WATER RESOURCES POLICY AND COMMUNICATIONS COMMITTEE

DISTRICT WEBSITE AND SOCIAL MEDIA METRICS

SUMMARY:

Web and social media analytics are used to track the growth and impact of IRWD.com, RightscapeNow.com, and the District's social media programs. Provided in this report is an overview of analytic data from 2014 through 2017 that includes measurements of the growth and impact of these websites and programs. At the Committee meeting, staff will provide a presentation that showcases the successes of the past four years and describes how the analytics will shape IRWD's future digital outreach programs.

BACKGROUND:

IRWD has a fully-developed, complex, and evolving array of websites and social media platforms which can be tailored to target a variety of multi-objective community outreach goals, such as encouraging water efficiency, building enthusiasm for District events, supporting customer service objectives and building community trust. IRWD continues to broaden its social media presence, conversing with customers on Facebook, Twitter, YouTube, LinkedIn, Pinterest, Instagram and the newest addition, Nextdoor. The *Pipelines* e-newsletter also remains an important tool for communicating with customers.

Social media continues to change and can tend to splinter into niche groups, requiring IRWD to remain current and active on new and diverse platforms. At a time when overall confidence in public agencies tends to be generally low, IRWD's customers continue to place a high level of trust in the District. IRWD's digital communications must focus on maintaining and growing this trust, and continuing to provide transparency to our ratepayers and other stakeholders.

Digital Outreach Program Goals:

The goal of IRWD's digital outreach programs is to move the District and customer perception of IRWD in positive directions in measureable ways, such as increasing customer attendance at District events, increasing customer conversations with District staff, providing more targeted customer service, aggregating an audience that can be reached in an emergency, and educating the public about water efficiency, the value of recycled water and other priorities.

Digital Outreach Program Results:

The Website and Social Media Results Report, provided as Exhibit "A", provides an overview of analytic data associated with the District's digital outreach programs and highlights new initiatives that IRWD has undertaken in 2018. A detailed Digital Communications Technical Report is provided as Exhibit "B". The reports include data spanning four years that showcase successes and reveal opportunities. At the Committee meeting, staff will provide an overview of the reports.

Exhibit "A"

IRWD WEBSITE AND SOCIAL MEDIA RESULTS REPORT

OVERVIEW:

IRWD has four key digital platforms — IRWD.com, RightScapeNow.com, social media, and the Pipelines e-newsletter:

IRWD.com Website:

- Traffic on IRWD's main website, IRWD.com, has been consistent most of the past four years, spiking in 2015 with drought outreach in high gear; page views declined in 2016 due to a decrease in promotion, but began ticking back up in 2017 as promotion was restored;
- IRWD.com is a transactional tool for customers:
 - Payment Options, Customer Care, and Start/Stop Service have consistently been the most-viewed pages on the site over the past four years;
 - Rebates ranked in the top three most-viewed pages in 2014 and 2015;
 - In late 2015, Rebates moved to the District's new RightScapeNow website and has been the most-viewed page there ever since;
- Users find IRWD.com primarily via organic search (Google), and direct visit (typing IRWD.com into their browser), rather than through referral, email or social media; and
- IRWD.com ranks consistently higher than websites from comparable agencies, with one of the highest daily page views per visitor and one of the longest average daily time on site meaning customers are finding relevant information on the IRWD website.

RightScapeNow.com Website:

- RightScapeNow.com traffic has increased every year since its 2015 launch, due to the site's evergreen content and budget-friendly resources such as rebates;
- Residential Rebates and Events pages continue to be of high interest to customers;
- In 2016, the audience found RightscapeNow.com mostly through referral, via the main navigation bar on IRWD.com; but in 2017, direct visit became the most popular route to the microsite as users began going directly there after learning about it from an in-person source such as a water efficiency outreach event or in a print asset such as the Pipelines newsletter; and
- In 2017, the new Watering Guide became the second-most-viewed page on this website, driven by the "See it from your lawn's perspective" ad campaign.

