Ways to trim outdoor water waste



Get rid of your thirsty lawn and receive up to \$4 in rebates for every square foot of turf removed.



Replace sprinklers with rotating nozzles and pressure regulating spray bodies for up to \$4 each in rebates.



Change your spray head irrigation to drip and get up to 70 cents per foot of converted area.

Kitchen tips for a happy holiday

Looking forward to preparing feasts of rich foods this holiday season? Remember that fats, oils and grease should never be poured down the drain. Collectively referred to as "FOG," these substances are a leading cause of troublesome clogs and sewage spills.

Here's how you can help prevent a stopped-up sink from spoiling your celebration:

- Pour used cooking oil and grease into a can, let it cool, and dispose of it in the trash.
- Wipe greasy pots with a paper towel before washing.
- Put all food scraps, coffee grounds, eggshells, dairy products, pasta, rice and flour in the trash or compostable bin.

Remember, it's not just your drain you'll be saving! You will also be protecting your local sewer lines.



Fall back for water efficiency

Daylight saving time ends this month, so remember to set your clock back one hour on Sunday, Nov. 7. The semi-annual time changes coincide with seasonal shifts in weather when irrigation controllers and sprinkler times should be adjusted. Water needs drop as the weather cools, so it's a good idea to check your controller at the same time you change your clocks. This is a good time to replace the batteries in your controller, as well.



Q: During the fall and into winter, I noticed my landscape's water use has gone up. What do you think it might be related to?

A: Sometimes we neglect to check our sprinkler system for leaks, and that can cause unforeseen problems. This is the perfect time to adjust your watering times and visually inspect your sprinklers for leaks, breaks and other issues that might cause water waste.

Q: How does IRWD's water budget work?

A: IRWD uses a budget-based rate structure to calculate your monthly bill based on the type of home, number of people living there, the landscape area, and weather.

Outdoor water budgets decrease in fall and winter when plants don't need as much water.

Indoor water budgets are based on the number of people in the home, with defaults set at between two and four people.
