Overwatering and water leaks lead to mosquitoes

Did you know mosquito bites and water waste are related? The smallest puddle of standing water from overwatering or leaks can be a breeding ground for mosquitos. In fact, the Aedes mosquito can breed in as little as a teaspoon of water!

Irvine Ranch Water District has teamed up with Orange County Mosquito and Vector Control District to remind residents that mosquito control is a shared responsibility that benefits everyone.

It can be easy to overlook water waste — but it's not easy to ignore being bitten by invasive Aedes mosquitoes, commonly known as ankle biters.

Q: When my irrigation system turns on and off, we hear a loud banging sound. Is this caused by pressure in the line? Is there a way to fix this?

A: It sounds like what you're experiencing is what we call "water hammer." When the sprinklers turn on, it draws water from the irrigation mainline that is also tied into the mainline that supplies water to the house. When the sprinkler valves shut down or shut off quickly,

it causes the water to suddenly stop flowing in the pipe, causing that banging noise. Some sprinkler valves shut down slowly while others can shut down immediately. Water hammer is also caused by irregular pressure in the lines.

One recommendation is to reduce or lower the pressure by installing a pressure reducing valve (PRV) on the irrigation mainline, or installing slow closing irrigation valves. California native corner Juan's May plant: sticky monkey flower

Sticky monkey flower *(Mimulus aurantiacus)* is found on rocky cliffs, hillsides and canyons, and is native to the Southwest. It gets its name from its long narrow leaves and stems that are coated in a sticky resin. Blooming profusely in winter, spring, and well into summer, the sticky monkey flower has nectar-rich trumpet-shaped flowers that are yellow to orange in color. It also attracts butterflies and birds, and can tolerate poor soils if adequate drainage is provided. Learn more at **CalScape.org** and **CalScape.org/ planting-guide.php**. — Juan





Q: When do customers need to submit a variance request, and why does it need to be renewed annually?

A: Customers are provided a water budget each month that is determined by the number of residents in the household and the area of irrigated landscape in our records. The base number of residents and landscape square footage on file is determined by the property classification. If customers have more than the base amount, they can increase their water budget by submitting a variance request with the necessary documentation. Many of our customers have frequent occupancy changes and, as such, variances need to be renewed annually. Landscape variances do not require renewal. Variances are also available for medical needs, livestock, and licensed care facilities. Visit IRWD.com/ request-a-variance.
