## **IRWD Provides Rebates for Water Conservation Devices**

Looking for a great way to be more water efficient? Purchasing a new washer or toilet can help and IRWD can help financially.

Effective August 1, 2009, IRWD rebates required reservation numbers prior to purchase of the eligible devices and a new electronic application format replaces the paper applications. The Rebate Reservation System is now in effect. Before purchasing a qualifying device, a reservation number is required.

To reserve a single-family home rebate (for customers living in detached homes or attached homes of four units or less) visit

Note: Rebate amounts are expected to change in Fall 2009. In the past, IRWD partnered with Metropolitan Water District (MWD) to provide supplemental funding for customers. Co-funding from the MWD has been depleted and future funding is uncertain. As a result of these changes, the program is being re-evaluated and funding levels are likely to be adjusted. # IRWD to Receive Federal **Stimulus Funding for Local Water Supply Projects**

The Irvine Ranch Water District will receive \$17.8 million under the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 for three local water supply reliability projects. These projects will provide IRWD service area businesses and residents with an additional 8,900 acre feet of drinking water, enough for 66,200 people per year and reduce IRWD's dependency on imported water. They illustrate IRWD's long standing commitment to the development of local water supply reliability projects that have insulated IRWD customers from the current regional drought caused by court-ordered restrictions in Northern California's Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta.

In 1990 IRWD imported over 82% of its water supply. Since this time, IRWD's investment in water supply projects has reduced this number and today only 28 percent of IRWD's drinking water is imported and purchased from the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California. The remaining 72 percent of IRWD's water supply comes from local water wells, treated groundwater projects, and recycled water.

# **Smart Landscape Maintenance Tips** for the Fall Season

As summer draws to a close, it's time to start cutting back on your outdoor watering. By the end of September, plants will need as much as one-third less water than they did in August, even though the days are still warm. Why? Because the days are shorter, so plants do not lose as much water during the day as they did in mid-summer.

In fall, plants are slowing their growth rate - the opposite of the spring growth phase. To ensure plants are getting enough water, watch for signs of stress. Lawns show stress when grass blades turn wiry and don't pop back up when stepped on. Plants and bushes show stress when leaves droop or start to turn color. Domestic plants will easily recover from minor stress. If runoff occurs, reduce the watering time, but water twice in the same day at least an hour apart. Shrubs and trees will need about half of what turf requires.

Additional fall landscaping tips that will help you increase water-use efficiency include: · Brown grass. Warm season grasses go into dormancy and turn brown this time of year. No amount of water will change that! Some landscapers will overseed with an annual rye grass to keep a lawn looking green. You will need to water more frequently to get the seeds to germinate, but only a few BRIEF minutes each day for a couple of weeks - just enough to get the seeds wet.

• Lower the mower blade. If you increased the height during the warm months, return to the • Plant the "California Friendly" way. Choose native and California Friendly plants, (like those

recommended height for your type of turf. Hybrid Bermuda: 1/2 to 3/8 inch; Tall Fescue: 2-21/2 inches. shown at right) which are well suited to our warm, dry summers and mild winters. Many are naturally pest-resistant and require little or no fertilizing. Fall is the best time of year for planting in Southern California. The soil is still warm, but the days and nights are cool. Winter rains are just around the corner to encourage good, deep root systems so plants will be ready f

Suggested Weekly Autumn Irrigation Schedule									
Month	Turf grass	Tree, Shrubs & Ground Cover	% Option***						
September*	4 days, 2 cycles** of 3 minutes each	2 days, 2 cycles of 4 minutes each	70%						
October	3 days, 2 cycles of 3 minutes each	2 days, 2 cycles of 3 minutes each	50%						
November	2 days, 2 cycles of 3 minutes each	1 day, 2 cycles of 4 minutes each	40%						

The above chart suggests a weekly schedule for spray-head irrigation, assuming heavy clay soils common to most local coastal and foothill areas. Generally, these are the MAXIMUM times you will need for full sun areas. Start with this schedule and increase the times only if your plants shop signs of stress. If stress occurs only in isolated areas, check your irrigation system before increasing the watering time.

\*In September, plants water needs drop by approximately 30 percent even if the temperature remains warm. \*\*By "cycling" the irrigation controller to turn on for the recommended number of minutes an hour apart, deeper watering and healthier root growth are gained, while runoff is reduced.

\*\*The % option, either a button or a dial, permits the watering run times for all electric valves managed by a controller to be increased or decreased with just one adjustment by percentage.
