed for the construction of 700 new residential dwelling units, 10,000 square feet of retail space and up to one acre of park area. The project location is bordered by Campus Drive to the north, Birch Street to the south and MacArthur Boulevard to the west. The project is included in the existing City of Newport Beach General Plan. A location map of the MacArthur Court Mixed-Use Project is provided as Exhibit “A”.

In August, the City of Newport Beach requested that IRWD prepare a WSA for the project consistent with SB 610 and SB 221 that were passed and signed by the Governor of California in 2001. Both laws went into effect in January 2002. Staff has prepared the WSA as described below.

#### Water Supply Assessment:

The WSA for the proposed MacArthur Court Mixed-Use Project was prepared based on information from the most recent IRWD Water Resources Master Plan. The WSA concludes that the total water supplies available to IRWD during normal, single-dry, and multiple-dry years within a 20-year projection will meet the projected water demand of the project. Estimates for a normal year in 2045 show an increase in IRWD potable water demands of 93 acre-feet per year (AFY) from 85,515 AF of baseline demand to 85,608 AF with the project. Due to minimal non-potable uses, estimates for non-potable demands in 2045 remain unchanged at 29,068 AF with the project. The completed WSA is provided as Exhibit “B”.

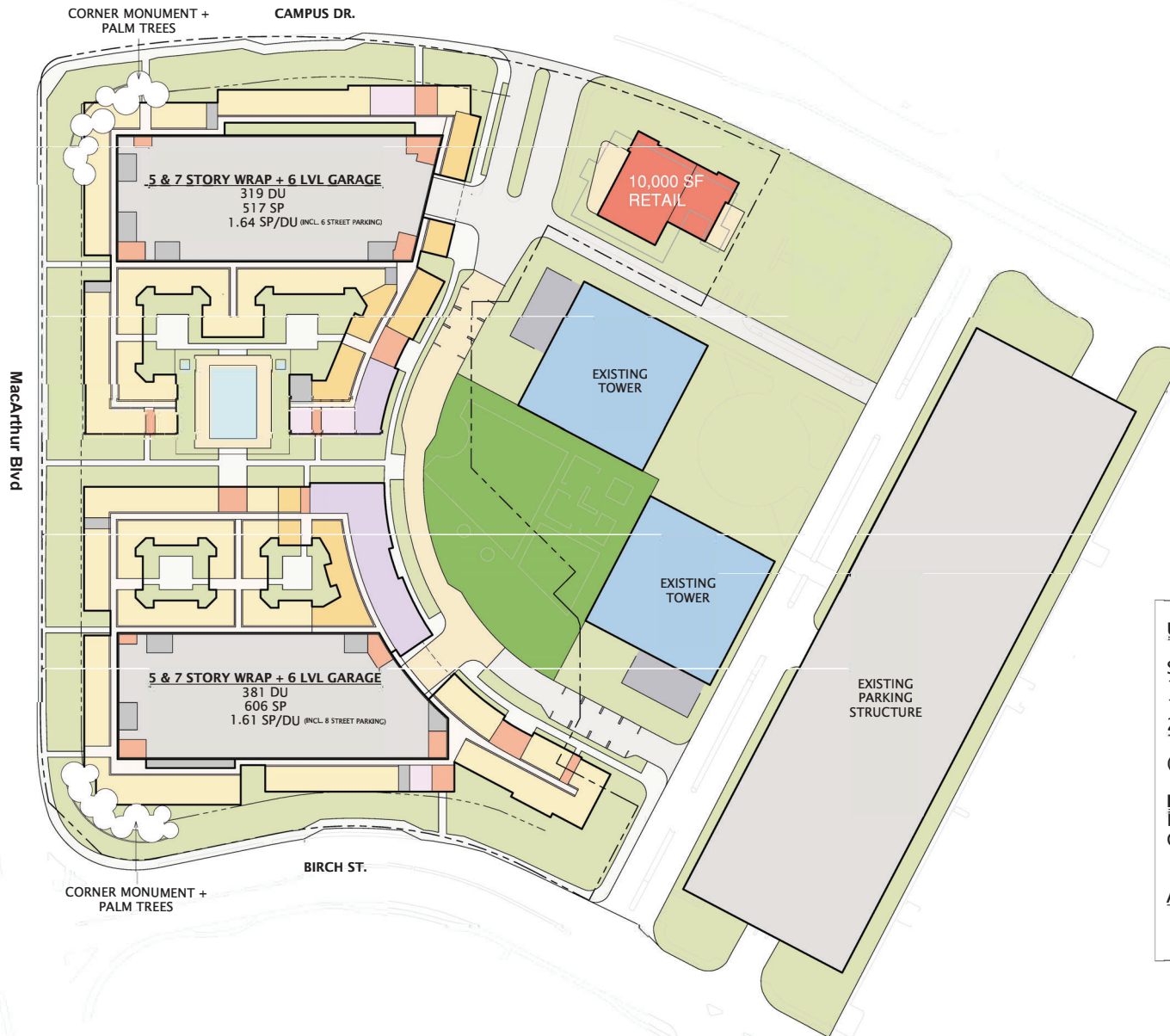

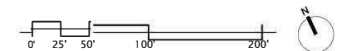
Exhibit “A” – MacArthur Court Mixed-Use Project Location Map

## **Water Supply Assessment Information**

### **Purpose of Assessment**

Irvine Ranch Water District (“IRWD”) has been identified by the City as a public water system that will supply water service (both potable and nonpotable) to the project identified on the cover page of this assessment (the “Project”). As the public water system, IRWD is required by Section 10910 *et seq.* of the Water Code to provide the City with an assessment of water supply availability (“assessment”) for defined types of projects. The Project has been found by the City to be a project requiring an assessment. The City is required to include this assessment in the environmental document for the Project, and based on the record, make a determination whether projected water supplies are sufficient for the Project and existing and planned uses.

Water Code Section 10910 *et seq.* (the “Assessment Law”) contains the requirements for the information to be set forth in the assessment.

### **Prior Water Supply Assessments**

IRWD does not allocate particular supplies to any project but identifies total supplies for its service area. Because of IRWD’s aggregation of demands and supplies, each assessment completed by IRWD is expected to be generally similar to the most recent assessment, with changes as needed to take into account changes, if any, in demands and supplies, and any updated and corrected information obtained by IRWD. Previously assessed projects’ water demands will be included in the baseline. A newly assessed project’s water demand will have been included in previous water supply assessments for other projects (as part of IRWD’s “full build-out” demand) to the extent of any land use planning or other water demand information for the project that was available to IRWD.

The Project’s water demand was included (as part of IRWD’s “full build-out” demand) in previous water supply assessments performed by IRWD, based on land use planning information available to IRWD. In this water supply assessment, the Project demand will be revised in accordance with updated information provided by the applicant and included in the “with project” demand.

### **Supporting Documentation**

IRWD prepares two planning documents to guide water supply decision-making. IRWD’s principal planning document is IRWD’s “Water Resources Master Plan” (“WRMP”). The WRMP is a comprehensive document compiling data and analyses that IRWD considers necessary for its planning needs. IRWD also prepares an Urban Water Management Plan (“UWMP”), a document required by statute. The UWMP is based on the WRMP, but contains defined elements as listed in the statute (Water Code Section 10631 *et seq.*), and, as a result, is more limited than the WRMP in the treatment of supply and demand issues. Therefore, IRWD primarily relies on its most recent WRMP. The UWMP is required to be updated in years ending with “five” and “zero,” and IRWD’s most recent update of that document (2020 UWMP) was adopted in June 2021.

In addition to the WRMP and the 2020 UWMP mentioned above, other supporting documentation referenced herein is found in Section 6 of this assessment.



Due to the number of contracts, statutes and other documents comprising IRWD's written proof of entitlement to its water supplies, in lieu of attachment of such items, they are identified by title and summarized in Section 2(b) of this assessment (written contracts/proof of entitlement). Copies of the summarized items can be obtained from IRWD.

### Assessment Methodology

**Water use factors; dry-year increases.** IRWD employs water use factors to enable it to assign water demands to the various land use types and aggregate the demands. The water use factors are based on average water use and incorporate the effect of IRWD's tiered-rate conservation pricing and its other water use efficiency programs. The factors are derived from historical usage (billing data) and a detailed review of water use factors within the IRWD service areas conducted as a part of the WRMP. System losses at a rate of approximately 5% are built into the water use factors. Water demands also reflect normal hydrologic conditions (precipitation). Lower levels of precipitation and higher temperatures will temporarily result in higher water demands, due primarily to the need for additional water for irrigation. To reflect this, base (normal) WRMP water demands have been increased by 7% in the assessment during both "single-dry" and "multiple-dry" years. This increase in estimated demands is considered conservative and is consistent with the Municipal Water District of Orange County's ("MWDOC") 2020 UWMP which assumes increased demands in single-dry and multiple dry years of 6% based on MWDOC's Orange County Reliability Study (MWDOC 2020 UWMP, pg. 7-2). The Metropolitan Water District of Southern California ("MWD") also considers these weather variables in their climate adjustment factors when forecasting demands, as documented in MWD's 2020 UWMP which shows an average increase of 8% for single dry year demands (MWD 2020 UWMP Tables 2-4, 2-5, 2-6) and also documented in their 2020 Integrated Resources Plan - Regional Needs Assessment (2022).

**Planning horizon.** In accordance with Water Code Section 10910, this assessment reviews demands and supplies covering a 20-year planning horizon. For consistency with IRWD's WRMP, the assessment reviews demands and supplies through the year 2045, which is considered to include build-out or "ultimate development".

**Assessment of demands.** Water demands are reviewed in this assessment for three development projections (to 2045):

- Existing and committed demand (without the Project) ("baseline"). This provides a baseline condition as of the date of this assessment, consisting of demand from existing development, plus demand from development that has both approved zoning and (if required by the Assessment Law) an adopted water supply assessment.
- Existing and committed demand, plus the Project ("with-project"). This projection adds the Project water demands to the baseline demands.
- Full WRMP build-out ("full build-out"). In addition to the Project, this projection adds potential demands for all presently undeveloped areas of IRWD based on current general plan information, modified by more specific information available to IRWD, as more fully described in Chapter 2 of the WRMP.

**Assessment of supplies.** For comparison with demands, water supplies are classified as *currently available* or *under development*:

- *Currently available* supplies include those that are presently operational, and those that will be operational within the next several years. Supplies expected to be operational in the next several years are those having completed or substantially completed the environmental and regulatory review process, as well as having necessary contracts (if any) in place to move forward. These supplies are in various stages of planning, design, or construction.
- In general, supplies *under development* may necessitate the preparation and completion of environmental documents, regulatory approvals, and/or contracts prior to full construction and implementation.

IRWD is also evaluating the development of additional supplies that are not included in either *currently available* or *under-development* supplies for purposes of this assessment. As outlined in the WRMP, prudent water supply and financial planning dictates that development of supplies be phased in over time consistent with the growth in demand.

Water supplies available to IRWD include several sources: groundwater pumped from the Orange County groundwater basin (including the Irvine Subbasin); captured local (native) surface water; recycled sewage; and supplemental imported water supplied by MWD through the MWDOC. The supply-demand comparisons in this assessment are broken down among the various sources and are further separated into potable and nonpotable water sources.

***Comparison of demand and supply.*** The three demand projections noted above (baseline, with-project and full build-out) are compared with supplies in the following ways:

- On a total *annual* quantity basis (stated in acre-feet per year (“AFY”)).
- On a *peak-flow* (maximum day) basis (stated in cubic feet per second (“cfs”)).
- Under three climate conditions: base (normal) conditions and single-dry and multiple-dry year conditions. (Note: These conditions are compared for *annual* demands and not for *peak-flow* demands. *Peak-flow* is a measure of a water delivery system’s ability to meet the highest day’s demand of the fluctuating demands that will be experienced in a year’s time. Peak demands occur during the hot, dry season and as a result are not appreciably changed by dry-year conditions; dry-year conditions do affect *annual* demand by increasing the quantity of water needed to supplement normal wet-season precipitation.)

#### Summary of Results of Demand-Supply Comparisons

Listed below are Figures provided in this assessment, comparing projected potable and nonpotable water supplies and demands under the three development projections:

- Figure 1: Normal Year Supply and Demand – Potable Water
- Figure 2: Single Dry-Year Supply and Demand – Potable Water
- Figure 3: Multiple Dry-Year Supply and Demand – Potable Water
- Figure 4: Maximum-Day Supply and Demand – Potable Water
- Figure 5: Normal Year Supply and Demand – Nonpotable Water
- Figure 6: Single Dry-Year Supply and Demand – Nonpotable Water
- Figure 7: Multiple Dry-Year Supply and Demand – Nonpotable Water
- Figure 8: Maximum-Day Supply and Demand – Nonpotable Water

It can be observed in the Figures that IRWD's *supplies* remain essentially constant between normal, single-dry, and multiple-dry years. This result is due to the fact that groundwater and MWD imported water account for the majority of all of IRWD's potable supply, and recycled water, groundwater and imported water comprise all of IRWD's nonpotable supply. Groundwater production typically remains constant or may increase in cycles of dry years, even if overdraft of the basin temporarily increases, as groundwater producers reduce their demand on imported supplies to secure reliability. (See Section 4 herein.) As to imported water, MWD's 2020 Urban Water Management Plan (MWD 2020 UWMP) concludes that MWD has supply capabilities sufficient to meet expected demands from 2025 through 2045 under a single dry year condition and a period of drought lasting five consecutive water years, as well as in a normal water year hydrologic condition. (See also Section 2(b) (1) "IMPORTED SUPPLY - ADDITIONAL INFORMATION," below.) Recycled water production also remains constant and is considered "drought-proof" as a result of the fact that sewage flows remain virtually unaffected by dry years. Only a small portion of IRWD's supply, native water captured in Irvine Lake, is reduced in single-dry and multiple-dry years. The foregoing factors also serve to explain why there is no difference in IRWD's supplies between single-dry and multiple-dry years.

A review of the Figures indicates the following:

- *Currently available* supplies of potable water are adequate to meet annual demands for the *baseline*, *with-project* and *full build-out* scenarios projected under the normal year, and the single- and multiple-dry year conditions through the year 2045. (Figures 1, 2 and 3.) IRWD plans to proceed with the implementation of future potable supplies (*under development*), as shown in the Figures, to improve local reliability during dry-year conditions.
- Adequate *currently available* potable water supply capacity is available to meet *peak-flow* (maximum day) demands for all demand projections through the year 2045. (Figure 4.)
- With respect to nonpotable water, *currently available* supplies are adequate to meet projected annual demands for both the *baseline* and *with-project* demand projections under both dry-year conditions through the year 2045. (Figures 5, 6, 7 and 8.) IRWD has implemented all planned nonpotable supplies, as shown in the Figures, to improve local reliability during dry-year conditions.

The foregoing Figures provide an overview of IRWD potable and nonpotable water supply capabilities. More detailed information on the anticipated development and use of supplies, which incorporates source costs and reliability issues, is provided in the WRMP.

***Margins of safety.*** The Figures and other information described in this assessment show that IRWD's assessment of supply availability contains several margins of safety or buffers:

- "Reserve" water supplies (excess of supplies over demands) will be available to serve as a buffer against inaccuracies in demand projections, future changes in land use, or alterations in supply availability.
- Conservative estimates of annual potable and nonpotable *imported* supplies have been made based on connected delivery capacity (by application of peaking factors as

described below in Section 2, footnote 1); additional supplies are expected to be available from these sources, based on legal entitlements, historical uses and information provided by MWD. In addition to MWD's existing regional supply assessments, this assessment has considered MWD information concerning operational limits on Delta pumping. See "**Actions on Delta Pumping**," below.

- Information provided by MWD, as the imported water supplier, concerning the adequacy of its regional supplies, summarized herein, demonstrates MWD's inclusion of reserves in its regional supply assessments. In addition to MWD's existing regional supply assessments, this assessment has considered MWD's information concerning operational limits on Delta pumping. See "**Actions on Delta Pumping**," below.
- Although groundwater supply amounts shown in this assessment assume production levels within applicable basin production percentages described herein, production of groundwater can exceed applicable basin production percentages on a short-term basis, which can provide additional reliability during dry years or emergencies. See "**IRWD's Evaluation of Effect of Reduced MWD Supplies to IRWD**," below.

**Actions on Delta Pumping.** The Sacramento/San Joaquin Delta ("Delta") is a vulnerable component in both the State and Federal systems to convey water from northern portions of California to areas south of the Delta. Issues associated with the Delta have generally been known for years; however, the continuing decline in the number of endangered Delta smelt resulted in the filing of litigation challenging permits for the operation of the Delta pumping facilities. On August 31, 2007, a Federal court ordered interim protective measures for the endangered Delta smelt, including operational limits on Delta pumping, which have an effect on State Water Project ("SWP") operations and supplies. On June 4, 2009, a federal biological opinion imposed rules that further restrict water diversions from the Delta to protect endangered salmon and other endangered fish species. Several proceedings concerning Delta operations were initiated to evaluate options to address Delta smelt impacts and other environmental concerns. In addition to the regulatory and judicial proceedings to address immediate environmental concerns, the Delta Vision process and Bay-Delta Conservation Plan ("BDCP") process were established to identify long-term solutions for the Delta. In addition, State and federal agencies and water user entities are currently engaged in the development of the Delta Conveyance Project (previously California WaterFix), which is aimed at making physical and operational improvements in the Delta necessary to improve south of the Delta SWP water supplies and water quality and protect ecosystem health in the Delta (MWD 2020 UWMP). Prior to the 2007 court decision, MWD's Board approved a Delta Action Plan in May 2007, that described short, mid and long-term conditions and the actions to mitigate potential supply shortages and to develop and implement long-term solutions. To address uncertainties in expected SWP supplies, in October 2007, MWD prepared its 2007 Integrated Resources Plan ("IRP") Implementation Report, in which MWD estimated that it could see as much as up to a 22% reduction on average of its SWP supplies based on the court order. As part of its ongoing long term planning, in its 2010 IRP Update, MWD identified changes to the long-term plan and established direction to address the range of potential changes in water supply planning. The 2010 IRP also discusses dealing with uncertainties related to impacts of climate change (see additional discussion of this below), as well as actions to protect endangered fisheries. The 2010 IRP Update emphasizes an evolving approach and suite of actions to address the water supply challenges that are posed by uncertain weather patterns, regulatory and environmental restrictions, water quality impacts and changes in the state and the region. The 2010 IRP Update includes MWD's Adaptive Resource Management Strategy three components: Core Resources Strategy, Supply Buffer Implementation and Foundational Actions, which together

provides the basis for the 2010 IRP Update. The 2010 IRP Update expands the concept of developing a planning buffer from the 2004 IRP Update by implementing a supply buffer equal to 10 percent of the total retail demand.

In January 2016, MWD adopted its 2015 IRP Update. In the 2015 IRP Update, MWD continued its Adaptive Resource Management Strategy and integrated future supply actions to improve the viability of potential contingency resources as needed, and to position the region to effectively implement these resources in a timely manner. The 2015 IRP finds that additional actions are needed in investments in conservation, local supplies, the Delta Conveyance Project (previously California WaterFix), and stabilizing Colorado River supplies. Among the supply actions, MWD will continue to work collaboratively with state and federal agencies on the California WaterFix, maximize its storage and transfer approach, and continue to develop and protect local supplies and conservation.

MWD is currently developing its 2020 IRP Update and has completed and adopted a 2020 IRP Regional Needs Assessment which is considered Phase 1 of the 2020 IRP. A One Water Implementation phase will be Phase 2 of the 2020 IRP. The One Water Implementation will take the results and findings of Phase 1 to identify integrated regional solutions. It will include an updated Adaptive Management Strategy, policies, programs and projects to address the findings and mitigate any potential shortages.

