# Smarty Plants – Transform your Garden into an Always Water Smart Landscape

Spring is the perfect time to transform your yard into an Always Water Smart landscape. Landscape water use can account for up to 70 percent of residential water use, with nearly half of this water being wasted through overwatering, runoff and evaporation. By planting a water-efficient landscape, residents can reduce their water bill and have a healthier and attractive landscape.

Plants that will be featured at The Home Depot Garden-Friendly events include:



**Bougainvillea** – These plants showcase even more color when they are not over watered.



**Euryops** – Daisy-like flowers that are Garden Friendly?
Yes please!



**Hesperaloe** – Showy red flowers that bloom all spring through summer.

There's no need to constrain your landscape to a patch of grass when there are an abundance of water-efficient plants with lots of textures and colors. Native plants are well-suited to southern California's mild winters and warm, dry summers. They're less maintenance, use little water and don't need soil preparation or fertilizing.

If you're ready to make this transition but are uncertain about what types of plants to use and how to design an Always Water Smart landscape, we are here to help.

Here are some general design recommendations to help you transform your landscape:

- Less is more in planting design. Complex designs require more maintenance. Limit the number of plant species and create well-defined planted areas by not scattering plants throughout open areas.
- Consider how much lawn you would like or need. Plant lawn where it will be enjoyed, or forego it altogether (it is the highest water-consuming plant in the garden) and consider lawn alternatives, such as ground covers, decks, or patios.
- If you enjoy seasonal color, consider container gardens with lush and low-maintenance ornamentals, grasses, or succulents.
- Look for plants with the same water needs and group them together to maximize water use and allow for better plant health.
- A year-round evergreen garden can be achieved with low-maintenance ground covers such as Dymondia, Rosemary, or Star Jasmine.

# **Suggested Weekly Spring Irrigation Schedule**

Month	Turfgrass	Trees, Shrubs & Ground Cover	% Option <sup>2</sup>
March	3 days, 2 cycles of 3 minutes each	2 days, 2 cycles of 3 minutes each	50%
April	3 days, 2 cycles of 4 minutes each	2 days, 2 cycles of 4 minutes each	70%
May	3 days, 3 cycles of 3 minutes each	2 days, 3 cycles of 3 minutes each	80%

The above chart suggests a weekly schedule for spray-head irrigation, assuming heavy clay soils common to most local coastal and foothill areas. Generally, these are the MAXIMUM times you will need for full sun areas. Your landscape's particular watering times may vary. Start with this schedule and increase the times only if your plants show signs of stress. If stress occurs only in isolated areas, check your irrigation system before increasing the watering time.
