Q: Juan, now that spring is nearly over, can I still plant?

A: Ideally, the best time to plant is late fall through winter, as this will allow plants to develop a deep and vast root system to beat the heat of

summer. But with a vigilant eye and deep but infrequent watering, you can still plant. It just takes a little more upkeep.

One recommendation is to focus on smaller, 1- to 5-gallon plants, whose roots will establish themselves more quickly in the soil. Another is to make sure to mulch to reduce soil temperature and retain moisture for better root development.

With a little care, you'll be successful, and your landscape will thrive for years to come.

California native corner Juan's May plant: Blue-eyed grass

Blue-eyed grass (*Sisyrinchium bellum*) is a perennial herb found throughout California. It is easy to grow and readily reseeds. From spring through summer, it produces spikes of blue-to-lavender flowers that hover above the foliage. It does well in full sun but performs best in low light conditions. When blooms are spent, it dies back to the ground and is summer dormant until the following year. Learn more at **CalScape.org** and **CalScape.org/planting-guide.php**. — *Juan*