***IRWD's Evaluation of Effect of Reduced MWD Supplies to IRWD:*** In the MWD 2020 UWMP, MWD states it has supply capability that would be sufficient to meet expected demands from 2025 to 2045 under single dry year and multiple dry year conditions.<sup>1</sup>

Based on the prior MWD 2007 IRP Implementation Report and also reported in the MWD 2015 IRP, MWD estimated that it could receive reduction of SWP supplies of up to 22% on average until a long-term solution was implemented. For purposes of ensuring a conservative analysis, IRWD made an evaluation of the effect of the 22% estimated reduction of MWD's SWP supplies on its overall imported supplies. IRWD estimates that 22% reduction of SWP supplies conservatively translates to approximately 16% reduction in all of MWD's imported supplies over the years 2025 through 2045. For this purpose, it is assumed that MWD's total supplies consist only of imported SWP and Colorado deliveries. Based on this estimate, this assessment uses a 16% reduction in MWD supplies available to IRWD for the years 2025 through 2045, using IRWD's connected capacity without any water supply allocation imposed by MWD. This reduction in MWD supplies is reflected in Figures 1, 2, 3, 5, 6, and 7. (See also the footnote 1).

Per the MWD 2020 UWMP, MWD performs water shortage planning in its Water Surplus and Drought Management ("WSDM") Plan (1988) which guides MWD's planning and operations during both shortage and surplus conditions. Furthermore, MWD developed the Water Supply Allocation Plan ("WSAP") (dated February 2009, updated December 2014) which provides standardized methodology for allocation of MWD's supplies during times of shortage. The WSDM Plan distinguishes between shortages, severe shortages, and extreme shortages.

<sup>1</sup> The MWD 2020 UWMP utilized DWR's 2019 SWP Delivery Capability Report to estimate future SWP supplies for 2025 through 2045. These estimates incorporate the effect of regulatory requirements in accordance with biological opinions and also reflect potential impacts of climate change on SWP operations. Tables A.3-7 of the MWD 2020 UWMP reflect 58% or 1.1 MAF in MWD's expected average year SWP entitlement supplies. This amount is a higher expected average than MWD's 2015 estimate of 984,000 AF. For purposes of a conservative analysis, IRWD has used the 22% reduction in its supplies from MWD as the basis of IRWD's analysis.

These terms have specific meanings relating to MWD's ability to deliver water and the actions it takes. In June 2008, MWD's Board adopted a Water Supply Condition Framework to communicate the urgency of the region's water supply situation and the need for further water conservation to reduce regional demands, MWD uses the WSDM Plan and Framework to determine if a WSAP is recommended.

As an alternative means of analyzing the effect of reduced MWD supplies on IRWD, listed below are Figures provided comparing projected potable water supplies and demands in all of the five year increments, under a temporary MWD allocation scenario:

Figure 1a: Normal Year Supply and Demand (MWD Allocated) – Potable Water  
Figure 2a: Single Dry-Year Supply and Demand (MWD Allocated) – Potable Water  
Figure 3a: Multiple Dry-Year Supply and Demand (MWD Allocated) – Potable Water

Figures 1a, 2a, and 3a show IRWD's estimated supplies (average and single and multiple dry years) under a short-term MWD water supply allocation scenario whereby MWD declares a shortage stage under its WSAP, and a cutback is applied to IRWD's actual usage rather than its connected capacity. IRWD's evaluation of reduced MWD supplies to IRWD as shown in Figures 1a, 2a and 3a conservatively analyzes the effect of up to a MWD level 5 Regional Shortage Level. In addition, these Figures do not reflect a reduction in demands, thus representing a more conservative view of IRWD's supply capability. (see "**Recent Actions Related to Drought Conditions**" below)

On April 14, 2015, MWD approved the implementation of its WSAP at a level 3 Regional Shortage Level and an effective 15% reduction in regional deliveries effective July 1, 2015, through June 30, 2016. As a result of IRWD's diversified water supplies, IRWD is reliant on MWD for only 20% of its total supplies. IRWD's evaluation of reduced MWD supplies to IRWD as shown in Figures 1a, 2a and 3a includes MWD's 2015 actions to implement a level 3 Regional Shortage Level and 15% reduction.

Under shortage scenarios, IRWD may need to supplement supplies with production of groundwater, which can exceed the applicable basin production percentage on a short-term basis, providing additional reliability during dry years or emergencies.<sup>2</sup>

<sup>2</sup> In these scenarios, it is anticipated that other water suppliers who produce water from the Orange County Basin will also experience cutbacks of imported supplies and will increase groundwater production and that Orange County Water District ("OCWD") imported replenishment water may also be cutback. The OCWD's "2021-2022 Engineer's Report on the Groundwater Conditions, Water Supply and Basin Utilization" references a report (OCWD Report on Evaluation of Orange County Groundwater Basin Storage and Operational Strategy, 2007) which recommends a basin management strategy that provides general guidelines for annual basin refill or storage decrease based on the level of accumulated overdraft. It states: "Although it is considered to be generally acceptable to allow the basin to decline to 500,000 AF overdraft for brief periods due to severe drought conditions and lack of supplemental water...an accumulated overdraft of 100,000 AF best represents an optimal basin management target. This optimal target level provides sufficient storage space to accommodate anticipated recharge from a single wet year while also providing water in storage for at least 2 or 3 consecutive years of drought." MWD replenishment water is a supplemental source of recharge water and OCWD estimates other main supply sources for recharge are available.

In addition, IRWD has developed water banking projects in Kern County, California which may be called upon for delivery of supplemental banked water to IRWD under a MWD WSAP.<sup>3</sup> IRWD may also convert non-potable water uses to recycled water as a way to conserve potable water. In addition, if needed, resultant net shortage levels can be addressed by demand reduction programs as described in IRWD's updated Water Shortage Contingency Plan adopted in 2021. IRWD's Water Shortage Contingency Plan provides procedures for responding to various levels of supply shortages through a combination of supply augmentation and demand management measures. As stated in IRWD's Water Shortage Contingency Plan, use of local supplies, storage and other supply augmentation measures can mitigate shortages, and are used as necessary and appropriate during declared shortage levels.

It can be noted that IRWD's above approach is conservative, in that IRWD evaluates the effect of the 16% reduction through 2045 and shows the effect of current allocation scenarios in all of the five-year increments. However, MWD reports that it has made significant progress in other water resource categories such as transfers, groundwater storage and developing other local resources, and supplies will be available from these resources over the long-term.

**Climate Change.** The California Department of Water Resources ("DWR") released a report "Progress on Incorporating Climate Change into Management of California's Water Resources" (July 2006), considering the impacts of climate change on the State's water supply. In 2012, DWR adopted phase 1 of its Climate Action Plan, its department-wide plan for reducing greenhouse gas emissions (GHG). In September 2018, the DWR released phase 2 of its Climate Action Plan, which is DWR's guide to addressing climate change in the programs, projects, and activities over which it has authority. Per this guidance, California's climate policy focuses on reducing GHG emissions, preparing for climate change impacts, and supporting climate-related research to inform policy responses and decision-making processes.

In MWD's 2015 IRP Update, MWD recognizes there is additional risk and uncertainty associated with climate change that may affect future supply and demands. In the 2015 IRP Update, MWD states that it plans to hedge against supply and demand uncertainties by implementing a long-term plan that recognizes the risk and provides resource development to offset the risk. Per the MWD 2020 UWMP, for longer term risks, like climate change, MWD established a Robust Decision Making ("RDM") approach that can show how vulnerable the region's reliability is to the longer-term risks such as climate change and can also establish "signposts" that can be monitored to see when crucial changes may be happening. MWD states in its 2020 UWMP that the RDM analysis was valuable in identifying vulnerabilities to its 2015 IRP approach to long-term reliability and in understanding how climate change would best be incorporated into the 2020 IRP.

Per the MWD 2020 UWMP, MWD continues to incorporate current climate change science into its planning efforts and MWD has made great efforts to implement GHG mitigation programs and policies for its facilities and operations. In 2022, MWD released a Climate Action Plan which complements MWD's IRP planning process and set reduction targets and outlined strategies to reduce emission levels by 2045. In MWD's 2020 IRP Regional Needs Assessment, MWD finds that SWP supplies are highly susceptible to varying hydrologic conditions, climate change, and regulatory restrictions. In this report, MWD assesses climate

<sup>3</sup> IRWD has developed water banking projects ("Water Bank") in Kern County, California and has entered into a 30-year water banking partnership with Rosedale-Rio Bravo Water Storage District to operate IRWD's Strand Ranch and Stockdale West portions of the Water Bank. The Water Bank can improve IRWD's water supply reliability by capturing lower cost water available during wet hydrologic periods for use during dry periods. The Water Bank can enhance IRWD's ability to respond to drought conditions and potential water supply interruptions.

vulnerabilities and the need for future projects such as indirect potable reuse, stormwater capture, and expanded storage capacity to mitigate and adapt to these vulnerabilities and ensure future resilience. Specific climate change impacts on regional and local water supplies and relevant information for the Orange County hydrologic basin and Santa Ana Watershed have not been sufficiently developed at this time to permit IRWD to assess and quantify the effect of any such impact on its conclusions in the Assessment.

***Catastrophic Supply Interruption Planning.*** MWD has developed Emergency Storage Requirements (MWD 2020 UWMP) to safeguard the region from catastrophic loss of water supply. MWD has made substantial investments in emergency storage and has based its planning on a 100% reduction in its supplies for a period of six months. The emergency plan outlines that under such a catastrophe, non-firm service deliveries would be suspended, and firm supplies would be restricted by a mandatory cutback of 25 percent from normal year demand deliveries. In addition, MWD discusses DWR's investments in improvements on the SWP and the long term Delta plan in the MWD 2020 UWMP (pages 3-19 to 3-23). IRWD has also addressed supply interruption planning in its WRMP and 2020 UWMP.

***Recent Actions Related to Drought Conditions.*** In response to historically dry conditions throughout the state of California, on April 1, 2015, Governor Brown issued an Executive Order directing the State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB) to impose restrictions to achieve an aggregate statewide 25 percent reduction in potable water use through February 2016. The Governor's Order also included mandatory actions aimed at reducing water demands, with a particular focus on outdoor water use. On May 5, 2015, the SWRCB adopted regulations which required that IRWD achieve a 16% reduction in potable water use from its 2013 potable water use levels. On November 13, 2015, Governor Brown issued an Executive Order directing the SWRCB to extend the 2015 Emergency Regulation through October 31, 2016, if drought conditions continued. On February 2, 2016, the SWRCB adopted an extended and modified Emergency Regulation. As a result of the modification, IRWD's mandated reduction was changed from 16% to 9% effective March 1, 2016. On April 14, 2015, MWD approved actions to implement its WSAP at a level 3 Regional Shortage Level and a 15% reduction in regional deliveries effective July 1, 2015, through June 30, 2016. During this period, IRWD continued to implement actions to reduce potable water demands during the drought; however, this did not affect IRWD's long-term supply capability to meet the demands. On April 7, 2017, Governor Brown rescinded the Executive Order.

In California's most recent drought (2021-2023), in July 2021, Governor Newsom called for voluntary 15 percent reduction in potable water use from all urban suppliers. Consistent with the Governor's Executive Order, IRWD implemented Level 2 of its Water Shortage Contingency Plan, although IRWD had no projected shortages in supplies. In March 2023, Governor Newsom rescinded the Executive Order.

As discussed under "*IRWD's Evaluation of Effect of Reduced MWD Supplies to IRWD*" (see above), IRWD has effectively analyzed an imported water supply reduction up to a level 5 Regional Shortage Stage in Figures 1a, 2a, 3a. These Figures, however, do not reflect a reduction in demands, thus representing a more conservative view of IRWD's supply capability. In particular, the reduction in demand mandated by Senate Bill 7 in 2010, requiring urban retail water suppliers to establish water use targets to achieve a 20% reduction in daily per capita water use by 2020, has not been factored into the demands in this analysis. Similarly, notwithstanding the Governors' 2015 and 2021 orders, IRWD's conservative supply-sufficiency analysis in Figures 1a, 2a and 3a does not include the ordered reduction in potable demands.

