NATURAL TREATMENT SYSTEM EDUCATIONAL SIGNS

SUMMARY:

New graphics and signs have been designed to educate the public about IRWD's Natural Treatment System (NTS) and the role NTS sites play in protecting the environment, while also serving as a community resource. The new signs are proposed to be installed at 18 publicly accessible NTS sites that currently lack educational displays; older signs will also be replaced at 13 additional sites. Installation of the signs will clarify IRWD's role as owner, operator, and protector of the sites, and educate customers about the wetlands' important dual role as wildlife habits and water treatment facilities. At the Committee meeting, staff will present the design concepts for the Committee's review and input.

BACKGROUND:

For nearly three decades, IRWD has been treating urban runoff naturally within its service area. The District's effort began in 1998 when IRWD began diverting urban runoff within San Diego Creek into a series of constructed treatment ponds at San Joaquin Marsh. The District expanded its treatment of urban runoff in 2006 through a network of smaller wetlands called the Natural Treatment System (NTS), which begins removing pollutants from the runoff before it reaches San Diego Creek and the San Joaquin Marsh. Nearly 30 years after it first began treating urban runoff, the District now has 46 NTS sites throughout its service area.

Educational Signs at NTS Sites:

Over the past 20 years, the District has posted illustrated signs at some of the more prominent NTS sites to educate the public about the value of the NTS and the important role the sites play as facilities for treating water that flows to Upper Newport Bay and the Pacific Ocean. Because educational signs are currently installed at less than one-third of IRWD's NTS sites, staff receives many questions from the public regarding numerous NTS sites. Questions range from, "what purpose does the NTS facility serve?" to "why is the NTS site not manicured like the neighboring parks?"

Installing signage at additional NTS sites will greatly contribute to the IRWD's interest in educating the public regarding the purpose and benefits of the NTS sites. To determine where additional signage should be installed, staff evaluated the 33 sites that do not have educational signs. Based on the results of this evaluation, staff determined that:

- 18 sites are accessible and well-suited for signs; and
- 15 sites are not appropriate for signs because they are either inaccessible to the public, on property not fully under IRWD control, or in construction areas.

NTS Signage Design and Messaging:

In 2023, the District introduced a new look and feel for its educational displays, installing consistent earth- and rust-toned signage at San Joaquin Marsh, and blue-toned graphics in the Sand Canyon office hallways, using engaging images and reader-friendly prose to explain IRWD's commitment to water quality and environmental stewardship.

In designing new signage for NTS sites, staff set out to align the District's messaging by giving the NTS sites the same clean, consistent look that was introduced at the San Joaquin Marsh and in the Sand Canyon building. Staff will present to the Committee designs for two types of signs, which are proposed for installation:

- An updated 48-by-36-inch graphic sign that would be inserted into existing frames at the original 13 locations, and installed in identical wooden frames at 15 new sites with significant foot traffic; and
- A 20-by-30-inch aluminum sign with the look, feel, and tone of the 2023 San Joaquin Marsh signage, that would be installed at three sites where a lower-profile sign is more appropriate.

From these signs, residents, pedestrians, and other members of the public who pass by will learn about the NTS sites and the investment IRWD has made in environmental stewardship.

A draft of the PowerPoint presentation, which includes images of the proposed signs, is provided as Exhibit "A".

FISCAL IMPACTS:

Funding for Natural Treatment System Educational Signs is included in the budget for Capital Project 12575, Educational Displays and Signage. The design, fabrication, and installation of the signs will be funded with over-allocation funds.

WATER EDUCATION STRATEGY FOR 2025-2026

SUMMARY:

Irvine Ranch Water District has a long history of providing high-quality, effective water education to local schoolchildren throughout its service area to teach them the value of water, encourage water conservation, and build meaningful relationships with the community. At its peak attendance level, the District's educational program reached over 14,000 students during the school year. Since the COVID-19 pandemic, the reach of the program has struggled to return to its pre-pandemic levels. As a result, staff has developed a modified approach for the 2025-2026 school year drawing on the successes of IRWD's earlier programming and creating new opportunities to broaden these offerings by expanding the program into junior high and high school. The goal is to restore attendance to pre-pandemic levels in the coming years.

Staff will present the proposed approach to the Committee and seek the Committee's input on the modified approach for the 2025-2026 school year.

BACKGROUND:

IRWD has had a long-standing educational program, and for the past 18 years the District has partnered with Discovery Cube Orange County (formerly Discovery Science Center) to bring its educational programs to students. The IRWD / Discovery Cube partnership was renewed in three-year increments until 2019-2020, when the IRWD Board of Directors approved a two-year term covering 2019-2020 and 2020-2021 – aligning the program with the District's two-year budgeting process. In 2020-2021, IRWD worked with Discovery Cube to establish online and virtual resources such as the interactive 360-degree video tours of IRWD's San Joaquin Marsh and Michelson Water Recycling Plant.

Historically, the IRWD/Discovery Cube programing included three options for student participation:

- School Assemblies: Students in kindergarten through fourth grade participate in assembly-style programming that teaches grade-specific, Next Generation Science Standard-aligned content that builds year over year. Hand-held keypads and interactive skits provide hands-on learning opportunities that are fun and engaging;
- Field Trips to Discovery Cube: Students in kindergarten through fourth grade will participate in field trips to the new Ocean Lab and Touch Tank exhibits, where they will explore a diverse selection of ocean topics that put into context how water consumption and waste affect the environment. Displays on alternative water sources showcase IRWD's pioneering role in recycled water, among other water sources. The exhibit also incorporates information on how students can take action to protect the Earth's precious water resources and ecosystems; and

• Water Quality Lab and Field Trips: In this two-part program for fifth graders, students attend a workshop at school to learn about water quality testing. The second day of the program takes the students on a field trip to IRWD's San Joaquin Marsh where they tour the ponds, learn about the Michelson Water Recycling Plant and perform tests for dissolved oxygen with samples collected from the San Diego Creek. Water conservation kits are distributed to these students for use in their homes.

For the 2023-2024 and 2024-2025 school years, the program evolved into a hybrid model of in-person and virtual learning that would help Discovery Cube achieve pre-pandemic attendance goals as schools adjusted to having students back on campus. Field trip opportunities to Discovery Cube's Ocean Encounter exhibit were added for First Grade through Fifth Grade students, in addition to the Fifth Grade Field Trip to IRWD's San Joaquin Marsh to encourage a resurgence in the participation level.

Annual Educational Program Participation

Education Program Plan for the 2025-2026 School Year:

Given the struggle to return the District's educational program participation back to pre-pandemic levels, staff had a number of discussions with Discovery Cube and evaluated a variety of options and changes to the District's current program to increase participation.

After those discussions and evaluation, staff is proposing to continue the District's partnership with Discovery Cube, with the goal of reaching 5,600 students next school year, for student education to grades K-4, and to begin a new partnership with Orange County Coastkeeper, with the goal of reaching 2,000 students next year, for student education for grades 5-12. The breakdown of the proposed program is as follows:

Discovery Cube Orange County: Targeting students in grades K-4 with the following activity/participation options:

- <u>School Assemblies: (Attendance Goal: 4,000 students, grades K-4):</u> Students will participate in assembly-style programming that teaches grade-specific, Next Generation Science Standard-aligned content that builds year over year. Hand-held keypads and interactive skits provide hands-on learning opportunities that are fun and engaging; and
- Field Trips to Discovery Cube: (Attendance Goal: 1,600 students, grades 1-4): Students will participate in field trips to the new Ocean Lab and Touch Tank exhibits, where they will explore a diverse selection of ocean topics that put into context how water consumption and waste affect the environment. Displays on alternative water sources showcase IRWD's pioneering role in recycled water, among other water sources. The exhibit also incorporates information on how students can take action to protect the Earth's precious water resources and ecosystems.

Orange County Coastkeeper: Coastkeeper launched its WHALES (Watershed Heroes: Actions Linking Education to Stewardship) program in 2005 to empower students to care for their watershed. The program offers hands-on learning workshops and field trips at local creeks, wetlands and the ocean. Staff proposes to use the WHALES program, modified to match IRWD's goals, to offer hands-on field trips to students grades 5-15. The field trips offer:

• Field Trips: (Attendance Goal: 2,000 students, grades 5-12): Students will participate in a workshop to learn about water quality testing and then perform tests in the field, either at the San Joaquin Marsh or at a local watershed near their school, to instill a sense of community stewardship specific to their neighborhood. Local watershed field trips will broaden participation to schools unwilling to make the drive to the San Joaquin Marsh.

Staff will present this plan to the Committee using presentation provided as Exhibit "A".





LOCAL AGENCY FORMATION COMMISSION OF ORANGE COUNTY MUNICIPAL SERVICE REVIEW AND SPHERE OF INFLUENCE REVIEW – CENTRAL REGION

SUMMARY:

Government Code Section 56430 requires the Orange County Local Agency Formation Commission ("OC LAFCO" or "Commission") to conduct a comprehensive analysis of the municipal services provided by cities, special districts, and other local service providers within Orange County every five years. This comprehensive analysis is called a Municipal Service Review ("MSR") and includes a review of municipal boundaries and spheres of influence for local agencies.

OC LAFCO recently released the Public Review Draft of the MSR for the Central Orange County, which includes IRWD. The Commission is currently accepting public comments on this draft through August 18, 2025.

District staff had provided preliminary comments on the Administrative Draft, and those comments were largely incorporated into the Public Review Draft. Staff recommends that the Committee review the Central Region Municipal Service Review Public Review Draft and provide input on any further comments the Committee would like to see the District make on the Public Review Draft.

BACKGROUND:

Pursuant to the Cortese-Knox-Hertzberg Local Government Reorganization Act of 2000, each local agency formation commission in the state is required to conduct a MSR every five years. A MSR reviews municipal boundaries and spheres of influence for local governmental entities, and reviews the coordination and delivery of municipal services within the area covered by the MSR.

A MSR aims to give a local agency formation commission the analytical foundation needed to make informed decisions, as required by the Government Code, regarding:

- Establishing, expanding, or reorganizing local agencies;
- Coordinating planning efforts among local agencies and communities;
- Promoting shared facilities and resources among local agencies where appropriate;
- Discouraging duplication of services; and
- Encouraging consolidation or reorganization of inefficient local agencies.

OC LAFCO MSR Process:

In Orange County, OC LAFCO is undertaking its requirement to conduct MSRs of local agencies based on geographic regions for most cities and special districts. The only exception is individual MSRs for larger regional local agencies. The regional MSR's cover the following:

The first of the three regional MSRs that cover IRWD is the MSR for the Central Region.

For the Central Region MSR, OC LAFCO hired RSG, Inc. in March 2024 to complete the MSR. Since that time, IRWD staff has participated in the MSR process through coordination with RSG via multiple virtual meetings so that RSG could have the information they needed from the District for their analysis. Staff addressed questions about IRWD's service delivery, capital projects, infrastructure assets, and financial management practices. Throughout the MSR development process, IRWD staff also provided valuable input and technical clarifications, and submitted formal comments and recommendations during administrative draft review phase of the MSR., resulting in the Public Review Draft that can be read here.

FINDINGS OF 2025 WATER SUPPLY RELIABILITY STUDY

SUMMARY:

Staff, with the assistance of consultants from HDR and DCSE, have prepared the 2025 IRWD Water Supply Reliability Study (WSRS). The purpose of the study was to evaluate the reliability of IRWD's water supplies and to develop a detailed understanding of IRWD's water banking project needs under various supply disruption scenarios. The study was performed in alignment with existing IRWD Policy Position Papers and recent regional modeling work conducted by Metropolitan Water District. At the meeting, staff will present an overview of the study and the corresponding findings.

BACKGROUND:

Providing a reliable and safe water supply is the primary mission of IRWD. The District's goal is to provide sufficient water to meet customer water demands under reasonably foreseeable hydrologic and system related disruptions in supply. IRWD's water supply reliability planning efforts are guided by the following IRWD Policy Position Papers:

- Potable Water Supply Reliability (November 2014);
- Water Banking, Transfers, and Wheeling (November 2020); and
- Metropolitan's Integrated Water Resources Plan (November 2023).

2020 Needs Assessment:

In March 2020, staff presented to the Board a needs assessment for the development of the IRWD Water Bank that evaluated water supply disruption scenarios consistent with guidance from the above policy papers. The assessment concluded that IRWD needs to develop 105,000 acre-feet (AF) of water in storage for IRWD's use from the existing IRWD Water Bank and corresponding expansion projects such as the Kern Fan Groundwater Storage Project and the proposed South Valley Project (collectively referred to as the Banking Projects). The assessment further concluded that IRWD needs to develop 35,000 AF per year in recovery capacity for IRWD's use in severe supply disruption scenarios.

2025 Water Supply Reliability Study:

To evaluate the reliability of IRWD's water supplies and to further refine IRWD's Banking Project needs, the District retained HDR and DCSE to prepare a 2025 Water Supply Reliability Study. The consultants used IRWD's Integrated Resources Planning Distribution System Model (IRPDSM) to evaluate water supply reliability over a 38-year planning horizon and to evaluate mitigation strategies for dealing with outstanding shortages of water. An Executive Summary from the WSRS is provided as Exhibit "A".

IRPDSM Model Overview:

The IRPDSM is a comprehensive network model consisting of interconnected pipes and network components such as surface and groundwater sources, treatment plants, reservoirs, and pumping stations. The IRPDSM performs Monte Carlo simulations of IRWD supplies, demands and operational constraints to predict shortages under various supply disruption scenarios.

To support the IRPDSM modeling work, Metropolitan provided imported water supply and shortage data from its 2020 Integrated Resource Plan (IRP) simulation of Metropolitan's service area. The IRP simulation data assumed low regional demands and reduced imported supplies. In preparing for the modeling work, IRWD water supplies were prioritized, and demand projections were developed considering historical trends, anticipated buildout, and conservation.

Supply Disruption Scenarios and Shortage Mitigation Strategies:

adding additional storage and implementing additional conservation.

Three supply disruption scenarios were modelled using IRPDSM. The first being a highly probable major earthquake in the Sacramento-San Joaquin River Delta with Delta levee failures that disrupt imported supplies from the State Water Project. A second less likely scenario assumed an earthquake in the Delta with Delta levee failures along with a simultaneous earthquake in Southern California resulting in failure of Metropolitan's Lower Feeder and disruptions to imports from the Colorado River. A third scenario assumed reduced operations of IRWD Dyer Road Well Field due to emerging contaminants.

Monte Carlo simulations of IRPDSM of each scenario were run for 53 different hydrologic trials over the 38-year planning horizon. Simulations were ranked by shortage levels and 95th percentile results were compiled. Four mitigation strategies were evaluated to address shortage levels that are expected to occur in 95 percent of all potential futures. These strategies included: 1) Reliance on the Delta Conveyance Project; 2) Adding storage to IRWD's Banking Projects; 3) Implementing additional conservation in IRWD's service area; and 4) A combination of

Study Findings:

The 2025 WSRS reaffirms the need for IRWD's continued investment in its Banking Projects as well as the Sites Reservoir Project to offset shortages under the disruption scenarios described above. The study also highlights the importance of IRWD's Jackson Ranch and the Sites Reservoir Project in providing schedulable sources of water to the Banking Projects. The 2025 study concludes that IRWD needs to develop 115,000 AF of water in storage for IRWD's use from the Banking Projects, develop 35,000 AF per year in recovery capacity for IRWD's use at the projects, and add an additional 25,000 AF of storage for IRWD's use in the Banking Projects. These findings are consistent with the 2020 needs assessment. At the meeting, staff will present the findings of the 2025 WSRS. Staff's draft presentation is provided as Exhibit "B".



Executive Summary

This Executive Summary (ES) for the 2025 Water Supply Reliability Study Update (2025 Study) provides a concise overview of the study methodologies, modeling results and conclusions. It highlights the critical insights related to water supply reliability, demand projections, and the evaluation of potential supply disruptions and mitigation strategies to inform future planning and capital investments.

ES.1 Introduction

IRWD, established in 1961, provides potable water supply to the City of Irvine and portions of Costa Mesa, Lake Forest, Newport Beach, Orange, Tustin, and unincorporated areas of Orange County. Irvine Ranch Water District (IRWD) relies on both local and imported water to serve its potable water customers. The availability of these water resources to IRWD is influenced by climatologic variations, the integrity of the infrastructure that delivers the water, and the policies of agencies who administer these resources. A significant portion of IRWD's supply comes from the Orange County Groundwater Basin, managed by the Orange County Water District (OCWD), while imported water is purchased from the Municipal Water District of Orange County (MWDOC), which serves as IRWD's wholesaler water supplier and a member agency of the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California (MWD), the regional provider of imported water. Water banking further enhances reliability during shortages by allowing IRWD to store and recover water when needed.

IRWD's approach to manage risk and maintain a resilient water supply relies on diversifying water supplies, groundwater banking programs, and a robust planning process that anticipates and prepares for a variety of risks such as extended drought, climate change, and infrastructure disruptions and both regional and local level.

