Single-family Residential Rebates Currently Available

To encourage water use efficiency, Irvine Ranch Water District (IRWD) provides customer rebates on clothes washers, toilets, spray nozzles and irrigation controllers. The following changes to IRWD single-family residential rebate program went into effect this fall:

Beginning September 21, 2009, rebates for IRWD customers residing in single-family dwellings - including detached homes, duplexes, tri-plexes and four-plexes, no longer require a reservation.

A rebate application is required and is available online at www.socalwatersmart.com or at local retail stores that sell qualifying water saving-devices. Along with this rebate application, IRWD residents must submit a printed copy of their recent water bill with the original receipt from the purchase of the qualifying fixture, appliance or device.

Michelson Water Reclamation Plant Expansion

If you have recently driven by the Michelson Water Reclamation Plant (MWRP), you may have noticed some construction activity. The MWRP is currently undergoing a plant expansion which will increase the capacity of the plant from approximately 18 million gallons per day (MGD) to 28 MGD. IRWD's proactive long-term planning identified the need upgrade to MWRP in order to meet the projected 60 percent increased recycled water demands by the year 2025. Expansion includes a new headworks facility, primary clarifier, electrical building, ultra-violet disinfection facility, membrane bioreactor facility, and modification to the influent trunk sewer

Grease poured down drains is the leading cause of sewage spills.

Grease needs to be handled carefully all year round, but especially at this time of year. With the holidays



approaching fast, many families are cooking special meals to share with friends and relatives. Larger quantity of grease created by cooking a turkey, ham or roast can result in problems within your home's sewer pipes or within your neighborhood if not disposed of properly.

Never pour grease down your sink drain, toilet or garbage disposal. Instead, pour grease into a can and refrigerate or freeze until solid and

line. Construction, which began in September 2009, is anticipated to be complete in 2012. For safety reasons tours of the plant will no longer be conducted during construction.

Recycled water comprises about 20 percent of IRWD supply. That's enough water to provide landscape irrigation for 80 percent of the district's business and community customers including parks, school grounds and golf courses. As California continues to experience drought conditions, every gallon of water recycled by IRWD, a gallon of drinking water is spared for drinking purposes only.

Care and Pruning Tips for Keeping Drought-Resistant Shrubs Healthy and Attractive

As the days of autumn continue to shorten and winter approaches, it's time to think about pruning your California Friendly, drought-tolerant shrubs and trees. Many of these varieties are native to California, evolved to survive being browsed by deer in the wild, and are well adapted to seasonal tip pruning. As a general rule, you can trim off about half of the most recent season's tip growth without doing harm. Remove all dead wood. When pruning other parts of these plants, however, go easy. For instance, if two branches are heading in the same parallel direction, save one and thin the other. Branches growing down tend to add needless weight, so remove them to strengthen the healthy supporting branch. In the center of the shrub or tree, you can thin the crossing branches to open up the crown.

Never cut branches off flush with their connecting branch and don't leave a big stub

either. Depending on the size of the branch you are removing, you should leave a quarter inch or so (more for very large branches) to allow proper

Weed control is often overlooked, but necessary, for the successful maintenance of any shrub or tree. Grasses are particularly pernicious thieves of water and nutrients. After

cultivate the soil around California Friendly plants. If the ground is hard and compacted, simply scratch away at the surface with a three-prong cultivator. No need to go deep, an inch or so will do. This aerates the soil, and prepares it to absorb the winter rains.

Along with pruning, now is the time to

removing weeds and grasses that are growing around the base of a shrub or tree, apply a thick (2 to 4 inches deep) layer of disease-free organic mulch, such as bark chips. This will suppress weeds and grass, conserve moisture, and return nutrients to the soil as the mulch decomposes.

The above chart suggests a weekly schedule for spray-head irrigation, assuming heavy clay soils common to most local coastal and foothill areas. Generally, these are the MAXIMUM times you will need for full sun areas. Start with this schedule and increase the times only if your plants shop signs of stress. If stress occurs only in isolated areas, check your irrigation system before increasing the watering time.

Don't forget to turn off your sprinklers when it rains. For convenience, consider installing an automatic rain shut-off device on your irrigation system.

*In November, plants need approximately 60 percent less water than they require in the hot summer months, even if fall temperatures remains warm. This drop in water needs will increase by another 10 percent in December and continue through February.

**By "cycling" the irrigation controller to lurn on for the recommended number of minutes an hour apart, deeper watering and healthier root growth are gained,

**The % option, either a button or a dial, permits the watering run times for all electric valves managed by a controller to be increased or decreased with just one adjustment by percentage.



Dr. Hurd Manzanita

Arctostaphylos manzanita 'Dr. Hurd'

More like a small tree than a large shrub, this plant can grow up to 20 feet tall and wide. Known for its dark reddish-brown bark, characteristic of many manzanitas. the Dr. Hurd variety also has gray-green foliage. Its white to pink flower clusters bloom from February to March, attracting hummingbirds.



Weeping Bottlebrush

Callistemon viminalis

Native to Australia, this large flowering shrub, or small tree, explodes in the spring with scarlet stamens arranged in fuzzy 6-inch hanging cylinders. Weeping bottlebrush grows best in full sun with average to occasional summer watering. It can reach 15 to 20 feet in height and, without pruning, becomes shrubby to form an attractive privacy hedge or screen.



Western Redbud

Cercis occidentalis

This deciduous shrub is desirable for its magenta spring flowers (detail shown above), yellow to red fall leaf color and dangling winter seed pods. Western redbud is tolerant of many soil types and drought, generally growing from 6 to 20 ft. tall and 10 to 15 ft. wide. Attracts butterflies and hummingbirds.
