Q: I have three mature citrus trees in my backvard close to my fence. What other plants go well with citrus trees?

A: Thank you for your question. I typically do not plant anything under citrus trees because their water and nutrient needs differ throughout the season. Fruit trees should be separate from traditional landscape areas. Specific horticultural practices are needed for each type of plant, from shrubs to fruiting trees. The

important thing to do is research these plants for specific requirements. For watering, consider applying for the pressure regulating spray body program rebate at RightScapeNow.com/prs-program.

California Native Corner Juan's February Plant: Manzanita

Manzanitas (Arctostaphylos spp.) are found throughout California and can grow from two inches to 20 feet tall. These beautiful evergreen plants are known for their clusters of urn-shaped white to pink flowers and loved for their shiny, red-mahogany bark. They are a magnet for native birds, butterflies, and insects. Once established, manzanitas require little to no



summer watering, and various species are known to grow for over 100 years. Learn more about native plants at CalScape.org and CalScape.org/planting-guide.php. — Juan



Q: How does IRWD keep operating during a power outage?

A: The District has several procedures in place to avoid any disruptions in service during a power outage or other emergency. Critical facilities include backup generators (many also have alternative energy sources on site), and portable generators can be moved to wherever they are needed.

Our water storage tanks use gravity to deliver water to your tap, and that's in constant supply. This is true for most sewer lines, too.