This 2025 Study is a comprehensive update to the 2016 Water Supply Reliability Study and serves as a key planning document to support IRWD's long-term water supply strategy. It assesses IRWD's ability to reliably meet potable water demands through the planning horizon of 2022 to 2059 (38-year period) under a range of evolving conditions, including changes in local and regional supply availability and potential emergency scenarios. The 2025 Study incorporates updated potable water demand forecasts, revised supply assumptions, and a detailed analysis of system performance using IRWD's Integrated Resources Planning Distribution System Model (IRPDSM). The model simulates system performance under three scenarios, each representing different types of supply interruptions. These are evaluated against a baseline condition, reflecting normal operations without disruptions, to assess IRWD's ability to maintain reliable service.

This study reaffirms IRWD's commitment to deliver reliable and safe water supply by providing an updated, data-driven assessment of the IRWD's ability to maintain service under reasonably foreseeable challenges.

ES.2 Demands

IRWD initially served primarily agricultural customers. Land use within IRWD's boundaries has since evolved, with agricultural lands converted to a wide variety of potable water customers. Residential customers, particularly single-family homes, apartments, and condominiums, account for about two-thirds of the total demand, while agricultural use comprised less than 1 percent. From fiscal year 2018–2019 through 2022–2023, IRWD's average annual purchase and production of potable water was approximately 56,700 acre-feet per year (AFY).

To project future potable water demands, IRWD utilized its Demand Forecast Tool (DFT). The DFT is a land-use and geographic information system (GIS)-based calibration model that estimates average annual dry-weather demands through build-out year of 2035. DFT Demand projects demands based on changes in land use, including residential, commercial, industrial, agricultural, and community park areas, and development phasing as provided by local jurisdictional plans. The DFT applies water use group (WUG) factors, which are demand coefficients applied to specific land use categories or areas, to estimate water use in various customer and usage categories.

To tailor demand projections specifically for this 2025 Study and to better align with recent historical trends, IRWD applied a two-step post-processing approach to the DFT Demand. First, an **Adjusted Demand** was developed by calibrating the DFT Demand results with actual historical demand data from 2022 and 2023. Adjustments included the removal of a previously included conservative 10 percent buffer, linear interpolation between actual and projected build-out (2035) DFT value, and incorporation of a minor post-build-out growth factor through 2040 to account for potential uncertainties.


Second, a **Lower Demand** was developed using IRWD's Demand Adjustment Tool (DAT). This tool applies additional demand reductions across key WUGs to reflect ongoing and anticipated conservation efforts and drought response measures, as outlined in IRWD's 2020 Water Shortage Contingency Plan. The reductions applied in the Lower Demand scenario include:

- WUG 1 (Local Interior Residential Use): 5 percent reduction to reflect voluntary and mandatory conservation measures.
- WUG 2 (Local Exterior Residential Use): 7.5 percent total reduction, combining 5 percent conservation and 2.5 percent turf replacement.
- WUG 3 (Irrigation Non-Residential Use): 11.5 percent total reduction, including a 10 percent conservation reduction and 1.5 percent turf replacement.

The Lower Demand scenario, incorporating these reductions, serves as the demand condition modeled in this 2025 Study. Figure ES-1 compares the original DFT projections, the Adjusted Demand, and the Lower Demand scenarios, with 2022 and 2023 values based directly on observed historical demand data.

ES.3 Supply

IRWD provides reliable potable water to over 446,000 residents and a daytime population of 634,000 by utilizing a diversified portfolio of water sources: local groundwater, imported water, and groundwater banking.

Local groundwater is sourced mainly from the Orange County Groundwater Basin (OCGWB), managed by the Orange County Water District (OCWD). Basin management is through an annual Basin Production Percentage (BPP) that limits groundwater withdrawals from wells without additional fees. With recent expansions to the Groundwater Replenishment System, OCWD has set a sustained BPP of 85 percent starting in 2025. Exceeding this percentage triggers the Basin Equity Assessment (BEA), a financial surcharge from OCWD that equalizes the cost of groundwater with imported water supplies and intended to protect the basin from over-pumping. Groundwater wells fall into two categories, non-exempt and BEA exempt, and are defined as follows:

- Non-exempt wells: Wells that are subject to the BPP and the BEA. Water pumped from these wells counts towards the agency's BPP allocation, and any production above the threshold incurs BEA fees.
- BEA exempt wells: Wells that are not subject to the BEA, regardless of how much is pumped.

IRWD operates both non-exempt and BEA exempt groundwater production facilities, including the Dyer Road Well Field, (DRWF), Deep Aquifer Treatment System (DATS), Wells 21 and 22 Desalter, Irvine Desalter Project Potable Treatment Plant (IDP-PTP), and Orange Park Acres (OPA) Well-1. Figure ES-2 illustrates these groundwater facilities within the IRWD service area, and Table ES-1 summarizes the production and contractual capacities of each.

Furthermore, stricter production limits (PL), or limits on the maximum groundwater production allowed, are applied to protect the basin during regional shortages. These regional shortages can occur because of climate-driven hydrologic variability, regulatory constraints on water deliveries, or increased demands associated with economic and population growth.

Irvine Lake, owned by IRWD, is another local surface water supply and can store up to 28,000 AFY. It stores both local runoff and untreated imported water from MWD. IRWD also co-owns the 28.1 million gallons per day (MGD) Baker Water Treatment Plant (WTP) -- with 6.8 MGD of capacity owned by IRWD -- which treats imported and Irvine Lake water. The Howiler WTP, also owned by IRWD, will expand treatment capacity and is planned to deliver treated water to the IRWD service area in the near future.

Imported water is purchased from the MWD through MWDOC, supplied through the State Water Project (SWP) and Colorado River Aqueduct (CRA). Additionally, groundwater banking projects in Kern County enable IRWD to store and recover water during drought conditions or regional shortages. Key projects include the Strand Ranch and Stockdale Integrated Banking Projects in Kern County. Partnerships and exchange agreements with other water districts enable IRWD to bank and recover water efficiently, such as exchanging non-exportable Kern River water into exportable SWP water for use in Orange County through an agreement with DRWD.



Further looking into the future, IRWD's supply portfolio is positioned to benefit from several potential and developing regional and local water supply projects. Pure Water Southern California could enhance treated water reliability for IRWD by supplementing supplies at the Weymouth and Diemer treatment plants, while Pure Water Los Angeles may reduce LADWP's demand on MWD, freeing up additional imported supplies for agencies like IRWD. The Delta Conveyance Project would improve the consistency and resiliency of SWP deliveries by bypassing Delta Levees that are vulnerable to seismic failures. Although these developing opportunities, as well as MWD's future water supply portfolio and prospective IRWD-specific projects, are not explicitly modeled in this 2025 Study, these represent critical conceptual pathways to offset future shortages and bolster water availability.

One exception is the Sites Reservoir, a proposed off-stream storage facility in the Sacramento Valley that is explicitly modeled in this 2025 Study. Developed by the Sites Project Authority, the reservoir will store up to 1.5 million acre-feet of stormwater from the Sacramento River for use during dry periods and will integrate with both the SWP and Central Valley Project to improve statewide supply management during droughts and floods. As a Sites participant, IRWD will have dedicated storage and water rights and decision-making authority. IRWD's average annual yield from Sites Reservoir is modeled at 1,053 AFY, with an estimate of 793 AFY expected to support recharge in the Kern Fan and South Valley Projects. Sites Reservoir is scheduled to come online in 2032. Figure ES-3 illustrates an overview of key infrastructure and interconnections of existing and future MWD and IRWD potable water systems.

Figure ES-2. Groundwater Production Potable Wells for IRWD Service Area





ES.4 Planning and Modeling Approach

IRWD used a collaborative, workshop-driven planning process to identify and prioritize key vulnerabilities, or supply interruptions, impacting the reliability of its water delivery system. Given the wide range of possible future supply and demand conditions, IRWD focused on high-impact "planning scenarios" that warrant proactive planning and investment for long-term supply reliability. Planning scenarios are defined as specific combinations of future supply and demand conditions, including potential system interruptions. Each planning scenario integrates the following core elements:

- Import Scenarios: Defined by MWD's 2020 Integrated Resource Plan (IRP), these
 MWD import scenarios (A, B, C, and D) reflect possible future hydrologic conditions
 that influence the demand and availability of MWD imported water supplies. IRWD
 adopted Scenario C, characterized by low regional demands and reduced imported
 supplies, as the most realistic foundation for long-term reliability analysis.
- Demand Condition: Defined by post-processed and reduced DFT projections, this IRWD planning element reflects a more conservative future that incorporates additional conservation and drought-related reductions, as described in Section ES.2. Demand projections are based on expected population growth and land use changes, and the DFT is calibrated to align with recent historical data.
- Supply Interruptions: Defined by likelihood, duration, and severity, supply
 interruptions are seismic disruptions or water quality issues which could reduce the
 availability or reliability of IRWD's supply resources, as described in Section ES.3.

This 2025 Study evaluates 3 scenarios, in addition to a baseline, as follows:

- Scenario 1 (Delta Levee Failure) is a seismic event at the Delta that severely impairs
 water quality and interrupts State Water Project (SWP) imports. Analysis of United
 State Geological Survey (USGS) data revealed that a Delta Levee seismic event has
 an 80% likelihood of occurrence in the next 38 years.
- Scenario 2 (Delta Levee and Lower Feeder Failure) pairs the Delta Levee Failure
 with a seismic event in Southern California resulting in the Lower Feeder failure
 interrupting Colorado River Aqueduct (CRA) imports. A less likely scenario, analysis
 of USGS data revealed an 11% likelihood of occurrence in the next 38 years.
- Scenario 3 (DRWF Reduced Operations) assumed that emerging contaminants result in a 50 percent reduction in DRWF capacity. A 5% likelihood of occurrence in the next 38 years was estimated based on discussions with IRWD staff.

These scenarios form the basis for modeling and evaluating system performance using the IRPDSM tool over a 38-year planning horizon from 2022 to 2059. The IRPDSM is a comprehensive network model consisting of interconnected pipes ("Links") and components ("Nodes") such as supply sources, groundwater wells, treatment plants, surface reservoirs, pumping stations, and demand connections. It accounts for hydraulic constraints including pressure zones, pumping capacities, and pipe sizes. The model allows users to set priorities and operational constraints (up to 10 tiers) for each supply and demand node, enabling optimization of water deliveries within IRWD's physical infrastructure. The IRPDSM simulates how supplies are allocated to meet demands

under these constraints, and the results identify potential shortages that may occur under various supply interruption scenarios.

To assess supply reliability across a broad range of plausible future conditions through the full planning horizon, the model uses a Monte Carlo simulation with 53 hydrologic trials, each representing a unique 19-year sequence (or trace) from the 1965 to 2017 historical record. The IRPDSM integrates MWD's Scenario C supply, shortage and demand projections from MWD's Integrated Resources Planning Simulation Model (IRPSIM), which accounts for drought, climate variability, and regulatory factors. Scenario C data is applied for IRWD's partial planning period from 2022 to 2040. To extend the analysis through the full planning horizon (2022–2059), the 2022–2040 data set is repeated for the 2041–2059 period. Although IRWD anticipates system buildout by 2035, a 0.05 percent annual growth buffer is applied from 2035 to 2040 to reflect potential unforeseen demand increases. Beyond 2040, demands are assumed to remain stable and are held constant at 2040 levels.

IRWD employs an eight-tiered supply prioritization framework to optimize water source use based on availability, cost, and policy objectives. Local groundwater supplies receive the highest priority due to cost-effectiveness and operational constraints, followed by imported sources and banking supplies:

- Tier 1 Non-Exempt Groundwater Well Supply Below BPP Threshold
- Tier 2 BEA Exempt Groundwater Well Supply
- Tier 3 Non-Exempt Groundwater Well Supply Above BPP Threshold, But Below 100 Percent of Demand in OCWD's Service Boundary
- Tier 4 Irvine Lake (Through Baker WTP)
- Tier 5 CRA
- Tier 6 SWP
- Tier 7 IRWD Groundwater Bank
- Tier 8 Integrated Operations of the Kern Fan Project, South Valley Project, and Sites Reservoir

The following are descriptions of each of the supply tiers modeled in the IRPDSM:

- Local Groundwater: IRWD extracts groundwater from wells within the OCGWB, with production limited by not only the BPP and Production Limitation (PL), but also both physical pumping capacity and contractual capacity, as summarized in Table ES-1. During shortages, the PL further restricts pumping. This is simulated in the IRPDSM using a PL response function that was developed by IRWD, which links allowable pumping to regional shortage levels. Tiers 1 through 3 represent the local groundwater supplies.
- Irvine Lake: Irvine Lake provides additional local surface water treated at the Baker Water Treatment Plant. Supply volumes vary based on ownership shares and infrastructure projects, with temporary reductions during the Irvine Lake Improvement Project (2028–2031) and increased availability afterward. Tier 4 represents Irvine Lake.



- Imported Water from MWD: MWD supplies imported water from the SWP and CRA, supplemented by transfers, exchanges, and storage programs. IRWD's import supply is calculated as a proportion of MWD's total demand and available supply. The model conservatively assumes that any disruption to imported supplies results in a direct and proportional shortage for IRWD, without accounting for potential mitigation through MWD's conservation efforts. As a result, this approach may overstate the severity of impacts. Tiers 5 and 6 represents imported water from MWD.
- IRWD Groundwater Bank: The Groundwater Banking Program stores imported
 water for use during dry years or interruptions, with a modeled maximum capacity of
 75,000 AF available for IRWD's use. This estimate reflects a midpoint between lowand high-end possible conditions, based on storage agreements and operational
 capacity. Initial 2022 storage is approximately 33,000 AF, with annual recharge
 subject to supply availability and operational constraints. Tier 7 represents the IRWD
 Groundwater Bank.
- Kern Fan Project, South Valley Project, and Sites Reservoir: The integrated operations of these projects provide supplemental storage and supply during shortages. Modeled as coming online in 2032, these projects offer combined recharge capacity of up to 18,750 AF annually (IRWD's portion from unbalanced exchange programs), supporting IRWD's ability to offset shortages. Recharge volumes are governed by response curves linked to SWP allocations that were developed by IRWD. No recharge is assumed during Delta Levee failure events. Tier 8 represents the integrated operations of the Kern Fan Project, South Valley Project, and Sites Reservoir.

Using the IRPDSM model and 53 hydrologic trials, the analysis estimates potential supply shortages and identifies the volume of water needed to maintain reliability. The focus is on how IRWD's portfolio, including the IRWD Groundwater Bank, Kern Fan, South Valley, and Sites Reservoir, can address these gaps. Two types of shortages are evaluated:

- **Total Shortage:** Unmet demand after local and imported supplies, but before banking programs, indicating the need for use of water from the banking programs.
- **Remaining Shortage:** Unmet demand after using stored banking supplies, indicating the need for further mitigation through expanded supplies or reduced demands.

For planning purposes, the 95th percentile shortage is used to represent a conservative yet reasonable estimate of potential future conditions for total and remaining shortage, capturing the upper range of likely outcomes while excluding extreme case outliers. The 95th percentile is selected from the fourth-highest result among the 53 trials and applied consistently across baseline and outage scenarios. The results quantify how IRWD's supply resources perform in meeting demands and how banking programs help mitigate outages. Probability curves show the likelihood of experiencing varying levels of shortage, supporting IRWD risk-based planning approach.

ES.5 Model Results

The following section summarizes the modeled outcomes from the IRPDSM under baseline and outage scenarios.

Baseline

Under baseline conditions (no supply interruptions), IRWD can meet all potable demands in every trial using local groundwater and imported water from MWD. While a few trials with regional MWD supply shortages require use of IRWD's Groundwater Bank, no remaining shortages occur. At the 95th percentile, the total shortage is 300 AF (Trial 13). This confirms that under normal operating conditions, IRWD's supply portfolio is robust enough to meet projected demands without requiring additional new supplies. Any remaining shortages observed in subsequent outage scenarios reflect the impact of those disruptions and the need for mitigation. Figure ES-4 illustrates the baseline without remaining shortages (Trial 14) which is useful in comparing 95th percentile results from Scenarios 1 and 2.

Scenario 1 – Delta Levee Failure

Scenario 1 (Delta Levee Failure) models a seismic-induced Delta Levee failure that restricts SWP deliveries and triggers a reduction in the PL in Orange County by OCWD from 2052 to 2057. Results show that all but one trial experiences a shortage after accounting for local and imported supplies. At the 95th percentile (Trial 14), the total shortage is 116,000 AF, and IRWD's banked supplies offset 94,500 AF, leaving a remaining shortage of 21,500 AF across two years. For the 95th percentile (Trial 14), Figure ES-4 illustrates the baseline without remaining shortages, while Figure ES-5 illustrates Scenario 1 with remaining shortage (red-hatched areas) in Years 2056 and 2057.

Scenario 2 - Delta Levee and Lower Feeder Failure

Scenario 2 (Delta Levee and Lower Feeder Failure) adds a concurrent outage of the CRA Lower Feeder to the Delta Levee failure, further restricting imported supply. It results in the most severe modeled impact. At the 95th percentile, the total shortage reaches 147,700 AF, with 96,900 AF met through banked supplies, and a remaining shortage of 50,800 AF (Trial 14) across three years. The combined infrastructure failures amplify supply vulnerability and emphasize the necessity of a mitigation strategy. For the 95th percentile (Trial 14), Figure ES-4 illustrates the baseline without remaining shortages, while Figure ES-6 illustrates Scenario 2 with remaining shortage (red-hatched areas) in Years 2056 through 2058. The maximum amount of banking project well recovery capacity used in the simulation of Scenario 2 was 35,000 AF per year.