Social Media:

- IRWD's follower count has grown each year on Facebook, Instagram and Twitter:
 - Facebook has the largest following at 3,850 while Twitter has 3,760 followers and Instagram has 602 users;

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- IRWD has roughly the same Facebook following as similar-size local water districts;
- 2017 Facebook impressions (1.8 million) and clicks (10,269) more than doubled versus the prior year, driven by paid Water Use Efficiency outreach campaigns such as "See it from your lawn's perspective" and workshop announcements;
- Top-viewed videos on Facebook were related to the "See it from your lawn's perspective" campaign, particularly those related to the time of year (i.e. Thanksgiving) or a seasonal event (daylight saving time);
- The top Facebook videos were short snippets about 10 seconds each;
- Top YouTube videos addressed turf removal rebates and how to fix leaks; and
- A new water quality video posted in July 2018 was the District's second-most-viewed video on YouTube that month (behind "Fix a Leak: How to Check for Leaks") and so far has garnered 450 views.

E-Newsletter

- Open rates for the monthly Pipelines e-newsletter ranged from 36.8% to 51.6% a month in 2017, significantly better than our vendor's 22.93% industry average.
- Subscriber count stands at 103,468.

Changes Made:

Because social media is an increasingly important way to communicate conversationally with customers regarding coming events, water efficiency, rebates and community news, action has been taken in 2018 to grow social media impact.

- Staff has increased messaging on Nextdoor.com, a private social network for neighborhoods. This new, hyper-local network — promoted as a platform for neighbors to work together to build stronger, safer neighborhoods — allows public agencies such as IRWD to speak directly to targeted groups of customers via web, email and smartphone alerts. Thus Nextdoor has quickly become a powerful tool for IRWD outreach:
 - IRWD's Nextdoor monthly resident count has grown from 57,103 in February to 70,044 in August;
 - Views of IRWD's posts increased from 4,571 in February to 16,456 in August;
 - Nextdoor has quickly become the biggest driver of enrollment in customer events and workshops, producing 31% of RSVPs;
- Staff has implemented the social media analytics and scheduling tool Sprout Social, which efficiently repurposes content to Facebook, Twitter and Instagram, analyzing audience data to automatically post content when our customers are active and most engaged on those platforms;
- In recent years, social media platforms have increasingly become "pay to play," meaning organically created posts are less likely to be seen than paid posts. Therefore, staff has invested in weekly and monthly content boosts paid social media advertising to

extend the reach of posts. For boosts, staff has targeted posts — such as the new water quality video — that are identified by Facebook as having wide reach when they are first posted organically;

- Because video has statistically higher engagement and reach than text or photos, staff has increased video content on social media, posting water efficiency campaign videos along with the water quality informational video; and
- This month staff launched a redesigned homepage for plant database microsite RightScapeResources.com, offering relevant content, rebates, new technology and simple navigation, with a new, aesthetically pleasing look and feel.

Future Objectives:

Social media as an industry continues to change and splinter into niche groups, and it is important for IRWD to stay up to date and active on new and diverse platforms.

But the goal is not to drive social media likes and website pageviews for their own sake. At a time when overall confidence in public agencies is low, IRWD is proud of the high level of trust customers place in us. Our digital communications must focus on maintaining and growing that trust and providing transparency to our ratepayers, as we continue to earn their support. Our media will move IRWD and customer perception of IRWD in a positive direction in measureable ways — recruiting more customers to events and conversations, humanizing our staff as key members of the community, providing customer service, aggregating an audience that we can reach in an emergency, and educating the public about water efficiency, the value of recycled water, and other priorities. With those goals in mind, staff will:

- Give IRWD a unique voice: Highlight the importance of water;
- Build trust: Convey to customers the good reputation of IRWD in the industry;
- Support key initiatives: Continue outreach on the Syphon Reservoir project, recycled water projects, and outdoor water use efficiency efforts;
- Use social media for customer service inquiries:
 - Provide a channel to openly communicate and share information;
 - Stimulate active engagement through comments and discussions;
 - Ensure a high level of personalization;
 - Facilitate the building of social networks and relationships;
- Promote water education: Highlight partnerships and activities in local schools;
- Collaborate: Identify social media leaders within IRWD departments (engineering, construction services, customer service, water efficiency, human resources, general manager's office, NTS operations, recycled water) to obtain relevant content; and
- Create automated reports via Sprout Social and web analytic tools and monitor them to measure success.