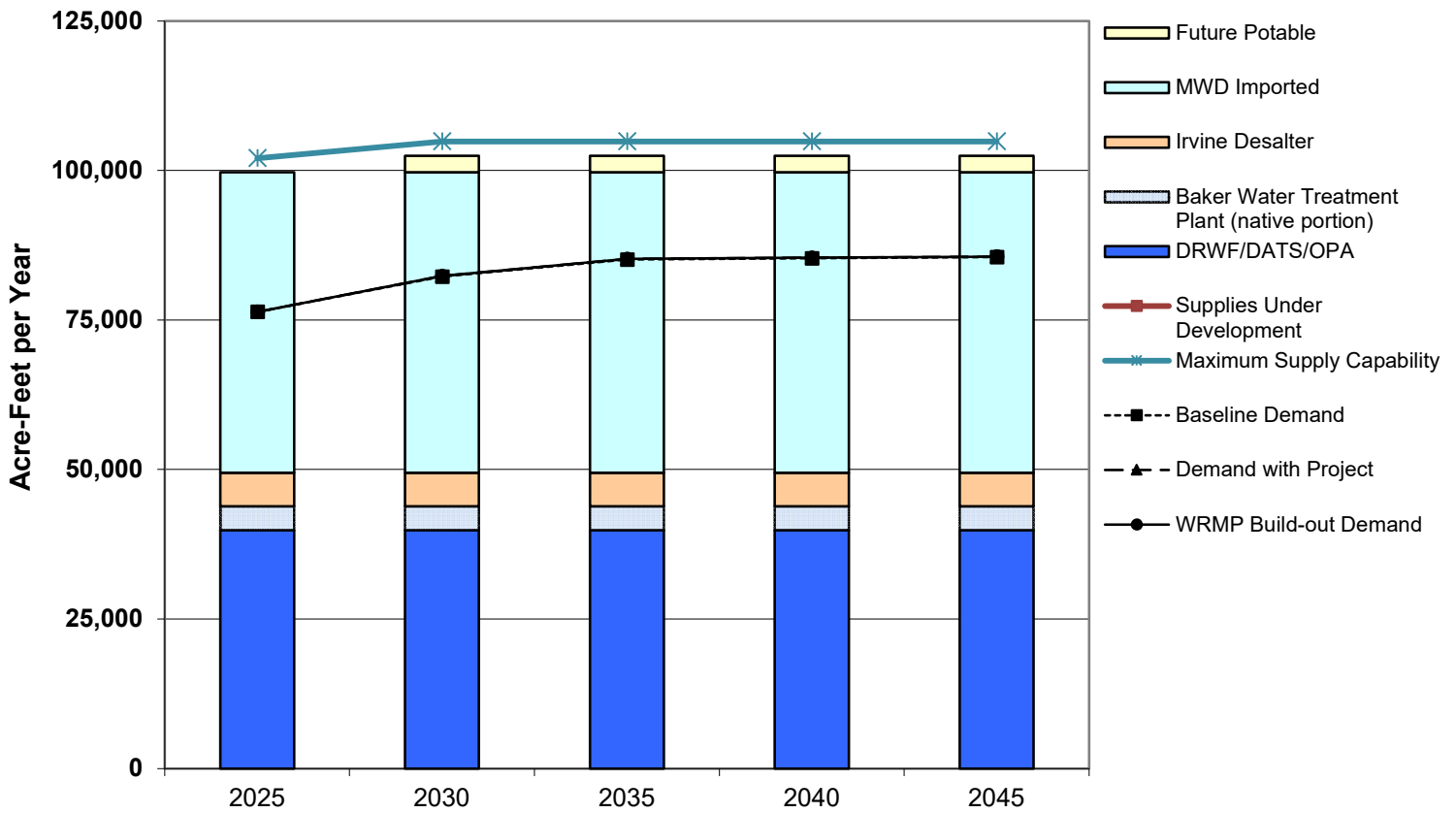

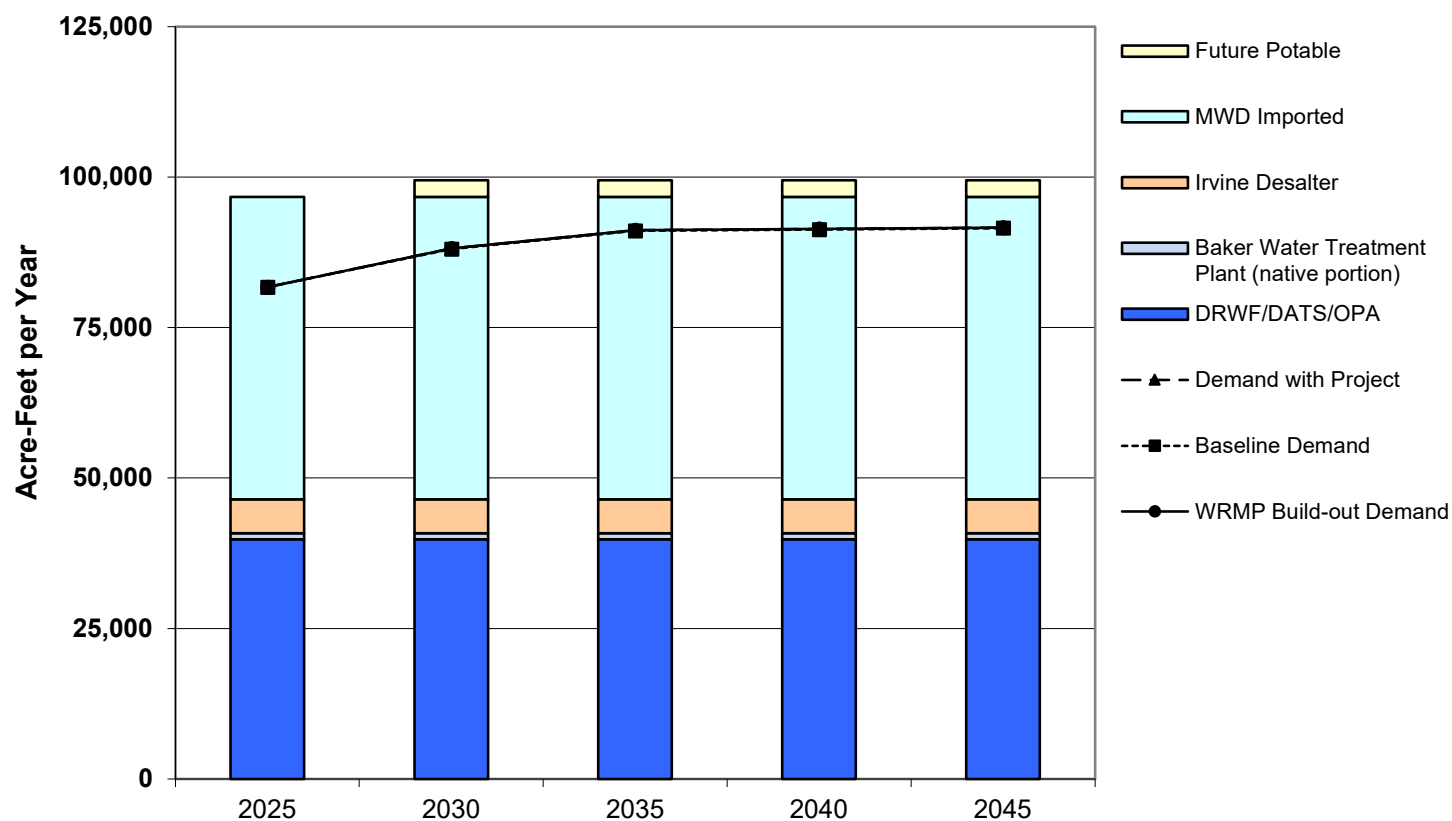

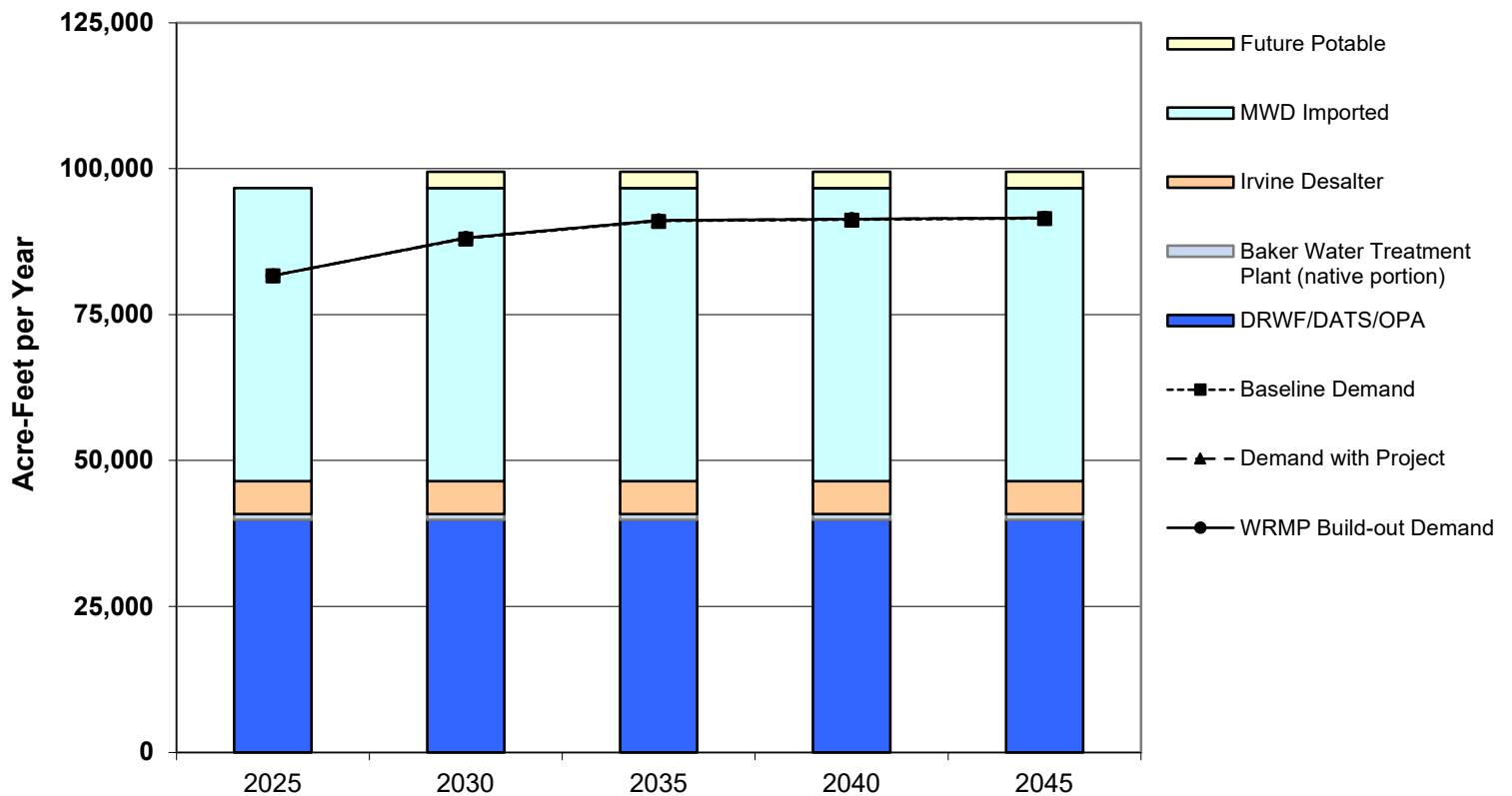

**IRWD Multiple Dry-Year Supply & Demand - Potable Water**



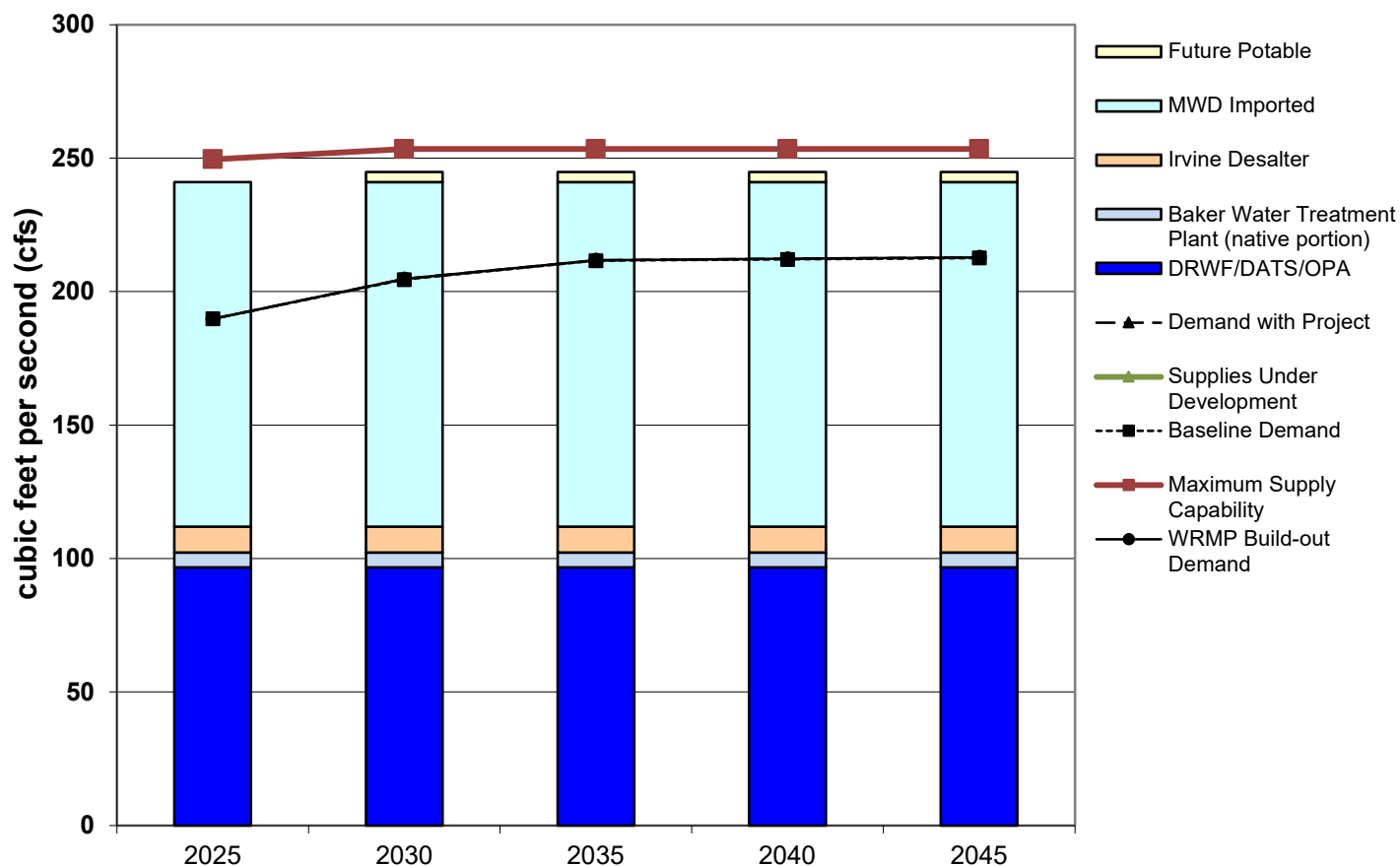

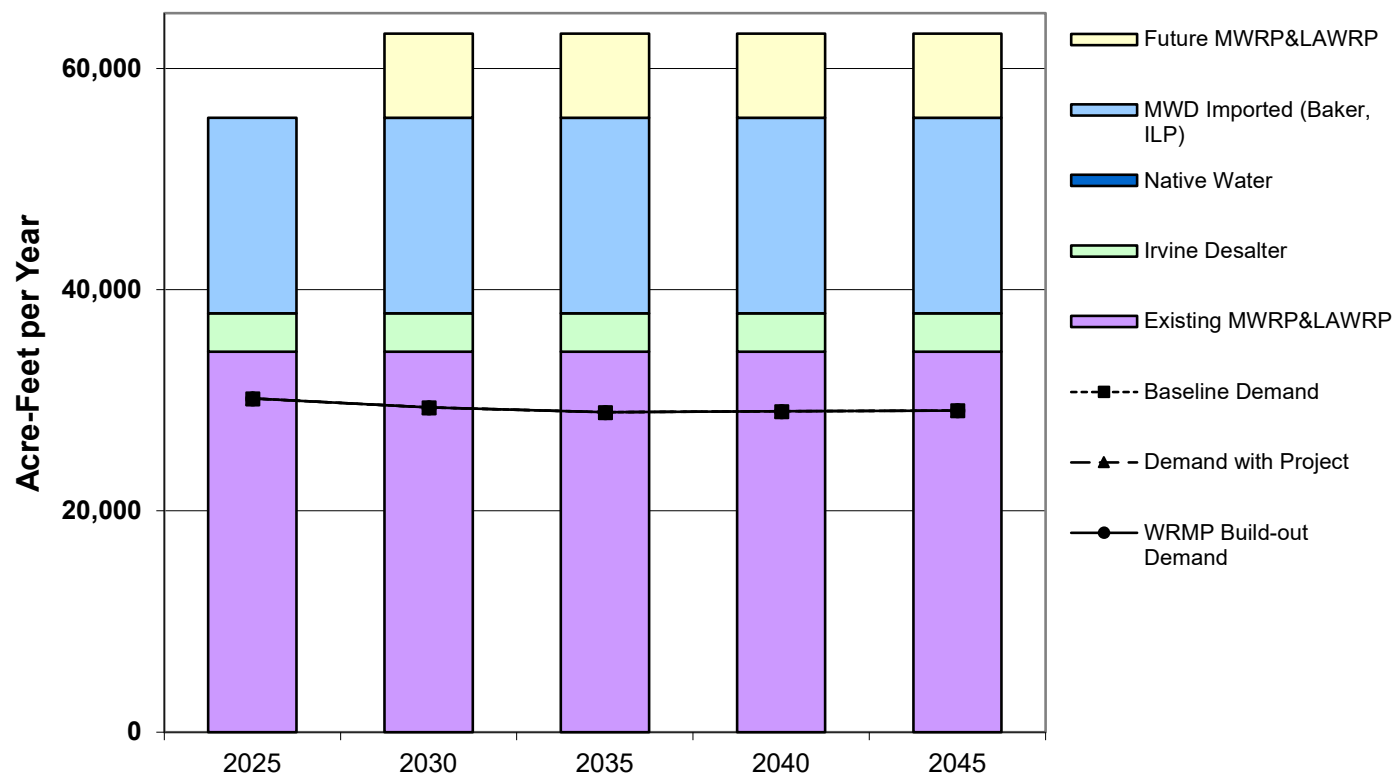

**IRWD Normal-Year Supply & Demand - Nonpotable Water**

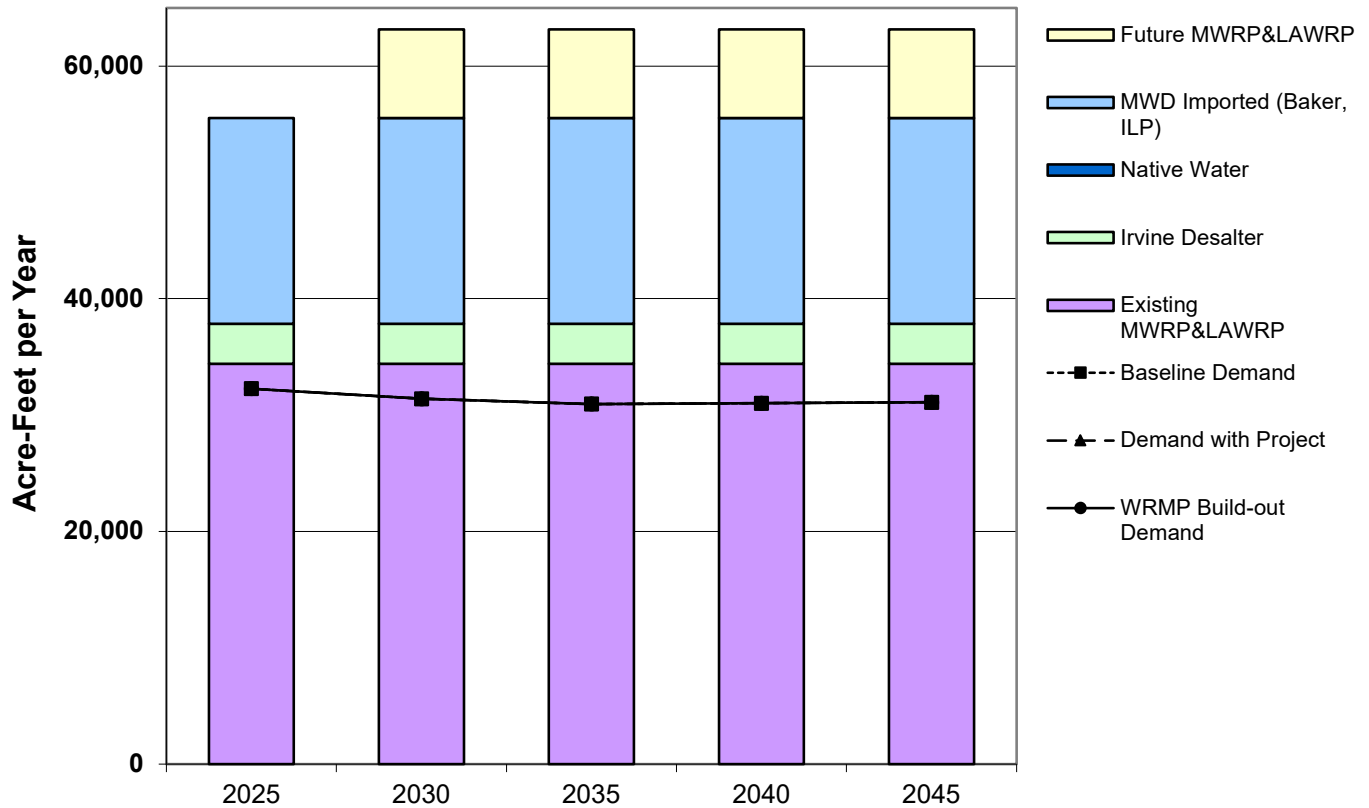

**IRWD Single Dry-Year Supply & Demand - Nonpotable Water**

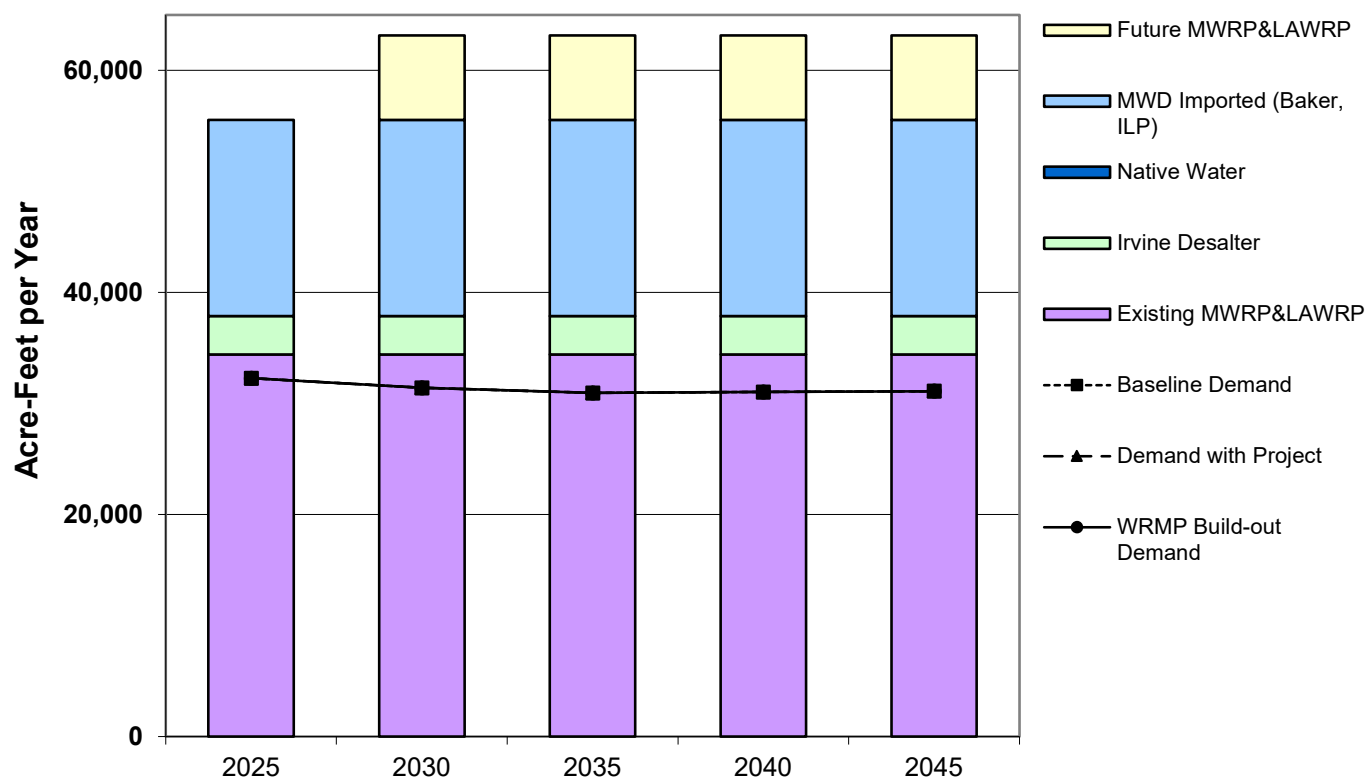

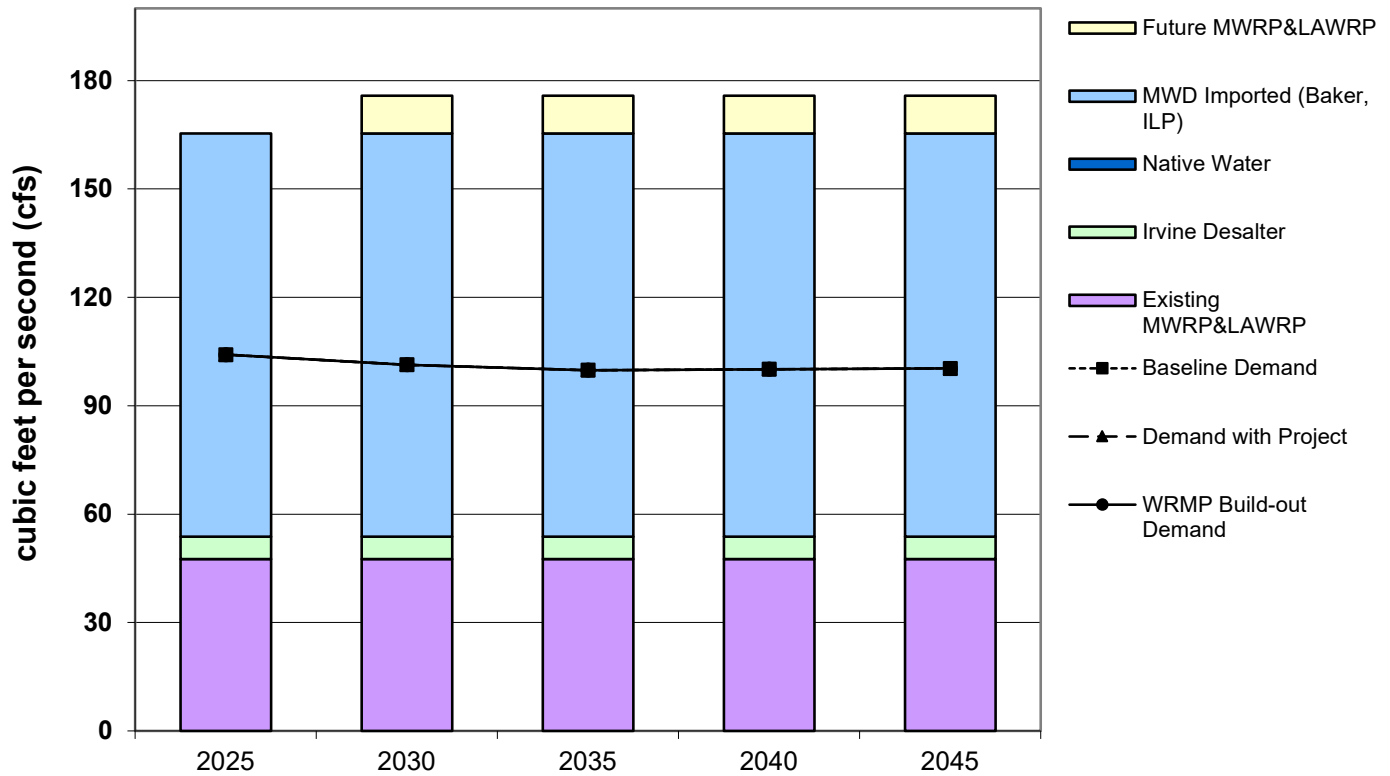

**IRWD Maximum-Dry Supply & Demand - Nonpotable Water**

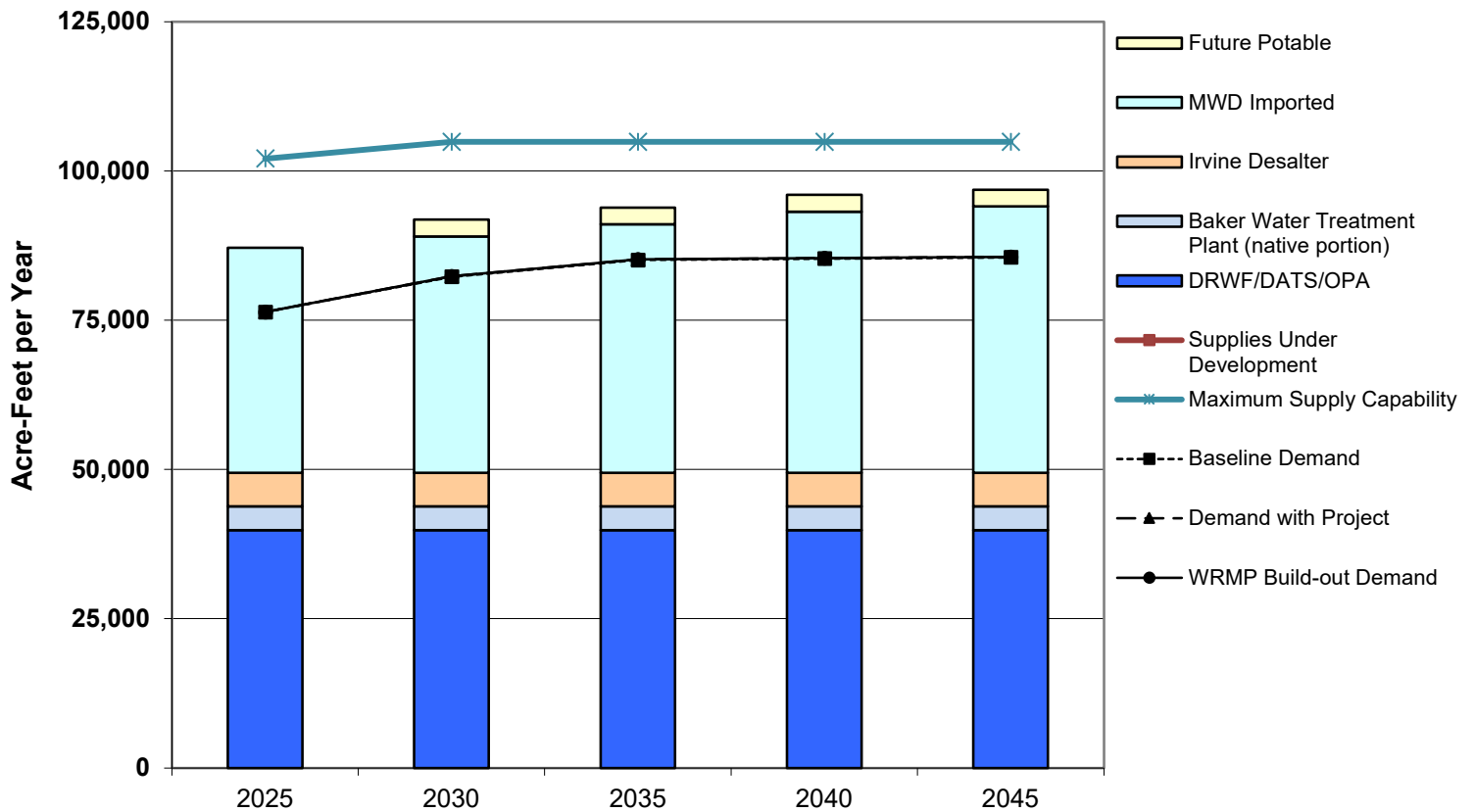

**Under Temporary MWD Allocation\***

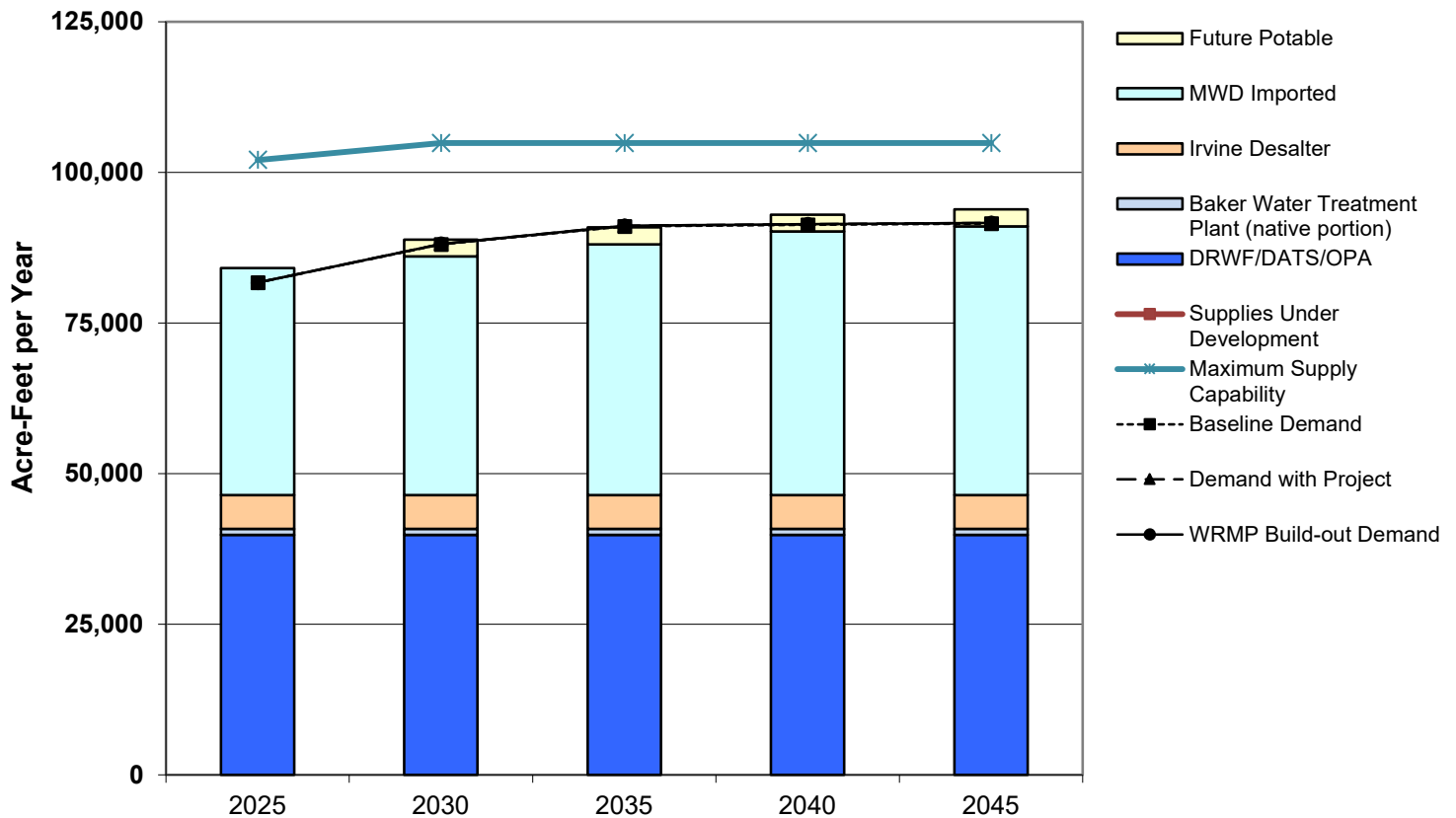

**Under Temporary MWD Allocation\***

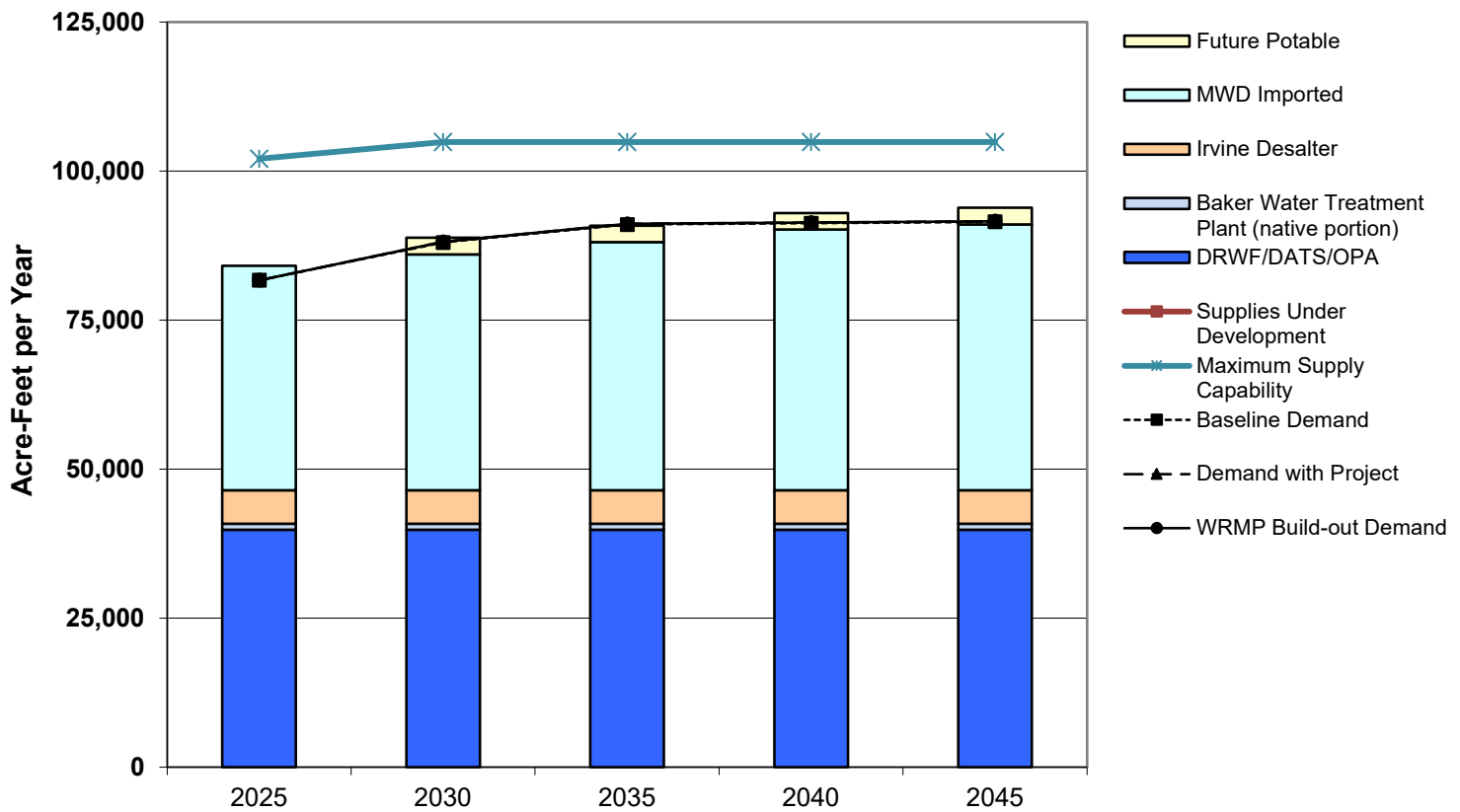

## 2. Information concerning supplies

### (a)(1) Existing sources of identified water supply for the proposed Project.

IRWD does not allocate particular supplies to any project, but identifies total supplies for its service area, as described below.

### (b) Required information concerning currently available and under-development water supply entitlements, water rights and water service contracts:

#### (1) Written contracts or other proof of entitlement.<sup>4 5</sup>

##### •POTABLE SUPPLY - IMPORTED<sup>6</sup>

##### ***Potable imported water service connections (currently available).***

(i) Potable imported water is delivered to IRWD at various service connections to the imported water delivery system of The Metropolitan Water District of Southern California ("MWD"): service connections CM-01A and OC-7 (Orange County Feeder); CM-10, CM-12, OC-38, OC-39, OC-57, OC-58, OC-63 (East Orange County Feeder No. 2); and OC-68, OC-71, OC-72, OC-73/73A, OC-74, OC-75, OC-83, OC-84, OC-87 (Allen-McColloch Pipeline). IRWD's entitlements regarding service from the MWD delivery system facilities are described in the following paragraphs and summarized in the above Table ((2)(a)(1)). IRWD receives imported water service through Municipal Water District of Orange County ("MWDOC"), a member agency of MWD.

##### ***Allen-McColloch Pipeline ("AMP") (currently available).***

(ii) Agreement For Sale and Purchase of Allen-McColloch Pipeline, dated as of July 1, 1994 (Metropolitan Water District Agreement No. 4623) ("AMP Sale Agreement"). Under the AMP Sale Agreement, MWD purchased the Allen-McColloch Pipeline (formerly known as the "Diemer Intertie") from MWDOC, the MWDOC Water Facilities Corporation and certain agencies, including IRWD and Los Alisos Water District ("LAWD"),<sup>7</sup> identified as "Participants" therein. Section

5.02 of the AMP Sale Agreement obligates MWD to meet IRWD's and the other Participants' requests for deliveries and specified minimum hydraulic grade lines at each connection serving a Participant, subject to availability of water. MWD agrees to operate the AMP as any other MWD pipeline. MWD has the right to operate the AMP on a "utility basis," meaning that MWD need not observe capacity allocations of the Participants but may use available capacity to meet demand at any service connection.

The AMP Sale Agreement obligates MWD to monitor and project AMP demands and to construct specified pump facilities or make other provision for augmenting MWD's capacity along the AMP, at MWD's expense, should that be necessary to meet demands of all of the Participants (Section 5.08).

