Now that Daylight Saving Time is over, it's time to lower your water use as the weather cools, humidity increases and we have potential for rain.

Checking your irrigation controller when you change your clocks is a good habit to get into. It's a great time to check your sprinklers for leaks too.

November	2 days, 2 cycles of 3 minutes	1 day, 2 cycles of 4 minutes
December	2 days, 2 cycles of 2 minutes	1 day, 2 cycles of 3 minutes
January	2 days, 2 cycles of 2 minutes	1 day, 2 cycles of 3 minutes

Keep Your Drains Free of Fats, Oils, and Grease This Holiday Season (and Always)

A clogged drain, especially on a holiday, can result in a high plumbing bill and potentially contribute to a sewer spill in the community. It's never a good idea to pour fats, oils, or grease (FOG) down the drain during the holiday season, or any other time during the year.

In fact, nearly 50 percent of sewage overflows nationwide are caused by homeowners who improperly dispose of everyday fats, oils, and grease. These overflows are not just public health issues, but can result in serious damage to our environment.

When FOG is put down the sewer system, it will build up over time and constrict the flow of household sewage. The grease sticks to the pipes and when it builds up, blocks the entire pipe, resulting in costly repairs and cleanups.

To prevent problems, follow these tips for disposing of leftover cooking grease:

- Never pour grease down your sink drain, toilet or garbage disposal.
- Place leftover grease into containers with lids, such as jars, and place into a trash receptacle for pick up on trash day.
- Mix oils with absorbent materials, such as coffee grounds, put it in a lidded container and dispose with the trash.
- If cleaning a greasy pan, pour grease into a container and wipe excess grease from the pan with paper towels. Place the towels into the trash.
- If using a deep fat fryer, mix oils with absorbent material, such as cat litter, or soak up excess oil with newspaper and put into the trash.

These simple steps will help IRWD protect the environment and prevent sewer spills.