DIGITAL COMMUNICATIONS TECHNICAL REPORT

The following graphs show metrics for IRWD websites and social media, 2014-2017.

COMBINED WEBSITE METRICS:

Website Overview

<u>Total Page Views:</u> A page view is an instance of a page being loaded (or reloaded) in a browser. The page views metric refers to the total number of pages all visitors viewed on the website during the specified period. A higher page view number means visitors are finding more relevant information on the website and reading more content.

The bulk of the District's page views occur on IRWD.com. But since the launch of RightScapeNow.com in late 2015, a growing number of pages are being viewed on that site, where customers find a plethora of useful water-efficiency resources, such as rebates, how-to advice, outreach events and a watering guide. Collectively, page views on the websites remained consistent most of the past four years, with a spike during 2015 as drought outreach ramped up. IRWD.com web traffic fell back in 2016 due to fewer postings on social media platforms and no use of a social media scheduling tool — but began ticking back up in 2017 as social media promotion was restored.



IRWD.COM WEBSITE METRICS:

Audience

Users: The number of people who have initiated at least one session during the date range.

<u>Sessions:</u> A session is a group of interactions one user takes on the website within a given time. Google Analytics defaults that time to 30 minutes — meaning whatever a user does on site (e.g. browses, downloads content, RSVPs for a tour) before he or she leaves equals one session.

User and session metrics for IRWD.com follow the same pattern seen in the page-view data. IRWD.com web traffic increased in 2014 and 2015 due to increased promotion of the website on social media and then decreased between 2015 and 2016 due to a decline in social media promotion. IRWD.com traffic bounced back in 2017 due to new strategies of promotion, and web traffic continues to steadily grow.



Top-Viewed Web Pages

The table below shows that customers come to IRWD.com to get things and to get things done. These past four years, Payment Options, Start/Stop Service and Customer Care/Contact have consistently been the most-viewed pages. Rebates pages ranked in the top four in 2014 and 2015. In 2015, however, Rebates moved to RightScapeNow.com, where it has been the most-viewed page. In 2016 and 2017, San Joaquin Marsh and Water Quality Report joined the top pages on IRWD.com, reflecting interest in the natural treatment system/Marsh Campus and water quality issues.

How Customers Find Us

Organic: Visitors referred to a webpage by an unpaid search engine listing (such as Google).

<u>Direct</u>: Visitors who arrived by typing the URL directly into their browser. Direct also can refer to visitors who clicked on links from their bookmarks/favorites, untagged links within emails, or links from documents that don't include tracking variables (such as PDFs or Word documents).

Referral: Visitors referred by links on other websites.

<u>Email:</u> Visitors referred by an email message, from the email newsletter, or from an email from a website like Nextdoor.

Social: Visitors referred by links from a social media platform such as Facebook or Twitter.

This Acquisition Rate graph shows how users found IRWD.com webpages. While social media plays a role in driving customers to IRWD.com, most users continue to find the website via search engines, which are prompted by key words on the website's posts and pages. Recent social media campaigns have focused on water use efficiency and alerting customers to upcoming workshops, which tend to direct traffic to RightScapeNow.com, not IRWD.com. These statistics illustrate the need to maximize IRWD.com's Google footprint by keeping the website refreshed with new information.



IRWD.com Rankings by Alexa Internet

<u>Alexa Global Rank:</u> A rough estimate of a website's worldwide popularity. The rank is calculated using a combination of average daily visitors and page views over the past three months.

<u>Alexa U.S. Rank:</u> A rough estimate of a website's popularity in this nation. The rank is calculated the same as global rank, except only using data from visitors in the U.S. over the past month.

The chart below illustrates how IRWD.com compares to similar agencies in the Alexa Rank, which is used to indicate a website's relative popularity in terms of user engagement. These May 1, 2018, numbers are calculated by Alexa Internet Inc.

On average, the IRWD website ranks consistently higher than websites from these comparable agencies. IRWD has one of the highest daily page views per visitor and one of the longest average time spent on the site, meaning customers are finding relevant information on IRWD.com. IRWD has a medium service area compared to the other water districts in the table but has consistently performed well in comparison to both large and small water districts. The table is ordered by best global rank.

