Q: Hi Juan! I want to replace my lawn with a water-efficient landscape. Does IRWD still offer a rebate?

## California native corner Juan's November plant: California fuchsia

California fuchsia (*Epilobium canum*) is a delightful plant, native to the foothills and coastal regions of the state. It produces clusters of bright scarlet trumpet flowers in summer and well into fall — allowing late season feeders, such as hummingbirds, to feast on their nectar. California fuchsia can tolerate almost any soil, from sandy to clay. Once it stops blooming, I recommend you prune this plant down to the ground in mid-winter. Do not worry, it will spring up beautifully the following year.





Q: Why is my bill higher than last month? I used the same amount of water.

A: Your water budget changes with the season to reflect the amount of irrigation needed for your landscape. In fall, our plants enter a period of dormancy. The days are shorter and their metabolism slows down so they need less water.

A smart irrigation timer will adjust your schedule automatically, but those with a manual timer will have to make note of the water needs of your plants and make those adjustments by hand — pretty much on a monthly basis.

In November, run two 3-minute cycles for grass three days per week; and two 4-minute cycles once a week for water efficient plants.