Scenario 3 – Dyer Road Well Field Reduced Operations


Scenario 3 (DRWF Reduced Operations), assuming a 50 percent reduction in DRWF operational and contractual capacity, due to an emerging contaminant, between 2030 and 2034, shows that IRWD's local and imported supplies, along with the IRWD Groundwater Bank, are sufficient to fully meet demand for all trials. At the 95th percentile, the total shortage only reached 300 AF (Trial 13). No remaining shortages occur at any of the 53 trials. At the 95th percentile (Trial 13), Figure ES-7 illustrates the baseline without DRWF outage, while Figure ES-8 illustrates Scenario 3 with the DRWF outage. In years 2030 to 2034, Figure ES-8 shows the marked decrease in Non-Exempt Groundwater Well Supply Below BPP (labelled "BPP") caused by the DRWF outage. However, imported supplies are sufficient to make up for the shortage due to the absence of regional shortages.

Scenario Comparison

Probability curves for the baseline and all three scenarios are compared in Figure ES-9. At the 95th percentile Scenario 2 (Delta levee and Lower Feeder failure) results in the highest total (147,700 AF) and remaining (50,800 AF) shortage. At the 95th percentile, Scenario 1 (Delta levee failure) results in less total (116,000 AF) and remaining (21,500 AF) shortage than Scenario 2. At the 95th percentile, Scenario 3 (50 percent DRWF reduction) shows a 300 AF total shortage but no remaining shortage – meaning that groundwater banking efforts are sufficient to meet demands.

Both Scenarios 1 and 2 result in remaining shortages, but Scenario 2 exhibits shortages across all trials, whereas Scenario 1 achieves zero remaining shortage in approximately 45 percent of trials or less. These findings indicate that Scenario 1 may be manageable without additional mitigation in nearly half the cases, whereas Scenario consistently results in significant shortages that require proactive mitigation strategies.

Figure ES-5. Scenario 1 Delta Levee Failure (Trial 14): Model Results – IRWD Supply to Meet Demands




Figure ES-6. Scenario 2 Delta Levee and Lower Feeder Failure (Trial 14): Model Results – IRWD Supply to Meet Demands






Figure ES-7. Baseline No Supply Interruptions (Trial 13): Model Results – IRWD Supply to Meet Demands




Figure ES-8. Scenario 3 DRWF Reduced Operations (Trial 13): Model Results – IRWD Supply to Meet Demands






Figure ES-9. IRPDSM Results of All Scenarios Total and Remaining Shortages Across 53 Trials (2022 to 2059)




Table ES-2 presents a summary of projected 95th percentile water supply shortages, banked supply usage, and remaining shortages (highlighted in red cells) under baseline and three disruption scenarios from 2022 to 2059. Under the baseline scenario, minimal shortages (300 AF) are fully mitigated using the IRWD Groundwater Bank. In contrast, Scenarios 1 and 2 result in significantly higher total shortages at 116,000 AF and 147,700 AF, respectively. While banked SWP water in IRWD's Groundwater Bank offsets a substantial portion of the total shortage, considerable remaining shortages persist: 21,500 AF for Scenario 1 and 50,800 AF for Scenario 2. Scenario 3, representing reduced DRWF operations, has minimal impact and is fully addressed through available IRWD Groundwater Bank. These findings highlight the importance of implementing additional mitigation strategies for scenarios with seismic interruptions.

ES.6 Mitigation Strategies

To respond effectively to water supply shortages during emergency conditions, IRWD evaluated four mitigation strategies outside of the IRPDSM modeling framework. While the IRPDSM identifies potential shortages across various disruption scenarios, it does not simulate corrective actions. The mitigation strategies were applied to Scenario 1 (Delta Levee Failure) and Scenario 2 (Delta Levee and Lower Feeder Failure), as only these resulted in remaining supply shortages. The four mitigation strategies evaluated to provide demand-side relief or additional supply during emergency conditions include:

- Mitigation 1 Delta Conveyance Project (DCP): A future infrastructure solution designed to restore State Water Project (SWP) deliveries from levels constrained by regulatory actions.
- Mitigation 2 Additional Conservation: Demand-side measures aligned with IRWD's Water Shortage Contingency Plan (WSCP) to reduce system demand during supply interruptions.
- Mitigation 3 Additional Groundwater Storage: Expansion of IRWD's banking storage capacity for integration with the operation of the Kern Fan and South Valley Projects.
- Mitigation 4 Combining Mitigation 2 and 3: Simultaneous implementation of Additional Conservation and Additional Groundwater Storage.

Mitigation 1 – Delta Conveyance Project

The DCP offers an alternative conveyance route that can maintain SWP deliveries during emergencies, reducing the risk of supply interruptions from seismic events and climate change affecting Delta Levees. The DCP might be operational by 2040 and would provide an alternative route for SWP deliveries during emergencies. Modeling shows that the DCP could restore supply levels close to baseline under Scenario 1, provided it operates at 40–50 percent capacity, which would offset disruptions 99 percent of the time. However, it does not mitigate Lower Feeder disruptions that result in loss of supply from the CRA and cannot eliminate the shortage in Scenario 2. Although included as a mitigation approach, IRWD recognizes that the Delta Conveyance Project faces significant obstacles towards completion, (which are outside of IRWD's control)

Mitigation 2 – Additional Conservation

Additional conservation reduces overall demand on the water system, preserving limited supplies during droughts or supply interruptions and increasing IRWD's ability to meet customer needs. IRWD's 2020 Water shortage Contingency Plan (WSCP) outlines procedures for responding to different levels of supply shortages. Level 2 under the 2020 WSCP targets a 10 percent demand reduction (approximately 7,000 AF annually). Over a six-year emergency event, this equates to a cumulative 42,200 AF reduction, which would fully eliminate the 21,500 AF shortage in Scenario 1. In Scenario 2, a residual shortage of 8,800 AF would remain, demonstrating conservation alone is not sufficient under the most severe conditions.

Mitigation 3 – Additional Groundwater Storage

Additional groundwater storage enhances supply reliability by allowing IRWD to bank supplies for recovery during dry years or emergency outages. IRWD's Kern Fan and South Valley Projects currently offer a combined storage capacity of 37,500 AF, with 18,750 AF available for IRWD's use, assuming the use of unbalanced exchanges. By integrating an additional 50,000 AF of storage (25,000 AF available to IRWD) with the operation of the Kern Fan and South Valley Projects, IRWD would be able to store additional water from Sites Reservoir and unbalanced exchanges of SWP Table A. This storage would eliminate shortages in Scenario 1 but leave 25,800 AF unaddressed in Scenario 2 if used alone.

Mitigation 4 – Combined Mitigations 2 and 3

IRWD examined how combinations of strategies could be implemented to address more severe and complex scenarios, specifically in Scenario 2 (Delta Levee and Lower Feeder Failure). The combined mitigation effects are calculated as a straightforward subtraction from the total 50,800 AF shortage, assuming each strategy operates independently and that impacts are additive without interaction or overlap. Outside the control of IRWD and with significant completion hurdles, DCP was not considered a mitigation measure to be included in Mitigation 4 (Combined Approach). Mitigation 4 is defined by combining:

- Mitigation 2 (Additional Conservation)
- Mitigation 3 (Additional Storage)

Mitigation Strategies Summary

The remaining shortages before and after implementing the mitigation strategies under both Scenarios 1 and 2 are summarized in Table ES-3. The remaining shortages after implementation of mitigation strategies are highlighted in red cells. For Scenario 1 (Delta Levee Failure), the remaining shortage before the implementation of the mitigation measures is 21,500 AF. This remaining shortage can be reduced to zero by implementing any of the four mitigation strategies.

For Scenario 2 (Delta Levee and Lower Feeder Failure), the remaining shortage before implementation of the mitigation measures, 50,800 AF, is more than double the remaining shortage caused by Delta Levee failure under Scenario 1. This remaining shortage can be reduced to zero only by Mitigation 4 (Combined Mitigations 2 and 3),

Role of Schedulable Supplies

The success of the IRWD Water Bank as well as the Kern Fan and South Valley Projects in offsetting shortages in Scenarios 1 and 2 is significantly dependent on schedulable water from IRWD's Jackson Ranch in Dudley Ridge Water District and IRWD's participation in the Sites Reservoir. In the IRPDSM simulations above, the unbalanced exchange of water from Jackson Ranch resulted in about 14,000 AF of water being available to offset shortages in Scenarios 1 and 2. Deliveries of water into storage from the Sites Reservoir Project resulted in about 16,000 AF of water being available to offset shortages. Combined, the two schedulable supplies offset 30,000 of the 116,000 total shortage in Scenario 1, which represents 26% of the banked supply used in offsetting the shortage. In the absence of IRWD's Jackson Ranch and the Sites Reservoir Project, IRWD would need to rely solely on SWP allocations, which are subject to variability and regulatory restrictions.

ES.7 Conclusions

The 2025 Study evaluated IRWD's ability to meet future potable water demands under a range of potential supply interruption scenarios. The analysis emphasized IRWD's diversified water supply strategy, which integrates local groundwater, imported water, water banking storage programs, and conservation measures to strengthen long-term system resilience.

Each scenario's impact on IRWD's potable water supply was evaluated using a probabilistic modeling approach over a 38-year planning horizon from 2022 to 2059. Four potential mitigation strategies were tested for effectiveness in reducing shortages. Key results from the IRPDSM and mitigation strategies, based on the 95th percentile outcomes, are summarized in Table ES-4 and as follows:

- Baseline Scenario (20 percent probability):
 No remaining shortages are projected. Minor shortages from regional related
 - No remaining shortages are projected. Minor shortages from regional related shortages are addressed through the IRWD Groundwater Bank.
- Scenario 1 Delta Levee Failure (80 percent probability):
 Scenario 1, with Delta Levee failure across six years (2052–2057), represents the most likely supply interruption scenario out of the three evaluated. After utilizing 94,500 AF of groundwater banking supplies, a remaining shortage of approximately 21,500 AF remains. Any one of the four mitigation strategies can offset the remaining shortages attributed to a Delta Levee failure.
- Scenario 2 Delta Levee and Lower Feeder Failure (11 percent probability):
 Scenario 2, with both Delta levee and Lower Feeder failure across six years (2052–2057), would result in the reliance on about 96,900 AF of groundwater banking supplies, while still having a remaining shortage of 50,800 AF. Scenario 2 represents the most severe supply interruption scenario, and the combined approach of Mitigation 2 and 3 is sufficient to fully mitigate this shortage.
- Scenario 3 DRWF Reduced Operations (5 percent probability): Scenario 3, with local groundwater interruption (due to an emerging contaminant) from DRWF reduced operations across 5 years (2030–2034), results in no remaining shortages at the 95th percentile. The IRWD Groundwater Bank is sufficient to meet demands under this low-likelihood, low-impact event. The Kern Fan Project, South Valley Project, and Sites Reservoir supplies are not used. In the absence of regional shortages throughout the duration of the outage, imports can offset the reduced groundwater availability at DRWF.

Assuming the Kern Fan Project, South Valley Project and Sites Reservoir are completed, Mitigation Strategies 2 and 3, which are both feasible and cost-effective, can address disruptions caused by seismic events. Each strategy alone is sufficient for Scenario 1 (Delta Levee Failure), while both are required concurrently for Scenario 2 (Delta Levee and Lower Feeder Failure).

The study also confirms the critical role of the Sites Reservoir in supporting both the Kern Fan and South Valley groundwater banking efforts, particularly by providing additional recharge water when 50,000 AF of additional storage (25,000 AF available to IRWD due



to unbalanced exchanges of water) is integrated into the operations of the Kern and South Valley Projects.

In conclusion, IRWD's proactive investment in a diversified water supply portfolio positions IRWD to reliably meet future demands across a wide range of disruption scenarios. This 2025 Study reaffirms that IRWD can manage risks associated with the range of import disruptions and changing regional conditions, as well as risks to local groundwater supplies.

IRWD Findings

Based on the conclusions above, IRWD should plan for a highly probable Delta Levee failure event, by:

- Securing an additional 50,000 AF (25,000 AF for IRWD's use in unbalanced exchanges) of storage for integrated operations with the Kern Fan and South Valley Projects.
- 2. Setting a goal of banking 116,000 AF of water in the IRWD Groundwater Bank, Kern Fan Project and South Valley Projects combined.
- 3. Developing banking well recovery capacity in the amount of 24,000 AF per year for IRWD's use.
- 4. Proceeding with participating in the Sites Reservoir Project as a schedulable supply.

To plan for a less probable combined Delta Levee and Lower Feeder failure event, IRWD should consider increasing its banking well recovery capacity to 35,000 AF per year for IRWD's use and be prepared to implement Level 2 of IRWD's Water Shortage Contingency Plan.










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IRWD WATER SUPPLIES TO POTABLE SYSTEM





2025 LEGISLATIVE AND REGULATORY UPDATE

SUMMARY:

This report provides an update on the 2025-2026 legislative session, regulatory issues, and IRWD priorities. As legislation and regulations develop, staff will provide updates and recommendations to the Water Resources Policy and Communications Committee and the Board, as appropriate.

Staff recommend the Board consider the following actions / positions:

- AB 93 (Papan, D-San Mateo) Water Demands of Data Center: "WATCH";
- AB 532 (Ransom) Water Rate Assistance Program: "CONCERNS"; and
- SB 616 (Rubio) Community Wildfire Commission- Wildfire Mitigation Program: "SEEK AMENDMENTS".

BACKGROUND:

On July 18, 2025, the Legislature began its 2025 Summer Recess. When lawmakers return to Sacramento on August 18, they will have less than a month before the last day of session, which is September 12. The Governor will then have until October 12 to sign or veto bills. This timetable creates a compressed timeline, giving lawmakers limited time to advance legislation through committee and floor votes before the September deadline. Additional budget trailer bills are expected to continue to emerge during the last few weeks of session to address outstanding fiscal issues including the allocation of the initial Proposition 4 funds, which have not yet been determined, and other fiscal issues.

A copy of the Legislative Matrix is provided as Exhibit "A". Links to the bills discussed below are included within each discussion unless a separate exhibit is noted.

2025 Budget Update & CEQA Reform Package:

While the State's Fiscal Year 2025-2026 budget was formally adopted by the June 15 constitutional deadline, an actual budget deal was not finalized and enacted until June 30. That deal included the Governor's legislative package to streamline the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) for certain development projects throughout the State. Those changes were enacted through AB 130 and SB 131, and included the largest number of CEQA reforms made in 40 years.

The AB 130 and SB 131 CEQA reforms create certain CEQA exemptions for the rezoning of approved housing elements, urban infill housing projects, clean water and sewer projects for disadvantaged communities, wildfire risk reduction projects, public parks and nonmotorized

trails funded by Proposition 4, daycare centers, nonprofit food banks, high-speed rail maintenance facilities and passenger stations, among others. To qualify for each of these exemptions, there are significant criteria that must be met. Staff has analyzed the details of the reforms and the impacts of both bills on the District. Based on that review, the CEQA exemptions appear to be largely unavailable to the District for its projects.

Despite the June 30 budget deal, this year's State budget will continue to face significant uncertainty due to multiple factors, including the federal budget impact, tariff impacts and tax filing delays caused by the Los Angeles wildfires. This means that additional budget actions will be required beyond this legislative session to address impacts to the State budget.

Additionally, there remain significant budget issues that have yet to be dealt with by the Legislature. Most notably, the allocation of the initial Proposition 4 funds and the reauthorization to Cap-and-Trade / Cap-and-Invest.

Staff will provide an oral update to the Committee on any new developments related to the State budget, additional budget trailer bills, and the CEQA reform package.

2025 State Legislative Update:

AB 93 (Papan, D-San Mateo) - Water Demands of Data Center:

AB 93, authored by the Chair of the Assembly Water, Parks and Wildlife Committee, Diane Papan (D-San Mateo), seeks to quantify and address the water demands and use of data centers. As introduced, the bill would have required the State Energy Resources Conservation and Development Commission and the Department of Water Resources to:

"develop guidelines and best practices to maximize the use of natural resources to address the developing and emerging needs of technology in California that are consistent with urban water use objectives... and the Energy Star Program of the United States Environmental Protection Agency, as that program existed on January 1, 2025, to the extent that the Energy Star Program is applicable to water usage."

The bill would have also required owners and operators of data centers to report expected water use and actual water used to a city or county when applying for and reapplying for a business license, equivalent instrument or permits. Additionally, the bill would have added a new requirement to a public water agency's cost-of-service study related to data center water use.

Because of the proposed added requirement to cost-of-service studies, the District took a "seek amendments" position on AB 93 and the Board authorized staff to seek amendments that would remove the cost-of-service study requirement along with other provision in the bill linking it to an urban retail water supplier's obligations under the "Making Conservation a California Way of Life" regulations.

After working with the author, AB 93 has been substantially amended. The current version of the bill would now require a data center owner, before applying for an initial business license, to provide its water supplier with an estimate of the expected water use, and when it renews its business license, the owner must self-certify that it has provided the data center's water supplier with a report on its annual water use.

These amendments remove the District's concern about cost-of-service studies and about any new obligations under the "Making Conservation a California Way of Life" regulations. Staff recommends that the Board now adopt a "watch" position on AB 93, which is currently in the Senate Appropriations Committee.