RIGHTSCAPENOW.COM WEBSITE METRICS:

Audience

RightScapeNow.com was created as a companion site to the main website, IRWD.com. Water efficiency event listings and information live on this separate site along with details on rebates, watering schedules, and other efficiency-related resources. The first pages for RightScapeNow.com were published in 2015.



As the Audience Overview graphic below shows, RightScapeNow.com traffic has increased each year since its launch. The microsite attracts new users with its evergreen content and budget-friendly resources such as rebates.

Top-Viewed Web Pages

As the table below shows, residential rebates and events continue to be of interest to IRWD customers. In the dry years 2015 and 2016, the drought webpage was of interest. That page has been decommissioned and did not make the leaderboard in 2017. The Nexus program webpage was of interest in 2017 as were webpages for the One-Stop Shop program.

How Customers Find Us

The graph below shows that RightScapeNow.com has quickly evolved in the way it acquires visitors. Referral was the top method of acquisition in 2015 and 2016 as many customers found the microsite through the main website, IRWD.com. The navigation bar on IRWD.com has a tab that refers to the microsite. In 2017, direct became the top referral method, demonstrating that many users were going directly to the microsite after learning about it from an in-person source, such as a water efficiency outreach event or workshop, or going to the site directly from a print asset such as the monthly *Pipelines* newsletter. As noted above, acquisition via social has edged up, due to social media promotion of water use efficiency (rebates) and upcoming workshops.



SOCIAL MEDIA METRICS:

Social Media Activity Overview

IRWD continues to amp up its social media presence, with official accounts currently on Facebook, Twitter, YouTube, Pinterest and Instagram. Social media is used to communicate with customers conversationally regarding coming events, rebates and community news. Below is a snapshot of activity on a few top platforms. Data for Pinterest is not available. Also, staff does not actively seek to increase the subscriber base for YouTube.

The following bar chart makes clear that the follower count has consistently grown each year on Facebook, Instagram and Twitter. Facebook — the account that has been in use the longest — has the largest following at more than 3,800.



Facebook Activity Overview

Facebook gives people the power to build community and bring the world closer together. For IRWD, this platform is used primarily for publicizing events and videos. The growth in Facebook impressions and clicks can be attributed to focused outreach, some of it supported by paid boosts. Posts about gardening and upcoming workshops tended to do well. Messages that had an image or link also tended to be popular. Successful social media campaigns focused on water efficiency, indoor and outdoor. Facebook is a pay-to-play platform, so ad dollars can increase the reach of content. In 2017, "See it from your lawn's perspective" was one campaign that incorporated paid social media.

Facebook

IRWD's most successful videos on Facebook were related to the "See it from your lawn's perspective" campaign. Videos from that campaign that were timely — related to either a holiday (i.e. Thanksgiving) or a seasonal activity (daylight saving time) — did particularly well. EMAIL NEWSLETTER METRICS:

Email Newsletter Activity Overview

The *Pipelines* e-newsletter is emailed to customers monthly and includes information about IRWD programs and events. Staff continues to test various email subject lines to determine which have a successful open rate. Staff uses the Constant Contact time optimization tool to schedule the email at optimal inbox time.

<u>Open Rate:</u> The total open rate is calculated based on unique opens by a contact. If a contact reads the same email on his or her desktop and phone, the open is counted in both the desktop rate and the mobile rate, but is only counted once in the total open rate. It measures the percentage of emails opened compared to those sent to customers.

<u>Click-Through Rate:</u> The click-through rate compares the number of people who clicked on a link within an email against the total number of emails sent. Multiple clicks are not factored in. This is an important number — it shows how interested, or engaged, our email contacts are.

According to Constant Contact, IRWD's email newsletter vendor, the industry-average open rate for a government agency or service organization is 22.93%. IRWD consistently scores above that industry average. The industry-average click-through rate is 9.555%. IRWD is slightly lower than that industry average. The low click-through rate may be attributed to a relative lack of links in the newsletter body for users to peruse.



LOOKING AHEAD:

Staff has moved forward, with new initiatives already bearing fruit in 2018.

