NATURE OF ACTION:

Cooperative Agreement No. R10AC35R04 provides American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 funding for the Irvine Ranch Water District to design and construct Tustin Legacy Well 1 near the southwest corner of former Marine Corps Air Station (MCAS) Tustin, Orange County, California. The well will provide hydro-geologic data on groundwater quality, zone of influence, and projected yield that will be used to design additional wells and a treatment facility for the full-scale Tustin Legacy Wellfield Project.

EXPLANATION/REMARKS

The groundwater well is a routine planning investigation activity. Impacts are expected to be localized and limited to 5,000 sq ft at former MCAS Tustin. An Initial Study (SCH No. 2009121071) prepared under the California Environmental Quality Act found that the project would not create substantial adverse effects. Redevelopment of former MCAS Tustin was approved under an MOA among Department of the Navy, Advisory Council on Historic Preservation, and California State Historic Preservation Officer.

COMMITMENTS:

Cultural Resources: Should cultural resources be discovered during project construction, all ground disturbing activities in the area of the archeological resource will stop and the Regional Archeologist, Pat Hicks, will be contacted at 702-293-8359. Construction will not resume in the area of the discovery until all mitigative measures developed in consultation with the State Historic Preservation Officer have been completed.