AB 532 (Ransom, D-Stockton) - Water Rate Assistance Program:

AB 532, sponsored by the California Municipal Utilities Association (CMUA), would provide express statutory authority for urban retail water suppliers to have a low-income water rate assistance program. The bill permits a retailer to use voluntary contributions from ratepayers and others, or any funding it has available to provide water rate assistance, provided it does not use any revenue from property-related fees in violation of Proposition 218.

As introduced, the bill would have also created the California Low Income Household Water Rate Assistance Program for smaller systems under 3,000 connections and water systems serving predominantly disadvantaged communities. That portion of the bill was removed in the Assembly in order to keep the bill moving forward this year.

AB 532 is current in the Senate Appropriations Committee.

The District currently has a "support" position on the bill. A recent amendment was made to the bill in the Senate Local Government Committee to add language to the provisions of the bill that permit the use of voluntary contributions from ratepayers to fund a low income water rate assistance program. The bill now states that "voluntary contributions may be sought on a water bill or through any other legal means and may be established to allow ratepayers to opt into or opt out of the program." The District previously expressed concerns about other proposals that would have permitted a voluntary "opt-out" contribution program on water bills because an "opt-out" program raises concerns related to customer service and trust. Because of this amendment and the District's past opposition to "opt-out" voluntary contributions, staff recommends that the Board now adopt a "concerns" position on AB 532.

SB 616 (Rubio, D-Baldwin Park) - Community Hardening Commission: Wildfire Mitigation Program:

SB 616 would establish a Community Hardening Commission (Commission), as an independent unit within the Department of Insurance, and would require the Commission to develop new wildfire home and community hardening standards. Specifically, the Commission would:

- Develop new wildfire community hardening standards to reduce fire risk and improve access to fire insurance;
- Establish guidelines and best practices for home hardening;
- Establish guidelines and best practices for infrastructure improvements for water and electrical supply to support fire suppression efforts and disaster recovery;
- Establish guidelines and best practices for enhancing ingress and egress routes;
- Establish guidelines and best practices for mandated funding mechanisms for defensible space maintenance, fire breaks, and vegetation management;
- Establish guidelines and best practices for risk mitigation specific to farm and agricultural land management;
- Develop new wildfire community hardening standards to reducing barriers for cities, counties, and members of those communities in home hardening and wildfire mitigation;
- Review existing home hardening regulations and provide recommendations to the Office of Emergency Services (CalOES), the Department of Forestry and Fire Protection (CalFIRE), and the Insurance Commissioner for changes to their regulations and programs to reduce fire risk and improve access to fire insurance, including outlining the most cost-effective strategies that will lower the risk for loss in a community in a useful manner insurers are able to reflect in underwriting;
- Make recommendations to expedite proven and cost-effective community hardening practices that reduce fire risk and improve insurability, including recommendations for reducing barriers for cities, counties, and members of those communities to invest in effective home hardening and wildfire mitigation strategies;
- Make recommendations to increase the pace and scale of forest health and landscape management projects with priority for mitigation near vulnerable communities; and
- Oversee and facilitate state and local agency participation in a wildfire data sharing platform.

The seven member Commission would be comprised of the following State officials, or their designee: the Insurance Commissioner, the State Fire Marshal, the Director of Housing and Community Development, the Director of the Office of Emergency Services, the Director of the Office of Energy Infrastructure Safety, a member of the State Assembly appointed by the Speaker, and a member of the State Senate appointed by the Senate President pro Tempore.

The Commission would be advised by an advisory council comprised of three representations from scientific research institutions with expertise in wildfire science; a representative on behalf of the insurance industry; a representative on behalf of the Insurance Institute for Business and Home Safety; a representative on behalf of consumers and policyholders; a local representative on behalf of a city or county; a representative on behalf of the business community; a representative of the California Building Industry Association; a representative of the California Fire Chiefs Association; and a public member.

Additionally, the bill would require the Commission to report to the Legislature additional actions needed to support home hardening and wildfire mitigation and would require CalOES and CalFIRE to revise the California Wildfire Mitigation Financial Assistance Program (CWMP) according to the standards and home hardening guidelines developed under this bill.

The inclusion of water infrastructure in the bill without recognition of how and for what purpose water systems are designed, as it relates to providing water to aid in firefighting, and the lack of utility representation in developing the required standards, is a cause of concern. As a result, staff has been working with the California Special Districts Association (CSDA) and the Association of California Water Agencies (ACWA) to seek amendments to the bill.

Given staff's involvement with CSDA and ACWA on seeking amendments to SB 616, staff recommends that the Board adopt a "seek amendments" position on the bill, and authorize the District to move to an "oppose unless amended" if discussions with the author regarding amendments are not productive.

Update on Other Bills of Interest to IRWD:

As has traditionally been done after the House of Origin deadline, staff is providing an update on bills the District has taken a position on or has actively monitored during this legislative session. The location of each bill, as of the writing of this report, is noted below. Staff will provide an oral update to the Committee on new developments related to these bills.

AB 52 (Aguiar-Curry, D-Winters) - Native American Resources:

In 2014, then Assemblymember Mike Gatto (D, Glendale) authored AB 52 (Gatto, 2014). AB 52 (Gatto, 2014) mandated consultation with Native American Tribes at various stages of CEQA review, prescribed CEQA processes related to the treatment of tribal cultural resources, and defined mitigation measures which shall be considered by a lead agency if tribal cultural resources will be impacted by a project. Specifically, the bill required a lead agency, prior to determining whether a negative declaration, mitigated negative declaration, or environmental impact report is required for a project, to begin consultation with a California Native American tribe that is traditionally and culturally affiliated with the geographic area of the proposed project, if the tribe requested consultation with the lead agency.

This year, Assemblymember Cecilia Aguiar-Curry (D, Davis) introduced AB 52 (Aguiar-Curry, 2025) which seeks to modify and strengthen the consultation process and requirements enacted in AB 52 (Gatto, 2014). Specifically, this bill would expand the timeline, purposes and definition of consultation for the purposes of the CEQA review process. AB 52 (Aguiar-Curry, 2025) also, among other things, defines the measure that may be taken if a substantial adverse change to a tribal cultural resource would occur due to a project and mitigation measures are not otherwise identified during the tribal consultation process.

AB 52 (Aguiar-Curry, 2025) is currently a two-year bill located in the Assembly Natural Resources Committee. The author decided not to move the bill forward this year to allow time for greater discussions with interested parties. The District has a "seek amendments" position on

the bill and the Board authorized staff to work with the District's associations and industry partners to seek amendments to the bill to ensure it is workable for lead agencies, clearly outlines the consultation requirements, and appropriately protects tribal cultural resources.

AB 259 (Rubio, D-Baldwin Park) - Open Meetings: Local Agencies: Teleconferences:

AB 259 would extend, until January 1, 2030, the provisions of the Brown Act which allowed members of a local agency legislative body to use teleconferencing without identifying each teleconference location in the notice and agenda of the meeting, and without making each teleconference location accessible to the public, if certain conditions are present. These are the teleconferencing provisions enacted during the COVID-19 pandemic to address unexpected situations. The District has a "support" position on AB 259 and is part of a coalition of local agencies and special districts organized by CSDA, which are actively supporting AB 259.

AB 259 is currently in the Senate Local Government Committee, and its hearing was postponed by the Committee on June 27. The provisions of the bill have been incorporated in the Senate Local Government Committee Chair María Elena Durazo (D-Los Angeles)'s bill on the Brown Act, SB 707 (Durazo).

AB 269 (Bennett, D-Oxnard) Dam Safety and Climate Resilience Local Assistance:

AB 269, as introduced by Assemblymember Steve Bennett (D-Oxnard), proposed to add a new category of eligible projects to those eligible for funding under the State's Dam Safety and Climate Resilience Local Assistance Program. The Dam Safety and Climate Resilience Local Assistance Program is the program the District and the Dam Safety Coalition were successful in getting established to fund dam safety improvements. AB 269, in addition to dam safety improvement projects, would have allowed the program to fund dam removal projects.

At the time the Dam Safety and Climate Resilience Local Assistance Program was being created, the inclusion of dam removal projects, as eligible projects, was debated, but that category of projects was left out of the program because there are other funding programs available to fund dam removals projects. Given that AB 269 would divert limited funding away from dam safety improvement projects, the District has an "oppose" position on the bill.

AB 269 was referred to the Assembly Waters, Parks and Wildlife Committee, but never received a hearing. The bill is now a two-year bill.

AB 333 (Alanis) – Textile Articles: Perfluoroalkyl and Polyfluoroalkyl Substances (PFAS):

Existing law prohibits, beginning January 1, 2025, a person from manufacturing, distributing, selling or offering for sale any textile article that contains perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS). AB 333, introduced by Assemblymember Dawn Addis (D-Monterey), would exempt apparel designed for and used by law enforcement from those provisions until January 1, 2028.

The bill was gutted and amended on April 10, 2025. It now deals with the recycling of glass beverage containers.

The District has been watching AB 333, but had not adopted a position on the bill before it was "gutted and amended."

AB 367 (Bennet) - County Water Districts: County of Ventura: Fire Suppression:

AB 367 is authored by Assemblymember Steve Bennet. The bill, as amended, would require water districts in the County of Ventura that supply water to more than 20 residential dwellings, and that supply is used for fire suppression in a high or very high-risk fire hazard severity zone, to:

- Have a backup energy source with sufficient power to operate critical fire suppression infrastructure;
- Identify all fire suppression infrastructure and provide that identified to the Ventura County Office of Emergency Services;
- Have their fire suppression infrastructure and backup emergency sources annually inspected by the Ventura County Fire Department to ensure critical fire suppression infrastructure and backup energy sources located in a high or very high fire hazard zone meets fire safety standards developed by the fire department;
- Establish an emergency preparedness plan for response to red flag warnings, extreme weather events and other major power outages or emergencies that pose a potential threat to providing water services in coordination with the Venture County Office of Emergency Services and the Ventura County Fire Department;
- Notify the Ventura County Office of Emergency Services within three business days of becoming aware that its water delivery capacity has been reduced that could substantially hinder firefighting operations or significantly delay the replenishment of reservoirs; and
- If any fire destroys more than 10 residential dwellings in the water district's service area to develop a report, in collaboration with the fire department, assessing the appropriateness of the water delivery system. The report would be required to be presented to the Ventura County Board of Supervisors by the Ventura County Fire Department at a regularly scheduled board meeting.

While AB 367 is a Ventura County-specific bill, Assemblymember Bennett has stated that he intends to introduce a bill next year that would apply these same provisions to all water providers statewide. Because of the Assemblymember's state intent, the District has a "concerns" position on this bill and the Board authorized staff to work to improve the bill, through the District's associations, to ensure to appropriately balances the need and roles of water systems and firefighting entities. AB 367 is currently in the Senate Appropriations Committee.

AB 514 (Petrie-Norris, D-Irvine) - Emergency Water Supplies:

AB 514, IRWD's sponsored legislation, would have added a policy to the California Water Code to establish a state policy encouraging, but not mandating, the development of emergency water supplies by both local and regional water suppliers and supported their use during droughts or unexpected service or supply disruptions. IRWD led a broad coalition of more than 40 water agencies and associations in support of AB 514; however, the bill was held on the Assembly Appropriations Suspense File in May.

AB 794 (Gabriel, D-Encino) - California Safe Drinking Water Act: Emergency Regulations:

Assemblymember Jesse Gabriel (D-Encino) introduced AB 794. AB 794 would provide the emergency regulatory authority to the State Board to adopt, on or before January 1, 2026, the federal maximum contaminant levels (MCL) in effective as of January 19, 2025. Specifically, the bill requires the State Board to adopt an emergency regulator and initiate a primary drinking water standard for the perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS), on or before December 31, 2026. The District has an "oppose unless amended" position on the bill.

AB 794 is currently in the Assembly inactive file and, having failed the house of orgin deadline, is now a two-year bill.

AB 810 (Irwin, D-Thousand Oaks) - Local Government: Internet Websites and Email Addresses:

Assemblymember Jacqui Irwin (D-Thousand Oaks) introduced AB 810, which would require all local agencies, including all special districts and joint powers authorities that maintain a website or have public email addresses to ensure that both the website and the email addresses use a ".gov" domain name or a ".ca.gov" domain name. This bill would require this to occur by January 1, 2031.

Because the District currently uses IRWD.com and several other web addresses to get information to its customers and interested parties, AB 810 would impact the District's ability to use these sites. As a result, the District has a "seek amendments" position on AB 810 and the Board authorized staff to seek amendments to the bill to make it workable for IRWD's business and communications needs.

The bill was held in the Assembly Appropriations Committee and made a two-year bill.

AB 872 (Rubio, D-Balwin Park) - Environmental Health: Product Safety: Perfluoroalkyl and Polyfluoroalkyl Substances:

AB 872 would prevent the sale and use of products containing PFAS beginning in 2028 unless the use of the PFAS in the product is necessary and there is not a safer alternative available or is required to be used by federal law. AB 872 would also set up a process at the Department of Toxic Substances Control (DTSC) that would allow manufacturers to petition the DTSC to determine whether the presence of PFAS in their product is currently unavoidable use. The bill is sponsored by the industries that use PFAS in their products and the bill is designed to counter

SB 682 by carving out certain products where PFAS is used. Given the United States Environmental Protection Agency's (U.S. EPA) finalized rules on PFAS, the District has an "oppose unless amended" position the bill.

The bill is currently in the Assembly Committee on Environmental Safety and Toxic Materials. It is a two-year bill.

ACR 36 (Carrillo, D-Palmdale) - Special Districts Week:

Again, this year, the CSDA sponsored an Assembly Concurrent Resolution proclaiming Special Districts week. ACR 36, authored by Assemblymember Juan Corrilo (D-Palmdale), was enacted on June 25, 2025, and proclaimed May 18-24, 2025, to be Special Districts Week. As the District has done in previous years, the District has a "support" position on the Assembly Concurrent Resolution.

SB 31 (McNerney, D-Pleasanton) - Water Quality: Recycled Water:

Title 22 is the title in the California Code of Regulations that governs recycled water and its use. That title has not been updated to reflect advancements in treatment and technology. In an effort to further the State's goal of expanding water recycling by at least 800,000 acre-feet of water per year by 2030 and 1.8 million acre-feet per year by 2040, SB 31 seeks advance the expanded use of recycled water by:

- Allowing tertiary treated recycled water to be used in parks that contain outdoor eating areas as long as irrigation complies with State regulations;
- Allowing food handling and processing facilities to use tertiary treated recycled water for toilet and urinal flushing and outdoor landscape irrigation;
- Clarifying the definition of recycled water for the purposes of what is considered an "unauthorized discharge" of wastewater;
- Allowing recycled water to be used to fill decorative bodies of water; and
- Clarifying that outdoor irrigation of common space with recycled water by a homeowners association is allowable as landscape irrigation.

These changes in the Water Code would allow the State Board to modify Title 22, without a full regulatory process, and make these important changes that have been impeding recycled water use in some parts of the state.

SB 31 is authored by Senator Jerry McNerney (D-Pleasanton) and sponsored by WateReuse California. The District has a "support" position on the bill, which is in the Assembly Appropriations Committee.

SB 72 (Caballero, D-Salinas) – The California Water Plan: Long-Term Supply Targets:

SB 72 would require the Department of Water Resources (DWR) to update the California Water Plan, and require DWR to establish an advisory committee to assist the department in updating the plan. More importantly, the bill sets water supply planning targerts that should be incorprated into any updates of the California Water Plan. The bill is currently on the Assembly Approrpations Suspense File. The District has a "support" position on the bill and is part of the "support" coalition being led by CMUA.

SB 350 (Durazo) - Water Rate Assistance Program:

Senator Durazo is the author of SB 350, which was sponsored by Clean Water Action, the Community Water Center, and Leadership Counsel for Justice and Accountability. As amended, SB 350 sought to establish a statewide water rate assistance program at the State Board, and would have required water suppliers to participate in the statewide program and automatically enroll households in the program. Water suppliers would also have to provide qualified low-income residential ratepayers with a bill credit of no less than 20 percent of the total water charges and, if present on the bill, wastewater charges, for the indoor volume of water defined in the "Making Conservation a California Way of Life" laws.

Because SB 350 sought to create a statewide low-income rate assistance program without a funding source and presented some implementation challenges for local water suppliers, the District has an "oppose unless amended" position on the bill. The Board authorized staff to seek amendments that make the bill more workable for water agencies. As staff had reached an agreement with the sponsors on amendments to the bill, the bill was held on the Senate Appropriations Suspense File.

Staff will update the Committee on continuing conversations with the bill's sponsors since it was held on the Suspense File.

SB 394 (Allen, D-Santa Monica)- Water Theft from Fire Hydrants:

SB 395 is authored by Senator Benjamin Allen (D-Santa Monica) and is sponsored by ACWA. The bill, as introduced, would add a new provision to the Water Code addressing water theft from fire hydrants and add express authority for a water supplier to file a civil lawsuit against anyone tampering with fire hydrants, fire hydrant meters, or fire detector checks, as well as diverting water from a fire hydrant without proper authorization. Because IRWD does experience water theft and unauthorized use of its fire hydrant, in addition to tampering with its hydrants, the District has a "support" position on the bill after it was amended to address the District's concerns with its proposed language.