Nextdoor.com is a new private social network for neighbors and the community. Nextdoor's stated mission is to provide a trusted platform where neighbors work together to build stronger, safer neighborhoods. It has quickly become a powerful tool for IRWD outreach, as reflected in this quick growth during a two-month period this year.

WATER RESOURCES POLICY AND COMMUNICATIONS COMMITTEE

2018 LEGISLATIVE AND REGULATORY UPDATE

SUMMARY:

This report provides an update on the 2017-2018 legislative session and IRWD priorities. As legislation and regulations develop, staff will provide updates and recommendations to the Water Resources Policy and Communications Committee and the Board, as appropriate. Staff recommends that the report be received and filed.

BACKGROUND:

During the 2017-2018 legislative session, 3,264 Assembly bills and 1,511 Senate bills were introduced. In the 2018 legislative year, 1,217 were passed and sent to the Governor. Governor Brown had until midnight on September 30, 2018, to sign or veto bills sent to him at the end of session. Overall, in 2018, the 1,016 bills were chaptered and 201 vetoed. Unless a signed bill contained an urgency measure or language delaying its effective date, the bill will take effect on January 1, 2019.

The 2019-2020 legislative session will convene on December 3, 2018. Legislators will have until February to introduce new legislation.

A copy of the 2018 Legislative Matrix is attached as Exhibit "A". Exhibit "B" is the 2018 Legislative Update Report Links to Bill Texts, which contains links to the bills discussed below, unless a separate exhibit is noted.

State Budget Update:

August Revenue Numbers:

On September 10, 2018, State Controller Betty Yee released her monthly report on the State's finances. She announced that the State took in \$9.98 billion during the month of August. This was \$1.14 billion, or 12.9 percent, more than the revenue assumptions contained in the Fiscal Year 2018-2019 Budget. "For the first two months of the 2018-19 fiscal year, revenues are \$846.0 million, or 5.4 percent, higher than projected in the enacted budget. While corporation tax missed the mark for the month of August, personal income tax (PIT) and sales tax – the other two of the "big three" revenue sources – came in higher than assumed in the enacted budget."

2017-2018 State Legislative Update:

Staff has provided an update on the bills before the Governor at the end of the legislative session and of interest to the District. A summary and a status report on each bill are provided below:

AB 1912 (Rodriguez, D-Pomona) — Joint Powers Authority: Public Employees' Retirement Liability:

Existing law permits two or more public agencies to form a joint powers authority (JPA). A JPA is a separate entity from the public agencies that form it; however, under existing law, the debts, liabilities and obligations of the JPA become the debts, liabilities and obligations of its member agencies unless the agreement governing the JPA states otherwise. AB 1912, authored by Assemblymember Freddie Rodriguez (D-Pomona), would change this with regard to pension liabilities. Specifically, AB 1912 prohibits the agreement governing the JPA from limiting the pension and retirement obligations to the JPA.

The Governor signed AB1912 on September 29, 2018. It will take effect on January 1, 2019.

AB 2050 (Caballero, D-Salinas) — Small Water System Authority Action of 2018:

AB 2050, authored by Assemblymember Anna Caballero (D-Salinas), would have created a new category of water agency — a Small System Water Authority — with unique powers to absorb, improve and competently operate currently non-compliant public water systems with either contiguous or non-contiguous boundaries. Small System Water Authorities would consolidate failing small water systems that are voluntarily donated to the Authority to provide technical, managerial and financial capabilities to ensure the provision of safe, clean, affordable, and accessible water and local governance.

The Governor vetoed AB 2050 on September 28, 2018. In his veto message, he stated that while he appreciated the author's intent, the "bill creates an expensive, bureaucratic process and does not address the most significant problem with providing safe drinking water - a stable funding source to pay for ongoing operations and maintenance costs."

Additionally, his veto message commented on funding safe drinking water stating:

"My administration remains committed to a comprehensive solution to address safe drinking water issues based on shared responsibilities between water users and water providers that will not result in ongoing costs to the General Fund. I urge the Legislature and stakeholders to work towards a stable funding solution in 2019."