*(iii)* Agreement For Allocation of Proceeds of Sale of Allen-McColloch Pipeline, dated as of July 1, 1994 ("AMP Allocation Agreement"). This agreement, entered into concurrently with the AMP Sale Agreement, provided each Participant, including IRWD, with a capacity allocation in the AMP, for the purpose of allocating the sale proceeds among the Participants in accordance with their prior contractual capacities adjusted to conform to their respective future demands. IRWD's capacity under the AMP Allocation Agreement (including its capacity as legal successor agency to LAWD) is 64.69 cfs at IRWD's first four AMP connections, 49.69 cfs at IRWD's next five downstream AMP connections and 35.01 and 10.00 cfs, respectively at IRWD's remaining two downstream connections. The AMP Allocation Agreement further provides that if a Participant's peak flow exceeds its capacity, the Participant shall "purchase" additional capacity from the other Participants who are using less than their capacity, until such time as MWD augments the capacity of the AMP. The foregoing notwithstanding, as mentioned in the preceding paragraph, the allocated capacities do not alter MWD's obligation under the AMP Sale Agreement to meet all Participants' demands along the AMP, and to augment the capacity of the AMP if necessary. Accordingly, under these agreements, IRWD can legally increase its use of the AMP beyond the above-stated capacities but would be required to reimburse other Participants from a portion of the proceeds IRWD received from the sale of the AMP.

*(iv)* Improvement Subleases (or "FAP" Subleases) [MWDOC and LAWD; MWDOC and IRWD], dated August 1, 1989; 1996 Amended and Restated Allen-McColloch Pipeline Subleases [MWDOC and LAWD; MWDOC and IRWD], dated March 1, 1996. IRWD subleases its AMP capacity, including the capacity it acquired as successor to LAWD. To facilitate bond financing for the construction of the AMP, it was provided that the MWDOC Water Facilities Corporation, and subsequently MWDOC, would have ownership of the pipeline, and the Participants would be sublessees. As is the case with the AMP Sale Agreement, the subleases similarly provide that water is subject to availability.

***East Orange County Feeder No. 2 (“EOCF#2”) (currently available).***

(v) Agreement For Joint Exercise of Powers For Construction, Operation and Maintenance of East Orange County Feeder No. 2, dated July 11, 1961, as amended on July 25, 1962, and April 26, 1965; Agreement Re Capacity Rights In Proposed Water Line, dated September 11, 1961 (“IRWD MWDOC Assignment Agreement”); Agreement Regarding Capacity Rights In the East Orange County Feeder No. 2, dated August 28, 2000 (“IRWD Coastal Assignment Agreement”). East Orange County Feeder No. 2 (“EOCF#2”), a feeder linking Orange County with MWD’s feeder system, was constructed pursuant to a joint powers agreement among MWDOC (then called Orange County Municipal Water District), MWD, Coastal Municipal Water District (“Coastal”), Anaheim and Santa Ana. A portion of IRWD’s territory is within MWDOC and the remainder is within the former Coastal (which was consolidated with MWDOC in 2001). Under the IRWD MWDOC Assignment Agreement, MWDOC assigned 41 cfs of capacity to IRWD in the reaches of EOCF#2 upstream of the point known as Coastal Junction (reaches 1 through 3), and 27 cfs in reach 4, downstream of Coastal Junction. Similarly, under the IRWD Coastal Assignment Agreement, prior to Coastal’s consolidation with MWDOC, Coastal assigned to IRWD 0.4 cfs of capacity in reaches 1 through 3 and 0.6 cfs in reach 4 of EOCF#2. Delivery of water through EOCF#2 is subject to the rules and regulations of MWD and MWDOC and is further subject to application and agreement of IRWD respecting turnouts.

***Orange County Feeder (currently available)***

(vi) Agreement, dated March 13, 1956. This 1956 Agreement between MWDOC’s predecessor district and the Santa Ana Heights Water Company (“SAHWC”) provides for delivery of MWD imported supply to the former SAHWC service area. SAHWC’s interests were acquired on behalf of IRWD through a stock purchase and IRWD annexation of the SAHWC service area in 1997. The supply is delivered through a connection to MWD’s Orange County Feeder designated as OC-7.