The bill is currently on the Senate Floor awaiting a vote of concurrence in the Assembly amendments made to the bill.

SB 454 (McNerney) - State Water Resources Control Board: PFAS Mitigation Program:

SB 454, introduced by Senator McNerney, would create a statewide PFAS Mitigation Fund intended to help local agencies pay for manmade PFAS contamination cleanup in drinking water and wastewater. The bill is co-sponsored by ACWA and the League of California Cities and is currently on the Assembly Appropriations Suspense File. The District has a "support" position on the bill.

SB 496 (Hurtado, D-Lemoore) – Advanced Clean Fleets Regulation: Appeals Advisory Committee: Exemptions

SB 496 introduced by Senator Melissa Hurtado (Lemoore-D) would have required the California Air Resources Control Board (CARB) to create the Advanced Clean Fleets Regulation Appeals Advisory Committee (Appeals Committee) to review any requests that are denied by CARB for exemption from the Advanced Clean Fleets Regulation (ACF). The Appeals Committee would have included representatives from various government and nonprofit groups and would be required to meet monthly. Additionally, it would have required that the Appeal Committee to make a recommendation on the denied appeal request within 60 days after an appeal is made and CARB to consider the Appeal Committee's recommendation during a public meeting within 60 days after the Appeal Committee's recommendation is made.

More importantly, the bill would have made substantial changes to the existing ACF regulations including changes to the existing daily use exemption criteria and changes to the definition of what vehicles are considered exempt from the ACF due to their status as being able to respond to a disaster.

The bill was sponsored by the California State Association of Counties (CSAC), CSDA, League of California Cities, and the Rural County Representatives of California. In providing greater clarity around the appeals process and certain ACF exemptions, the bill would have assisted the District in complying with the AFC and the District has a "support" position on the bill.

The bill was held on the Senate Appropriations Suspense File earlier this year.

SB 599 (Caballero) – Atmospheric River Extended Forecasting:

The "Atmospheric Rivers Research and Forecast Improvement Program: Enabling Climate Adaptation Through Forecast-Informed Reservoir Operations and Hazard Resiliency (AR/FIRO) Program" currently exists within DWR. Under the program, DWR reoperates flood control and water storage facilities to capture water generated by atmospheric rivers; and researches, develops and implements new observations, prediction models, novel forecasting methods, and tailored decision support systems to improve predictions of atmospheric rivers and their impact on water supply, flooding, post-wildfire debris flows, and environmental conditions.

SB 599, introduced by Senator Anna Caballero, would extend the research DWR is required to undertake to include extended-range atmospheric river forecasting.

The District has a "support" position on SB 599, which is currently on the Assembly Appropriations Suspsense File.

SB 682 (Allen, D-Santa Monica) - Environmental Health: Product Safety: Perfluoroalkyl and Polyfluoroalkyl Substances:

SB 682, introduced by Senator Ben Allen (D-Santa Monica), prohibits, beginning on a specified date, a person from distributing, selling, or offering for sale a covered product that contain intentionally added PFAS, as defined, except for previously used products and as otherwise preempted by federal law.

SB 682, as amended, would prevent the sale of certain products containing intentionally added PFAS. The products covered by the bills prohbitions was cleaning products, cookware, dental floss, juvenile products, food packaging, and ski wax. The District has a "support" position on SB 682, and signed on to the coalition of the California Association of Sanitary Agencies (CASA).

SB 682 is co-sponsored by California Association of Sanitation Agencies, Natural Resources Defense Council, Breast Cancer Prevention Partners, Clean Water Action, and Environmental Working Group. The District has a "support" position on SB 682, which is currently in the Assembly Approprations Committee.

SB 730 (Hurtado) – Consumer Products: PFAS:

SB 730, introduced by Senator Hurtado, would prohibit the sale of consumer products, as defined in the bill, that contain PFAS on and after January 1, 2027. The bill defines consumer products as artificial turf, carpets, rugs, cleaning products, cookware, dental floss, fabric treatments and upholstered furniture. The bill seeks to amend some of the same sections as other PFAS bills and intentionally certain PFAS products. The District has a "watch" position on the bill, which is a two-year bill currently in the Senate Health Committee.

Other 2025 State Legislative Updates:

Staff will also provide an oral update to the Committee on new developments related to the following:

- AB 1146 (Papan, D-San Mateo) Dams and Reservoir Water Releases: False Pretense;
- AB 1337 (Ward, D-San Diego) Information Practices Act of 1977;
- AB 1413 (Papan, D-San Mateo)- Sustainable Groundwater Management Act: Groundwater Adjudication;
- SB 601 (Allen, D-Santa Monica) Waste Discharge Requirements;
- SB 707 (Durazo, D-Los Angeles) Brown Act: Meeting Requirements;
- Housing-related legislation;

- Labor and employment; and
- Other legislative matters of interest to IRWD.

2025 State and Regional Regulatory Update:

WATER SUPPLY ASSESSMENT FOR PLANNING AREA 52 PROJECT

SUMMARY:

In July 2025, staff received a request from the City of Irvine to prepare a Water Supply Assessment (WSA) for the Planning Area 52 (PA 52) Project. Staff prepared the WSA for the proposed project and recommends Board approval.

BACKGROUND:

The proposed PA 52 Project in the City of Irvine is designed for the construction of 3,100 new residential dwelling units, a 1,500 student K-6 school, a seven-acre community park and an 18,000 square feet community park building on approximately 239 acres at the northeast corner of Jeffrey Road and Irvine Center Drive. The project is not included in the existing City of Irvine General Plan. The project site is currently designated for 184 acres of Preservation, 29 acres of Recreation, and 46 acres of Industrial / Medical and Science; therefore a General Plan Amendment will be necessary. A location map of the PA 52 Project is provided as Exhibit "A".

In July, the City of Irvine requested that IRWD prepare a WSA for the PA 52 Project consistent with SB 610 and SB 221 that were passed and signed by the Governor of California in 2001. Both laws went into effect in January 2002. Staff has prepared the WSA as described below.

Water Supply Assessment:

The WSA for the proposed PA 52 Project was prepared based on information from the most recent IRWD Water Resources Master Plan. The WSA concludes that the total water supplies available to IRWD during normal, single-dry, and multiple-dry years within a 20-year projection will meet the projected water demand of the project. Estimates for a normal year in 2045 show an increase in IRWD potable water demands of 420 acre-feet per year (AFY) from 85,095 AF of baseline demand to 85,515 AF with the project. In addition, non-potable demand decreases by 171 AFY in 2045 from 29,239 AF at baseline to 29,068 AF with the project. These demand changes are in addition to the existing and planned future uses including, but not limited to, agricultural and manufacturing. The completed WSA is provided as Exhibit "B".


Exhibit "A" Planning Area 52 - Oak Park Village

Water Supply Assessment Information

Purpose of Assessment

Irvine Ranch Water District ("IRWD") has been identified by the City as a public water system that will supply water service (both potable and nonpotable) to the project identified on the cover page of this assessment (the "Project"). As the public water system, IRWD is required by Section 10910 *et seq.* of the Water Code to provide the City with an assessment of water supply availability ("assessment") for defined types of projects. The Project has been found by the City to be a project requiring an assessment. The City is required to include this assessment in the environmental document for the Project, and based on the record, make a determination whether projected water supplies are sufficient for the Project and existing and planned uses.

Water Code Section 10910 *et seq.* (the "Assessment Law") contains the requirements for the information to be set forth in the assessment.

Prior Water Supply Assessments

IRWD does not allocate particular supplies to any project but identifies total supplies for its service area. Because of IRWD's aggregation of demands and supplies, each assessment completed by IRWD is expected to be generally similar to the most recent assessment, with changes as needed to take into account changes, if any, in demands and supplies, and any updated and corrected information obtained by IRWD. Previously assessed projects' water demands will be included in the baseline. A newly assessed project's water demand will have been included in previous water supply assessments for other projects (as part of IRWD's "full build-out" demand) to the extent of any land use planning or other water demand information for the project that was available to IRWD.

The Project's water demand was included (as part of IRWD's "full build-out" demand) in previous water supply assessments performed by IRWD, based on land use planning information available to IRWD. In this water supply assessment, the Project demand will be revised in accordance with updated information provided by the applicant and included in the "with project" demand.

Supporting Documentation

IRWD's principal planning document is IRWD's "Water Resources Master Plan" ("WRMP"). The WRMP is a comprehensive document compiling data and analyses that IRWD considers necessary for its planning needs. IRWD also prepares an Urban Water Management Plan ("UWMP"), a document required by statute. The UWMP is based on the WRMP, but contains defined elements as listed in the statute (Water Code Section 10631 *et seq.*), and, as a result, is more limited than the WRMP in the treatment of supply and demand issues. Therefore, IRWD primarily relies on its most recent WRMP. The UWMP is required to be updated in years ending with "five" and "zero," and IRWD's most recent update of that document (2020 UWMP) was adopted in June 2021.

In addition to the WRMP and the 2020 UWMP mentioned above, other supporting documentation referenced herein is found in Section 6 of this assessment.

Due to the number of contracts, statutes and other documents comprising IRWD's written proof of entitlement to its water supplies, in lieu of attachment of such items, they are identified by title and summarized in Section 2(b) of this assessment (written contracts/proof of entitlement). Copies of the summarized items can be obtained from IRWD.

Assessment Methodology

Water use factors; dry-year increases. IRWD employs water use factors to enable it to assign water demands to the various land use types and aggregate the demands. The water use factors are based on average water use and incorporate the effect of IRWD's tiered-rate conservation pricing and its other water use efficiency programs. The factors are derived from historical usage (billing data) and a detailed review of water use factors within the IRWD service areas conducted as a part of the WRMP. System losses at a rate of approximately 5% are built into the water use factors. Water demands also reflect normal hydrologic conditions (precipitation). Lower levels of precipitation and higher temperatures will temporarily result in higher water demands, due primarily to the need for additional water for irrigation. To reflect this, base (normal) WRMP water demands have been increased by 7% in the assessment during both "single-dry" and "multiple-dry" years. This increase in estimated demands is considered conservative and is consistent with the Municipal Water District of Orange County's ("MWDOC") 2020 UWMP which assumes increased demands in single-dry and multiple dry years of 6% based on MWDOC's Orange County Reliability Study (MWDOC 2020 UWMP, pg. 7-2). The Metropolitan Water District of Southern California ("MWD") also considers these weather variables in their climate adjustment factors when forecasting demands, as documented in MWD's 2020 UWMP which shows an average increase of 8% for single dry year demands (MWD 2020 UWMP Tables 2-4, 2-5, 2-6) and also documented in their 2020 Integrated Resources Plan - Regional Needs Assessment (2022).

Planning horizon. In accordance with Water Code Section 10910, this assessment reviews demands and supplies covering a 20-year planning horizon. For consistency with IRWD's WRMP, the assessment reviews demands and supplies through the year 2045, which is considered to include build-out or "ultimate development".

Assessment of demands. Water demands are reviewed in this assessment for three development projections (to 2045):

- Existing and committed demand (without the Project) ("baseline"). This provides a baseline condition as of the date of this assessment, consisting of demand from existing development, plus demand from development that has both approved zoning and (if required by the Assessment Law) an adopted water supply assessment.
- Existing and committed demand, plus the Project ("with-project"). This projection adds the Project water demands to the baseline demands.
- <u>Full WRMP build-out ("full build-out")</u>. In addition to the Project, this projection adds potential demands for all presently undeveloped areas of IRWD based on current general plan information, modified by more specific information available to IRWD, as more fully described in Chapter 2 of the WRMP.

Assessment of supplies. For comparison with demands, water supplies are classified as *currently available* or *under development*:

- Currently available supplies include those that are presently operational, and those that will be operational within the next several years. Supplies expected to be operational in the next several years are those having completed or substantially completed the environmental and regulatory review process, as well as having necessary contracts (if any) in place to move forward. These supplies are in various stages of planning, design, or construction.
- In general, supplies under development may necessitate the preparation and completion of environmental documents, regulatory approvals, and/or contracts prior to full construction and implementation.

IRWD is also evaluating the development of additional supplies that are not included in either currently available or under-development supplies for purposes of this assessment. As outlined in the WRMP, prudent water supply and financial planning dictates that development of supplies be phased in over time consistent with the growth in demand.

Water supplies available to IRWD include several sources: groundwater pumped from the Orange County groundwater basin (including the Irvine Subbasin); captured local (native) surface water; recycled sewage; and supplemental imported water supplied by MWD through the MWDOC. The supply-demand comparisons in this assessment are broken down among the various sources and are further separated into potable and nonpotable water sources.

Comparison of demand and supply. The three demand projections noted above (baseline, with-project and full build-out) are compared with supplies in the following ways:

- On a total annual quantity basis (stated in acre-feet per year ("AFY")).
- On a peak-flow (maximum day) basis (stated in cubic feet per second ("cfs")).
- Under three climate conditions: base (normal) conditions and single-dry and multipledry year conditions. (Note: These conditions are compared for *annual* demands and not for peak-flow demands. Peak-flow is a measure of a water delivery system's ability to meet the highest day's demand of the fluctuating demands that will be experienced in a year's time. Peak demands occur during the hot, dry season and as a result are not appreciably changed by dry-year conditions; dry-year conditions do affect annual demand by increasing the quantity of water needed to supplement normal wet-season precipitation.)

Summary of Results of Demand-Supply Comparisons

Listed below are Figures provided in this assessment, comparing projected potable and nonpotable water supplies and demands under the three development projections:

- Figure 1: Normal Year Supply and Demand Potable Water
- Figure 2: Single Dry-Year Supply and Demand Potable Water
- Figure 3: Multiple Dry-Year Supply and Demand Potable Water
- Figure 4: Maximum-Day Supply and Demand Potable Water
- Figure 5: Normal Year Supply and Demand Nonpotable Water
- Figure 6: Single Dry-Year Supply and Demand Nonpotable Water
- Figure 7: Multiple Dry-Year Supply and Demand Nonpotable Water
- Figure 8: Maximum-Day Supply and Demand Nonpotable Water

It can be observed in the Figures that IRWD's *supplies* remain essentially constant between normal, single-dry, and multiple-dry years. This result is due to the fact that groundwater and MWD imported water account for the majority of all of IRWD's potable supply. and recycled water, groundwater and imported water comprise all of IRWD's nonpotable supply. Groundwater production typically remains constant or may increase in cycles of dry years, even if overdraft of the basin temporarily increases, as groundwater producers reduce their demand on imported supplies to secure reliability. (See Section 4 herein.) As to imported water, MWD's 2020 Urban Water Management Plan (MWD 2020 UWMP) concludes that MWD has supply capabilities sufficient to meet expected demands from 2025 through 2045 under a single dry year condition and a period of drought lasting five consecutive water years, as well as in a normal water year hydrologic condition. (See also Section 2(b) (1) "IMPORTED SUPPLY -ADDITIONAL INFORMATION," below.) Recycled water production also remains constant and is considered "drought-proof" as a result of the fact that sewage flows remain virtually unaffected by dry years. Only a small portion of IRWD's supply, native water captured in Irvine Lake, is reduced in single-dry and multiple-dry years. The foregoing factors also serve to explain why there is no difference in IRWD's supplies between single-dry and multiple-dry years.

A review of the Figures indicates the following:

- Currently available supplies of potable water are adequate to meet annual demands for the baseline, with-project and full build-out scenarios projected under the normal year, and the single- and multiple-dry year conditions through the year 2045. (Figures 1, 2 and 3.) IRWD plans to proceed with the implementation of future potable supplies (under development), as shown in the Figures, to improve local reliability during dry-year conditions.
- Adequate *currently available* potable water supply capacity is available to meet *peak-flow* (maximum day) demands for all demand projections through the year 2045. (Figure 4.)
- With respect to nonpotable water, *currently available* supplies are adequate to meet projected annual demands for both the *baseline* and *with-project* demand projections under both dry-year conditions through the year 2045. (Figures 5, 6, 7 and 8.) IRWD has implemented all planned nonpotable supplies, as shown in the Figures, to improve local reliability during dry-year conditions.

The foregoing Figures provide an overview of IRWD potable and nonpotable water supply capabilities. More detailed information on the anticipated development and use of supplies, which incorporates source costs and reliability issues, is provided in the WRMP.

Margins of safety. The Figures and other information described in this assessment show that IRWD's assessment of supply availability contains several margins of safety or buffers:

- "Reserve" water supplies (excess of supplies over demands) will be available to serve as a buffer against inaccuracies in demand projections, future changes in land use, or alterations in supply availability.
- Conservative estimates of annual potable and nonpotable *imported* supplies have been made based on connected delivery capacity (by application of peaking factors as

described below in Section 2, footnote 1); additional supplies are expected to be available from these sources, based on legal entitlements, historical uses and information provided by MWD. In addition to MWD's existing regional supply assessments, this assessment has considered MWD information concerning operational limits on Delta pumping. See "Actions on Delta Pumping," below.

- Information provided by MWD, as the imported water supplier, concerning the adequacy of its regional supplies, summarized herein, demonstrates MWD's inclusion of reserves in its regional supply assessments. In addition to MWD's existing regional supply assessments, this assessment has considered MWD's information concerning operational limits on Delta pumping. See "Actions on Delta Pumping," below.
- Although groundwater supply amounts shown in this assessment assume production levels within applicable basin production percentages described herein, production of groundwater can exceed applicable basin production percentages on a short-term basis, which can provide additional reliability during dry years or emergencies. See "IRWD's Evaluation of Effect of Reduced MWD Supplies to IRWD," below.