AB 2447 (*Reyes*, *D*- San Bernardino) — California Environmental Quality Act: Environmental Justice:

AB 2447, authored by the Assemblymember Eloise Reyes (D-San Bernardino), would have expanded the requirements of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) for certain projects and provide for an additional process for certain projects located near or in disadvantaged communities. Specifically, the bill would have required that a lead agency that is preparing an Environmental Impact Report to provide individual notice to owners and occupants of property located within a disadvantaged community when the CEQA review involves industrial or equivalent land uses. As amended, the bill would not have applied to "A project undertaken by a public water supplier or public agency for the conveyance, production, storage,

impoundment, or treatment of safe and reliable water, such as recycled water, wastewater, and stormwater, to serve a disadvantaged community."

The Governor vetoed AB 2447 on September 30, 2018. In his veto message, he stated that:

"I believe that the notice and meeting requirements, as outlined in the bill, are too prescriptive. Disadvantaged communities are entitled to clear and adequate notice, but zones of notice and the definition of projects subject to the requirements should be flexibly defined to reflect the vast diversity of our state."

AB 2501(Chu, D-Milpitas) — Drinking Water: Consolidation and Extension of Service:

AB 2501, authored by Assemblymember Kaasen Chu (D-Milpitas), amends the consolidation authorities granted to the State Board in SB 88 (2015). SB 88 authorized the State Board to order a water system to take over and consolidate with a public water system or a state small water system that consistently fails to provide an adequate supply of safe drinking water within a disadvantaged community in order to ensure that those communities would no longer receive unsafe drinking water. In addition to the authority granted in SB 88, AB 2501 extends the State Board's consolidation authority. Among other things, it allows the State Board to order a water system to take over, consolidate or provide service where the disadvantaged community is served a domestic well that consistently fails to provide an adequate supply of safe drinking water or where a school is served with unsafe or inadequate water supply.

AB 2501 was signed by the Governor on September 28, 2018. It will take effect on January 1, 2019.

SB 998 (Dodd, D-Napa) — Discontinuation of Residential Water Service:

SB 998, authored by Senate Bill Dodd (D-Napa), establishes new statutory provisions governing when a public water system may discontinue water service at a residential property. Among its many provisions, the bill would prohibit a public water system from discontinuing residential water service for nonpayment until a customer has been delinquent for at least 60 days and has been provided adequate notice about their options to avoid discontinuation of their water service. The bill also prohibits, if certain situations exist, the discontinuation of water service. The bills would prohibit the discontinuation of residential water service where all of the following conditions are met:

- The customer, or a tenant of the customer, submits to the water provider certification from a licensed medical professional that that discontinuation of residential service will be life-threatening to, or pose a serious threat to the health and safety of, a resident of the premises where the service is being provided;
- The customer demonstrates that he or she is financially unable to pay their bill within the normal payment period; if any member of the customer's household is a recipient of CalWORKS, CalFresh, general assistance, Medi-Cal, Supplemental Security Income/State Supplementary Payment Program, or California Special Supplemental

Nutrition Program for Women, Infants and Children; or he or she declares that the household's annual income is within 200 percent of the federal poverty level; and

• The customer is willing to enter into an amortization agreement, alternative payment schedule or plan for deferred or reduce payment with respect to the delinquent charges.

Additionally, the bill limits a water provider's ability to discontinue service if the customer is delinquent on a payment required under an amortization agreement, alternative payment schedule or plan for deferred or reduced payment plan. The bill would require that service could not be discontinued until the customer was 60 days delinquent on those charges. SB 998 also limits reconnection fees and interest charges on past due bills.

SB 998 was signed by the Governor on September 28, 2018. It will take effect on January 1, 2019.

SB 1215 (Hertzberg, D-Van Nuys) — Provision of Sewer Service: Disadvantaged Communities:

SB 1215, authored by Senator Hertzberg (D-Van Nuys), expands the Regional Water Quality Control Boards' (regional boards) authority. Specifically, SB 1215 authorizes the regional boards to order a sewer service provider to extend service to a disadvantaged community or where the residents of a disadvantaged community are served by an onsite sewage treatment system (i.e. septic systems) that does not provide adequate sewage service.

SB 1215 was signed by the Governor on September 30, 2018. It will take effect on January 1, 2019.

Request for Qualifications for State Legislative Advocates

Given the retirement of the District's current state advocate, staff plans on releasing a Request for Qualifications (RFQ) this week to solicit qualifications from full-service lobbying firms to represent the District on state legislative issues in Sacramento.