(vii) Agreement For Transfer of Interest In Pacific Coast Highway Water Transmission and Storage Facilities From The Irvine Company To the Irvine Ranch Water District, dated April 23, 1984; Joint Powers Agreement For the Construction, Operation and Maintenance of Sections 1a, 1b and 2 of the Coast Supply Line, dated June 9, 1989; Agreement, dated January 13, 1955 (“1955 Agreement”). The jointly constructed facility known as the Coast Supply Line (“CSL”), extending southward from a connection with MWD’s Orange County Feeder at Fernleaf Street in Newport Beach, was originally constructed pursuant to a 1952 agreement among Laguna Beach County Water District (“LBCWD”), The Irvine Company (TIC) and South Coast County Water District. Portions were later reconstructed. Under the above-referenced transfer agreement in 1984, IRWD succeeded to TIC’s interests in the CSL. The CSL is presently operated under the above-referenced 1989 joint powers agreement, which reflects IRWD’s ownership of 10 cfs of capacity. The 1989 agreement obligates LBCWD, as the managing agent and trustee for the CSL, to purchase water and deliver it into the CSL for IRWD. LBCWD purchases such supply, delivered by MWD to the Fernleaf connection, pursuant to the 1955 Agreement with Coastal (now MWDOC).



### ***Baker Water Treatment Plant (currently available)***

IRWD recently constructed the Baker Water Treatment Plant (Baker WTP) in partnership with El Toro Water District, Moulton-Niguel Water District, Santa Margarita Water District and Trabuco Canyon Water District. The Baker WTP is supplied with untreated imported water from MWD and native Irvine Lake water supply. IRWD owns 10.5 cfs of treatment capacity rights in the Baker WTP.<sup>8</sup>

### **•POTABLE SUPPLY - GROUNDWATER**

(i) Orange County Water District Act (“OCWD”), Water Code App., Ch. 40 (“Act”). IRWD is an operator of groundwater-producing facilities in the Orange County Groundwater Basin (the “Basin”). Although the rights of the producers within the Basin vis a vis one another have not been adjudicated, they nevertheless exist and have not been abrogated by the Act (§40-77). The rights consist of municipal appropriators’ rights and may include overlying and riparian rights. The Basin is managed by OCWD under the Act, which functions as a statutorily-imposed physical solution. The Act empowers OCWD to impose replenishment assessments and basin equity assessments on production and to require registration of water-producing facilities and the filing of certain reports; however, OCWD is expressly prohibited from limiting extraction unless a producer agrees to such limitation (§ 40-2(6) (c)) and from impairing vested rights to the use of water (§ 40-77). Thus, producers may install and operate production facilities under the Act; OCWD approval is not required. OCWD is required to annually investigate the condition of the Basin, assess overdraft and accumulated overdraft, and determine the amount of water necessary for replenishment (§40-26). OCWD has studied the Basin replenishment needs and potential projects to address growth in demand through 2035 in its Final Draft Long-Term Facilities Plan (January 2006), last updated November 19, 2014. The Long-Term Facilities Plan is updated approximately every five years.

(ii) *Irvine Ranch Water District v. Orange County Water District*, Orange County Superior Court Case No. 795827. A portion of IRWD is outside the jurisdictional boundary of OCWD. IRWD is eligible to annex the Santa Ana River Watershed portion of this territory to OCWD, under OCWD’s current annexation policy (OCWD Resolution No. 86-2-15, adopted on February 19, 1986, and reaffirmed on June 2, 1999). This September 29, 1998, Superior Court ruling indicates that IRWD is entitled to deliver groundwater from the Basin to the IRWD service area irrespective of whether such area is also within OCWD.

In 2023, IRWD executed an agreement that sells 3 cfs to South County agencies, leaving 7.5 cfs for daily use for IRWD. However, should an emergency arise, IRWD retains the right to the use of the 3 cfs sold.

***Dyer Road Wellfield (“DRWF”) / Deep Aquifer Treatment System (“DATS”) (currently available)***

(iii) Agreement For Water Production and Transmission Facilities, dated March 18, 1981, as amended May 2, 1984, September 19, 1990, and November 3, 1999 (the “DRWF Agreement”). The DRWF Agreement, among IRWD, OCWD and Santa Ana, concerns the development of IRWD’s Dyer Road Wellfield (DRWF), within the Basin. The DRWF consists of 16 wells pumping from the non-colored water zone of the Basin and 2 wells (with colored-water treatment facilities) pumping from the deep, colored-water zone of the Basin (the colored-water portion of the DRWF is sometimes referred to as the Deep Aquifer Treatment System or DATS.) Under the DRWF Agreement, an “equivalent” basin production percentage (“BPP”) has been established for the DRWF, currently 28,000 AFY of non-colored water and 8,000 AFY of colored water, provided any amount of the latter 8,000 AFY not produced results in a matching reduction of the 28,000 AFY BPP. Although typically IRWD production from the DRWF does not materially exceed the equivalent BPP, the equivalent BPP is not an extraction limitation; it results in imposition of monetary assessments on the excess production. The DRWF Agreement also establishes monthly pumping amounts for the DRWF. With the addition of the Concentrated Treatment System (“CATS”), IRWD has increased the yield of DATS.

***Irvine Subbasin / Irvine Desalter (currently available)***

(iv) First Amended and Restated Agreement, dated March 11, 2002, as amended June 15, 2006, restating May 5, 1988 agreement (“Irvine Subbasin Agreement”). TIC has historically pumped agricultural water from the Irvine Subbasin. (As in the rest of the Basin of which this subbasin is a part, the groundwater rights have not been adjudicated and OCWD provides governance and management under the Act.) The 1988 agreement between IRWD and TIC provided for the joint use and management of the Irvine Subbasin. The 1988 agreement further provided that the 13,000 AFY annual yield of the Irvine Subbasin (“Subbasin”) would be allocated 1,000 AFY to IRWD and 12,000 AFY to TIC. Under the restated Irvine Subbasin Agreement, the foregoing allocations were superseded as a result of TIC’s commencement of the building its Northern Sphere Area project, with the effect that the Subbasin production capability, wells and other facilities, and associated rights have been transferred from TIC to IRWD, and IRWD has assumed the production from the Subbasin. In consideration of the transfer, IRWD is required to count the supplies attributable to the transferred Subbasin production in calculating available supplies for the Northern Sphere Area project and other TIC development and has agreed that they will not be counted toward non-TIC development.

A portion of the existing Subbasin water production facilities produce water which is of potable quality. IRWD could treat some of the water produced from the Subbasin for potable use, by means of the Desalter and other projects. Although, as noted above, the Subbasin has not been adjudicated and is managed by OCWD, TIC reserved water rights from conveyances of its lands as development over the Subbasin has occurred, and under the Irvine Subbasin Agreement TIC has transferred its rights to IRWD.

(v) Second Amended and Restated Agreement Between Orange County Water

District and Irvine Ranch Water District Regarding the Irvine Desalter Project, dated June 11, 2001, and other agreements referenced therein. This agreement provides for the extraction and treatment of subpotable groundwater from the Irvine Subbasin, a portion of the Basin. As is the case with the remainder of the Basin, IRWD's entitlement to extract this water is not adjudicated, but the use of the entitlement is governed by the OCWD Act. (See also, discussion of Irvine Subbasin in the preceding paragraph.) A portion of the product water has been delivered into the IRWD potable system, and the remainder has been delivered into the IRWD nonpotable system.

***Orange Park Acres (currently available)***

On June 1, 2008, through annexation and merger, IRWD acquired the water system of the former Orange Park Acres Mutual Water company, including its well ("OPA Well"). The well is operated within the Basin.

***Wells 21 and 22 (currently available)***

In early 2013, IRWD completed construction of treatment facilities, pipelines, and wellhead facilities for Wells 21 and 22. Water supplied through this project became available in 2013. The wells are operated within the Basin.

***Irvine Wells (under development)***

(vi) IRWD is pursuing the installation of production facilities in the west Irvine, Tustin Legacy and Tustin Ranch portions of the Basin. These groundwater supplies are considered to be under development; however, four wells have been drilled and have previously produced groundwater, three wells have been drilled but have not been used as production wells to date, and a site for an additional well and treatment facility has been acquired by IRWD. These production facilities can be constructed and operated under the Act; no statutory or contractual approval is required to do so. Appropriate environmental review has or will be conducted for each facility. See discussion of the Act under Potable Supply - Groundwater, paragraph (i), above.

• **NONPOTABLE SUPPLY - RECYCLED**

***Water Recycling Plants (currently available)***

Water Code Section 1210. IRWD supplies its own recycled water from sewage collected by IRWD and delivered to IRWD's Michelson Water Recycling Plant ("MWRP") and Los Alisos Water Recycling Plant ("LAWRP"). Under the recently completed MWRP Phase II Capacity Expansion Project, IRWD increased its tertiary treatment capacity on the existing MWRP site to produce sufficient recycled water to meet the projected demand through the year 2045. MWRP currently has a permitted tertiary capacity of 28 million gallons per day ("MGD") and LAWRP currently has a permitted tertiary capacity of 5.5 MGD. Water Code Section 1210 provides that the owner of a sewage treatment plant operated for the purposes of treating wastes from a sanitary sewer system holds the exclusive right to the treated effluent as against anyone who has supplied the water discharged into the sewer system. IRWD's permits for the operation of MWRP and LAWRP allow only irrigation and other customer uses of recycled water, and

do not permit stream discharge of recycled water under normal conditions; thus, no issue of downstream appropriation arises, and IRWD is entitled to deliver all of the effluent to meet contractual and customer demands. Additional reclamation capacity will augment local nonpotable supplies and improve reliability.

•**NONPOTABLE SUPPLY - IMPORTED<sup>9</sup>**

***Baker Pipeline (currently available)***

Santiago Aqueduct Commission (“SAC”) Joint Powers Agreement, dated September 11, 1961, as amended December 20, 1974, January 13, 1978, November 1, 1978, September 1, 1981, October 22, 1986, and July 8, 1999 (the “SAC Agreement”); Agreement Between Irvine Ranch Water District and Carmichael Whiting Joint Venture Relative to Proposed Annexation of Certain Property to Irvine Ranch Water District, dated May 26, 1981 (the “Whiting Annexation Agreement”); service connections OC-13/13A, OC-33/33A. The imported untreated water pipeline initially known as the Santiago Aqueduct and now known as the Baker Pipeline was constructed under the SAC Agreement, a joint powers agreement. The Baker Pipeline is connected to MWD’s Santiago Lateral. IRWD’s capacity in the Baker Pipeline includes the capacity it subleases as successor to LAWD, as well as capacity rights IRWD acquired through the Whiting Annexation Agreement. (To finance the construction of AMP parallel untreated reaches which were incorporated into the Baker Pipeline, replacing original SAC untreated reaches that were made a part of the AMP potable system, it was provided that the MWDOC Water Facilities Corporation, and subsequently MWDOC, would have ownership, and the participants would be sublessees.) IRWD’s original capacities in the Baker Pipeline include 52.70 cfs in the first reach, 12.50 cfs in each of the second, third and fourth reaches and 7.51 cfs in the fifth reach of the Baker Pipeline. These existing Baker Pipeline capacities have been apportioned to the Baker WTP participants based on Baker WTP capacity ownership. IRWD retains 10.5 cfs of the pipeline capacity for potable supply through the Baker WTP and retains 36 cfs in Reach 1U of the Baker Pipeline capacity for nonpotable supply (See also footnote 8, page 27). In 2023, IRWD executed an Agreement that sells 3 cfs to South County agencies, leaving 7.5 cfs for daily use for IRWD. However, should an emergency arise, IRWD retains the right to use the 3 cfs sold. Water is subject to availability from MWD.

•**NONPOTABLE SUPPLY - NATIVE**

***Irvine Lake (currently available)***

(i) Permit For Diversion and Use of Water (“Permit No. 19306”) issued pursuant to Application No. 27503; License For Diversion and Use of Water (“License 2347”) resulting from Application No. 4302 and Permit No. 3238; License For Diversion and Use of Water (“License 2348”) resulting from Application No. 9005 and Permit No. 5202, and License For Diversion and Use of Water (“License

2349”) resulting from Application No. 9314. The foregoing permit and licenses, held solely by IRWD (as successor to The Irvine Company (“TIC”), Carpenter Irrigation District (“CID”), and Serrano Water District (“SWD”)), secure appropriative rights to the flows of Santiago Creek. Under Licenses 2347, 2348, and 2349 IRWD has the right to diversion by storage at Santiago Dam (Irvine Lake) and a submerged dam, of a total of 25,830 AFY. Under Permit No. 19306, IRWD has the right to diversion by storage of an additional 3,000 AFY by flashboards at Santiago Dam (Irvine Lake), as well as 15 cfs by direct diversion. (Rights under Permit No. 19306 may be junior to an OCWD permit to divert up to 35,000 AFY of Santiago Creek flows to spreading pits downstream of Santiago Dam.) The combined total of native water that may be diverted to storage in Irvine Lake, which is solely owned by IRWD, under these licenses and permit is 28,000 AFY. A 1996 amendment to License Nos. 2347, 2348 and 2349 limits the withdrawal of water from the Lake to 15,483 AFY under the licenses. This limitation specifically references the licensed water, and doesn’t reference water stored pursuant to other legal entitlements (e.g. imported water).

• **NONPOTABLE SUPPLY - GROUNDWATER**

***Irvine Subbasin / Irvine Desalter (currently available)***

(i) IRWD’s entitlement to produce nonpotable water from the Irvine Subbasin is included within the Irvine Subbasin Agreement. See discussion of the Irvine Subbasin Agreement under Potable Supply - Groundwater; paragraph (iv), above.

(ii) See discussion of the Irvine Desalter project under Potable Supply - Groundwater, paragraph (v), above. The Irvine Desalter project will produce nonpotable as well as potable water.

• **IMPORTED SUPPLY - ADDITIONAL INFORMATION**

As described above, the imported supply from MWD is contractually subject to availability. To assist local water providers in assessing the adequacy of local water supplies that are reliant in whole or in part on MWD’s imported supply, MWD has provided information concerning the availability of the supplies to its entire service area. In the MWD 2020 UWMP, MWD has extended its planning timeframe out through 2045 to ensure that the MWD 2020 UWMP may be used as a source document for meeting requirements for sufficient supplies. In addition, the MWD 2020 UWMP includes “Justifications for Supply Projections” (Appendix A-3) that details the planning, legal, financial, and regulatory basis for including each source of supply in the plan. The MWD 2020 UWMP summarizes MWD’s planning initiatives over the past 15 years, which includes the Integrated Resources Plan (IRP), the IRP 2015 Update, the WSDM Plan, Strategic Plan and Rate Structure. The reliability analysis in MWD’s 2015 IRP Update shows that MWD can maintain reliable supplies under the conditions that have existed in past dry periods throughout the period through 2040. The MWD 2020 UWMP includes tables that show the region can provide reliable supplies under both the single driest year (1977) and multiple dry years (1990-92) through 2045. MWD has also identified buffer supplies, including additional State Water Project groundwater storage and transfers that could serve to supply the additional water needed.

It is anticipated that MWD will revise its regional supply availability analysis periodically, if needed, to supplement the MWD 2020 UWMP in years when the MWD UWMP is not being updated.

IRWD is permitted by the statute (Wat. Code, § 10610 *et seq.*) to rely upon the water supply information provided by the wholesaler concerning a wholesale water supply source, for use in preparing its UWMPs. In turn, the statute provides for the use of UWMP information to support water supply assessments and verifications. In accordance with these provisions, IRWD is entitled to rely upon the conclusions of the MWD UWMP. As referenced above under Summary of Results of Demand-Supply Comparisons - **Actions on Delta Pumping**, MWD has provided additional information on its imported water supply.

MWD's reserve supplies, together with the fact that IRWD relies on MWD supplies as supplemental supplies that need not be used to the extent IRWD operates currently available and under-development local supplies, build a margin of safety into IRWD's supply availability.

(2) Adopted capital outlay program to finance delivery of the water supplies.

All necessary delivery facilities currently exist for the use of the *currently available* and *under-development* supplies assessed herein, with the exception of future groundwater wells, and IRWD sub-regional and developer-dedicated conveyance facilities necessary to complete the local distribution systems for the Project. IRWD's turnout at each MWD connection and IRWD's regional delivery facilities are sufficiently sized to deliver all of the supply to the sub-regional and local distribution systems.

With respect to future groundwater well projects (PR Nos. 11828 and 11829), IRWD adopted its fiscal year 2023-24 capital budget on April 24, 2023 (Resolution No. 2023-6) and the mid-cycle capital budget for fiscal year 2024-25 was adopted on May 28, 2024. Budgeting portions of the funds are for such projects. (A copy is available from IRWD on request.) For these facilities, as well as unbuilt IRWD sub-regional conveyance facilities, the sources of funding are previously authorized general obligation bonds, revenue-supported certificates of participation and/or capital funds held by IRWD Improvement Districts. IRWD has maintained a successful program for the issuance of general obligation bonds and certificates of participation on favorable borrowing terms, and IRWD has received AAA public bond ratings. IRWD has approximately \$585.5 million (water) and \$711.1 million (recycled water and sewer) of unissued, voter-approved general obligation bond authorization. Certificates of participation do not require voter approval. Proceeds of bonds and available capital funds are expected to be sufficient to fund all IRWD facilities for delivery of the supplies under development. Tract-level conveyance facilities are required to be donated to IRWD by the Applicant or its successor(s) at time of development.

See also the MWD 2020 UWMP, Appendix A.3 Justifications for Supply Projections with respect to capital outlay programs related to MWD's supplies.

(3) Federal, state and local permits for construction of delivery infrastructure.

Most IRWD delivery facilities are constructed in public right-of-way or future right-of-way. State statute confers on IRWD the right to construct works along, under or across any stream of water, watercourse, street, avenue, highway, railway, canal, ditch, or flume (Water Code Section 35603). Although this right cannot be denied, local agencies may require encroachment permits when work is to be performed within a street. If easements are necessary for delivery infrastructure, IRWD requires the developer to provide them. The crossing of watercourses or areas with protected species requires federal and/or state permits as applicable.

See also the MWD 2020 UWMP, Appendix A.3 Justifications for Supply Projections with respect to permits related to MWD's supplies.

(4) Regulatory approvals for conveyance or delivery of the supplies.

See response to preceding item (3). Additionally, in general, supplies under development may necessitate the preparation and completion of environmental documents and/or regulatory approvals prior to full construction and implementation. IRWD obtains such approvals when required, and copies of documents pertaining to approvals can be obtained from IRWD.

See also the MWD 2020 UWMP, Appendix A.3 Justifications for Supply Projections with respect to regulatory approvals related to MWD's supplies.

**3. Other users and contractholders (identified supply not previously used).**

For each of the water supply sources identified by IRWD, if no water has been received from that source(s), IRWD is required to identify other public water systems or water service contractholders that receive a water supply from, or have existing water supply entitlements, water rights and water service contracts to, that source(s):

Water has been received from all listed sources. A small quantity of Subbasin water is used by Woodbridge Village Association for the purpose of supplying its North and South Lakes. There are no other public water systems or water service contractholders that receive a water supply from, or have existing water supply entitlements, water rights and water service contracts to, the Irvine Subbasin.

**4. Information concerning groundwater included in the supply identified for the Project:**

(a) Relevant information in the Urban Water Management Plan (UWMP):

See Irvine Ranch Water District 2020 UWMP, section 6.2.