Actions on Delta Pumping. The Sacramento/San Joaquin Delta ("Delta") is a vulnerable component in both the State and Federal systems to convey water from northern portions of California to areas south of the Delta. Issues associated with the Delta have generally been known for years; however, the continuing decline in the number of endangered Delta smelt resulted in the filing of litigation challenging permits for the operation of the Delta pumping facilities. On August 31, 2007, a Federal court ordered interim protective measures for the endangered Delta smelt, including operational limits on Delta pumping, which have an effect on State Water Project ("SWP") operations and supplies. On June 4, 2009, a federal biological opinion imposed rules that further restrict water diversions from the Delta to protect endangered salmon and other endangered fish species. Several proceedings concerning Delta operations were initiated to evaluate options to address Delta smelt impacts and other environmental concerns. In addition to the regulatory and judicial proceedings to address immediate environmental concerns, the Delta Vision process and Bay-Delta Conservation Plan ("BDCP") process were established to identify long-term solutions for the Delta. In addition, State and federal agencies and water user entities are currently engaged in the development of the Delta Conveyance Project (previously California WaterFix), which is aimed at making physical and operational improvements in the Delta necessary to improve south of the Delta SWP water supplies and water quality and protect ecosystem health in the Delta (MWD 2020 UWMP). Prior to the 2007 court decision, MWD's Board approved a Delta Action Plan in May 2007, that described short, mid and long-term conditions and the actions to mitigate potential supply shortages and to develop and implement long-term solutions. To address uncertainties in expected SWP supplies, in October 2007, MWD prepared its 2007 Integrated Resources Plan ("IRP") Implementation Report, in which MWD estimated that it could see as much as up to a 22% reduction on average of its SWP supplies based on the court order. As part of its ongoing long term planning, in its 2010 IRP Update, MWD identified changes to the long-term plan and established direction to address the range of potential changes in water supply planning. The 2010 IRP also discusses dealing with uncertainties related to impacts of climate change (see additional discussion of this below), as well as actions to protect endangered fisheries. The 2010 IRP Update emphasizes an evolving approach and suite of actions to address the water supply challenges that are posed by uncertain weather patterns, regulatory and environmental restrictions, water quality impacts and changes in the state and the region. The 2010 IRP Update includes MWD's Adaptive Resource Management Strategy three components: Core Resources Strategy, Supply Buffer Implementation and Foundational Actions, which together

provides the basis for the 2010 IRP Update. The 2010 IRP Update expands the concept of developing a planning buffer from the 2004 IRP Update by implementing a supply buffer equal to 10 percent of the total retail demand.

In January 2016, MWD adopted its 2015 IRP Update. In the 2015 IRP Update, MWD continued its Adaptive Resource Management Strategy and integrated future supply actions to improve the viability of potential contingency resources as needed, and to position the region to effectively implement these resources in a timely manner. The 2015 IRP finds that additional actions are needed in investments in conservation, local supplies, the Delta Conveyance Project (previously California WaterFix), and stabilizing Colorado River supplies. Among the supply actions, MWD will continue to work collaboratively with state and federal agencies on the California WaterFix, maximize its storage and transfer approach, and continue to develop and protect local supplies and conservation.

MWD is currently developing its 2020 IRP Update and has completed and adopted a 2020 IRP Regional Needs Assessment which is considered Phase 1 of the 2020 IRP. A One Water Implementation phase will be Phase 2 of the 2020 IRP. The One Water Implementation will take the results and findings of Phase 1 to identify integrated regional solutions. It will include an updated Adaptive Management Strategy, policies, programs and projects to address the findings and mitigate any potential shortages.

IRWD's Evaluation of Effect of Reduced MWD Supplies to IRWD: In the MWD 2020 UWMP, MWD states it has supply capability that would be sufficient to meet expected demands from 2025 to 2045 under single dry year and multiple dry year conditions. ¹

Based on the prior MWD 2007 IRP Implementation Report and also reported in the MWD 2015 IRP, MWD estimated that it could receive reduction of SWP supplies of up to 22% on average until a long-term solution was implemented. For purposes of ensuring a conservative analysis, IRWD made an evaluation of the effect of the 22% estimated reduction of MWD's SWP supplies on its overall imported supplies. IRWD estimates that 22% reduction of SWP supplies conservatively translates to approximately 16% reduction in all of MWD's imported supplies over the years 2025 through 2045. For this purpose, it is assumed that MWD's total supplies consist only of imported SWP and Colorado deliveries. Based on this estimate, this assessment uses a 16% reduction in MWD supplies available to IRWD for the years 2025 through 2045, using IRWD's connected capacity without any water supply allocation imposed by MWD. This reduction in MWD supplies is reflected in Figures 1, 2, 3, 5, 6, and 7. (See also the footnote 1).

Per the MWD 2020 UWMP, MWD performs water shortage planning in its Water Surplus and Drought Management ("WSDM") Plan (1988) which guides MWD's planning and operations during both shortage and surplus conditions. Furthermore, MWD developed the Water Supply Allocation Plan ("WSAP") (dated February 2009, updated December 2014) which provides standardized methodology for allocation of MWD's supplies during times of shortage. The WSDM Plan distinguishes between shortages, severe shortages, and extreme shortages.

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¹ The MWD 2020 UWMP utilized DWR's 2019 SWP Delivery Capability Report to estimate future SWP supplies for 2025 through 2045. These estimates incorporate the effect of regulatory requirements in accordance with biological opinions and also reflect potential impacts of climate change on SWP operations. Tables A.3-7 of the MWD 2020 UWMP reflect 58% or 1.1 MAF in MWD's expected average year SWP entitlement supplies. This amount is a higher expected average than MWD's 2015 estimate of 984,000 AF. For purposes of a conservative analysis, IRWD has used the 22% reduction in its supplies from MWD as the basis of IRWD's analysis.

These terms have specific meanings relating to MWD's ability to deliver water and the actions it takes. In June 2008, MWD's Board adopted a Water Supply Condition Framework to communicate the urgency of the region's water supply situation and the need for further water conservation to reduce regional demands, MWD uses the WSDM Plan and Framework to determine if a WSAP is recommended.

As an alternative means of analyzing the effect of reduced MWD supplies on IRWD, listed below are Figures provided comparing projected potable water supplies and demands in all of the five year increments, under a temporary MWD allocation scenario:

Figure 1a: Normal Year Supply and Demand (MWD Allocated) – Potable Water Figure 2a: Single Dry-Year Supply and Demand (MWD Allocated) – Potable Water Figure 3a: Multiple Dry-Year Supply and Demand (MWD Allocated) – Potable Water

Figures 1a, 2a, and 3a show IRWD's estimated supplies (average and single and multiple dry years) under a short-term MWD water supply allocation scenario whereby MWD declares a shortage stage under its WSAP, and a cutback is applied to IRWD's actual usage rather than its connected capacity. IRWD's evaluation of reduced MWD supplies to IRWD as shown in Figures 1a, 2a and 3a conservatively analyzes the effect of up to a MWD level 5 Regional Shortage Level. In addition, these Figures do not reflect a reduction in demands, thus representing a more conservative view of IRWD's supply capability. (see "Recent Actions Related to Drought Conditions" below)

On April 14, 2015, MWD approved the implementation of its WSAP at a level 3 Regional Shortage Level and an effective 15% reduction in regional deliveries effective July 1, 2015, through June 30, 2016. As a result of IRWD's diversified water supplies, IRWD is reliant on MWD for only 20% of its total supplies. IRWD's evaluation of reduced MWD supplies to IRWD as shown in Figures 1a, 2a and 3a includes MWD's 2015 actions to implement a level 3 Regional Shortage Level and 15% reduction.

Under shortage scenarios, IRWD may need to supplement supplies with production of groundwater, which can exceed the applicable basin production percentage on a short-term basis, providing additional reliability during dry years or emergencies.²

² In these scenarios, it is anticipated that other water suppliers who produce water from the Orange County Basin will

providing water in storage for at least 2 or 3 consecutive years of drought." MWD replenishment water is a supplemental source of recharge water and OCWD estimates other main supply sources for recharge are available.

target level provides sufficient storage space to accommodate anticipated recharge from a single wet year while also

also experience cutbacks of imported supplies and will increase groundwater production and that Orange County Water District ("OCWD") imported replenishment water may also be cutback. The OCWD's "2021-2022 Engineer's Report on the Groundwater Conditions, Water Supply and Basin Utilization" references a report (OCWD Report on Evaluation of Orange County Groundwater Basin Storage and Operational Strategy, 2007) which recommends a basin management strategy that provides general guidelines for annual basin refill or storage decrease based on the level of accumulated overdraft. It states: "Although it is considered to be generally acceptable to allow the basin to decline to 500,000 AF overdraft for brief periods due to severe drought conditions and lack of supplemental water...an accumulated overdraft of 100,000 AF best represents an optimal basin management target. This optimal

In addition, IRWD has developed water banking projects in Kern County, California which may be called upon for delivery of supplemental banked water to IRWD under a MWD WSAP.³ IRWD may also convert non-potable water uses to recycled water as a way to conserve potable water. In addition, if needed, resultant net shortage levels can be addressed by demand reduction programs as described in IRWD's updated Water Shortage Contingency Plan adopted in 2021. IRWD's Water Shortage Contingency Plan provides procedures for responding to various levels of supply shortages through a combination of supply augmentation and demand management measures. As stated in IRWD's Water Shortage Contingency Plan, use of local supplies, storage and other supply augmentation measures can mitigate shortages, and are used as necessary and appropriate during declared shortage levels.

It can be noted that IRWD's above approach is conservative, in that IRWD evaluates the effect of the 16% reduction through 2045 and shows the effect of current allocation scenarios in all of the five-year increments. However, MWD reports that it has made significant progress in other water resource categories such as transfers, groundwater storage and developing other local resources, and supplies will be available from these resources over the long-term.

Climate Change. The California Department of Water Resources ("DWR") released a report "Progress on Incorporating Climate Change into Management of California's Water Resources" (July 2006), considering the impacts of climate change on the State's water supply. In 2012, DWR adopted phase 1 of its Climate Action Plan, its department-wide plan for reducing greenhouse gas emissions (GHG). In September 2018, the DWR released phase 2 of its Climate Action Plan, which is DWR's guide to addressing climate change in the programs, projects, and activities over which it has authority. Per this guidance, California's climate policy focuses on reducing GHG emissions, preparing for climate change impacts, and supporting climate-related research to inform policy responses and decision-making processes.

In MWD's 2015 IRP Update, MWD recognizes there is additional risk and uncertainty associated with climate change that may affect future supply and demands. In the 2015 IRP Update, MWD states that it plans to hedge against supply and demand uncertainties by implementing a long-term plan that recognizes the risk and provides resource development to offset the risk. Per the MWD 2020 UWMP, for longer term risks, like climate change, MWD established a Robust Decision Making ("RDM") approach that can show how vulnerable the region's reliability is to the longer-term risks such as climate change and can also establish "signposts" that can be monitored to see when crucial changes may be happening. MWD states in its 2020 UWMP that the RDM analysis was valuable in identifying vulnerabilities to its 2015 IRP approach to long-term reliability and in understanding how climate change would best be incorporated into the 2020 IRP.

Per the MWD 2020 UWMP, MWD continues to incorporate current climate change science into its planning efforts and MWD has made great efforts to implement GHG mitigation programs and policies for its facilities and operations. In 2022, MWD released a Climate Action Plan which complements MWD's IRP planning process and set reduction targets and outlined strategies to reduce emission levels by 2045. In MWD's 2020 IRP Regional Needs Assessment, MWD finds that SWP supplies are highly susceptible to varying hydrologic conditions, climate change, and regulatory restrictions. In this report, MWD assesses climate

³ IRWD has developed water banking projects ("Water Bank") in Kern County, California and has entered into a 30-year water banking partnership with Rosedale-Rio Bravo Water Storage District to operate IRWD's Strand Ranch and Stockdale West portions of the Water Bank. The Water Bank can improve IRWD's water supply reliability by capturing lower cost water available during wet hydrologic periods for use during dry periods. The Water Bank can enhance IRWD's ability to respond to drought conditions and potential water supply interruptions.

vulnerabilities and the need for future projects such as indirect potable reuse, stormwater capture, and expanded storage capacity to mitigate and adapt to these vulnerabilities and ensure future resilience. Specific climate change impacts on regional and local water supplies and relevant information for the Orange County hydrologic basin and Santa Ana Watershed have not been sufficiently developed at this time to permit IRWD to assess and quantify the effect of any such impact on its conclusions in the Assessment.

Catastrophic Supply Interruption Planning. MWD has developed Emergency Storage Requirements (MWD 2020 UWMP) to safeguard the region from catastrophic loss of water supply. MWD has made substantial investments in emergency storage and has based its planning on a 100% reduction in its supplies for a period of six months. The emergency plan outlines that under such a catastrophe, non-firm service deliveries would be suspended, and firm supplies would be restricted by a mandatory cutback of 25 percent from normal year demand deliveries. In addition, MWD discusses DWR's investments in improvements on the SWP and the long term Delta plan in the MWD 2020 UWMP (pages 3-19 to 3-23). IRWD has also addressed supply interruption planning in its WRMP and 2020 UWMP.

Recent Actions Related to Drought Conditions. In response to historically dry conditions throughout the state of California, on April 1, 2015, Governor Brown issued an Executive Order directing the State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB) to impose restrictions to achieve an aggregate statewide 25 percent reduction in potable water use through February 2016. The Governor's Order also included mandatory actions aimed at reducing water demands, with a particular focus on outdoor water use. On May 5, 2015, the SWRCB adopted regulations which required that IRWD achieve a 16% reduction in potable water use from its 2013 potable water use levels. On November 13, 2015, Governor Brown issued an Executive Order directing the SWRCB to extend the 2015 Emergency Regulation through October 31, 2016, if drought conditions continued. On February 2, 2016, the SWRCB adopted an extended and modified Emergency Regulation. As a result of the modification, IRWD's mandated reduction was changed from 16% to 9% effective March 1, 2016. On April 14, 2015, MWD approved actions to implement its WSAP at a level 3 Regional Shortage Level and a 15% reduction in regional deliveries effective July 1, 2015, through June 30, 2016. During this period, IRWD continued to implement actions to reduce potable water demands during the drought; however, this did not affect IRWD's long-term supply capability to meet the demands. On April 7, 2017, Governor Brown rescinded the Executive Order.

In California's most recent drought (2021-2023), in July 2021, Governor Newsom called for voluntary 15 percent reduction in potable water use from all urban suppliers. Consistent with the Governor's Executive Order, IRWD implemented Level 2 of its Water Shortage Contingency Plan, although IRWD had no projected shortages in supplies. In March 2023, Governor Newsom rescinded the Executive Order.




Figure 2 IRWD Single Dry-Year Supply & Demand - Potable Water

As discussed under "IRWD's Evaluation of Effect of Reduced MWD Supplies to IRWD" (see above), IRWD has effectively analyzed an imported water supply reduction up to a level 5 Regional Shortage Stage in Figures 1a, 2a, 3a. These Figures, however, do not reflect a reduction in demands, thus representing a more conservative view of IRWD's supply capability. In particular, the reduction in demand mandated by Senate Bill 7 in 2010, requiring urban retail water suppliers to establish water use targets to achieve a 20% reduction in daily per capita water use by 2020, has not been factored into the demands in this analysis. Similarly, notwithstanding the Governors' 2015 and 2021 orders, IRWD's conservative supply-sufficiency analysis in Figures 1a, 2a and 3a does not include the ordered reduction in potable demands.

Detailed Assessment

1. Supply and demand comparison

Comparisons of IRWD's average annual and peak (maximum day) demands and supplies, under *baseline* (existing and committed demand, without the Project), *with-project* (baseline plus Project), and *full build-out* development projections, are shown in the following Figures 1-4 (potable water), Figures 5-8 (nonpotable water) and Figures 1a, 2a, and 3a (short term MWD allocation potable water). See also the "Actions on Delta Pumping" above.

IRWD Normal-Year Supply & Demand - Potable Water







IRWD Normal-Year Supply & Demand - Nonpotable Water



IRWD Single Dry-Year Supply & Demand - Nonpotable Water



IRWD Multiple Dry-Year Supply & Demand - Nonpotable Water




Figure 8 IRWD Maximum-Dry Supply & Demand - Nonpotable Water

Under Temporary MWD Allocation*





2. Information concerning supplies

(a)(1) Existing sources of identified water supply for the proposed Project.

IRWD does not allocate particular supplies to any project, but identifies total supplies for its service area, as described below.

- (b) Required information concerning currently available and under-development water supply entitlements, water rights and water service contracts:
 - (1) Written contracts or other proof of entitlement.⁴ ⁵

•POTABLE SUPPLY - IMPORTED⁶

Potable imported water service connections (currently available).

