Osprey Chick Hatches at San Joaquin Marsh Nesting Platform

More than 200 species of birds have been sighted at the IRWD San Joaquin Marsh and Wildlife Sanctuary, including many raptors, such as the osprey.

Now for the first time, an osprey pair has hatched a chick in a nest they constructed on a 40-foot-tall nesting platform installed last summer. The platform is located on a peninsula in one of the marsh's ponds, which gives the birds the illusion of being surrounded by water, but also allows access for maintenance crews. Currently, the trail to the platform is not accessible to the public, but the birds may be best viewed from adjacent trails.

IRWD installed the platform in partnership with the Sea and Sage Audubon Society. It is modeled after the successful platform at Newport Back Bay's Shellmaker Island.

"In January, we observed the nesting pair gathering material for the nest," said Jason Tran, wetlands specialist for IRWD. "The chick hatched in early May."

Interestingly enough, the chick's mother was born in 2008 at the Shellmaker Island platform. She was tracked to that site by leg bands biologists at Shellmaker's Marine Science Center had placed on her. Experts say female ospreys usually don't nest until they are at least three years old.

In June, Sea and Sage held a banding event at the marsh. Local raptor biologist Pete Bloom and raptor expert Scott Thomas removed the chick from the nest and put bands on its legs then returned it to the nest.

Recently, the chick flew from the nest for the first time. It is still dependent on the parents for food, so it frequently returns to the nest.

It is estimated that osprey nests had not been reported in Orange County for more than 70 years, until the platform at Shellmaker Island was built four years ago. Since then, there have been several successful nests there. It is hoped that the platform at the San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary will see many more osprey chicks hatched there in the future.

Smart Ways to Reduce Urban Runoff this Summer

As August's long hot days arrive, outdoor watering increases as well as the chance for increased urban runoff. By making these simple changes to your water-use habits, you can help reduce the volume of runoff which leaves your property and eventually drains to the ocean:

- Water only in the early morning or after dusk.
- Make sure you don't over-water with timed sprinklers. (Follow irrigation schedule below.)
- Landscape with California Friendly plants, which need less water and suit our climate.
- Wash your car at a car wash or on the lawn, not in your driveway or curbside.

Cut along dashed line and post this schedule near your irrigation controller.

Suggested Weekly Summer Irrigation Schedule % Option** Month **Turfgrass** Trees, Shrubs & Ground Cover July & August 4 days, 3 cycles* of 3 minutes each 100% 2 days, 3 cycles of 4 minutes each September 4 days, 2 cycles of 3 minutes each 2 days, 2 cycles of 4 minutes each

The above chart suggests a weekly schedule for spray-head irrigation, assuming heavy clay soils common to most local coastal and foothill areas. Generally, these are the MAXIMUM times you will need for full sun areas. Your landscape's particular watering times may vary. Start with this schedule and increase the times only if your plants show signs of stress. If stress occurs only in isolated areas, check your irrigation system before increasing the watering time.

*By "cycling" the irrigation controller to turn on for the recommended number of minutes an hour apart, deeper watering and healthier root growth are gained,

while runoff is reduced.
**The % option, either a button or a dial, permits the watering run times for all electric valves managed by a controller to be increased or decreased with just one adjustment by percentage.