(b) Description of the groundwater basin(s) from which the Project will be supplied:

The Orange County Groundwater Basin ("Basin") is described in the Orange County Water District Groundwater Management Plan ("GMP") 2015 Update,

dated June 17, 2015<sup>10</sup>. The rights of the producers within the Basin vis a vis one another have not been adjudicated. The Basin is managed by the Orange County Water District ("OCWD") for the benefit of municipal, agricultural, and private groundwater producers. OCWD is responsible for the protection of water rights to the Santa Ana River in Orange County as well as the management and replenishment of the Basin. Current production from the Basin is approximately 260,000 AFY.

The DWR has not identified the Basin as "critically overdrafted," and has not identified the Basin as overdrafted in its most current bulletin that characterizes the condition of the Basin, Bulletin 118. The efforts being undertaken by OCWD to avoid long-term overdraft in the Basin are described in the OCWD GMP 2015 Update and OCWD Master Plan Report ("MPR"), including in particular, Chapters 4, 5, 6, 14 and 15 of the MPR. OCWD has also prepared a Long Term Facilities Plan ("LTFP") which was received by the OCWD Board in July 2009 and was last updated in November 2014. The LTFP Chapter 3 describes the efforts being undertaken by OCWD to eliminate long-term overdraft in the Basin. See also following section on "***Sustainable Groundwater Management Act***".

Although the water supply assessment statute (Water Code Section 10910(f)) refers to elimination of "long-term overdraft," overdraft includes conditions which may be managed for optimum basin storage, rather than eliminated. OCWD's Act defines annual groundwater overdraft to be the quantity by which production exceeds the natural replenishment of the Basin. Accumulated overdraft is defined in the OCWD Act to be the quantity of water needed in the groundwater basin forebay to prevent landward movement of seawater into the fresh groundwater body. However, seawater intrusion control facilities have been constructed by OCWD since the Act was written and have been effective in preventing landward movement of seawater. These facilities allow greater utilization of the storage capacity of the Basin.

OCWD has invested over \$250 million in seawater intrusion control (injection barriers), recharge facilities, laboratories, and Basin monitoring to effectively manage the Basin. Consequently, although the Basin is defined to be in an "overdraft" condition, it is actually managed to allow utilization of up to 500,000 acre-feet of storage capacity of the basin during dry periods, acting as an underground reservoir and buffer against drought. OCWD has an optimal basin management target of 100,000 acre-feet of accumulated overdraft provides sufficient storage space to accommodate increased supplies from one wet year while also provide enough water in storage to offset decreased supplies during a two- to three year drought. If the Basin is too full, artesian conditions can occur along the coastal area, causing rising water and water logging, an adverse condition. Since the formation of OCWD in 1933, OCWD has made substantial investment in facilities, Basin management and water rights protection, resulting in the elimination and prevention of adverse long-term "mining" overdraft conditions. OCWD continues to develop new replenishment supplies, recharge capacity and basin protection measures to meet projected production from the basin during normal rainfall and drought periods. (OCWD GMP, OCWD MPR and LTFP)

OCWD's efforts include ongoing replenishment programs and planned capital improvements. It should be noted under OCWD's management of overdraft to maximize the Basin's use for annual production and recharge operations, overdraft varies over time as the Basin is managed to keep it in balance over the long term. The Basin is not operated on an annual safe-yield basis. (OCWD GMP, OCWD MPR, section 3.2 and LTFP, section 6). See also the following section on "***Sustainable Groundwater Management Act***".

(c) Description and analysis of the amount and location of groundwater pumped by IRWD from the Basin for the past five years:

The following table shows the amounts pumped, by groundwater source since the year 2002:

(d) Description and analysis of the amount and location of groundwater projected to be pumped by IRWD from the Basin:

IRWD has a developed groundwater supply of 35,200 AFY from its Dyer Road Wellfield (including the Deep Aquifer Treatment System), in the main portion of the Basin.

Although TIC's historical production from the Subbasin declined as its use of the Subbasin for agricultural water diminished, OCWD's and other historical production records for the Subbasin show that production has been as high as 13,000 AFY. Plans are also underway to expand IRWD's main Orange County Groundwater Basin supply (characterized as *under-development* supplies herein). (See Section 2 (a) (1) herein). IRWD anticipates the development of potential additional production facilities within both the main Basin and the Irvine Subbasin. However, such additional facilities have not been included or relied upon in this assessment. Additional groundwater development will provide an additional margin of safety as well as reduce future water supply costs to IRWD.

The OCWD MPR and LTFP examined future Basin conditions and capabilities, water supply and demand, and identified projects to meet increased replenishment needs of the basin. With the implementation of OCWD's preferred projects, the Basin yield in the year 2025 would be up to 500,000 AF. The amount that can be produced will be a function of which projects will be implemented by OCWD and how much increased recharge capacity is created by those projects, total demands by all producers, and the resulting Basin Production Percentage ("BPP") that OCWD sets based on these factors.<sup>14</sup> Sufficient replenishment supplies are projected by the OCWD MPR to be available to OCWD to meet the increasing demand on the Basin. These supplies include capture of increasing Santa Ana River flows, purchases of replenishment water from MWD, and development of new local supplies. In 2008, OCWD began operating its replenishment supply project, the Groundwater Replenishment System project ("GWRS"). The GWRS currently produces approximately 100,000 AFY of new replenishment supply from recycled water (OCWD GMP).

Production of groundwater can exceed applicable basin production percentages on a short-term basis, providing additional reliability during dry years or emergencies. Additional groundwater production is anticipated by OCWD in the Basin in dry years, as producers reduce their use of imported supplies, and the Basin is "mined" in anticipation of the eventual availability of replenishment water. (OCWD MPR, section 14.6.)

See also, Figures 1-8 hereto. IRWD assesses sufficiency of supplies on an aggregated basis, as neither groundwater nor other supply sources are allocated to particular projects or customers. Under the Irvine Subbasin Agreement, IRWD is contractually obligated to attribute the Subbasin supply only to TIC development projects for assessment purposes; however, the agreement does not allocate or assign rights in the Subbasin supply to any project.

***Sustainable Groundwater Management Act.*** Pursuant to the Sustainable Groundwater Management Act ("SGMA"), the DWR has designated the Orange County groundwater basin, Basin 8-1, as a medium priority basin for purposes of groundwater management. The SGMA specifically calls for OCWD, which regulates the Orange County groundwater basin, to serve as the groundwater sustainability agency or "GSA". The SGMA allows Special Act Districts created by statute, such as OCWD, to prepare and submit an alternative to a Groundwater Sustainability Plan ("GSP") that is "functionally equivalent" to a GSP. Basin 8-1 includes the OCWD service area and several fringe areas outside of OCWD that are within the Basin 8-1 boundary. Per the requirements of SGMA, an Alternative Plan must encompass the entire groundwater basin as defined by DWR. On January 1, 2017, OCWD and the overlying agencies within Basin 8-1, including IRWD, jointly prepared and submitted an alternative plan in compliance with SGMA (Basin 8-1 Alternative). The Basin 8-1 Alternative was

<sup>14</sup> OCWD has adopted a basin production percentage of 85% for 2024-25. In prior years OCWD has maintained a basin production percentage that is lower than the current percentage, and IRWD anticipates that such reductions may occur from time to time as a temporary measure employed by OCWD to encourage lower pumping levels as OCWD implements other measures to reduce the current accumulated overdraft in the Basin. 

## ACTION CALENDAR

### 2025 LEGISLATIVE AND REGULATORY UPDATE

#### SUMMARY:

This report provides an update on the 2025-2026 legislative session, regulatory issues, and IRWD priorities. As legislation and regulations develop, staff will provide updates and recommendations to the Board, as appropriate.

#### BACKGROUND:

When the California State Assembly and Senate returned from the summer recess, both houses had one month to finish their work for the regular legislative session. The last day for each house to pass bills this year was supposed to be September 12, but due to an agreement being reached on additional budget trailer bills to address outstanding fiscal issues, including the allocation of the initial Proposition 4 funds, the date was extended to September 13. The Governor had until October 12 to sign or veto bills. The 2025-2026 Regular Legislative Session will resume on January 6, 2026.

A copy of the Legislative Matrix is provided as Exhibit “A”. Links to the bills discussed below are included within each discussion unless a separate exhibit is noted.

#### 2025 End of Session Activity:

While the State’s Fiscal Year 2025-2026 budget was formally adopted by the June 15 constitutional deadline, and an actual budget deal was finalized and enacted on June 30, there remained significant budget issues to be dealt with at the end of the legislative session. Most notably (from IRWD’s perspective) was the allocation of the initial Proposition 4 funds, the \$10 billion in general obligation bonds for climate resilience and environmental projects across the state. Similarly important was the reauthorization of the Cap-and-Trade program, now known as Cap-and-Invest. The Legislature and Governor took action on both of these at the end of session. Staff will provide the Board with an update on the end of session activities.

#### 2025 State Legislative Update:

As has been traditionally done after the legislative session has recessed, staff has provided an update on the bills still active at the end of the legislative session and that were of interest to the District. ### ENTERPRISE BUSINESS SOFTWARE PROJECTS

#### SUMMARY:

IRWD's enterprise business software systems are essential to support IRWD's critical business operations. The District's current enterprise business software for Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP) and Customer Information System (CIS) are based on outdated technologies and processes that are challenging for internal users and costly to maintain. The proposed projects will replace the current ERP and CIS with modern software systems to improve efficiencies, improve decision support, and reduce the cost of ownership. Due to the interconnected processes between the two systems, they will be implemented concurrently as a coordinated program, with active oversight and project support to reduce implementation risks.

Staff recommends that the Board authorize the General Manager to execute agreements with Workday, Inc. in the amount of \$5,449,581 for 10-year ERP software subscription, with Strada U.S. Professional Services, LLC in the amount of \$4,982,685 for ERP implementation services, with SpryPoint Services, Inc. in the amount of \$11,365,102 for 10-year CIS software subscription and implementation services, and with Plante Moran, PLLC in the amount of \$2,132,990 for program management services.

#### BACKGROUND:

IRWD's enterprise business software systems are essential to IRWD's critical business operations, including core processes for Finance, Purchasing, Human Resources, Customer Service, Water Efficiency, and Development Services. Functional areas include Accounts Payable, Accounts Receivable, Bank Reconciliation, Cash Management, Contract Management, Financial Reporting, Fixed Assets, General Ledger, Project Accounting, Purchasing, Employee Benefits, Employee Self Service, Personnel Actions, Payroll, Time Entry, Customer Account Management, Billing, Delinquency, Rates, Service Orders, Development, and more. The enterprise business software systems are also integrated with approximately twenty other internal and external systems. In Fiscal Year 2024, IRWD's enterprise business software systems were used to process \$388.8 million in revenue, 1.6 million customer bills, payroll and human resources transactions for nearly 400 employees, and all vendor purchases.

IRWD's current ERP is Oracle E-Business Suite (EBS), which was first implemented in 2011. IRWD's current CIS is Oracle Customer Care and Billing (CC&B), which was first implemented in 2014. These applications have been upgraded since their initial implementations, but they are based on outdated technologies and processes that continue to be challenging for users and costly to maintain. In addition, the data are challenged with system of records, visibility, and accessibility issues that create burdensome reporting and limit analytical insights.

In January 2024, the District initiated an effort to improve upon its existing Oracle EBS and CC&B applications. A Request for Proposal (RFP) was publicly posted for an independent assessment of IRWD's use of its Oracle applications and recommend improvements to meet the District's current and future needs. The District evaluated the considerable cost of further investment in the Oracle applications and the marginal benefits from the consultant proposals.

Also in January 2024, the District began a separate effort to improve the management of its enterprise data. A data consulting firm conducted 42 meetings with 69 employees representing different areas across the District. The assessment confirmed data challenges and developed twenty enterprise data use cases, most of which were dependent on ERP and CIS data.

The limited potential benefits from these targeted improvement efforts supported a more holistic approach to transform business operations by replacing the Oracle software systems.

#### Proposed Projects:

The proposed ERP and CIS projects will replace IRWD's Oracle EBS and CC&B with modern software systems that will enable the District to improve efficiencies, improve decision support, and reduce the cost of ownership. Objectives for the proposed projects include:

- Best practices for more efficient IRWD business operations;
- Enterprise data management;
- Seamless integration with other enterprise systems;
- Secure and modern technical environment;
- Cost-appropriate for an organization such as IRWD, including initial and on-going costs;
- High success rate for migration from Oracle EBS and CC&B systems;
- High success rate for user acceptance;
- Proven solution for water utility and public sector customers; and
- Product roadmap that continuously improves and leverages advancements going forward.

In March 2024, the District publicly posted a Request for Information (RFI) to gain knowledge of modern business software options and approaches. The vendor responses provided encouraging information about a more advanced software market with more options now available to support the District's objectives. With this information, a very comprehensive process was initiated to replace the Oracle EBS and CC&B systems.

In June 2024, the District publicly posted an RFP for experienced consultants to assist in the evaluation of new ERP and CIS software that would best meet the District's objectives. Staff evaluated eleven proposals and awarded an agreement to consulting firm Plante Moran. Plante Moran conducted more than forty process owner interviews across the District to develop detailed ERP and CIS software requirements.



In February 2025, the District publicly posted an RFI to procure new ERP and CIS software. The RFI included 699 finance requirements, 444 human resources requirements, 551 utility billing requirements, and 137 general and technical requirements, as well as detailed questionnaires for vendor information, pricing, and staffing expectations. Four ERP and six CIS proposals were submitted. The evaluation process included review of the proposal documents, reference calls, and vendor demonstrations.

The CIS Evaluation Team consisted of department representatives from Finance, Customer Service, Water Efficiency, Operations, and Information Technology. Based on the RFI scoring criteria, the software from SpryPoint scored the highest of the six proposals. The other proposers were Cayenta, Infor, Itineris, Utility Solutions Partners, and VertexOne. The proposed SpryCIS software will replace Oracle CC&B. In addition, the proposed SpryMobile software will provide new capabilities for Customer Service field personnel, SpryEngage will provide a new internet portal for IRWD customers, and SpryBackflow will provide new capabilities for Cross Connection Control staff for backflow management and compliance. The SpryPoint agreement amount is \$11,365,102, which includes 10 years of software subscription and implementation services, as SpryPoint is the only implementor of its software. The CIS Project Scope of Work is provided as Exhibit “A”.

The ERP Evaluation Team consisted of department representatives from Finance, Purchasing, Human Resources, Operations, and Information Technology. Based on the RFI scoring criteria, the software from Workday scored the highest of the four proposals. The other proposers were Cayenta, Infor, and Mythics. The proposed Workday Financials and Human Capital Management software will replace Oracle EBS. In addition, the proposed Workday Prism will provide new capabilities for enterprise data management. The Workday agreement amount is \$5,449,581, which includes 10 years of software subscription and 5 years of Workday Success Plan Accelerate Essentials training.

In June 2025, the District publicly posted an RFP for implementation services for the Workday ERP software. The RFP included 722 functional requirements and 137 general and technical requirements, as well as detailed questionnaires for vendor information, approach, pricing, and staffing expectations. The Evaluation Team consisted of department representatives from Finance, Purchasing, Human Resources, Operations, and Information Technology. Based on the RFP scoring criteria, Strada scored the highest of the three proposals that were submitted. The other proposers were Cognizant and Slalom. The Strada agreement amount is \$4,982,685, which includes services for implementing the Workday ERP software, integrations with more than 20 other systems, and coordination between Strada and SpryPoint project teams. The ERP Project Scope of Work is provided as Exhibit “B”.

Also in June 2025, the District publicly posted an RFP for program management services. Due to the interconnected processes between the ERP and CIS, these two projects will be implemented concurrently to enable unencumbered best practices, minimize rework between old and new systems, and realize benefits earlier. A program management approach, which includes program oversight and as-needed project support for IRWD staff, will reduce concurrent implementation risks. The Evaluation Team consisted of department representatives from Finance and Administration, Financial Planning and Data Analytics, and Information Technology. Based on the RFP scoring criteria, Plante Moran scored the highest of the seven

proposals that were submitted. The other proposers were Advisely Tech, Averro Advisors, Consultadd, Sacramento Consulting Group, Slalom, and Utility Solutions Partners. The Plante Moran agreement amount is not-to-exceed \$2,132,990, which includes as-needed program advisory, subject matter expert, and project support services. The Program Management Scope of Work is provided as Exhibit “C”.

Staff are aware of the significant internal level of effort that will be required to implement the proposed projects. Staff have estimated the additional workload and developed mitigation plans based on discussions with other agencies and review of vendor staffing assumptions.

If approved, the ERP and CIS projects and the program management services will begin in November 2025. Implementation is anticipated to be completed in March 2027, which will be followed by three months of post go-live operational support. Staff will further describe the implementation and other aspects of this project utilizing the powerpoint presentation provided as Exhibit “D.”

In addition to the proposed ERP and CIS, a new Land Management and Permitting System (LaMPS) will be needed for IRWD’s Development Services functions currently performed in Oracle CC&B. Due to the smaller scope and shorter schedule of the LaMPS project, it will begin later to align implementation dates with the ERP and CIS projects. A separate recommendation for the LaMPS project will be presented to the Board in the future.

#### FISCAL IMPACTS:

The proposed business software project costs are included in the Capital Budget and will be funded as shown in the table below. Sufficient budget is available to fund the recommendations presented herein.

In addition to the proposed agreements, additional costs will be incurred on an as-needed basis for internal staff working on a project and for temporary support services. Sufficient budget is available for these as-needed costs in their respective project numbers.

After implementation, the on-going cost for the software subscription fees and support will be requested through the bi-annual budget process to be budgeted in the Information Technology Operating Budget, Department 250.

The 10-year total cost of ownership (TCO) of the proposed business software systems will result in an estimated savings of \$17.1 million (present value of the savings is \$12.5 million) compared to the projected 10-year TCO of continuing with the current Oracle EBS and CC&B systems. This savings will be reflected in the IRWD Operating Budget over this period.

#### ENVIRONMENTAL COMPLIANCE:

This item is not a project as defined in the California Environmental Quality Act Code of Regulations, Title 14, Chapter 3, Section 15378.

#### COMMITTEE STATUS:

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# 1. Introduction

This Statement of Work (SOW) is entered into per the Agreement Date by and between **SpryPoint** Services Inc. (hereinafter "**SpryPoint**"), with principal offices in Charlottetown, PE, and Irvine Ranch Water District ("Client") with offices at 3512 Michelson Drive, Irvine, California 92612, USA.

## Background Statements:

- **SpryPoint** will provide a range of software solutions and services to achieve a business solution that meets the identified Customer Information System (CIS) Solution ("Solution") requirements of the **Client**. **Client** is open to new ways to achieve the same outcome but are not looking to go backward in functionality or efficiency.
- The Solution will encompass several **SpryPoint** products with Metabase included as a reporting and dashboard solution. The products include:
  - SpryCIS – Customer Information System
  - SpryEngage – Customer Portal
  - SpryMobile MFS – Mobile Field Service
  - SpryBackflow – Cross Connection
- The **Client** wishes to work together with **SpryPoint** for the implementation of the Solution and **SpryPoint** agrees to provide such services and/or software as agreed to in the terms provided herein.
- This Statement of Work provides the general detailed terms and provisions that govern the delivery of all services and/or deliverables to the **Client** by **SpryPoint**.
- Since the Client is implementing a Workday Implementation at the same time as the SpryPoint Implementation, SpryPoint will work with Strada to participate in the overarching Strada Program as defined in this document.

This document is one of several that constitute the Agreement. These documents help define the project's scope and will guide its execution.



## 2. Scope of Work

### 2.1. Overall Project Approach

**SpryPoint** shall use its implementation methodology, to deliver the **SpryPoint** Services, while reporting and delivering to the **Client** the requested deliverables and service levels in this SOW. **SpryPoint** will use its hybrid approach that brings together the best of the traditional Waterfall Methodology and the iterative elements of the Agile Methodology. This hybrid approach encompasses Project Management tasks, and six (6) major phases, as follows:

- Initiation
- Analysis
- Assembly
- Validation
- Deployment
- Operation

The Project scope has been broken out into Phase 1 and Phase 2 deliverables. Phase 1 will include Integrations and Enhancements as defined in section 3, in addition all SpryPoint products will go live as part of Phase 1, however a final decision on which features and functionality will be completed as defined in section 2.3.4.

