### Q: Juan, what are some decorative plants I can use to replace my lawn?

A: Some of my favorites include yarrow (Achillea millefolium) and various types of manzanita (Arctostaphylos) like emerald carpet or Point Reyes, which grows in dense mats. California lilac (Ceanothus griseus horizontalis) provides lovely blue flowers and quick coverage. Other non-native choices include dymondia

(Dymondia margaretae), a tough, low-profile mat perfect for foot traffic, and creeping thyme (Thymus serpyllum), which releases a pleasant fragrance when walked upon. Trailing rosemary (Rosmarinus officinalis) also offers evergreen texture and culinary uses. All these alternatives thrive in Orange County's climate with very little water.

### **California native corner**Juan's August plant: Coyote mint

Coyote mint (Monardella villosa) is a wonderful perennial herb that blooms in the summer with showy ball-shaped lavender flowers. It has fragrant mint-scented foliage and attracts a variety of pollinators with its nectar-rich blooms. It thrives in well-drained soil in dry, full sun conditions and needs only a little water in summer.





Q: I just moved here from out of state and am seeing water spots on my dishes. Is that normal?

A: Hardness in water is caused by naturally occurring minerals, such as calcium and magnesium. The level of hardness depends very much on where your water comes from.

Southern California typically experiences harder water due to its geology and dependence on groundwater and imported water sources. Those minerals, which are essential to health and give water its taste. can leave deposits on dishes and faucets. Those are the spots you are seeing. To remove them, be sure to use the recommended rinse aid for your dishwasher, and use a vinegar solution to wipe away spots.
