Federal grant supports IRWD project

IRWD's Syphon Reservoir Improvement Project was awarded a \$12.2 million grant from the Bureau of Reclamation as part of a national funding plan to promote critical drought-resilient projects.

The Bureau of Reclamation award will support an expansion of the reservoir off Portola Parkway north of Irvine to store more recycled water, which is used for landscape irrigation and many other uses.

Secretary of the Interior Deb Haaland announced the award

at a recent event at IRWD's Rattlesnake Reservoir, where a recycled water pump station is being built to support continued expansions of recycled water use in our community.

IRWD's nationally acclaimed recycled water system accounts for more than 25% of the water the District serves. It is one or the reasons IRWD is so resilient, even during drought—and why our community is still green. The Syphon Reservoir Improvement Project will build on that.

"Right now, we cannot store all the recycled water we produce in winter," IRWD General Manager Paul Cook explained. "This project will give us the capacity to store all the recycled water we produce so we have plenty to draw from in summer when demand is high."

Q: Hi Juan. What tips do you have for the fall? After September's hot spell, I am eager to rejuvenate my landscape.

A: This is a great time to give your garden a little TLC. Take

time to walk around your yard and prune any dead flowers, shoots or branches that may have been stressed in summer. Also, a little weeding and mulching can suppress those dreadful weeds. Then, start planning for planting later this season. The soil is still warm enough to promote root development and autumn rains will give those new plantings a boost for winter. Santa Ana winds can increase a plant's water needs this time of year, so be sure to water your landscape deeply once or twice a week to help.

California native cornerJuan's October plant: bush poppy

Bush poppy (Dendronmecon rigida) is a vigorous evergreen shrub native to Southern and Baja California. It has long, narrow, grayish blue-green leaves on upright arching branches—and its solitary blooms are brilliant yellow and slightly fragrant in winter and spring. Bush poppy provides excellent habitat for caterpillars, butterflies, bees and other beneficial insects. Once established it can do with little to no