Phase 2 will include Integrations and Enhancements as defined in section 3, and any features and functionality identified for Phase 2 during the finalized schedule creation (as defined in section 2.3.4)

Any changes to the scope of each phase after Schedule Finalization (section 2.3.4) will result in the change order process being engaged to outline any project impacts.

### 2.2. Scope Details

#### 2.2.1. Project Initiation

Assuming a mid-October 2025 contract execution, SpryPoint will begin Project Initiation activities early-November. **SpryPoint** will initiate the project, and start preparation and mobilization of its resources in accordance with the requirements defined in this SOW.

## 2.3. Analysis

### 2.3.1. Analysis - Workshops

Workshops are collaborative session designed to bring together the Client's Core Team members and any other key stakeholders and/or decision makers from across an organization to analyze and evaluate the alignment between SpryPoint Solution and the desired future state. The workshops are structured, interactive meetings that focus on identifying areas where gaps exist between the out of the box SpryPoint workflows and the Clients desired future state processes.

Prior to the workshops **SpryPoint** will:

- Develop Workshop schedule/agenda with input from the **Client**
- Familiarize themselves with the **Client's** legacy system using available material provided by the **Client**, personal interviews, and other such information as needed.

### 2.3.2. Analysis – Solution Design Report

Upon completion of the Analysis Workshops **SpryPoint** will deliver to the **Client** a Solution Design Report. This report will outline the findings of the workshops, how the solution will meet the future state business process and identify any gaps that may have been identified. The **Client** will be required to review and provide feedback on the report. **SpryPoint** will make updates to the report based on the **Client** feedback. Once all updates are completed the **Client** will be required to sign off on the Solution Design Report. It should be noted that as decisions in the project evolve this document will be updated

### 2.3.3. Analysis – Traceability Matrix

It is common as we work through the Analysis Phase and the Client's understanding of the potential business process improvements that can be accomplished with the use of the SpryPoint Solution of products that the requirements outlined in RFP will be adjusted or removed. Upon completion and approval of the Analysis Report a Traceability Matrix will be created upon the agreed client requirements. This document will become the document of truth to measure functionality against during testing, go live and project close out.

### 2.3.4. Analysis - Finalized Project Schedule

Upon completion of the Solution Design Report and the Traceability Matrix; SpryPoint will work with the Client to complete an additional prioritization of features and functionality; reports/dashboards; integrations; enhancements, reports that will be completed in phase 1 and phase 2. Phasing of the items will help derisk the initial project phase timeline of 16 months. This information will be used to update the initial project schedule and create the baselined project schedule.

### 2.3.5. Analysis – Planning Documents

During the Analysis Phase the following additional documents will be created.

- **Test Plan** – A document that outlines the strategy for testing. As part of the test plan testing success parameters will be mutually agreed to with the **Client** for each major testing activity (Functional, Integration, User Acceptance). For example: it will include criteria like X % of residential accounts need to be checked or 100% of industrial account with no unexplainable discrepancies.
- **Training Plan** – a document that outlines the requirements for training. This includes a training matrix that can be used to plan End User training for the various user roles and courses, an approach, curriculum, type of training delivery, recommended seats, high-level schedule for training, and the need for **Client** training facilities and materials. The **Client** will be responsible for matching training needs to individual End Users. In addition, as part of the training plan it will define which users will be trained in which training group.

## 2.4. System Configuration

SpryPoint will conduct configuration activities using an iterative approach, allowing for progressive refinement of the solution based on feedback, and validation of future state business processes. This incremental process supports collaboration, reduces rework, and ensures alignment with the agreed future state business processes throughout. In addition, this iterative approach promotes early visibility into the solution, enabling timely adjustments and improving the likelihood of a successful and efficient deployment.

### 2.4.1. Additional Configurable Items

#### 2.4.1.1. CIS – Bill Statement

SpryPoint uses an iterative approach to complete the creation of the Client's bill statement pdf. It starts gathering initial requirements to determine the initial look and feel of the statement This will be provided to the Client to provide some initial testing and feedback. Up to 2 more additional iterations will be completed to meet the Client's requirements.

#### 2.4.1.2. CIS – Collection Letters

**SpryPoint** uses an iterative approach to complete the Collection Letter configuration. It starts gathering initial requirements to determine the initial look and feel of the Collection Letter(s). This will be provided to the **Client** to provide some initial testing and feedback. Up to 2 more additional iterations will be completed to meet the **Client's** requirements.

Note a set of Collection Letters includes the letters to support the steps of the Collection Process. For example, if the collection process may have 3 steps that requires documents

to be created (1- Late Notice; 2- Delinquent Notice; 3 – Disconnect/Cut-off Notice) all three letters would be included in the scope.

### 2.4.1.3. CIS – Miscellaneous Letters & Other Items

Other items required to be configured are:

- **Service Orders - SpryPoint** will gather requirements for developing **Client's** Service Order processes including service types.
- **Miscellaneous Letters & Templates** – Report deliverables (letters) will be created by **SpryPoint** with respect to the **Client** logo, contact information, return address and text. The **Client** will supply the logo, contact information, return address, and text to **SpryPoint** for development of the letters. Some examples include, but is not limited to:
  - Welcome Letter
  - Returned Check Fee Letter
  - Payment Arrangement Agreement Letter
  - Write-off Letter (one for non-payment, second before collections)
  - Customer Credit Refund Letter

**SpryPoint** has included in scope budget to build up to 100 letter templates and will train the Client in building letter templates. If additional letters are required, the change order process may be engaged or the Client will be assisted to build the additional letter, provided no development effort is required to create the letter.

### 2.4.2. Data Conversion – CIS

Included in the scope of the project SpryPoint will complete a maximum number of data conversion as outlined below.

**SpryPoint** will convert 3 full calendar years plus the number of months to go live of history into SpryCIS. **SpryPoint** will archive any **Client** Data older than 3 calendar years.

The following table provides specific details of the objects to be converted, where the agreed time is 3 full calendar years, plus the number of months to go live of history.

### 2.4.3. SpryCIS Objects to Convert

<b>Meter Readings</b>	For all converted meters per the agreed time.

<b>Bill History</b>	Includes transactional data for any active accounts, inactive accounts with historical transactions within the agreed time.

<b>Deposits</b>	If applicable, active deposit values will be converted.
<b>Equipment</b>	All active equipment.
<b>Remotes</b>	All active meters within the agreed time range, regardless of account status (if applicable).
<b>Notes &amp; Comments</b>	Notes & Comments for applicable converted records.
<b>Historical Bill Pdfs</b>	If the Client can provide historical bill pdfs in the required format, SpryPoint will import up to 12 months of historical bill pdfs.

#### 2.4.4. Data Conversion – Additional Notes

The following additional details should be noted:

- Converted transactional data will be present for informational purposes and will not be actionable. i.e. users will not be able to complete processes such as cancel rebill, adjustments, etc. on these records. Instead, if changes are required it will need to occur via manual adjustments.
- In the event there is account balances on accounts that are older than 3 years, SpryPoint will convert these accounts
- In the event enhancements require data to be converted to support functionality this conversion related to the enhancement will be converted as part of the project scope.
- Additional history can be brought into the SpryCIS Archive Data Store. The Archive Data Store allows for inquiry and retrieval of historical, non-editable transactional data within the SpryCIS application.

#### 2.4.5. Data Conversion– Out of Scope

The following items will not be converted:

- Rate history table/historical rates
- Any record types not listed in the SpryCIS objects to Convert table
- Merging CIS data from multiple legacy systems

## 2.4.6. Data Extraction

The Client will be responsible to complete all data extraction activities. SpryPoint will work with the Client to define the extraction format and requirements

## 2.4.7. Data Mapping

The purpose of the Data Mapping activity is to map fields in the Client's legacy CIS system to the SpryPoint CIS system, as well as the review the required format and naming conventions for the data extraction files. SpryPoint will meet with the Client's conversions resource(s) to discuss this process and share the Required Fields for Conversion Template. The Client will be responsible to complete this template, however, SpryPoint will be available to answer questions.

SpryPoint will provide data mapping assistance and guidance with regard to custom tables from Oracle CCB that are used by the IRWD Water Use Efficiency Department. In addition, SpryPoint will support Strada with exposing the required data in Workday Prism Analytics, as required.

## 2.4.8. Data Conversion – Data Cleansing

During the data migration process there will be requirements to clean up data, this will be referred to as data cleansing. There will be several methods used to complete this cleansing activity. The main ones are:

- Correct during the extraction – In some instances it is easiest to correct the data using scripting on the export from legacy system.
- Correct during the import process – In some instances it is easiest to correct the data using scripting on the import into the **SpryPoint** product(s).
- Manual correction in legacy system- In some instances, the **Client** will be asked to correct the data in the legacy system.
- Correction in **SpryPoint** Product(s) – In some instances. The **Client** and/or **SpryPoint** Implementation Specialist will be asked to correct the data in the **SpryPoint** Product(s). This may be completed manually or by scripting.

**SpryPoint** will work with the **Client** to decide the best approach on how data cleansing will be conducted and which of the above methods will be used or if an alternative method is required. **SpryPoint** and the **Client** will work together to come to a mutually agreed decision that is in the best interest of the Project.

### 2.4.9. Data Conversion – SpryBackflow

SpryBackflow uses an import approach for Data Migration. The **Client** will be required to extract the data in the requested formats. Included in the scope of the project **SpryPoint** will complete a maximum number of data conversion as outlined below.

### 2.4.11. Training – SpryCIS, SpryEngage & SpryMobile

Training will be delivered using an iterative approach to build knowledge progressively and reinforce key concepts over multiple cycles. Each iteration will prepare the Client for the next step in the implementation. This method allows participants to gain hands-on experience, apply learning in context, and deepen their understanding of the systems and future state business processes throughout the project lifecycle. The table below outlines the planned training iterations.

NOTE: As part of the roles-based training will include training for technical and system management training this includes training for things such as:

- System configurations (i.e creations of rates; service order creation, etc)
- Report Development Training via Metabase
- Security Role Management
- Existing integration configuration
- API Documentation Training

## 2.4.12. Training Materials & Job Aides

To support the Client's learning, SpryPoint will deliver end-to-end system training, including copies of training presentations and student workbooks. The training will feature activities and assessments to reinforce key concepts and will use Client data for hands-on exercises. Training materials will focus on system functionality relevant to the Client's future business processes but will not detail the Client's specific business processes.

As part of the implementation, SpryPoint will also provide Job Aids to assist end users with day-to-day system tasks. These Job Aids may include checklists, one-pagers, diagrams, flowcharts, and other resources designed to break down and support work activities. These training materials will be provided in a format that the Client can modify.

## 2.4.13. Training – SpryBackflow

For SpryBackflow SpryPoint will complete the following training

Note: out of scope for this project is training of the Client's Customers. The Client will be responsible for providing any training to their customer users.

## 2.5. Testing

Testing is a critical component of this implementation, serving to validate that all solution components function as required to support the client's future state business processes and user roles. Rigorous testing helps identify and remediate defects early, reducing the risk of costly issues after deployment. Through a structured and comprehensive iterative testing approach, will help enabling a smooth transition at go live.

**SpryPoint** will provide out of the box test scripts based on the standard desired future state business processes, via Test Rail. The **Client** will be given access to Test Rail and will be responsible to work with **SpryPoint** to modifying test scripts (in Test Rail) to meet their custom needs and identify edge cases.

The table below outlines the planned testing rounds. Additional details for each testing category are provided in subsequent sections. Test scripts that do not pass during a round will be retested until successful. Depending on the reason for the additional testing, a change order may be required.

### 2.5.1. Functional Testing

The main purpose of the Functional Testing step is to establish that decisions made during the configuration phase of the project will be in line with **Client's** business requirements. Functional Testing utilizes scenarios based on industry best practices.

### 2.5.2. Integration Testing

Integration testing focuses on ensuring the end-to-end business processes are functioning as required to support the future state business requirements. Testing will focus on

- Core integrated testing which tests major batch processes;
- Financial scenarios which focus on validating financial transactions;
- Integrated testing scenarios inclusive of primary and secondary scenarios;
- Unit (Singular) testing of interfaces and enhancement(s);

### 2.5.3. Bill Validation Testing

The purpose of the billing comparison process is to replicate a full billing cycle for all accounts in both the legacy system and SpryCIS and compare the results on each account. The end goal is to identify any billing anomalies to correct issues with setup or conversion, and to document acceptable differences.

The billing comparison is an iterative process throughout the implementation to ensure bills are calculated correctly. The scope of the project includes 4 iterations of billing validation. The first iteration will likely identify configuration or data issues that need to be corrected. After those issues are corrected the billing comparison will be run again up to 3 more times to ensure billing accuracy. Billing comparison will be deemed acceptable when there is a 97% or higher billing match with no unknown reasons for differences. After each round of bill comparisons, a document is created that is shared with the Client to show the results. While SpryPoint is responsible to complete this testing, the Client will be required to help review and resolve issues. Results of each Bill Validation Testing Iteration will need to be signed off by the Client.

To complete Bill Validation Testing the Client must have the ability to provide an extract of the billing data from their legacy system in the form of a comma-separated file or spreadsheet from their legacy system at any given time. This data will need to include, at a minimum:

- Legacy Account Number
- Service Period Dates, start and end date
- Consumption by service
- Billing Cycle

- Bill Amount
- Budget Amount (if applicable)
- Bill amount by Service (if possible)
- Breakdown by flat charge vs. consumption, consumption charges by tiers (if possible)

### 2.5.4. Performance Testing

Performance Testing is a systematic and comprehensive process aimed at assessing application efficiency, responsiveness, and stability under a designated production-level workload. The primary objective is to ensure that SpryPoint's application services and processing environments are tuned and configured to manage and process realistic data volumes with acceptable performance. Specific areas that are tested during this phase include:

- Account Inquiry and Maintenance Pages: Ensuring responsiveness of user interfaces and transactional processes related to account information and adjustments.
- Cash Receipt Entry: Ensuring responsiveness of user interfaces and transactional processes related to cash receipts.
- Batch Processes: Ensuring responsiveness of user interfaces and transactional processes related to critical batch operations such as billing cycles and the dispatch of collection notices.
- API Performance: Ensuring responsiveness of transactional processes related to API calls to guarantee smooth integrations and data exchanges with other systems or third-party applications.
- Load Testing: Ensuring performance of the system under varying load conditions, when multiple users are simulated to be login at the same under varying load conditions (month-end, batch processing, bill generation).

To closely replicate the conditions faced in a live production environment, these tests are conducted on production-level infrastructure during standard business hours, and they prioritize specific billing cycles and processes deemed as most representative of typical operational demands.

### 2.5.5. User Acceptance Testing

User Acceptance is designed to act as a "Day in the Life" testing to ensure all Client Roles can complete their responsibilities as defined by the agreed future state business processes. During User Acceptance Testing the **Client** will be accountable to complete any required testing, however, the **SpryPoint** team will be available to answer questions and help resolve any questions, issues, or concerns.

The **Client's** identified testers will complete the test cases as defined in the approved test script list and agree to complete testing to meet the parameters defined in the test plan. If tests fail, **SpryPoint** resources will be available to help and answer questions

and/or work with the customer to fix the issues. Once **SpryPoint** has deemed the issue fixed, the **Client** will be required to retest.

### 2.5.6. Client Driven Solution Walkthrough

To validate and ensure Client Go Live Readiness, the Client will be asked to assemble a group of users to demonstrate, to SpryPoint, their use and knowledge of the end-to-end solution and future state business processes

### 2.5.7. User Roles & Permissions

During the implementation **SpryPoint** will provide details on the out of the box Roles & Permission provided in the product(s). Based on this information, the **Client** will be responsible to assign security roles to users of the System. The **Client** can either use the out of the box security roles or they can create their own. When new functionality is released, **SpryPoint** is responsible to update the out of the box security roles only. If the **Client** has created their own custom security roles, they will be responsible to update any security related to new features to the affected roles. The **SpryPoint** Project Manager will work with the **Client** to ensure release notes are shared when required or applicable.

### 2.5.8. Reports & Dashboards

Once transactional data has started being converted, SpryPoint will complete a reports & dashboard analysis. The purpose of this analysis is to compare the out of the box report library to the reporting and dashboard needs that support the Client's future state business processes and identify any gaps. In addition, this report will define delivery groups for the reports and dashboards to align with the needs of the project. These delivery groups will determine when in the project timeline they will be delivered.

Upon completion of the of the analysis, a Report & Dashboard Plan will be provided to the **Client**. This document summarizes the findings of the analysis and provides an estimate of effort required to build any reports identified as a gap or to modify existing reports and dashboards. This report work effort will be compared against the contracted work effort of 480 hours and **SpryPoint** will work with the **Client** to determine which reports will be built using the custom report and dashboard budget as contracted. Additional reports and work hours over the budgeted amount and agreed upon will be submitted through the change control process.

As part of the Project implementation SpryPoint will show the Client how to generate reports

## 2.5.9. Mock Go Live

The Mock Go-Live will serve as a dress rehearsal for the production Go-Live weekend and Monday morning activities. The objectives and expectations for the Mock Go-Live include:

- **Role Readiness:** Confirm that all project team members and stakeholders understand their roles and responsibilities for the production Go-Live.
- **Schedule Validation:** Validate the cutover schedule and timings to ensure the planned activities can be executed successfully.
- **Manual Entry Verification:** Complete and verify any required manual entries following data conversion.
- **Reporting Validation:** Ensure that all reports are accurate and functioning as expected after data conversion.
- **User Testing:** Engage selected users to perform testing to confirm readiness for Monday morning business operations.
- **Timing Considerations:** Although the production Go-Live will take place over a weekend, the Mock Go-Live is not required to occur during a weekend.
- **Resource Commitment:** Both SpryPoint and the Client are expected to dedicate resources to the Mock Go-Live in the same manner as would be required during the actual Go-Live weekend.

Included in scope are two (2) Mock Go Lives.

## 2.6. Go Live

### 2.6.1. Go Live Cutover Plan

**SpryPoint** will develop a Go-Live Cutover Plan which outlines all issues and activities required to cutover and to the achievement of operational stability. The plan is based on experiences gathered from other **SpryPoint** production cutovers, an on-going evaluation of best practices in the industry, and specific issues that arose during the configuration and testing of the software for the **Client**.

### 2.6.2. Go/No Go Decision

This is a critical decision point in the project, where the state of the project is reviewed against the Deploy Prerequisites to determine the readiness for Go-Live. This step should occur approximately 30 days before Go-Live. If the **Client** has specific needs that will require more than 30 days' notice, this decision point should occur further out than 30 days prior.

**The Go/No Go Decision process occurs in two steps.**

#### **Step 1 – SpryPoint Internal Go/No Go Decision**

This is an internal meeting with the **SpryPoint** Project Team, **SpryPoint** Executive Sponsor and other **SpryPoint** Stakeholders to discuss the project and evaluate Go-Live

readiness. If this meeting results in a "Go" Decision, a **Client** Go/No Go meeting is scheduled. In the event a "No" results from this meeting a meeting will be scheduled with the **Client's** Executive Sponsor and Key Stakeholder to discuss the concerns and establish an action plan.

## Step 2 – SpryPoint/Client Go/No Go Decision

When the **SpryPoint** Internal meeting results in a "Go" Decision, the project status, risk, cutover plan is discussed with the **Client's** Project Team, Executive Sponsor and any Key Stakeholders. If the **Client** makes a "Go" decision, plans for the cutover are finalized. If the **Client** makes a "No-Go" decision, SpryPoint and the **Client** will work together to determine if the change is in or out of scope, and the appropriate actions will be taken to resolve the issues/concerns.