(i) Potable imported water is delivered to IRWD at various service connections to the imported water delivery system of The Metropolitan Water District of Southern California ("MWD"): service connections CM-01A and OC-7 (Orange County Feeder); CM-10, CM-12, OC-38, OC-39, OC-57, OC-58, OC-63 (East Orange County Feeder No. 2); and OC-68, OC-71, OC-72, OC-73/73A, OC-74, OC-75, OC-83, OC-84, OC-87 (Allen-McColloch Pipeline). IRWD's entitlements regarding service from the MWD delivery system facilities are described in the following paragraphs and summarized in the above Table ((2)(a)(1)). IRWD receives imported water service through Municipal Water District of Orange County ("MWDOC"), a member agency of MWD.

Allen-McColloch Pipeline ("AMP") (currently available).

(ii) Agreement For Sale and Purchase of Allen-McColloch Pipeline, dated as of July 1, 1994 (Metropolitan Water District Agreement No. 4623) ("AMP Sale Agreement"). Under the AMP Sale Agreement, MWD purchased the Allen-McColloch Pipeline (formerly known as the "Diemer Intertie") from MWDOC, the MWDOC Water Facilities Corporation and certain agencies, including IRWD and

In some instances, the contractual and other legal entitlements referred to in the following descriptions are stated in terms of flow capacities, in cubic feet per second (cfs). In such instances, the cfs flows are converted to volumes of AFY for purposes of analyzing supply sufficiency in this assessment, by dividing the capacity by a peaking factor of 1.8 (potable) or 2.5 (nonpotable), consistent with maximum day peaking factors used in the WRMP. The resulting reduction in assumed available annual AFY volumes through the application of these factors recognizes that connected capacity is provided to meet peak demands and that seasonal variation in demand and limitations in local storage prevent these capacities from being utilized at peak capacity on a year-round basis. However, the application of these factors produces a conservatively low estimate of annual AFY volumes from these connections; additional volumes of water are expected to be available from these sources.

In the following discussion, contractual and other legal entitlements are characterized as either potable or nonpotable, according to the characterization of the source of supply. Some of the nonpotable supplies surplus to nonpotable demand could potentially be rendered potable by the addition of treatment facilities; however, except where otherwise noted, IRWD has no current plans to do so.

See Imported Supply - Additional Information, below, concerning the availability of the MWD supply.

Los Alisos Water District ("LAWD"), ⁷ identified as "Participants" therein. Section 5.02 of the AMP Sale Agreement obligates MWD to meet IRWD's and the other Participants' requests for deliveries and specified minimum hydraulic grade lines at each connection serving a Participant, subject to availability of water. MWD agrees to operate the AMP as any other MWD pipeline. MWD has the right to operate the AMP on a "utility basis," meaning that MWD need not observe capacity allocations of the Participants but may use available capacity to meet demand at any service connection.

The AMP Sale Agreement obligates MWD to monitor and project AMP demands and to construct specified pump facilities or make other provision for augmenting MWD's capacity along the AMP, at MWD's expense, should that be necessary to meet demands of all of the Participants (Section 5.08).

(iii) Agreement For Allocation of Proceeds of Sale of Allen-McColloch Pipeline. dated as of July 1, 1994 ("AMP Allocation Agreement"). This agreement, entered into concurrently with the AMP Sale Agreement, provided each Participant, including IRWD, with a capacity allocation in the AMP, for the purpose of allocating the sale proceeds among the Participants in accordance with their prior contractual capacities adjusted to conform to their respective future demands. IRWD's capacity under the AMP Allocation Agreement (including its capacity as legal successor agency to LAWD) is 64.69 cfs at IRWD's first four AMP connections, 49.69 cfs at IRWD's next five downstream AMP connections and 35.01 and 10.00 cfs, respectively at IRWD's remaining two downstream connections. The AMP Allocation Agreement further provides that if a Participant's peak flow exceeds its capacity, the Participant shall "purchase" additional capacity from the other Participants who are using less than their capacity, until such time as MWD augments the capacity of the AMP. The foregoing notwithstanding, as mentioned in the preceding paragraph, the allocated capacities do not alter MWD's obligation under the AMP Sale Agreement to meet all Participants' demands along the AMP, and to augment the capacity of the AMP if necessary. Accordingly, under these agreements, IRWD can legally increase its use of the AMP beyond the above-stated capacities but would be required to reimburse other Participants from a portion of the proceeds IRWD received from the sale of the AMP.

(iv) Improvement Subleases (or "FAP" Subleases) [MWDOC and LAWD; MWDOC and IRWD], dated August 1, 1989; 1996 Amended and Restated Allen-McColloch Pipeline Subleases [MWDOC and LAWD; MWDOC and IRWD], dated March 1, 1996. IRWD subleases its AMP capacity, including the capacity it acquired as successor to LAWD. To facilitate bond financing for the construction of the AMP, it was provided that the MWDOC Water Facilities Corporation, and subsequently MWDOC, would have ownership of the pipeline, and the Participants would be sublessees. As is the case with the AMP Sale Agreement, the subleases similarly provide that water is subject to availability.

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⁷ IRWD has succeeded to LAWD's interests in the AMP and other LAWD water supply facilities and rights mentioned in this assessment, by virtue of the consolidation of IRWD and LAWD on December 31, 2000.

East Orange County Feeder No. 2 ("EOCF#2") (currently available).

(v) Agreement For Joint Exercise of Powers For Construction, Operation and Maintenance of East Orange County Feeder No. 2, dated July 11, 1961, as amended on July 25, 1962, and April 26, 1965; Agreement Re Capacity Rights In Proposed Water Line, dated September 11, 1961 ("IRWD MWDOC Assignment Agreement"); Agreement Regarding Capacity Rights In the East Orange County Feeder No. 2, dated August 28, 2000 ("IRWD Coastal Assignment Agreement"). East Orange County Feeder No. 2 ("EOCF#2"), a feeder linking Orange County with MWD's feeder system, was constructed pursuant to a joint powers agreement among MWDOC (then called Orange County Municipal Water District), MWD, Coastal Municipal Water District ("Coastal"), Anaheim and Santa Ana. A portion of IRWD's territory is within MWDOC and the remainder is within the former Coastal (which was consolidated with MWDOC in 2001). Under the IRWD MWDOC Assignment Agreement, MWDOC assigned 41 cfs of capacity to IRWD in the reaches of EOCF#2 upstream of the point known as Coastal Junction (reaches 1 through 3), and 27 cfs in reach 4, downstream of Coastal Junction. Similarly, under the IRWD Coastal Assignment Agreement, prior to Coastal's consolidation with MWDOC, Coastal assigned to IRWD 0.4 cfs of capacity in reaches 1 through 3 and 0.6 cfs in reach 4 of EOCF#2. Delivery of water through EOCF#2 is subject to the rules and regulations of MWD and MWDOC and is further subject to application and agreement of IRWD respecting turnouts.

Orange County Feeder (currently available)

(vi) Agreement, dated March 13, 1956. This 1956 Agreement between MWDOC's predecessor district and the Santa Ana Heights Water Company ("SAHWC") provides for delivery of MWD imported supply to the former SAHWC service area. SAHWC's interests were acquired on behalf of IRWD through a stock purchase and IRWD annexation of the SAHWC service area in 1997. The supply is delivered through a connection to MWD's Orange County Feeder designated as OC-7.

(vii) Agreement For Transfer of Interest In Pacific Coast Highway Water Transmission and Storage Facilities From The Irvine Company To the Irvine Ranch Water District, dated April 23, 1984; Joint Powers Agreement For the Construction, Operation and Maintenance of Sections 1a, 1b and 2 of the Coast Supply Line, dated June 9, 1989; Agreement, dated January 13, 1955 ("1955 Agreement"). The jointly constructed facility known as the Coast Supply Line ("CSL"), extending southward from a connection with MWD's Orange County Feeder at Fernleaf Street in Newport Beach, was originally constructed pursuant to a 1952 agreement among Laguna Beach County Water District ("LBCWD"), The Irvine Company (TIC) and South Coast County Water District. Portions were later reconstructed. Under the above-referenced transfer agreement in 1984, IRWD succeeded to TIC's interests in the CSL. The CSL is presently operated under the above-referenced 1989 joint powers agreement, which reflects IRWD's ownership of 10 cfs of capacity. The 1989 agreement obligates LBCWD, as the managing agent and trustee for the CSL, to purchase water and deliver it into the CSL for IRWD. LBCWD purchases such supply, delivered by MWD to the Fernleaf connection, pursuant to the 1955 Agreement with Coastal (now

MWDOC).

Baker Water Treatment Plant (currently available)

IRWD recently constructed the Baker Water Treatment Plant (Baker WTP) in partnership with El Toro Water District, Moulton-Niguel Water District, Santa Margarita Water District and Trabuco Canyon Water District. The Baker WTP is supplied with untreated imported water from MWD and native Irvine Lake water supply. IRWD owns 10.5 cfs of treatment capacity rights in the Baker WTP.8

•POTABLE SUPPLY - GROUNDWATER

(i) Orange County Water District Act ("OCWD"), Water Code App., Ch. 40 ("Act"). IRWD is an operator of groundwater-producing facilities in the Orange County Groundwater Basin (the "Basin"). Although the rights of the producers within the Basin vis a vis one another have not been adjudicated, they nevertheless exist and have not been abrogated by the Act (§40-77). The rights consist of municipal appropriators' rights and may include overlying and riparian rights. The Basin is managed by OCWD under the Act, which functions as a statutorily-imposed physical solution. The Act empowers OCWD to impose replenishment assessments and basin equity assessments on production and to require registration of water-producing facilities and the filing of certain reports; however, OCWD is expressly prohibited from limiting extraction unless a producer agrees to such limitation (§ 40-2(6) (c)) and from impairing vested rights to the use of water (§ 40-77). Thus, producers may install and operate production facilities under the Act; OCWD approval is not required. OCWD is required to annually investigate the condition of the Basin, assess overdraft and accumulated overdraft, and determine the amount of water necessary for replenishment (§40-26). OCWD has studied the Basin replenishment needs and potential projects to address growth in demand through 2035 in its Final Draft Long-Term Facilities Plan (January 2006), last updated November 19, 2014. The Long-Term Facilities Plan is updated approximately every five years.

(ii) Irvine Ranch Water District v. Orange County Water District, Orange County Superior Court Case No. 795827. A portion of IRWD is outside the jurisdictional boundary of OCWD. IRWD is eligible to annex the Santa Ana River Watershed portion of this territory to OCWD, under OCWD's current annexation policy (OCWD Resolution No. 86-2-15, adopted on February 19, 1986, and reaffirmed on June 2, 1999). This September 29, 1998, Superior Court ruling indicates that IRWD is entitled to deliver groundwater from the Basin to the IRWD service area irrespective of whether such area is also within OCWD.

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⁸ The Baker WTP is supplied nonpotable imported water through the existing Baker Pipeline. IRWD's existing Baker Pipeline capacity (see Section 2(b)(1) NONPOTABLE SUPPLY – IMPORTED) has been apportioned to the Baker WTP participants based on Baker WTP capacity ownership, and IRWD retains 10.5 cfs of pipeline capacity through the Baker WTP for potable supply and retains 36 cfs in Reach 1U of the Baker Pipeline capacity for nonpotable supply. In 2023, IRWD executed an agreement that sells 3 cfs to South County agencies, leaving 7.5 cfs for daily use for IRWD. However, should an emergency arise, IRWD retains the right to the use of the 3 cfs sold.

Dyer Road Wellfield ("DWRF") / Deep Aquifer Treatment System ("DATS") (currently available)

(iii) Agreement For Water Production and Transmission Facilities, dated March 18, 1981, as amended May 2, 1984, September 19, 1990, and November 3, 1999 (the "DRWF Agreement"). The DRWF Agreement, among IRWD, OCWD and Santa Ana, concerns the development of IRWD's Dyer Road Wellfield (DRWF), within the Basin. The DRWF consists of 16 wells pumping from the non-colored water zone of the Basin and 2 wells (with colored-water treatment facilities) pumping from the deep, colored-water zone of the Basin (the coloredwater portion of the DRWF is sometimes referred to as the Deep Aguifer Treatment System or DATS.) Under the DRWF Agreement, an "equivalent" basin production percentage ("BPP") has been established for the DRWF, currently 28,000 AFY of non-colored water and 8,000 AFY of colored water, provided any amount of the latter 8,000 AFY not produced results in a matching reduction of the 28,000 AFY BPP. Although typically IRWD production from the DRWF does not materially exceed the equivalent BPP, the equivalent BPP is not an extraction limitation; it results in imposition of monetary assessments on the excess production. The DRWF Agreement also establishes monthly pumping amounts for the DRWF. With the addition of the Concentrated Treatment System ("CATS"), IRWD has increased the yield of DATS.

Irvine Subbasin / Irvine Desalter (currently available)

(iv) First Amended and Restated Agreement, dated March 11, 2002, as amended June 15, 2006, restating May 5, 1988 agreement ("Irvine Subbasin Agreement"). TIC has historically pumped agricultural water from the Irvine Subbasin. (As in the rest of the Basin of which this subbasin is a part, the groundwater rights have not been adjudicated and OCWD provides governance and management under the Act.) The 1988 agreement between IRWD and TIC provided for the joint use and management of the Irvine Subbasin. The 1988 agreement further provided that the 13,000 AFY annual yield of the Irvine Subbasin ("Subbasin") would be allocated 1,000 AFY to IRWD and 12,000 AFY to TIC. Under the restated Irvine Subbasin Agreement, the foregoing allocations were superseded as a result of TIC's commencement of the building its Northern Sphere Area project, with the effect that the Subbasin production capability, wells and other facilities, and associated rights have been transferred from TIC to IRWD, and IRWD has assumed the production from the Subbasin. In consideration of the transfer, IRWD is required to count the supplies attributable to the transferred Subbasin production in calculating available supplies for the Northern Sphere Area project and other TIC development and has agreed that they will not be counted toward non-TIC development.

A portion of the existing Subbasin water production facilities produce water which is of potable quality. IRWD could treat some of the water produced from the Subbasin for potable use, by means of the Desalter and other projects. Although, as noted above, the Subbasin has not been adjudicated and is managed by OCWD, TIC reserved water rights from conveyances of its lands as development over the Subbasin has occurred, and under the Irvine Subbasin Agreement TIC has transferred its rights to IRWD.

(v) Second Amended and Restated Agreement Between Orange County Water District and Irvine Ranch Water District Regarding the Irvine Desalter Project, dated June 11, 2001, and other agreements referenced therein. This agreement provides for the extraction and treatment of subpotable groundwater from the Irvine Subbasin, a portion of the Basin. As is the case with the remainder of the Basin, IRWD's entitlement to extract this water is not adjudicated, but the use of the entitlement is governed by the OCWD Act. (See also, discussion of Irvine Subbasin in the preceding paragraph.) A portion of the product water has been delivered into the IRWD potable system, and the remainder has been delivered into the IRWD nonpotable system.

Orange Park Acres (currently available)

On June 1, 2008, through annexation and merger, IRWD acquired the water system of the former Orange Park Acres Mutual Water company, including its well ("OPA Well"). The well is operated within the Basin.

Wells 21 and 22 (currently available)

In early 2013, IRWD completed construction of treatment facilities, pipelines, and wellhead facilities for Wells 21 and 22. Water supplied through this project became available in 2013. The wells are operated within the Basin.

Irvine Wells (under development)

(vi) IRWD is pursuing the installation of production facilities in the west Irvine, Tustin Legacy and Tustin Ranch portions of the Basin. These groundwater supplies are considered to be under development; however, four wells have been drilled and have previously produced groundwater, three wells have been drilled but have not been used as production wells to date, and a site for an additional well and treatment facility has been acquired by IRWD. These production facilities can be constructed and operated under the Act; no statutory or contractual approval is required to do so. Appropriate environmental review has or will be conducted for each facility. See discussion of the Act under Potable Supply - Groundwater, paragraph (i), above.

•NONPOTABLE SUPPLY - RECYCLED

Water Recycling Plants (currently available)

Water Code Section 1210. IRWD supplies its own recycled water from sewage collected by IRWD and delivered to IRWD's Michelson Water Recycling Plant ("MWRP") and Los Alisos Water Recycling Plant ("LAWRP"). Under the recently completed MWRP Phase II Capacity Expansion Project, IRWD increased its tertiary treatment capacity on the existing MWRP site to produce sufficient recycled water to meet the projected demand through the year 2045. MWRP currently has a permitted tertiary capacity of 28 million gallons per day ("MGD") and LAWRP currently has a permitted tertiary capacity of 5.5 MGD. Water Code Section 1210 provides that the owner of a sewage treatment plant operated for the purposes of treating wastes from a sanitary sewer system holds the exclusive right to the treated effluent as against anyone who has supplied the water

discharged into the sewer system. IRWD's permits for the operation of MWRP and LAWRP allow only irrigation and other customer uses of recycled water, and do not permit stream discharge of recycled water under normal conditions; thus, no issue of downstream appropriation arises, and IRWD is entitled to deliver all of the effluent to meet contractual and customer demands. Additional reclamation capacity will augment local nonpotable supplies and improve reliability.