ELECTION OF THE INDEPENDENT SPECIAL DISTRICTS OF ORANGE COUNTY 2019-2020 OFFICERS

SUMMARY:

Last month, the Independent Special Districts of Orange County (ISDOC) sought candidates to serve as the association's officers and on its Executive Committee for the 2019-2020 term. The deadline for candidate nominations was September 18, 2018. ISDOC received only one nomination for the offices of Second Vice President, Third Vice President and Treasurer, and no nominations for the office of Secretary. Pursuant to the ISDOC bylaws, the one candidate nominated for those offices will serve in those offices for the 2019-2020 term, and a decision on how to fill the office of Secretary will take place within the first 60 days of the 2019-2020 term. For the offices of President and First Vice President, ISDOC received multiple nominations and, as a result, has called an election for those offices. Each ISDOC Member District is entitled to participate in the election and ballots are due to ISDOC by October 23, 2018.

Staff recommends that the Water Resources Policy and Communications Committee review the candidates for the ISDOC offices and that that the Board authorize IRWD to cast its ballot in favor of Saundra Jacobs (Santa Margarita Water District) for President and Mark Monin (El Toro Water District) for First Vice President no later than the October 23, 2018, deadline.

BACKGROUND:

ISDOC is a membership association of Orange County's 25 independent special districts. Its purpose is to advance the interests of Orange County special districts through advocacy of sound public policy, educational opportunities to enhance special district governance and services, and collaboration with others to elevate awareness of the role of special districts. ISDOC does not have any responsibility for the Orange County Special Districts Selection Committee, which is a separate and unrelated entity.

ISDOC has sought nomination of candidates interested in serving as ISDOC officers and on its Executive Committee for the 2019-2020 term. The ISDOC Executive Committee determines the direction and focus of ISDOC. The Executive Committee is comprised of the ISDOC President, First Vice President, Second Vice President, Third Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer and the Immediate Past President. The responsibilities of each office are as follows:

• <u>*President:*</u> The President is the chief executive officer of ISDOC. He or she presides at all meetings of the Board of Directors and the Executive Committee; appoints all committees; and represents ISDOC as its official spokesperson;

- *First Vice President*: The First Vice President chairs the Program Committee, and in the absence of the President, serves as the President;

- <u>*Third Vice President*</u>: The Third Vice President chairs the Legislative Committee, and in the absence of the President, First Vice President, and Second Vice President, serves as the President;
- <u>Secretary</u>: The Secretary is responsible for all correspondence and the dissemination of information to members. The Secretary prepares and distributes agendas and minutes for the Executive Committee meeting and edits and publishes the quarterly newsletter; and
- <u>*Treasurer*</u>: The Treasurer maintains ISDOC financial records and bank accounts; collects dues and other receipts; and pays all bills duly approved by the Executive Committee.

REVIEW OF RESPONSES TO REQUEST FOR QUALIFICATIONS FOR FEDERAL ADVOCACY SERVICES

SUMMARY:

For many years, IRWD has received federal advocacy services from a qualified firm hired on a sole-source basis. Given the restructuring of the District's current federal advocate firm, the District issued a Request for Qualifications (RFQ) to solicit qualifications from full-service lobbying firms to represent the District on federal legislative and regulatory issues in Washington, D.C. The RFQ for federal advocacy services was released on September 4, 2018, with responses due by October 1, 2018, at 5:00 p.m. (Pacific Daylight Saving Times).

Through the RFQ process and review of the submitted Statements of Qualifications (SOQs), IRWD seeks to retain the firm best suited to meet its federal advocacy needs. The SOQs will be initially screened by the District and an invitation to interview with the District will be extended to selected firms. Selected firms may be invited to participate in one or more interviews, which may include an opportunity for the firm to make a brief presentation to the District. The District currently anticipates that the initial interviews of selected firms will take place in Washington, D.C. at the firms' offices between October 15-16, 2018.

Staff will discuss with the Committee the SOQs received by the October 1 deadline, and recommend firms for initial interviews.

FISCAL IMPACTS:

Expenses for federal advocacy services have been included in the FY 2018-2019 Operating Budget.