### 2.6.3. Go-Live

Go-live represents the scheduled system downtime during which the production cutover takes place. This work is typically performed outside of business hours, such as over a weekend, to minimize disruption. During this period, the final data conversion will be completed, all tasks outlined in the cutover plan will be executed, and validation activities will be performed to confirm readiness. Formal sign-off will occur to ensure all components are in place for business operations to resume as scheduled.

### 2.6.4. Post Go Live Support

This is the initial period after Go-Live where the **Client's** focus is on system stabilization. The post Go-Live/stabilization period will last 90 calendar days with the goal to complete 3 full billing cycles (assuming monthly billing cycle).

During this period, the **Client** is using the **SpryPoint** product(s) to complete their day-to-day responsibilities and run their business. The **SpryPoint** implementation team is available to the **Client** to answer questions, provide refresher training, manage, and resolve all application issues (configuration, training, and defects, etc.), resolve all post-production issues as well as any Go-Live deferred functionality, provide support of the business process review activities and how to best achieve the desired improvements.

At the end of the post Go-Live stabilization period a punch list is created. This list contains:

- Any issues and their severity still open at the end to the stabilization period
- Any SOW items that were not delivered prior to Go-Live
- Any additional reports required and agreed to as part of scope of services

### 2.6.5. Transition to Client Success

After the post Go-Live period has been completed and all severity 1 and 2 issues have been resolved, we will transition the **Client** to the Client Success team. The transition involves a **SpryPoint** internal knowledge transfer between the SpryPoint Implementation



Team and Client Success Teams and an introductory meeting with the **Client**, **SpryPoint** Project Manager, and the **SpryPoint** Client Success Team Representatives. Once the transition to the Client Success team has occurred, the **SpryPoint** implementation team will continue to be accountable for the resolution of all items on the project RAID log and the Client Success Team will be accountable for any new issues.

### 2.6.6. Project Close Out

The project close out is the point when the Project parties both agree that all Project deliverables have been completed per the Statement of Work and the Implementation portion of the contract is completed, the system is accepted by the **Client** and the Project is deemed closed.

This occurs when the following are met:

1. All of the service deliverables identified within this SOW have been completed, delivered and accepted or deemed accepted per specific contractual provisions, including approved Change Orders impacting the SOW;
2. All punch-list items severity 1, 2 and a plan for delivery of severity 3 are delivered to the **Client**. The **Client** agrees to test all delivered severity 1 and severity 2 items within 15 business days of receipt and provide written details of any concerns. If no written details or concerns are provided by the Client within the 15-business day period, the items will be considered approved. **Client** must have received training as defined in the SOW on the **SpryPoint** Products and know how to use the system.
3. 1. and 2. above have been met, and the project is 6 months past cutover, and no written documentation of issues related to the scope included in this SOW has been provided to **SpryPoint**; **SpryPoint** will send an email to the **Client** stating that due to no documentation approval has been assumed.

Once a project is deemed complete any outstanding implementation fees are due.

### 2.6.7. Organizational Change Management

The objective of organizational change management (OCM) is for the **SpryPoint** team to work with the Client to identify areas where a more formal approach to change. Can be applied to help the Client support their users through the implementation.

This starts with SpryPoint work to better understand the current state of the **Client**, assess the organizational culture and the capacity to change. As a result of this **SpryPoint** will:

- Complete OCM Discovery
- Deliver OCM presentation
- Develop OCM strategy & schedule



The following Organizational Change Management activities will be completed to support the Client and their users with the change that occurs during the implementation:

## **Risk Assessment**

Measures the characteristics of the change and the attributes of the impacted organization to better understand the unique risks of the change.

Changes that are more dramatic and farther reaching in the organization have a higher risk. Likewise, organizations and groups with histories and cultures that resist change face higher risk. Understanding these characteristics, attributes, and risks helps to scale the change management plans accordingly.

## **Sponsor Assessment**

The Sponsor Assessment measures the people management chain of all the impacted groups in terms of their position relative to the change and their change management competency. The resulting sponsor coalition describes the leaders and managers who need to be on board and actively engaged in leading the change. The primary sponsor is the person who authorizes and champions the change. This person must be actively and visibly engaged in the change throughout the project. Each member of the sponsor coalition has the responsibility to build support and communicate the change with their respective audiences.

## **P-P-P-P Exercise**

This exercise assists the organization in connecting change management to business results by documenting the Project, Purpose, Particulars, and People. If the people impacted by the project do not support and engage in the change, then the particulars of that change are not realized. If these particulars are not achieved, then the purpose will not be achieved, and the business results are not met.

## **Sponsor Interview**

The Sponsor Interview contains a list of questions that stakeholders may have about the project, and which can provide basic information about the project to stakeholders to create awareness and desire, the first two elements of the ADKAR® Model of individual change. Prosci® recommends that Primary Sponsors provide answers to these questions, which can then be repurposed throughout the project to reinforce key messaging concepts. These questions can also provide value for other tasks such as identifying stakeholders and defining project risk. The Client reserves the right to review and approve these questions and define the appropriate stakeholders.

## **Group Impact Assessment**

The Group Impact Assessment measure the degree of anticipated changes to each of the groups impacted it terms of the follow 10 aspects of change.

- **Processes:** The actions or steps taken to achieve a defined end or outcome.
- **Systems:** A combination of people and automated applications organized to meet a set of objectives.
- **Tools:** An item or implement used for a specific purpose; can be a physical object such as a mechanical tool or a technical object such as a web authoring tool or software program.
- **Job Roles:** A physical geographical place that provides facilities for a stated purpose.
- **Critical Behaviors:** Vital or essential response of an individual or group to an action, environment, person, or stimulus.
- **Mindset/Attitudes/Beliefs:** A mental inclination, disposition or frame of mind reflected in behaviors.
- **Reporting Structure:** The authority relationships in a company or organization; who reports to whom.
- **Performance Reviews:** The process and indicators of how performance is measured and assessed relative to objectives.
- **Compensation:** The amount of the monetary and non-monetary pay provided in return for work performed.
- **Location:** A physical geographical place that provides facilities for a stated purpose.

Not all groups will be impacted the same. Understanding the impacts relative to each impacted groups helps to scale the change management plans accordingly.

The term of this Statement of Work will commence on the Service Date and shall end on 06/18/2027 unless sooner terminated in accordance with the Agreement or this SOW. Client may terminate this SOW for convenience upon notice to Strada at least 30 days prior to the service effective thereof.

## II. PROJECT OVERVIEW / BACKGROUND

This Statement of Work describes the Services related to the configuration, testing and deployment of the Workday solution as described herein (the "Workday Solution" or "Workday") and the Client Tenant for Client. Strada is not responsible for any services, tasks or functions not identified as a Strada responsibility herein; Client or its third-party providers and vendors shall retain responsibility for all services, tasks or functions identified as a Client responsibility herein. Strada may utilize deployment automation tools in the performance of the Services.

Strada’s deployment methodology assumes the use of Strada specific tools, templates, and best practices. The schedule and fees are dependent upon the use of Strada’s tools and methodology.

### IV. TIMELINE

This SOW is based on a 90-week project timeline. The timeline assumes a Plan Phase start date of December 22, 2025 (the “Start Date”) with a move to production on March 12, 2027 (the “Move to Production Date”). Readiness activities begin 6 weeks prior to the Start Date. Post Deployment support begins on the Move to Production Date and lasts for 8 weeks immediately following, along with 12 weeks of overlap AMS Support.

#### Timeline

1. The timing and duration of this project timeline are a critical component of the estimated professional services for this scope of work. If the Start Date is delayed, Client acknowledges that Strada’s ability to meet the target Move to Production Date is at risk.
2. Client acknowledges responsibility for identifying appropriate project resources to complete the Workday recommended training path(s) in alignment with the timing and duration of the project. Failure to complete or deferment of training will result in a risk to the project milestones, and critical artifacts.
3. Delays introduced by Client resulting in missed deadline dates for project milestones or critical artifacts will impact Strada's ability to meet the target Move to Production Date. Project milestones include but are not limited to Foundation Alignment, Customer Confirmation, and Vendor Workshops.
4. The parties agree to review any replanning or modifications in the scoped effort of Strada resources as a result of timeline or scope impact through the Change Control Process. Strada will work closely with Client to identify the impacts of any delays and will discuss best available options before collaboratively determining next steps.

### V. PROJECT ASSUMPTIONS



## **Employee Count and Geography**

Client has an employee population of 700. The population may vary slightly over the course of the deployment; however, this population is the basis for scoping, planning, and pricing.

1. Populations stated above reflect the estimated end-user population at the Move to Production Date. This includes but is not limited to full-time employees, part-time employees, contingent workers, agency contractors, independent contractors, temporary employees, seasonal employees, interns, and volunteers.

## **Overall Responsibilities**

1. Client agrees to utilize Workday's delivered business processes ("BPs") across the enterprise. Business processes noted as modifiable in the assumptions section of this document may be altered to remove steps, reorder steps, or change role assignment where the role exists in the delivered Workday pre-configuration
2. Strada will provide foundation knowledge transfer to core Client project team members responsible for supporting the system in production. This knowledge transfer will be accomplished through the Client team's active participation in project milestones, artifacts, and other related activities.
3. Client will provide appropriate subject matter experts with decision-making authority for the duration of the project. These resources are required to participate in project milestones, artifact completion and other project activities including but not limited to requirement gathering sessions, Foundation Alignment, Customer Confirmation, Vendor Workshops, testing cycles and cutover.
4. Strada will conduct a single set of sessions for all project related activities, meetings, or workshops. Client will own alignment and acceptance from internal stakeholders and global business process owners across all areas.
5. Strada shall have the sole right to utilize its implementation methodologies and other best practices and to supervise and manage its Representatives performing the Services.

## **Project Administration**

1. The Strada Project Manager will be responsible for management of Strada owned tasks and responsibilities. The Client Project Manager will be responsible for management of Client owned tasks and responsibilities.
2. The Strada Project Manager will be responsible for scheduling and setting the agenda for the project status meeting held weekly, not to exceed 60-minutes.
3. The Strada Project Manager will act as the representative of the Strada team for the project status meeting. Additional Strada personnel will attend the status meeting based on the health of the project, timeline, workstream health or cross-functional escalations. The Strada Project Manager will ensure the status report is updated prior to the status meeting.
4. At the close of Readiness, Strada and Client Resources will work jointly to ensure each workstream has a weekly scheduled session not to exceed one hour. The sessions will include requirements review, testing support and knowledge transfer based on project timeline progress.
5. Strada and Client resources will be responsible for maintaining the project RAID log, located on the Strada project Smartsheet workspace. Client project manager will be responsible for following up on Client-owned issues as indicated on the RAID log.
6. Client shall permit and arrange for access to Client records requested by Strada that are reasonably necessary to perform the Services under this SOW. Onsite travel or participation will be governed by the Change Order process.

7. Client will utilize Strada's system tools, templates, methodologies, and practices for deployment, including but not limited to: project work repositories, data storage, testing management, and an integrations database. A baseline inventory of tools and their purpose is included as Exhibit A. Any deviation from Strada's standard tool set that is required by Client will be subject to a change order to address Strada's additional effort and costs associated with using the non-standard tool(s). Tools usage includes but is not limited to the tools identified in Exhibit A.
8. The Strada team will use Strada laptops, and all secured data will leverage Project security data transfer protocols such as Strada MFT / Move IT. Using alternative or client laptops will require a change order and could significantly impact the project timeline.
9. Client is responsible for all aspects Steering Committee meeting including but not limited to scheduling, agenda creation, presentation, and meeting execution. Only the aligned Strada PMO resource (e.g., Project Manager, or Program Executive) will attend. If additional attendees are required or Strada is asked to prepare Steering Committee content, an additional Change Order will be agreed upon between the Client and Strada.
10. If at any time during the project, Client or Strada determines that the deployment approach is no longer appropriate, an immediate notification should occur to the Project Steering Committee so the effort can be re-planned, re-scoped and re-priced.
11. Any modules and functionality not listed in Scope Assumptions are out of scope. Additionally, any new functionality delivered by Workday in an update after the Architect & Configure phase of the project has been completed, as indicated by creation of the configuration tenant, is out of scope unless set out in this Statement of Work.
12. Relative to integration approach, Strada will build, and unit test each owned integration during the Architect & Configure stage. For outbound, unit testing is the process of verifying that the output file from the integration matches the requirements and the identified unit test cases are completed successfully. When possible, in the Architect & Configure stage, Strada will send a file for confirmation to the vendor to ensure that it passes basic formatting, transmission and structural needs. If not possible in the Architect & Configure stage, this will be done as part of End-to-End testing. For inbound, unit testing is a verification of the process to import a file to Workday. Securing a sample file from the integration vendor to support this test is the ideal approach. If this is not possible the Strada resource will mockup a test file and testing with the vendor will happen as part of End-to-End testing.
  - a. Client will inform and secure necessary contacts for each in scope integration with the vendor prior to Customer Confirmation sessions.
  - b. Client will provide specifications and answer discovery questionnaires for each interface prior to integration workshops conducted during the Architect & Configure stage.
  - c. Client to provide contacts for all integrations in scope for setting up the initial vendor sessions at the onset of the Plan stage.
  - d. Client is responsible for scheduling the initial vendor sessions, coordinating with the Strada integration team.
  - e. Strada will conduct integrations workshops in the Architect & Configure stage for each in scope integration.
  - f. Client will approve documented requirements during within 5 days of receiving draft documents from Strada.
  - g. Strada will generate a design for each integration during the Architect & Configure stage that are Strada-owned or Shared Development.

#### **Strada and Client Obligations**

1. Strada will provide Workday certified resources skilled in all in-scope domains to adequately and successfully fulfill Client needs within this deployment scope.
2. Client will commit the necessary resources and management to perform their obligations outlined in this SOW in a timely manner. Those resources will have appropriate training, subject matter expertise and knowledge of Client needs to perform their project responsibilities.

3. Client resources allocated to the project will receive the necessary Workday training to fulfill their project responsibilities in advance of the Customer Confirmation Sessions. Delays incurred due to resources not taking the relevant training will be the responsibility of the Client.
4. Client will identify their ongoing / administrative support resources at the completion of the Plan stage and validate those resources have received the necessary Workday training prior to the move to Workday production.
5. Both Strada and Client shall use commercially reasonable efforts to maintain the continuity of its project team throughout the term of the SOW. Should Client reasonably determine that a Strada employee be removed from the project, (a) Client will notify Strada and provide specific examples related to the business reason for such removal, (b) Strada will have an opportunity to take appropriate developmental or disciplinary action to prevent a recurrence of the issue based on feedback provided by Client and (c) if employee performance does not improve, Strada will, in good faith, replace the employee with a new team member within a timeframe that prudently enables a timely replacement while allowing Strada to continue to deliver on its commitments set forth in this SOW.
6. Solicitation of Personnel. Each Party agrees that it shall not solicit for employment any employee of the other Party or any of its affiliates that performed or received Services under any SOW with whom such Party had contact in connection with such Services during the term of such SOW and for a period of twelve (12) months after the earlier of: (i) its expiration or termination; or (ii) the employee's completion of his/her work under the SOW. Such restriction shall not apply to a Party's general recruiting activities that are not specifically targeted at employees or an employee of the other Party or any of its affiliates.
7. Key Personnel (Key Personnel includes the Project Manager and Project Leads). Consultant shall assign Key Personnel who are approved by IRWD prior to starting work under this agreement. Consultant will not remove or re-assign any of the individuals listed as Key Personnel in the Order Form or Statement of Work without first obtaining the prior written consent of IRWD in each instance unless: (i) the individual resigns from Consultant; or (ii) the individual is terminated by Consultant; or (iii) the individual is promoted to or otherwise accepts a different role at Consultant in accordance with Consultant's human resource policies; or (iv) is on approved health-related leave; or (v) dies.
8. Qualified Personnel. Consultant shall assign only personnel, including its employees and authorized subcontractors and subconsultants, who are qualified to perform the Services. If the quality of the Services or personnel assigned by Consultant is unacceptable to IRWD, Consultant shall promptly notify Consultant in writing of any deficiency and permit Consultant a reasonable opportunity to cure. If, after the cure period passes and the deficiency has not objectively improved, Consultant will replace such individual(s).

## **VI. FEES AND INVOICING**

Based on the Project Scope, Project Assumptions and Project Timeline identified, Strada estimates professional Fees for this effort are a total fixed fee as indicated in the table below exclusive of travel expenses.

Strada will promptly notify Client at any time during the execution of the Project Scope of this SOW if a requested scope change could result in a change that would follow the Change Order procedure.

The fees set forth in this SOW are valid for signature for up to 90 days from the service date denoted on the SOW. The fees are subject to change upon expiration of the 90-day term if the SOW signature is not achieved.

Strada will bill Client for its Fees using milestone-based invoices triggered by Client's acceptance of the identified project milestone. If the project timeline changes at the request of the Client and there is agreement to modify the milestone payment schedule, this will be handled through the Change Order Procedure. Pricing above is exclusive of a \$400,000 contingency bucket to be utilized for project changes which will be managed through the Change Order Procedure. Pricing is also exclusive of travel which is estimated to be no more than \$335,000.

### **Project Execution and Controlling**

4. Participate in regular project management meetings, including status meetings and other appropriate meetings (E.g. issue-specific meeting, training planning, cutover planning, etc.).
5. Attend key implementation sessions to understand major project activities, decisions and their impacts, such as: discovery, configuration, process review, parallels, mock go-live, go-live, etc.
6. Assist with coordination of project resources and activities, including but not limited to coordinating logistics and schedules if desired.
7. Review and update the project schedule and monitor timeline progress.
8. Track, follow-up, and report on project risks, issues, action items, and decisions.
9. Provide written project status summaries to stakeholders.
10. Update project budget and comment on change orders.
11. Comment on potential concerns with contract compliance and review deliverables as requested.
12. Support client staff with acceptance testing process and assist with test plans.
13. Support interface and data conversion activities.
14. Assist with formatting & coordination of vendor homework (e.g. completing a list of rate types).
15. Support completion and tracking of go-live checklists and punch lists.

## **Project Closing and Post-Implementation Support**

16. Support tracking and resolution of unresolved post-implementation activities.
17. Support development of transition plans from vendors to IRWD.
18. Document ongoing system support procedures.
19. Assist with post-implementation debrief and documentation of lessons learned.
20. Receive feedback from IRWD project managers related to Plante Moran work quality and make any necessary adjustments.

## **Accounting backfill support**

As part of the IRWD's implementation of its future ERP environment, the District intends to assign various key members of its accounting team to the project in order to make the setup, configuration, training and other decisions related to its future accounting operations. As IRWD's accounting team will need to balance and prioritize both operational responsibilities and project work, the District has requested support to backfill certain roles of the day-to-day operations during the period leading up to and during its ERP implementation. IRWD has requested assistance from our PMGAP team (Plante Moran Government Accounting Professionals) with select key activities. IRWD understands that Plante Moran does not offer backfill services related to performing / processing payroll. IRWD may request any type of accounting backfill services through the engagement and we will work to identify how we can best accomplish IRWD's needs. The following services are an overview of those which can be provided upon request and assume a 15 month duration (services will exclude any pre-implementation transition or post go live support).

- Accounts Payable
- Miscellaneous AR (not Utility Billing)
- Bank reconciliation / cash management assistance (read only access)
- Payroll costing journal entry support including recommending JE's for projects
- Grant compliance support, including eligibility review of expenses against grants, associated accounting and drawdown requests
- Preparation assistance for IRWD's annual financial audit