NONPOTABLE SUPPLY - IMPORTED

Baker Pipeline (currently available)

Santiago Aqueduct Commission ("SAC") Joint Powers Agreement, dated September 11, 1961, as amended December 20, 1974, January 13, 1978, November 1, 1978, September 1, 1981, October 22, 1986, and July 8, 1999 (the "SAC Agreement"); Agreement Between Irvine Ranch Water District and Carma-Whiting Joint Venture Relative to Proposed Annexation of Certain Property to Irvine Ranch Water District, dated May 26, 1981 (the "Whiting Annexation Agreement"); service connections OC-13/13A, OC-33/33A. The imported untreated water pipeline initially known as the Santiago Agueduct and now known as the Baker Pipeline was constructed under the SAC Agreement, a joint powers agreement. The Baker Pipeline is connected to MWD's Santiago Lateral. IRWD's capacity in the Baker Pipeline includes the capacity it subleases as successor to LAWD, as well as capacity rights IRWD acquired through the Whiting Annexation Agreement. (To finance the construction of AMP parallel untreated reaches which were incorporated into the Baker Pipeline, replacing original SAC untreated reaches that were made a part of the AMP potable system, it was provided that the MWDOC Water Facilities Corporation, and subsequently MWDOC, would have ownership, and the participants would be sublessees.) IRWD's original capacities in the Baker Pipeline include 52.70 cfs in the first reach, 12.50 cfs in each of the second, third and fourth reaches and 7.51 cfs in the fifth reach of the Baker Pipeline. These existing Baker Pipeline capacities have been apportioned to the Baker WTP participants based on Baker WTP capacity ownership. IRWD retains 10.5 cfs of the pipeline capacity for potable supply through the Baker WTP and retains 36 cfs in Reach 1U of the Baker Pipeline capacity for nonpotable supply (See also footnote 8, page 27). In 2023, IRWD executed an Agreement that sells 3 cfs to South County agencies, leaving 7.5 cfs for daily use for IRWD. However, should an emergency arise, IRWD retains the right to use the 3 cfs sold. Water is subject to availability from MWD.

•NONPOTABLE SUPPLY - NATIVE

Irvine Lake (currently available)

(i) Permit For Diversion and Use of Water ("Permit No. 19306") issued pursuant to Application No. 27503; License For Diversion and Use of Water ("License

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See Imported Supply - Additional Information, below, for information concerning the availability of the MWD supply.

2347") resulting from Application No. 4302 and Permit No. 3238: License For Diversion and Use of Water ("License 2348") resulting from Application No. 9005 and Permit No. 5202, and License For Diversion and Use of Water ("License 2349") resulting from Application No. 9314. The foregoing permit and licenses, held solely by IRWD (as successor to The Irvine Company ("TIC"), Carpenter Irrigation District ("CID"), and Serrano Water District ("SWD")), secure appropriative rights to the flows of Santiago Creek. Under Licenses 2347, 2348, and 2349 IRWD has the right to diversion by storage at Santiago Dam (Irvine Lake) and a submerged dam, of a total of 25,830 AFY. Under Permit No. 19306, IRWD has the right to diversion by storage of an additional 3,000 AFY by flashboards at Santiago Dam (Irvine Lake), as well as 15 cfs by direct diversion. (Rights under Permit No. 19306 may be junior to an OCWD permit to divert up to 35,000 AFY of Santiago Creek flows to spreading pits downstream of Santiago Dam.) The combined total of native water that may be diverted to storage in Irvine Lake, which is solely owned by IRWD, under these licenses and permit is 28,000 AFY. A 1996 amendment to License Nos. 2347, 2348 and 2349 limits the withdrawal of water from the Lake to 15,483 AFY under the licenses. This limitation specifically references the licensed water, and doesn't reference water stored pursuant to other legal entitlements (e.g. imported water).

•NONPOTABLE SUPPLY - GROUNDWATER

Irvine Subbasin / Irvine Desalter (currently available)

- (i) IRWD's entitlement to produce nonpotable water from the Irvine Subbasin is included within the Irvine Subbasin Agreement. See discussion of the Irvine Subbasin Agreement under Potable Supply Groundwater; paragraph (iv), above.
- (ii) See discussion of the Irvine Desalter project under Potable Supply Groundwater, paragraph (v), above. The Irvine Desalter project will produce nonpotable as well as potable water.

•IMPORTED SUPPLY - ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

As described above, the imported supply from MWD is contractually subject to availability. To assist local water providers in assessing the adequacy of local water supplies that are reliant in whole or in part on MWD's imported supply, MWD has provided information concerning the availability of the supplies to its entire service area. In the MWD 2020 UWMP, MWD has extended its planning timeframe out through 2045 to ensure that the MWD 2020 UWMP may be used as a source document for meeting requirements for sufficient supplies. In addition, the MWD 2020 UWMP includes "Justifications for Supply Projections" (Appendix A-3) that details the planning, legal, financial, and regulatory basis for including each source of supply in the plan. The MWD 2020 UWMP summarizes MWD's planning initiatives over the past 15 years, which includes the Integrated Resources Plan (IRP), the IRP 2015 Update, the WSDM Plan, Strategic Plan and Rate Structure. The reliability analysis in MWD's 2015 IRP Update shows that MWD can maintain reliable supplies under the conditions that have existed in past dry periods throughout the period through 2040. The MWD 2020 UWMP includes tables that show the region can provide reliable supplies under both the

single driest year (1977) and multiple dry years (1990-92) through 2045. MWD has also identified buffer supplies, including additional State Water Project groundwater storage and transfers that could serve to supply the additional water needed.

It is anticipated that MWD will revise its regional supply availability analysis periodically, if needed, to supplement the MWD 2020 UWMP in years when the MWD UWMP is not being updated.

IRWD is permitted by the statute (Wat. Code, § 10610 *et seq.*) to rely upon the water supply information provided by the wholesaler concerning a wholesale water supply source, for use in preparing its UWMPs. In turn, the statute provides for the use of UWMP information to support water supply assessments and verifications. In accordance with these provisions, IRWD is entitled to rely upon the conclusions of the MWD UWMP. As referenced above under <u>Summary of Results of Demand-Supply Comparisons</u> - *Actions on Delta Pumping*, MWD has provided additional information on its imported water supply.

MWD's reserve supplies, together with the fact that IRWD relies on MWD supplies as supplemental supplies that need not be used to the extent IRWD operates currently available and under-development local supplies, build a margin of safety into IRWD's supply availability.

(2) Adopted capital outlay program to finance delivery of the water supplies.

All necessary delivery facilities currently exist for the use of the *currently* available and *under-development* supplies assessed herein, with the exception of future groundwater wells, and IRWD sub-regional and developer-dedicated conveyance facilities necessary to complete the local distribution systems for the Project. IRWD's turnout at each MWD connection and IRWD's regional delivery facilities are sufficiently sized to deliver all of the supply to the sub-regional and local distribution systems.

With respect to future groundwater well projects (PR Nos. 11828 and 11829). IRWD adopted its fiscal year 2023-24 capital budget on April 24, 2023 (Resolution No. 2023-6) and the mid-cycle capital budget for fiscal year 2024-25 was adopted on May 28, 2024. Budgeting portions of the funds are for such projects. (A copy is available from IRWD on request.) For these facilities, as well as unbuilt IRWD sub-regional conveyance facilities, the sources of funding are previously authorized general obligation bonds, revenue-supported certificates of participation and/or capital funds held by IRWD Improvement Districts. IRWD has maintained a successful program for the issuance of general obligation bonds and certificates of participation on favorable borrowing terms, and IRWD has received AAA public bond ratings. IRWD has approximately \$585.5 million (water) and \$711.1 million (recycled water and sewer) of unissued, voterapproved general obligation bond authorization. Certificates of participation do not require voter approval. Proceeds of bonds and available capital funds are expected to be sufficient to fund all IRWD facilities for delivery of the supplies under development. Tract-level conveyance facilities are required to be donated to IRWD by the Applicant or its successor(s) at time of development.

See also the MWD 2020 UWMP, Appendix A.3 Justifications for Supply Projections with respect to capital outlay programs related to MWD's supplies.

(3) Federal, state and local permits for construction of delivery infrastructure.

Most IRWD delivery facilities are constructed in public right-of-way or future right-of-way. State statute confers on IRWD the right to construct works along, under or across any stream of water, watercourse, street, avenue, highway, railway, canal, ditch, or flume (Water Code Section 35603). Although this right cannot be denied, local agencies may require encroachment permits when work is to be performed within a street. If easements are necessary for delivery infrastructure, IRWD requires the developer to provide them. The crossing of watercourses or areas with protected species requires federal and/or state permits as applicable.

See also the MWD 2020 UWMP, Appendix A.3 Justifications for Supply Projections with respect to permits related to MWD's supplies.

(4) Regulatory approvals for conveyance or delivery of the supplies.

See response to preceding item (3). Additionally, in general, supplies under development may necessitate the preparation and completion of environmental documents and/or regulatory approvals prior to full construction and implementation. IRWD obtains such approvals when required, and copies of documents pertaining to approvals can be obtained from IRWD.

See also the MWD 2020 UWMP, Appendix A.3 Justifications for Supply Projections with respect to regulatory approvals related to MWD's supplies.

3. Other users and contractholders (identified supply not previously used).

For each of the water supply sources identified by IRWD, if no water has been received from that source(s), IRWD is required to identify other public water systems or water service contractholders that receive a water supply from, or have existing water supply entitlements, water rights and water service contracts to, that source(s):

Water has been received from all listed sources. A small quantity of Subbasin water is used by Woodbridge Village Association for the purpose of supplying its North and South Lakes. There are no other public water systems or water service contractholders that receive a water supply from, or have existing water supply entitlements, water rights and water service contracts to, the Irvine Subbasin.

4. Information concerning groundwater included in the supply identified for the Project:

(a) Relevant information in the Urban Water Management Plan (UWMP):

See Irvine Ranch Water District 2020 UWMP, section 6.2.

(b) Description of the groundwater basin(s) from which the Project will be supplied:

The Orange County Groundwater Basin ("Basin") is described in the Orange County Water District Groundwater Management Plan ("GMP") 2015 Update, dated June 17, 2015¹⁰. The rights of the producers within the Basin vis a vis one another have not been adjudicated. The Basin is managed by the Orange County Water District ("OCWD") for the benefit of municipal, agricultural, and private groundwater producers. OCWD is responsible for the protection of water rights to the Santa Ana River in Orange County as well as the management and replenishment of the Basin. Current production from the Basin is approximately 260,000 AFY.

The DWR has not identified the Basin as "critically overdrafted," and has not identified the Basin as overdrafted in its most current bulletin that characterizes the condition of the Basin, Bulletin 118. The efforts being undertaken by OCWD to avoid long-term overdraft in the Basin are described in the OCWD GMP 2015 Update and OCWD Master Plan Report ("MPR"), including in particular, Chapters 4, 5, 6, 14 and 15 of the MPR. OCWD has also prepared a Long Term Facilities Plan ("LTFP") which was received by the OCWD Board in July 2009 and was last updated in November 2014. The LTFP Chapter 3 describes the efforts being undertaken by OCWD to eliminate long-term overdraft in the Basin. See also following section on "Sustainable Groundwater Management Act".

Although the water supply assessment statute (Water Code Section 10910(f)) refers to elimination of "long-term overdraft," overdraft includes conditions which may be managed for optimum basin storage, rather than eliminated. OCWD's Act defines annual groundwater overdraft to be the quantity by which production exceeds the natural replenishment of the Basin. Accumulated overdraft is defined in the OCWD Act to be the quantity of water needed in the groundwater basin forebay to prevent landward movement of seawater into the fresh groundwater body. However, seawater intrusion control facilities have been constructed by OCWD since the Act was written and have been effective in preventing landward movement of seawater. These facilities allow greater utilization of the storage capacity of the Basin.

OCWD has invested over \$250 million in seawater intrusion control (injection barriers), recharge facilities, laboratories, and Basin monitoring to effectively manage the Basin. Consequently, although the Basin is defined to be in an "overdraft" condition, it is actually managed to allow utilization of up to 500,000 acre-feet of storage capacity of the basin during dry periods, acting as an underground reservoir and buffer against drought. OCWD has an optimal basin management target of 100,000 acre-feet of accumulated overdraft provides sufficient storage space to accommodate increased supplies from one wet year while also provide enough water in storage to offset decreased supplies during a two- to three year drought. If the Basin is too full, artesian conditions can occur along the coastal area, causing rising water and water logging, an adverse condition. Since the formation of OCWD in 1933, OCWD has made substantial investment in facilities, Basin management and water rights protection, resulting

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¹⁰ OCWD has also prepared a Long-Term Facilities Plan which was received and filed by its Board in July 2009, and last updated in November 2014.

in the elimination and prevention of adverse long-term "mining" overdraft conditions. OCWD continues to develop new replenishment supplies, recharge capacity and basin protection measures to meet projected production from the basin during normal rainfall and drought periods. (OCWD GMP, OCWD MPR and LTFP)

OCWD's efforts include ongoing replenishment programs and planned capital improvements. It should be noted under OCWD's management of overdraft to maximize the Basin's use for annual production and recharge operations, overdraft varies over time as the Basin is managed to keep it in balance over the long term. The Basin is not operated on an annual safe-yield basis. (OCWD GMP, OCWD MPR, section 3.2 and LTFP, section 6). See also the following section on "Sustainable Groundwater Management Act".

(c) <u>Description and analysis of the amount and location of groundwater pumped by</u> IRWD from the Basin for the past five years:

The following table shows the amounts pumped, by groundwater source since the year 2002:

(d) <u>Description and analysis of the amount and location of groundwater projected to be pumped by IRWD from the Basin</u>:

IRWD has a developed groundwater supply of 35,200 AFY from its Dyer Road Wellfield (including the Deep Aquifer Treatment System), in the main portion of the Basin.

Although TIC's historical production from the Subbasin declined as its use of the Subbasin for agricultural water diminished, OCWD's and other historical production records for the Subbasin show that production has been as high as 13,000 AFY. Plans are also underway to expand IRWD's main Orange County Groundwater Basin supply (characterized as *under-development* supplies herein). (See Section 2 (a) (1) herein). IRWD anticipates the development of potential additional production facilities within both the main Basin and the Irvine Subbasin. However, such additional facilities have not been included or relied upon in this assessment. Additional groundwater development will provide an additional margin of safety as well as reduce future water supply costs to IRWD.

The following table summarizes future IRWD groundwater production from currently available and under-development supplies.

(e) <u>If not included in the 2020 UWMP, analysis of the sufficiency of groundwater projected to be pumped by IRWD from the Basin to meet the projected water demand of the Project:</u>

See responses to 4(b) and 4(d).

The OCWD MPR and LTFP examined future Basin conditions and capabilities, water supply and demand, and identified projects to meet increased replenishment needs of the basin. With the implementation of OCWD's preferred projects, the Basin yield in the year 2025 would be up to 500,000 AF. The amount that can be produced will be a function of which projects will be implemented by OCWD and how much increased recharge capacity is created by those projects, total demands by all producers, and the resulting Basin Production Percentage ("BPP") that OCWD sets based on these factors. 14 Sufficient replenishment supplies are projected by the OCWD MPR to be available to OCWD to meet the increasing demand on the Basin. These supplies include capture of increasing Santa Ana River flows, purchases of replenishment water from MWD, and development of new local supplies. In 2008, OCWD began operating its replenishment supply project, the Groundwater Replenishment System project ("GWRS"). The GWRS currently produces approximately 100,000 AFY of new replenishment supply from recycled water (OCWD GMP).

Production of groundwater can exceed applicable basin production percentages on a short-term basis, providing additional reliability during dry years or emergencies. Additional groundwater production is anticipated by OCWD in the Basin in dry years, as producers reduce their use of imported supplies, and the Basin is "mined" in anticipation of the eventual availability of replenishment water. (OCWD MPR, section 14.6.)

See also, Figures 1-8 hereto. IRWD assesses sufficiency of supplies on an aggregated basis, as neither groundwater nor other supply sources are allocated to particular projects or customers. Under the Irvine Subbasin Agreement, IRWD is contractually obligated to attribute the Subbasin supply only to TIC development projects for assessment purposes; however, the agreement does not allocate or assign rights in the Subbasin supply to any project.

Sustainable Groundwater Management Act. Pursuant to the Sustainable Groundwater Management Act ("SGMA"), the DWR has designated the Orange County groundwater basin, Basin 8-1, as a medium priority basin for purposes of groundwater management. The SGMA specifically calls for OCWD, which regulates the Orange County groundwater basin, to serve as the groundwater sustainability agency or "GSA". The SGMA allows Special Act Districts created by statute, such as OCWD, to prepare and submit an alternative to a

.

OCWD has adopted a basin production percentage of 85% for 2024-25. In prior years OCWD has maintained a basin production percentage that is lower than the current percentage, and IRWD anticipates that such reductions may occur from time to time as a temporary measure employed by OCWD to encourage lower pumping levels as OCWD implements other measures to reduce the current accumulated overdraft in the Basin. Any such reductions are not expected to affect any of IRWD's currently available groundwater supplies listed in this assessment, which are subject to a contractually-set equivalent basin production percentage as described or are exempt from the basin production percentage.

Groundwater Sustainability Plan ("GSP") that is "functionally equivalent" to a GSP. Basin 8-1 includes the OCWD service area and several fringe areas outside of OCWD that are within the Basin 8-1 boundary. Per the requirements of SGMA, an Alternative Plan must encompass the entire groundwater basin as defined by DWR. On January 1, 2017, OCWD and the overlying agencies within Basin 8-1, including IRWD, jointly prepared and submitted an alternative plan in compliance with SGMA (Basin 8-1 Alternative). The Basin 8-1 Alternative was updated in January 2024.
